Royal audience

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Former Penola resident, Craig Broughill had the trip of a lifetime when he and his children supported his wife as a competitor at the Invictus Games in Hague, the Netherlands, last

Injured while serving in the navy, Craig's wife Vanessa competed in the Games, which were founded by The Duke of Sussex, Prince Harry, for wounded military personnel.

Meeting the Prince and the Duchess of Sussex was one of the highlights of their trip, along with supporting Vanessa in collecting a swag of medals including gold in long jump, silver for time trial cycling, and bronze for discus, which added to a silver for discus and bronze for long jump which she won at her first Invictus Games held in Sydney in 2018.

Craig was born in Penola, went to primary school in the town and still has relatives living in Penola.

As a young boy, Craig and his family moved away from Penola in 1993 to settle on Kanga-

Talking to The Penola Pennant, Craig said he joined the navy in March 2001 as a Combat Systems Operator, specialising in sonar systems.

"I was quickly deployed to the Middle East in 2002 and again in 2003 onboard HMAS Newcastle where I was specifically involved in the boarding operations to prevent illegal trading and maintain security in the region," Craig said.

"In 2008 I had a career change to work in Cryptologic Systems, which involved intercepting and analysing communication transmissions.

"In 2010 I was deployed again to the Middle East onboard HMAS Paramatta.

Craig was transferred to the Naval Cadets in 2013 where he still serves when the opportunity arises.

Nangwarry store owner

There has been a changing of the guard at the Nangwarry Store after 23 years.

Kevin and Cheryle Dinnison operated the store up until April 19.

"It was really uncanny that we purchased the store from Geoff and Denise McDonald on April 19, 1999 and sold on April 19, 2022," Mrs Dinnison said.

"When we purchased the store our plan was to stay for five years and 23 years later we were still there."

The Dinnisons have had tremendous support from the Nangwarry community over the .years, however the business was hugely affected by the Nangwarry Sawmill closing down.

Cheryle said: "I used to do a lot of lunches and catering for the mill which had an employment number at one stage of 400 people.

"We also had agencies for the Savings and Loans and Bank SA and when they were taken away it was another blow to our business."

Kevin said: "We opened the shop seven days a week and never closed once in the 23 years, except for half a day when we had a funeral.

"We plan to rest up a bit and spend more time with the grand children."

Cheryle said: "I miss them already as they used to come to the shop every day."

"I had a few tears when I walked out the door for the last time," she said.

The Dinnisons are very involved in the Nangwarry Football club so they wont be going anywhere during the football season.

The new owner of the store is Lewis Hanna from Alice Springs. Mr Hanna moved to Nangwarry about 12 months ago as the housing was affordable, the weather was much better, and there was an opportunity to buy a business.

"I, along with employee Mick Waye, plan to expand the takeaway food side of things and gradually add more stock," Lewis said.

The shop will continue to operate seven days a week with staff looking forward to continued support from the Nangwarry community.

Mayor's old letter

Nearly 30 people gathered in the Millicent library's history room on Tuesday to witness the opening of an envelope found in the town's recently opened time capsule which was sealed 27 years ago.

The enclosed letter was written in 1995 by Millicent's Mayor at the time Jim Van Schaik (now deceased) to the current mayor.

In attendance to witness the reading of the letter by Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll was Jim's wife Mary Van Schaik with Noel Boyle introducing the former Mayoress.

Mr Boyle read a short story about Mrs Van Schaik's time with Jim, supporting his role while they managed several businesses in addition to council and Mayoral duties.


Before the letter was opened Des Noll applauded Mayor Van Schaik's vision, particularly in regards to the support he gave to building the new library which received a lot of debate at the time, but is now the centre of the Millicent community.

Mayor Noll compared the controversy surrounding the size and cost of the library in 1995 to the debate currently surrounding Wattle Range Council's planned new administration building.

The 1995 letter, addressed to the Mayor and residents of Millicent, reflected on the challenging period in history the town encountered as it suffered from declining population through lack of employment opportunities.

Mayor Van Schaik's letter spoke of hoping to restore confidence in the community with the forming of Millicent's Economic Development committee, Main Street committee and the Rendelsham Youth Camp Project.

Mayor Noll reflected on his involvement with the Rendelsham project (Noorla Yo-Long) at that time and he recalled touring the site with Mayor Van Schaik.

Mayor Van Schaik wrote in his letter, drafted on a District Council of Millicent letterhead: "In 1995 we have a great town that we can be proud of" and he was sure that many improvements would be undertaken in the next 25 years.

Touchingly Mr Van Schaik wrote: "I hope to be still about to share the pride in Millicent in 2020" finishing the letter by wishing everyone a very happy 150th from his wife and himself.

Mrs Van Schaik said it was a spontaneous decision to drop in to the library late last year during the Covid-19 delayed Millicent 150th celebrations shortly after the time capsule had been opened.

On arrival Mrs VanSchaik was handed a letter she had written for the time capsule about her business, Michael James Giftware, and was pleasantly surprised to also discover the letter written by her husband which she didn't know he had written.

Mr Van Schaik's youngest sister, Thea Richards from Mount Gambier, also attended the event with her husband Graeme, and said she found if quite emotional to hear the letter being read.

The letter is available in the library to read and residents have until May 13 to submit entries for the time capsule before it is resealed for the next 25 years.

In his navy career Craig has visited a lot of Middle East countries with Jordan, India and The Maldives being his most memorable.

"I met my wife Vanessa at Borneo Barracks, an army base just north of Toowoomba in 2008, where we where both completing our training," he said.

The Broughills have three children, Zachary, 10, Avyanna, 8, and Hamish, 7.

Vanessa began her Invictus Games journey in 2018 when she was first selected in the Australian team to compete in Sydney.

After her success there she was selected in the Australian team for the 2020 games that were to be hosted at Hague in the Netherlands.

However, due to Covid-19 these games were postponed twice and were finally held last month.

Craig said: "Vanessa's injury and illnesses include both physical and mental.

"She has had multiple surgeries to repair her shoulder and she suffers from depression and anxiety."

At the games Vanessa competed in athletics (100m and 200m sprints, long jump and

minute and one minute rowing races, powerlifting, time trial cycling and criterium racing, sitting volleyball and a Landrover driving challenge.

'We are super proud of Vanessa and everything she has been able to achieve at these games," Craig said.

"She is an inspiration to our family and many others.'

Craig said: "Attending the Invictus Games has been an amazing experience.

"Getting to know the rest of Team Australia, competitors from other countries and hearing their stories on what they had to overcome has also been so uplifting."

Craig said a special moment during the opening ceremony for the Games was when team Ukraine was introduced.

"The atmosphere and feeling in the stadium was remarkable as they had to leave their war torn country to attend the games and many would be returning to fight for their homes once the games had finished," Craig said.

Meeting Prince Harry and his wife Meghan, the Duchess of Sussex, was another special moment for the Broughills.

"Getting to meet Prince Harry and Meghan was a wonderful opportunity," Craig

"They seemed very down to earth people and easy to chat to.

"We spoke about The Hague and what a great place to host the games.

"They took great interest in the kids and were happy to speak openly about their own children," Craig said.

"The kids had an awesome time in the Hague and were very happy and proud to be able to see their Mum compete in the games and when we had a spare moment they were pretty keen to to get around Zuiderpark [the complex at which the Invictus Games was held] and do all the fun family activities.'

"Another fun filled experience was the kids being able to drive the mini Landrovers," Craig said.

The Broughills have returned to their home in the Barossa Valley.



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

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Skating to a scholarship

Scholarships with a difference are currently on offer to keen Limestone Coast skateboarders aged 15 and over.

YMCA Action Sports, in conjunction with Sport Australia, are offering Skate Coach scholarships which aim to teach people to become qualified skateboarding coaches and include how to manage skate programs and events.

Information from the Sports Australia online application values the scholarship at more than \$700 and provides National Skateboard Coaching accreditation. The three month program is a combination of both online and in-person sessions which cover how to create skateboarding workshops, officiate competitions, understand legal compliance and risk management, and basic marketing skills.

Scholarships include a one year Skate Australia Membership, Skate Australia Skateboarding Coaching Accreditation, Working With Children's Check, First Aid and CPR certificate and Australian Safeguarding Children and Young People certificate.

Successful applicants will be part of a nationwide team delivering Action Sport programs such as the National Accredited Skate Park Leagues, All Aboard Skate Sessions (inschool and weekend sessions) and YMCA Skate Club. Applications are open until June and more information is available from Wattle Range Council's Community Development Officer or the YMCA Action Sports website.

Brumby's change of life

Millicent attendees at the recent Anzac Day mid morning service were witness to a unique experience when members of Naracoorte's Troop of the 3rd Light Horse Regiment (Australian Light Horse Association) formed a catafalque party at the Cross of Sacrifice.

It's unknown if a catafalque party with horses has been performed before in Australia and it's a possibility this was a first.

Rider Tim Goodes said: "We came to Millicent a few weeks ago for a meeting with Chris [Mathias, President of the Millicent Returned and Services League sub-branch] to work out what they wanted and he suggested we form the catafalque party.

"Our horses have never done that before and we didn't practice until the day.

"We got there at 9am and within half an hour every horse had nailed what they had to do."

Few people would have been aware that the horse ridden by Mr Goodes on the day is a rehomed Mount Kosciuszko brumby.

The brumby, Murray, was mustered in the wild, then retrained and broken in by a family friend. Purchased by Mr Goodes in September last year, Murray had only been in training as a Light Horse since December.

An extraordinary amount of time and effort goes into training the horses, with Mr Goodes explaining he would ride Murray around the streets of Kalangadoo after dark to get him used to walking through the town at night and prepare him for the dawn service appearance at Naracoorte.

"If he wasn't trained he probably wouldn't do what we wanted because of the dark," Mr Goodes said.

"It's the reason I walked up first to form the guard because the other horses wouldn't go on their own first.

"But Murray isn't as used to forming the (horizontal) line formation as the others so he

was happy to go first and lead the others."

Mr Goodes is one of the original foundation members of the Naracoorte regiment and has been involved with the Australian Light Horse Association for about 10 years.

The association is a non-profit organisation tasked with preserving the history and traditions of the Australian Light Horse.

The Naracoorte regiment currently has six riders and four nurses who mostly appear at Anzac services but will perform elsewhere by invitation.

As the Light Horse they've been invited to events in Western Australia and the Jericho Cup in Warrnambool.

One of Mr Goodes' best memories was his involvement with the Gallipoli Trench Project in Geraldton, Western Australia.

The project is a life sized replica of Leane's Trench, a Turkish Trench at Gallipoli captured by Captain Leane and 200 volunteers from 11th Battalion on July 31/August 1, 1915.

"We were invited to attend a re-enactment and four of us put our hand up to go.

"We had four horses donated to ride when we got up there; we had never seen these horses before and didn't know what we were getting.

"Machine guns and cannons were firing blanks, the full noise was unreal.

"If you shut your eyes you'd swear you were at war.

"The airstrip was right alongside, we had First World War planes landing next to us and flying over.

"It was a highlight of my Light Horse career."

Lessons in controlling your pests on farm

Landholders will have the opportunity to learn how to control a variety of pests at a masterclass being held next week at the Cornish family's Boolara property at Coonawarra.

People intending to go to the masterclass need to book by this Saturday.

The masterclass will held next Thursday and will include lessons on how to best control foxes, rabbits, deer and unpalatable grasses.

Participants will learn from experts in invasive species from the Department of Primary Industries and Regions, landscape and project officers from the Limestone Coast Landscape Board, and a National Parks and Wildlife Service ranger offering advice and support.

Supported by the Commonwealth Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment, the masterclass will cover topics such

as DeerScan, lures for foxes, the fox bounty program, rabbit warren destruction and fumigation, rabbit calicivirus, poison storage, signage, safety and bait laying, traps, Canid Pest Ejectors, identification and control of Coolatai grass, African lovegrass and Chilean needlegrass, and kangaroo destruction permits.

Attendees will also be able to purchase fox baits.








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Arts Festival nearly here

A premiere opera performance in a cabaret setting, a family pARTy in the heart of Penola, and a night of grass roots music heads up a jam-packed program for the 30th Penola Coonawarra Arts Festival next week.

Being held from May 12 to 15, the festival will have more than 40 venues across Penola and Coonawarra abuzz with more than 50 events including exhibitions, workshops, competitions, comedy, live music and performances. The festival begins at 5.30pm on Thursday, May 12, with the announcement of the winner of the John Shaw Neilson Acquisitive Art Prize with an exhibition of entries at the Penola High School Hall.

With the festival this year coinciding with the 150th anniversary of the birth in Penola of John Shaw Neilson - one of Australia's most renowned poets of the late 1880's and early 1900's - the art prize pays homage to him and this year will boast prize money of \$12,000 thanks to the long-term supporter The Balnaves Foundation. There will also be a Limestone Coast Local Art Prize of \$1000 sponsored by renowned local artist Lois Hodge. A Design Prize of \$1000 will also be revealed, offering the winner the opportunity to have their work incorporated into all marketing material for the 2023 festival.

At 7pm the same night, the doors will open at the Rymill Hall for an 8pm curtains up for a Co-Opera premiere performance of the one act comic opera 'Gianni Schicchi' by Giacomo Puccini, made possible by the Regional Arts Fund which supports the arts in regional and remote Australia. Other features of the festival include a Family 'pARTy' which will take place on Sunday, May 15, from 11am on the Mary MacKillop Memorial School's Oval, along with community activities 'Down the Lane' in Petticoat Lane and the surrounding lawns in the historical heart of Penola.

Families are invited to join arty activities, face painting and fundraising stalls for local schools supported by a grant from the Stand Like Stone Foundation. Enjoy local produce along with a free afternoon of entertainment featuring magicians, circus acts, music and a giant birthday cake.

The popular Literary Brunch will also be on the Sunday at Coonawarra's Ottelia with a stellar line up of film creatives including producer Nick Batzias together with director and screenwriter Justin Kurzel to explore their award-winning Australian film Nitram (Martin spelt backwards). The controversial film tells the story of notorious convicted murderer Martin Bryant in the lead up to the Port Arthur massacre in Tasmania in 1996. Seasoned or aspiring buskers of any sort who'd like to try their talent on an audience can sign up for the Busking and Open Mic Competition which is the newest addition to the festival line up.

"We have plenty of reasons to celebrate this year, reaching the 30 year milestone and 150 years of John Shaw Neilson, who forms the centre point of our unique Festival," he said.

"We invite everyone to come and experience what promises to be a fabulous Festival celebration, and to enjoy the performances, workshops, wineries, galleries, gardens, food and wine of Penola and Coonawarra over this exciting weekend," he said.

"It's hard to give an exact number to expect, but even when you just look at the people who come here and do performances, that is an income to the region," he said.

"They all have to have somewhere to stay and they'll go out to eat somewhere and a lot stay on for the whole festival, and then there are the people that come as visitors."

Mr Mossop said the festival did great things for the entire Penola Coonawarra region, not just the arts.

He said the festival has historically attracted people from as far as Adelaide and Melbourne.


"The festival is activating locals, bringing people in from the Limestone Coast and then there is a percentage that come and stay from further away," he said.

Navara PRO-4X Warrior

On the outside it's dark, some might say foreboding, the Navara PRO-4X Warrior, to give it its full title, is engineered for tough going off road and comfort while cruising the bitumen.

This is all down to the continued input of Aussie automotive product development and engineering consultancy Premcar, in which the pickup's off-road improvements were tested on regular road surfaces to ensure the everyday ride and handling were not compromised.

Enhancements in wheel, tyre and suspension come up with better ground clearance and improved ride and handling, while wider stance, redesigned front end, plus new Cooper all-terrain rubber, complete a range of rugged

In practical terms, the PRO-4X Warrior has been given a gross vehicle mass boost of 100 kilograms to 3250 kg, plus a payload of 961 kg for manual vehicles and 952 kg for the automatics

With wider track - 1600 mm from 1570 mm - ground clearance has been lifted from 220 mm to 260 mm, while approach angle goes from 32 degrees to 36 degrees and departure angle trimmed from 19.8 degrees to 19 degrees due to the fitment of a full-size spare tyre with alloy wheel.

The Aussie developed Warrior has taken on the standard equipment of the PRO-4X, in-

cluding a new 7-inch driver assistance instrument cluster, a high resolution 8-inch touchscreen display incorporating Apple CarPlay and Android Auto connectivity and leatheraccented interior.

Competitively priced at \$69,990, plus onroad costs, the Navara PRO-4X Warrior automatic on test comes up against some mighty opposition in the Mazda BT-50 Thunder (\$68,990 drive-away), Toyota HiLux Rugged X (\$69,990) and Ford Ranger Raptor (\$77,690).

In typical Navara 'ready for anything' style, up front the PRO-4X Warrior carries a new Nissan winch, compatible Safari-style bull bar with integrated LED light strip and new 'Navara' branded red skid plate, plus a 3 mm steel secondary under-body protection plate.

The robust black test vehicle, with a new decal pack announcing the Warrior's presence from all angles, sported model-specific fender flares adding bulk to the body width, while a new towbar set-up out back was on hand for any serious towing.

The pickup rolls on Cooper Discoverer All Terrain AT3 275 / 70 / R17 tyres with increased tread depth and specific pattern.

Unlike others of the big pickup ilk, the PRO-4X Warrior eschews sombre cabin decor, relying on grey headlining to give the space a light and airy ambience.

Occupants will never be left wondering what they are riding in, the word 'Warrior' is plastered all over the place, from the embroidered front headrests to the orange accented

Occupants have the benefit of a smart key, satellite navigation, Apple CarPlay and Android Auto.

The screen helps the driver slot the big truck (nearly five-and-half metres long) into car park spots with 360-degree cameras.

In a move to keep costs down, engineers left the engine alone.

It's the regular Navara 2.3-litre twin-turbo four-cylinder diesel engine delivering 140 kW and 450 Nm, putting power to ground through a seven-speed automatic transmission in our test vehicle.

With seven airbags, the PRO-4X Warrior features intelligent forward collision warning and intelligent emergency braking, as well as vehicle dynamic control, brake limited slip differential, anti-skid brakes, electronic brakeforce distribution, traction control and brake assist.

The high revving engine produces enough power to handle various loads, while the bulky body and wide tyres add wind and road noise to the hum.

A turning circle of 12.7 metres puts parking moves at a premium.

Nissan claims fuel consumption at 8.1 litres per 100 kilometres on the combined urban / highway cycle.

The test car turned in 10.1 litres per 100 kilometres over a week of town and country

A revised suspension with new spring rates provides more front-end support, hence less

greater control of wheels, improved isolation of the cabin from impacts and reduced float

Head, leg and shoulder room all-round the cabin is above average and air-con outlets are extended to the rear seating, which on a long
