Calls for funding

Maaoupe community members have approached Wattle Range Council for \$100,000 to help provide a phone tower on V&A Lane at Maaoupe.

Christie Gapp, from the Maaoupe Phone Tower Committee, gave a presentation to council last week including correspondence from local businesses impacted daily by the mobile black spot in their community.

"Productivity is adversely affected in the Maaoupe area by the lack of mobile service and results in loss of business and difficulty in taking advantage of new technologies," Ms Gapp said.

"Mental health and safety concerns are also key elements in our push for better telecommunications.

"While our city counterparts are getting excited about the 5G technology available to them, we would just like to be able to sit inside our homes and make a phone call or use emerging AgTech such as animal tracking devices while working in our cattle yards.

"Whatever industry we look at, it is impacted by the lack of adequate phone service in the area," she said.

The presentation from the Maaoupe committee said Maaoupe was a relatively unknown part of the South East with high productivity and some of the areas biggest producers including forestry, viticulture, agriculture, trucking and tourism using roads in the area.

"Safety is a major concern as experienced during the Coles fire in January this year," the presentation said.

Telecommunications were a significant problem during the emergency with local farm fighting units, CFS trucks from Maaoupe and surrounding areas unable to communicate with each other on the fire ground or contact their homes.

Covid antimandate call fails

Covid-19 mandates were debated for almost 30 minutes during Wattle Range Council's meeting last week when Cr Dale Price submitted a Motion on Notice calling for an end to the State Emergency Declaration.

Cr Price requested Council write to the South Australian Premier, Peter Malinauskas, and Member for MacKillop, Nick McBride, emailing a copy to all members recently elected to the South Australian Parliament requesting the cessation of the declaration and all associated Covid-19 mandates during the first sitting of parliament.

In supporting his motion, Cr Price claimed Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data showed that 2657 people had died with Covid-19 while only 83 died as a direct result of Covid19.

However, according to the ABS website, 2639 deaths, where people died with or from Covid-19, had occurred by January 31 this year.

Of those, the majority (2556 deaths) were due directly to Covid-19.

There were a further 83 people who died of other causes (eg cancer) but were Covid-19 positive at the time of

Cr Price ended his submission with the belief it is time to deal with Covid-19 as a normal disease and end the State of

The majority of councillors and Mayor Des Noll spoke during the debate and the motion was lost, only gaining three votes in support.

Council decide on off-leash locations

Wattle Range Council will conduct a 12 month trial of designated off-leash exercise spaces for dogs in Millicent and Penola following recent public consultation about pro-

Sites proposed in Beachport will not be included in the trial due to the public consultation revealing concerns about disturbance to shore birds in the areas proposed.

The public consultation period was from February 15 to March 21 and 53 community members responded to a survey during this period, the majority in favour of the proposed sites, although an additional five submissions related specifically to concerns with proposed sites at Beachport.

At council's monthly meeting last week, elected members accepted a recommendation from the council's senior general inspector, Tim Wilson to conduct a 12 month trial at the following sites:

- McLaughlin Park grassed area west of the Millicent United Soccer clubrooms
- Dog Park Near Millicent Visitor Informa-
- Belt Road walking track (northern end only) from Park Terrace to Saleyards Road
- Bolton Oval sporting area, southern end, south of the drain

- Greenrise Recreational Reserve walking trail
- McCorquindale Park north of main Foot-

In Beachport, the Lagoon off McCourt Street, and Surf Beach from the outlet to 100m from the surf beach carpark, had been proposed to be off-leash areas but submissions from members of the public, including members of Friends of Shorebirds South East, and the South East branch of BirdLife Australia, expressed concern about the possible impact

on bird species including Ruddy Turnstone, Sanderlings, and Latham's Snipe which are known to use the areas.

As a result, Mr Wilson reported to council's meeting last week: "At this point in time, Council staff believe the proposed locations at the Beachport Surf Beach from outlet to 100m from surf beach carpark and the Beachport Lagoon should be excluded from the trial.

"These locations require further investigation regarding protection of the shorebirds.

"Council staff would like to work on this as a separate project with the hope to find a solution that works for all parties before any alterations to the Bylaws.'

Results of the trial will be reported back to council after 12 months before any decisions on officially designated off-leash areas is made.

The off-leash areas were originally proposed to prevent sports grounds from being used for dog exercising.

"We usually get more than 300 people attend the service and I encourage all families to come along," Mr DeGaris said.


'Wreaths will be laid by local service organisations, schools, police, RSL, and the general

Maaoupe residents call on council for \$100k for tower

The committee have met with industry leaders, local state and federal MP's as well as members of Wattle Range Council in their endeavour to find a solution.

Telstra representatives have stated there is no intention in the foreseeable future to place any further infrastructure in the area with the company suggesting the use of boosters and aerials to reduce the impact, placing the financial burden on individuals.

Optus have continued talks with the committee, identifying a potential site on V&A Lane where existing infrastructure is in place.

The never used tower, built by South Australia Police (SAPOL) after Ash Wednesday, has power, is elevated and was built to withstand fire.

In its presentation to council, the committee said the tower, if used, would create a honeycomb effect to allow phone service to reach a greater number of people.

At the council meeting, Optus Territory General Manager for Regional South Australia, Rob Seymour provided information on coverage issues impacting the area and confirmed to councillors that the SAPOL tower is high enough to cover the area and he believed the existing infrastructure would halve the cost of a greenfield build.

Mr Seymour talked about a similar project that proceeded at Wudinna on the West Coast, with Optus paying \$300,000 with the other 50 per cent matched by federal, state and local government funding.

Member for MacKillop, Nick McBride attended the meeting in support of the Maaoupe proposal and said other black spot areas included Mt Burr, Penola, Lucindale and Hatherleigh.

"It's sad that local government needs to be involved in this, it's not part of your charter," Mr McBride said.

Federal Member for Barker, Tony Pasin said, in a statement, that he had been engaging with the Maaoupe community about the issue of mobile phone service in the region.

"The Maaoupe community is a great example of a proactive group of residents seeking to improve services," Mr Pasin said.

The \$811.8 million Connecting Regional Australia initiative will be a great opportunity for communities across Barker when it opens for applications. "I'll be continuing to work with com-

munities like Maaoupe to see the initiative deliver improved telecommunications," Mr Various questions were asked during the

presentation to council but no resolution was made.

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War service of a nurse

Margaret Ann Sutherland, known as Maggie, was a nurse in the First World War.

Born in Millicent on March 8, 1888, she was the daughter of William and Christina (nee McArthur) Sutherland who lived at Lossie House, Millicent.

Maggie was the only sister of William, James John (known as Jack) and Peter.

After three years training at the Adelaide General Hospital, Maggie enlisted with the Australian Medical Corp and left Australia on August 27, 1915, aboard the ship 'Morea'.

Her position was Staff Nurse and her duty of care was looking after Australian soldiers injured at Gallipoli and included service in Egypt.

During her service overseas her father, William, died in November 1915 leaving she and two of her siblings unable to attend his funeral as brother Peter was also on active service and William Sutherland junior was farming in Madagascar.

In March 2016, Nurse Sutherland returned to Australia from Egypt where she had been engaged at a military hospital in Cairo.

She was one of the nursing staff on the steamer 'Suffolk' carrying wounded and sick soldiers, landing in Melbourne.

At this stage she was not certain if she would have to go back again as she had applied for her discharge but within days the military authority had requested she return to duty.

Nurse Sutherland's final date of discharge was April 27,1916, after 196 days abroad and 246 days of total service.

In December 2016 a local medal was presented to returned soldiers and there was a quandary as to whether Nurse Sutherland should receive the same medal as soldiers.

The committee came to the conclusion that she ranked as one of the soldiers and they presented her with the same medal as they were giving the men.

Maggie married Francis Edwards in Millicent on the December 31,1925, and lived in Deniliquin, New South Wales, until her death on January 14, 1959, in Beechworth, Victoria.

She had a daughter Christine (1926-2017) and son John Sutherland Edwards (1929-

Entrance sign discussions for Tantanoola

Twelve Tantanoola residents, along with councillors Moira Neagle and Sharon Cox, recently met with Wattle Range Council employees to discuss and update the existing community town plan.

The previous town plan had identified town entry signage as a priority and discussions continued to ensure the long awaited signs reflect the community's visions.

The current design included three images with Wattle Range Council's Director of Development Services, Emma Clay telling the group that signage specialists recommend a single image works better than multiple

images on signs.

"If you're going to use a photo (on signs) it's best practice to have one image and a really clear message," she said at the town meeting last week.

The option to have different photos on each entry was put forward as was the possibility of having a third entrance sign on Poonada Road to greet tourists coming off the windfarm drive.

Other signage on the highway and pedestrian signage within the town will be branded as part of council's broader Wayfinding Signage Strategy currently being designed.

The entrance signs will be about two metres by 1.75 metres and it is hoped the Tan-

tanoola signage will be installed by June 30.

Mount Burr community members had the opportunity to revisit their town plan a week earlier also discussing the town's entry signage.

Attendees discussed preference for an entrance statement made from Corten steel, possibly combined with timber or limestone blocks, and an image cut into the steel to represent the town's timber mill history.

A suggestion to include solar lighting to enhance the town's name on the entrance statement at night was put forward and the community is now waiting for two entrance statement options to come back from the designer they can then make a decision on.

Strategic land use plan changed after public feedback

Millicent's Matheson Road Scrub block will be excluded from residential use in Wattle Range Council's next stage of developing a 25 year Strategic Land Use Plan following community feedback to consultants recently.

Public consultation on initial reports for the land use plan was open between February 18 and March 23 with people encouraged to complete a survey and participate in public meetings with Adelaide based planning consultants, Holmes Dyer.

A total of 84 submissions were received as a result of the consultation.

Reporting to council's monthly meeting last week, the consultants said: "Respondents raised a broad range of points of both a specific and general nature, all of which will be useful in evolving the Strategic Land Use Plan moving forward ..."

However, the consultants said there were three points consistently raised, one being the Matheson Road Scrub block.

"The community were strongly opposed to the development of the scrub block on Matheson Road," read the report from the consultants tabled at the council meeting.

"Instead, the Draft Plan will look to consider how this site can better support nature-based recreation.

"This may include better links to the township, walking trails, and/or connections to Lake McIntyre."

The consultant's report also said that potential conservation areas in Southend and Rendelsham were consistently raised.

"The community were generally opposed

to the idea of rezoning areas around Rendelsham and Southend which are currently zoned for rural residential development," read the report.

"However, this idea was put forward on the basis that this land may not be suitable for residential development under current planning policy, primarily due to native vegetation concerns.

"While community feedback suggests that such native vegetation should not be an issue, this would be in the hands of the Native Vegetation Council. "Further investigation may seek to consider this further, but it is important to emphasise that the question is not immediately whether these areas should be rezoned, but whether they can in fact be developed at present.

"At present, the owners of the properties, when seeking to develop them, would be required to prove to the State Government agencies through appropriate investigations, that the proposal was acceptable.

"If the land is suitable, then its development would likely be a welcome boost to land supply in Southend. "Council may therefore wish to leave the zoning as-is, with the relevant Overlays providing an appropriate safeguard on development which may be environmentally inappropriate.

"However, it will therefore be important to ensure that the appropriate Overlays are applied correctly."

The consultant's report said coastal erosion was the third consistent issue brought up during the consultation period.

"The community were substantially concerned by issues of erosion in both Beachport and Southend," said the report.

"These issues stretch beyond just the scope of this plan, but it is nonetheless important to this plan.

"Further consideration will therefore need to be given to this issue by Council and other stakeholders in order to arrive at a position which can determine future actions."

The consultants will consider the community feedback when drafting the 25 Year Strategic Land Use Plan.

A draft is expected to be available mid this year for public feedback in phase two of community consultation on the plan.

Once completed, the plan is aimed at providing a 25-year strategic roadmap for land use planning with integrated consideration of infrastructure, servicing, community facilities, transport and other factors.

The plan will also be used to initiate future amendments to the Planning and Design Codes which may include zone changes in some areas.

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Nationals announce candidate

Marram Grass has been holding sand dunes in Beachport steady for almost 40 years.

First planted in Beachport in the 1970s, the grass grows quickly, putting in roots and keeping the dunes steady by trapping sand.

District ranger for the Limestone Coast, Ross Anderson, said the marram grass has been a fixture in the area since it was first introduced decades ago.

"In the Beachport Conservation Park there was a big program there using it in the 70s and 80s," Mr Anderson said.

"The park itself was largely eroding sand at that time, now there are very few areas like that.

"We have found that largely in the areas we have planted Marram Grass it has been replaced by native vegetation.

"I think in the future we could use some native vegetation, there are some native grasses we could use if we were going to vegetate blowing sand instead of marram grass."

An introduced species from Europe, while marram grass is effective, its ability to quickly spread can cause problems.

The plant can also produce coastal landforms which may be different to their natural shapes such as steep faced dunes.

It is a less commonly used method of avoiding erosion today.

"At the time it was the best thing we had, and it did stabilise a heck of a lot of mobile dunes in places like Beachport," Mr Anderson said.

"We still have areas with unstable dunes, but we tend these days to manage the disturbance of those dunes to allow them to revegetate naturally by keeping vehicles off areas where they should not be driving.

"We find that a lot of the natural regeneration is happening."

Mr Anderson said one of the most pressing threats to the national park are rabbits.

"The other thing we do from time to time is manage rabbit populations as rabbits can bare off the vegetation significantly," he said.

"One of the things we are getting a lot of benefit from in the coastal areas is the fact that a virus came through in 1994 and drastically reduced rabbit populations that has allowed vegetation to get back as well.

"Rabbit levels are nowhere near where they were prior to the virus coming.

"From time to time we will do rabbit control in certain areas; we have not had to do a lot of it along the coast in recent years."

The national park is enjoyed by campers, nature lovers, and four-wheel drivers.

The park's popularity is evident according to Mr Anderson.

"One of the main things that has happened along the coast in recent years is the visitation has gone up a lot," he said.

"I guess it may have a lot to do with Covid and people wanting to get out and about and explore the natural environment.

"Coastal areas are getting a lot higher visitation then they were 10 years ago."

However, with extra visitors comes extra environmental impacts, and Mr Anderson said everyone needs to follow the rules when visiting a park.

"Some places were probably getting to the stage of many more people would be causing a problem," he said.

"It is probably not the numbers itself but the timing of it.

"It is just flat out over times like January and Easter, but other times of the year is reasonably quiet.

"Along the coast it is mostly people getting out and about in four-wheel drives; more and more people have them these days.

"Not everybody obeys the rules is the issue."

Mr Anderson said they may need to look at future regeneration projects in the area, but at this stage it is manageable.

Fireworks funding may go up in smoke

Fireworks at Beachport's traditional New Year's Eve celebrations could be limited to a single display for the upcoming event.

The popular event for tourists and locals alike has not been held since 2019 due to Covid-19 restrictions impacting the 2020/21 display and the late cancellation by a contractor forcing the event to be abandoned for 2021/22.

Increased insurance premiums has placed significant burden on the cost of the displays

which have doubled since last held in 2019, with estimates now in excess of \$20,000.

Due to increased costs the Beachport District Development Association had requested an increase from \$2,000 previously received from Wattle Range Council in support of the event, requesting \$10,000 annually for four years.

At council's monthly meeting last week, discussion revolved around the substantial

funding increase to provide the two fireworks sessions traditionally held, one earlier in the evening and another at midnight.

Discussion included questioning the environmental impact of fireworks and if two firework displays were required on the night.

A recommendation to support the event was amended prior to being carried by a majority vote with the amount reduced to \$5,000 to assist with a single fireworks display instead of the original \$10,000 requested.

Lowering the shot

Beachport Golf Club has turned to Wattle Range Council for help to create a new tee to avoid errant golf balls landing on the adjoining rinks of Beachport Bowling Club.

At council's meeting last week, a letter was tabled from golf club president Lyn White asking for council to fund earthworks quoted at \$23,496 to develop a new sunken first tee block near the clubrooms which would create an amphitheatre with embankments designed to stop wayward golf balls heading in any other direction than intended.

"This [the funding] will enable the Beachport Golf Club to complete the works as soon as possible," Ms White wrote.

"The current situation is affecting our members, restricting the playing course, and providing an unsightly entrance to any visitors."

Council's elected members voted to accept an agenda recommendation for the Beachport Golf Club to apply for funding under council's 2022/23 round of its Community Infrastructure Grants program.

Applications for this are expected to open in July this year.

Council's decision follows a deputation made to council's March meeting by Ms White and club member Lyell MacGregor.

At that meeting, the pair told elected members the plans for the new sunken tee were developed by professional course designer, Neil Crafters, and improvements associated with the new tee would cost a total of almost \$50,000 with the deputation suggesting council cover the cost of earth works while the golf club would cover the remainder.

The work would address the bowling club's reports that up to ten stray balls each week had been entering the bowling area, despite vegetation on the boundary between the golf and bowling areas.

To address this, the golf club closed two of its risen tees next to its clubhouse which, with a less than straight shot - or strong winds - resulted in the golf balls flying onto the bowling rinks through a gap in trees to the right side of the tee.

Instead, a temporary tee has been located lower and immediately opposite the bowling club which requires a tee off with the bowling club behind the golfer.

Ms White said while the club had been in operation for more than 70 years, the first complaint about errant golf balls came in 2005 and the problem was then addressed by a row of trees that were planted to create a barrier.

This worked until some of the trees were allegedly poisoned by persons unknown and

the resulting gap allowed for some of the golf shots to get through.

In 2020 council approached the club with a request to provide a solution as a result of concerns from the Beachport Bowling Club and a new tee block was created for green fee players while a new men's tee block was created closer to the tree line. While these measures cost the club \$7000, with assistance from council with minor earth works, the change did not resolve the situation so that the problematic tees were closed off with orange bunting and since just before last Christmas all players now tee off from a short course marker opposite the bowls club until the new sunken tee can be built.

Crafty solution required

Millicent Craft Group has progressed a step closer in their aim to build a six metre extension off the existing building at the group's Fifth Street site.

Secretary of the Millicent Craft Group, Pat Muhovics and President Raz McDonald gave a presentation at council's April meeting last week asking for support to assist in bringing the \$51,000 extension to lock up stage.

The group was previously encouraged to apply for council's Community Infrastructure Grants program which requires a 50 per cent co-contribution.

Through fundraising efforts, the group has achieved the co-contribution amount and received development approval for the project.

Unfortunately the group was recently informed the current full lease agreement between council and the group for the land and building means they are ineligible for the Community Infrastructure Grants as these grants cannot be used for a council facility.

To address this, Wattle Range Council has recently agreed to provide in-principle support for the chief executive officer, Ben Gower, to enter into a new land only lease arrangement with the group.

With the current lease due to expire at the end of this year, an option to change to a land only lease would allow the group to apply for infrastructure grants.

The group would then control the building asset allowing them to make decisions on the building, borrow funds against it, and apply for infrastructure grants.

It would also make the group responsible for future capital renewal costs they are not currently responsible for.

Ms Muhovics noted in their presentation

the group is unique to the region in that it combines pottery, fibre arts and art and craft under the one roof.

The People's Choice Award voting will close on May 9.



Toyota Land Cruiser Prado ready for adventures

Since the original Prado debuted in 1996, it has clocked up more than 300,000 sales, making it Australia's best-selling SUV over the past 19 years.

Now in its fourth generation, the current model was launched 13 years ago, so it is not surprising that it's starting to show its age.

Prado was last updated in 2020, with more power for the engine and add-ons across the range, but when you get down to it -- it's basically the same old car.

The style hasn't changed much since it was squared off a few years ago.

For grades apart from GX, customers can choose between having the spare mounted on the tailgate or hidden under the rear of the vehicle.

The latter option replaces the second or sub-fuel tank, which reduces the total fuel capacity from 150 to 87 litres.

This won't be an issue for city dwellers, but could give country folk pause for thought, especially those in outback locations where fuel stops are few and far between.

The top of the range Kakadu is very well equipped.

It has leather accented trim, three-zone climate air, keyless entry and start, tint for the rear windows, and a tilt-and-slide sunroof.

There are also 19-inch alloys, daytime LEDs, auto high beam, auto lights and wipers, front and rear parking sensors with rear cross traffic alert, panoramic and multi-terrain monitor, adaptive variable suspension, rear air suspension with auto levelling, rearseat entertainment and crawl control and multi-terrain select off-road aids.

A new-generation multimedia system across the range incorporates a larger 9.0-

inch touchscreen, enhanced voice recognition, built-in satellite navigation, and compatibility with Apple CarPlay, Android Auto and myToyota, which enables third-party apps such as Waze, AccuWeather and Stitcher

There is also AM/FM/Digital Radio with premium JBL 14-speaker audio plus a 9.0-inch rear seat entertainment system with three pairs of wireless headphones.

All four grades are powered by a 2.8-litre four-cylinder turbo-diesel that produces 150kW of power and 500Nm of torque.

It's paired with a six-speed auto (with paddles shifters in the Kakadu) and drive to all four wheels through a full-time four-wheel drive system, with high and low range and lockable Torsen-style centre diff.

It has seven airbags and a five-star safety rating.

The pre-collision safety system includes autonomous emergency braking which can now detect cyclists during the day and pedestrians night and day.

Prado's lane-departure alert system now offers steering assistance by applying the brakes to one side of the vehicle to help prevent it drifting unintentionally into another lane

Newly adopted road-sign assist can recognise speed-limit changes and can reset the cruise-control to take a new limit into consideration.

The turbo diesel produces 20kW more power and 50Nm more torque than before which is a significant increase, especially the torque.

The extra performance comes from a new ball-bearing turbocharger with a larger turbine and impeller, and improved engine rigidity and cooling.

At the same time, it achieves better fuel economy thanks to optimised pistons and piston rings, changes to the cylinder block and head, higher fuel-injection flow rate and the adoption of high-performance materials for the exhaust manifold.

Despite the increase in power, fuel consumption has been shaved from $8.0\,$ to 7.9L/100km and CO2 emissions are down to $209\,g/km$.

We were getting a very creditable 9.2L/100km after over 400km behind the wheel.

The tailgate window does however open independently for quick access.

Because the swing tailgate opens sideways it can be a handful to operate if the vehicle is standing on a hill.

Prado is not a car that likes to be rushed, either on or off road, in a straight line or through corners.

The turbo takes a second or two to spool up, then torque comes on hot and strong with a rush, adding some unpredictability to throttle response.

Importantly, overtaking is still not the easiest of manoeuvres, requiring some planning and spending too much time on the wrong side of the road.

Ride is cushy, old school, bordering on rolly-polly, thanks to softish suspension and high centre of gravity, although you can adjust the suspension by switching drive modes -- with Sport+, Sport, Normal, Eco and Comfort modes from which to choose.

The beige/blonde wood interior trim dates the car, as do the analogue instrument gauges.

Off road Prado is a force to be reckened.

Kakadu gets the clever, Aussie-designed Kinetic Dynamic Suspension System and Multi-Terrain Select system.

When it senses a wheel drop, the system can disengage the stabiliser bars allowing opposing wheels to move independently of each other.

It's the difference between having a wheel spinning uselessly in the air or that wheel on the ground where it can help to push the vehicle forward.

With crawl control activated, all the driver has to do is steer, even in the roughest conditions

Prado can tow a 3000kg braked trailer, van or boat.

It is covered by a five-year warranty with two years extended engine and driveline coverage

Capped price servicing is \$260 per service up to three years, with complimentary map upgrades for 3 years.

Toyota Prado is an ideal vehicle for family adventure, with a braked towing capacity of 3000kg and strong off-road capability.

"Next season we will plan for another big one," he said.


"We have a National title for the Junior Sedans and possibly a couple of State titles.
