Support chopped

A last minute move to save a row of cypress trees on Penola's Clarke Street has failed after Riddoch ward councillor Dean Burrow this week unsuccessfully tried to reverse a decision to remove the trees.

At Wattle Range Council's monthly meeting on Tuesday, Cr Burrow moved a motion to rescind a decision made at council's March meeting to "remove the cypress trees from the parkland and replace them with appropriate trees as a part of the Coonawarra Rail Trail landscape development".

Council plans to develop the site including building an amenities block and carpark as the starting point of the Rail Trail.

Cr Burrow told the Penola Pennant that the trees dominate the skyline from the new bypass and screen the industrial area from residential housing.

He said the cost of removing the trees is outweighed by the benefit of keeping them.

"By leaving them there, a beautiful park could be created," Cr Burrow.

He said he has had advice from a retired forester that the trees live for a long time and can be pruned.

"They live to 100 years plus and are not being removed due to poor health," Cr Burrow said.

"I have been advised that they can be pruned up to a height of three metres above ground level to prevent the risk of fire."

He acknowledged that there has been divided opinion on the future of the trees from local residents.

"One person told me that they [the trees] are unsightly and another is concerned about them blowing over," he said.

"I appreciate their concern, however, my reading on the internet indicates that they are a very stable tree and they don't tend to blow over."

Cr Burrow said he was open to compromise.

Arts prize evening

The judging and announcement of the Penola-Coonawarra Arts Festival's John Shaw Neilson Acquisitive art prize and the Limestone Coast local prize will take place today at the Penola High school.

The John Shaw Neilson section has attracted 51 entries with paintings entered from all over South Australia and interstate.

Penola-Coonawarra Arts Festival Chairman, John Mossop said: "We are very pleased with the number of entries considering these trying times."

"We had 54 last year so the strong support is still there."

The acquisitive art prize offers prizemoney of \$12,000 sponsored by The Balnaves Foundation which has been a generous sponsor of the art prize for many years.

It is a private philanthropic organisation established in 2006 by Neil Balnaves AO to provide support to charitable enterprises across Australia.

The competition is open to all emerging and established artists throughout Australia and entries must be inspired by the works of early Penola poet, John Shaw Neilson.

The winner of the local Limestone Coast section will receive \$1000.

This prize is sponsored by Lois Hodge, a long time supporter of the arts festival and Penola artist.

The winner of the Catherine Martin Literary prize will also be announced.

Named after an Australian novelist and poet, the competition provides an opportunity for young writers to express their creativity and share their unique view on the theme of isolation.

This section has attracted 32 entries.

Mr Mossop said: "The co-ordinator Hillary Trotter has done an exceptional job with this part of the festival."

There are three sections in this competition, 10-12 years, 13-15 years and 16-18 years of age, with prizemoney on offer for each section.

Also at the opening will be the announcement of the winner of a design prize.

The design section is an opportunity for artists and graphic designers to exhibit their interpretation of what the Penola-Coonawarra Arts Festival means to them.

The winner will receive \$1000 and their design will be used to promote the 2023 festival.

Mr Mossop invited everyone to come along tonight to the opening of the festival and the announcement of the winners and to look at the magnificent art works on display.

The official opening and announcement of the winners will take place at 5.30pm at the Penola High School.

Terms for saleyards group

Terms of reference have been adopted for a committee formed to guide the future of Millicent's Saleyards.

Formed after a special Wattle Range Council meeting late last year resolved to spend almost \$700,000 on maintenance and improvements for the yards, the Millicent Saleyards Advisory Committee's function was refined at council's meeting last month.

A report from council officers recommended that the committee membership include two elected council members with the Mayor as an ex-officio member, a representative of the Millicent Business Community Association, four stock agents, one stock contractor, one vendor/buyer, and one transport carrier. The draft also proposed the purpose of the committee as: "To assist Council with the safety, management, operation, promotion and improvement of the Millicent Saleyards".

However, Cr Dale Price successfully moved that Council adopt the Terms of Reference for the committee with the inclusion of financial

sustainability so that the adopted purpose of the committee is: "The Millicent Saleyards Advisory Committee is formed to assist Council with the safety, management, financial sustainability, promotion and improvement of the Millicent Saleyards".

Cr Burrow fails to keep cypress trees

"Prior to the March meeting Cr Brodie and I went and had a look at them and we decided on a compromise on taking two out of every three trees down," Cr Burrow said.

"Unfortunately someone had jumped the gun and moved the motion to cut them all down and that [motion] was successful and we didn't get the opportunity to consider a compromise."

Cr Burrow believed that the majority of people in Penola support his view.

"As a long-term resident of Penola, I be-

lieve I can read the opinion of people reasonably well and I believe the people of Penola in general like to keep trees as best they can," he said.

"Over recent years there has been concern about the removal of large street trees in Penola and it appears virtually impossible to have large trees in Penola - this is one of the reasons I am disappointed by council's decision to remove them [the cypresses]."

"Looking at the Local Government Act, there are so many restrictions on being able to plant trees in urban places because

of power lines, water pipes, sewerage and kerbing.

"You are virtually being irresponsible if you plant a tree that is going to grow quite large."

"So given it is very difficult to now establish large trees, when you have got a large tree that is not causing any problem, I think there is a stronger reason to keep it."

Cr Burrow's motion to rescind the March meeting decision to remove the trees was defeated six votes to four at the council's meeting on Tuesday night.

Painting inspiration

Aspiring artists can be inspired by the stunning grounds at Yallum Park at a workshop this weekend.

Renowned artists Lois Hodge and Jill Eckermann have been working and teaching together since 1985, and have once again teamed up to hold a watercolour workshop at the historic homestead this Saturday. "We will be painting in the old Gordon House, which is very old and it looks out on this beautiful garden. The workshop costs \$180 and includes a personal watercolour lesson with artists Lois and Jill, a delicious lunch in the historically grand Yallum Park house, and a personal guided tour of the gardens at Yallum Park.

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CEO's electric car

Wattle Range Council chief executive Ben Gower may soon be the greenest head of any council in the region with Wattle Range Council considering supplying him with a fully electric car as part of its efforts to reduce carbon emissions.

The proposal for an electric car derives from a Wattle Range Climate Consultative Group meeting where members discussed the possibility of transitioning council's light vehicle fleet to either hybrid or fully electric cars.

Mr Gower said a draft Climate Action Plan had been finalised and, following an energy audit, it showed there was an opportunity to reduce council's diesel fuel use.

"By the time you weigh up the significant reduction in fuel use, State Government rebates, the reduced maintenance requirements and resale value, it should be a significantly cheaper option," Mr Gower said.

He said council switching its car fleet over to hybrid and electric cars may result in members of the community making the same move.

"What we are hoping it will do is for council to invest in a few charging stations as we transition which then can support the broader community," Mr Gower said.

Mr Gower said he expects the cost of buy-

ing an electric car will be less than the replacement price of his current four-wheel-drive vehicle.

He said government fleet pricing for an electric car is not yet available but expects it to be much lower than the advertised price.

"The difficulty at the moment is the availability - the biggest challenge is getting our hands on one," Mr Gower said.

A fully maintained motor vehicle is provided to Mr Gower by council as part of his negotiated salary package.

Roadworks undertaken

More than \$500,000 has been spent on 16 unsealed roads in the Wattle Range Council area so far this financial year with more planned as part of a record year for council works.

At council's meeting last month, it was reported that 154 projects were underway for the financial year as part of council's \$12.78m capital works budget, with more than 60 per cent of the scheduled projects already completed.

This includes work on unsealed district roads with resheeting completed on Bakers Road, Pinchgut Road, Banya Road and Shell Grit Road in the Millicent area, Andrews Street and Smiths Lane at Rendelsham, Carthew Road, Stony Road, and Whitty Road in the Tantanoola area, Cases Road in the Glencoe area, McArthurs Summer Track at Furner, Peach Tree Road and Picaninny Lane at Thornlea, Reedy Lagoon Road at Wattle Range, Rogers Road at Kalangadoo, and Winter Road at Penola.

Resheeting work on other unsealed roads presently underway includes Agars Road at Glencoe, Batemans Lane at Wattle Range, Botts Road at Tri Hi, Poonada Road at Tantanoola and Sunnymeade Road at Mount McIntyre.

Although not yet started, work on other unsealed roads expected to be completed before the end of the year include Dow Road at Glencoe, Roden Lane at Penola, and Considine Road at Tantanoola.

"So I said to them all if you want to come to the Penola Park we will try some exercises, and to my surprise 14 people turned up."

The group has had as many as 34 members, however numbers have decreased a bit due to various reasons.

"I am a carer for my wife and this weekly event is 'my time out'," Mr Morgan said.

"I really love being involved and get so much enjoyment from it."

The group also has a social side to it with members having a social outing every three to four months.

Some members have also formed a walking group and walk every day, while others have joined a gym and a mature movers exercise group. With some of the proceeds the group has donated to the Royal Flying Doctor Service, Foodbank and the Biggest Morning Tea.

Mr Morgan said: "The bowling club is a perfect venue and we are indebted to them for allowing us to use the facility."

Classes cost \$5 per person.

Indigenous design gear

Millicent High School (MHS) netball players will soon be sporting new uniforms featuring artwork designed by Ngarrindjeri artist and the school's Aboriginal education worker, Jenny Bishop.

Ms Bishop was approached earlier this year by Teneille Barry, the MHS sports co-ordinator, about designing the new uniform and said: "It was a privilege when Teneille asked me."

Ms Barry reflected on where the idea came from saying: "I wanted to bring Indigenous uniforms to female sport; you see it a lot in the AFL with the Indigenous round and their guernseys and I wanted to bring that to our school in the form of a netball uniform."

"We needed new netball uniforms so it was a great opportunity to represent the Aboriginal students at our school."

"I knew Jen had been doing some amazing artworks; what better way to get authentic representation."

A template of the dress was given to Ms Bishop to work on and six different designs created in texta were offered to the school's leadership staff to make the final decision.

The chosen design represents coming together with Ms Bishop explaining: "The middle bit is the meeting place, the place where

we all come together as one and the waterholes are there because this place used to be a swampy area."

"They are the main two (symbols) that I wanted to put on the dresses and represent Millicent High School."

Dress design was a first for the artist who said: "If anyone could see the biggest smile on my face when they were hanging up, it was just amazing and to see the girls today with them on, looks even more beautiful than ever."

Ms Bishop is a self taught artist and has been painting and drawing since a young age, taking it more seriously in the last six years: "Now I'm ready to go out and show my artwork to other people."

Teneille said: "As a public school to be given this opportunity, and the support from both Jen and the school for my idea, was fantastic."

"We have already looked to expanding to a football guernsey as well and the students have shown a lot of interest in them."

"I think Jen will always have a place at Millicent because these uniforms won't be just for a couple of years they will be worn for quite a long time."

"No matter what her role is at the school they (the uniforms) will always be a representation of Jen's contribution."

A guide to local services

Advocates for local health services, the Millicent and Surrounds Health Support Group (MASHSG), have recently distributed the 2022 edition of their Local Health Services Guide.

The first brochure was released in 2016 following the formation of MASHSG as a result of a public meeting that discussed concerns about declining health services available to the community.

MASHSG continue to research health services available to the local community and update the brochure which is reprinted annually with support from the Millicent and Districts Hospital and Health Service and the Millicent Health Advisory Council (HAC)

Core to the group is working on community engagement and making information from the Millicent Hospital, Medical Clinic Millicent, Limestone Coast Local Health Network (LCLHN) and other health services easily accessible.

MASHSG chair Trevor Sinclair told The South Eastern Times: "We are committed to being the voice between the health system and the community, communication is key

to getting information out so we can share it."

"The group also engages with and promotes the Wattle Range Suicide Prevention group, Focus One Health, Limestone Coast Red Cross, Standby - Support After Suicide, Anglicare SA and other organisations providing support for the health and wellbeing of our community."

The group has been involved in development of the LCLHN Service Plan and the Wattle Range Council Health Plan and are currently working with Focus One Health and Uni SA to raise awareness and improve community health outcomes.

Later in the year MASHSG hopes to organise a Men's Pub Talk event in Millicent in conjunction with Millicent HAC.

MASHSG is currently looking for new volunteers and is keen to have someone with a young family to include health service needs from that perspective.

The 2022 edition of the brochures are available from local chemists and health services and are included in a new residents pack available from the Millicent Visitor Information Centre.

Council agrees to give rate rebate to golf club

Penola Golf Club will have most of its council rates rebated saving the club almost \$2,000.

Decided at Wattle Range Council's April meeting, the rebate will save \$1812.43 on the club's council rates of \$2,631.09.

The decision follows an application made to the council by the club to assess a discretionary rate rebate application from the Penola Golf Club.

While the request was for a 100 per cent rebate, the council decided to apply the rebate to the playing surfaces only and excluded the clubhouse from the rebate which council officers reported was consistent with other sporting facilities.

The report to elected members by council officers said the Penola Golf Club Inc had existed for more than 75 years and the club owned the land it occupied.

"At present the club is responsible for all council rates and taxes and all infrastructure on their grounds is owned and maintained by the club," the report said.

"All work done at the club is on a voluntary basis, with the exception of a paid contractor who professionally maintains the upkeep of the greens."

"Penola Golf Club is financed by its members [about 80], golfing competitions and a number of events which are held at the club with 85 per cent of all income for the club being derived from golf."

"The golf club facilities are used by members for private functions such as funeral wakes and birthday celebrations on an ad hoc basis."

"The club does not charge members for the usage of the club on such occasions, but most do give a donation in lieu of a hire charge."

"The club also provides their facilities for other external organisations as part of social and bonding experiences by way of providing 'come and learn' activities for various schools as part of their education and learning curriculum."

The report said granting discretionary rate rebates is allowable under the Local Government Act and said the application from the Penola Golf Club met the Act's condition that the land was being used by an organisation which, in the opinion of the council, provides a benefit or service to the local community.

"... there is community need for the facilities and services provided being the only golf facility near Penola," said the council report.

"It is also clear that due to their membership numbers that the rebate, if granted, would provide a level of financial assistance to a small club who is maintaining a large facility."

Cr Dean Burrow moved that Council grant the rate rebate.

Cr Deb Agnew seconded the motion which was carried by council.

Tantanoola committee disbanded

The Tantanoola Institute Hall Management Committee will be disbanded.

This was decided at Wattle Range Council's meeting on Tuesday after elected members were informed that the committee had not met since 2017 and had been unable to attract a quorum.

Established by council in 2005 to advise it on issues related to the hall, the committee has eight positions, one of which is an elected member.

Cr Sharon Cox was appointed as the council's representative on the committee, however when council advertised for community representatives in 2019, it received only one nomination, and as a result council decided to undertake a review of the ongoing requirement for the committee.

By April 2020, council temporarily suspended meetings for all its committees due to Covid-19 restrictions.

A council officer report said: "Council records indicate that the last meeting held of the committee was 26 October 2017 and given its membership issues has not been able to attract an adequate membership for over four and a half years.

"In lieu of these membership issues and resultant complications in obtaining a quorum and on the back of declining volunteerism across the whole sector, the likelihood of the committee reforming and attracting the required membership is questionable," said the report.

"Based on this situation and in consideration of council's evolution and maturity in asset management particularly in buildings assets over the past five years, council is well placed to better oversee asset condition, building maintenance and renewal of building assets such as the Tantanoola Institute Hall."

The report said council had evolved its management of building assets through the employment of an asset management officer and the use of dedicated asset management software.


It had also established regular independent condition assessments of buildings and developed an Infrastructure and Asset Management Plan for buildings.

The report said council also had "increased internal capacity to resource building maintenance through [council's] employment of three tradespersons".

"These changes have put council in a more proactive position to undertake planned maintenance and schedule renewals of buildings when required.

"With council's development in asset management over the past five years, the requirement to have a section 41 committee to oversee the care, management, protection and operation of this asset has now been superseded."

After deferring any decision on the future of the committee for a month from council's April meeting, the May meeting this week decided to accept the council staff recommendation for the section 41 committee to be wound up.

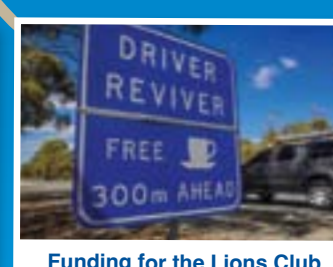

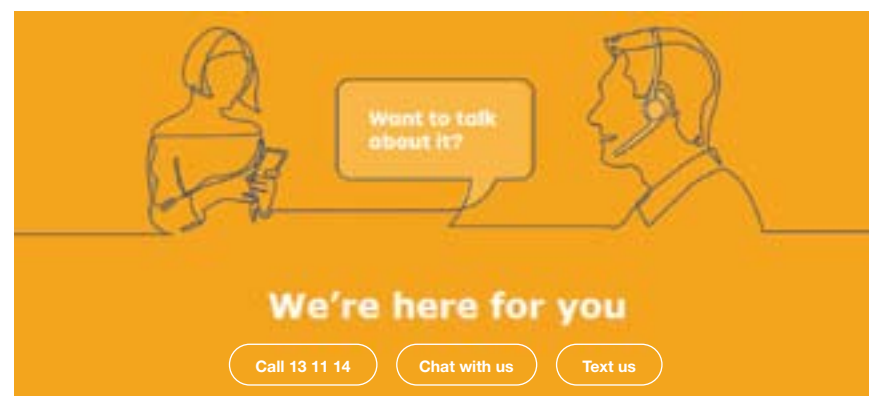

As well as caring for the animals, Mr Case also assists with much-needed maintenance around the property.

It was through his volunteer work that he

met Tritzi, his American Staffordshire terrier.

"She was a beautiful little pup, only eight weeks old," he said.

"I just fell in love with her.

"She just looked so beautiful in her night pen, I came in and she was so small and she looked so lonely.

"She looked up at me with those big eyes and I fell in love with her straight away."

The pair are now inseparable, with Tritzi going everywhere with Mr Case, including to the refuge on his volunteer days.

For anyone looking for something to do, Mr Case said it was a fantastic place and encouraged those interested to look into volunteering.

"It is just absolutely brilliant," he said."

There are a number of volunteer opportunities available at SEAWL, including kennel and cattery attendants, administration, fundraising committee and others.

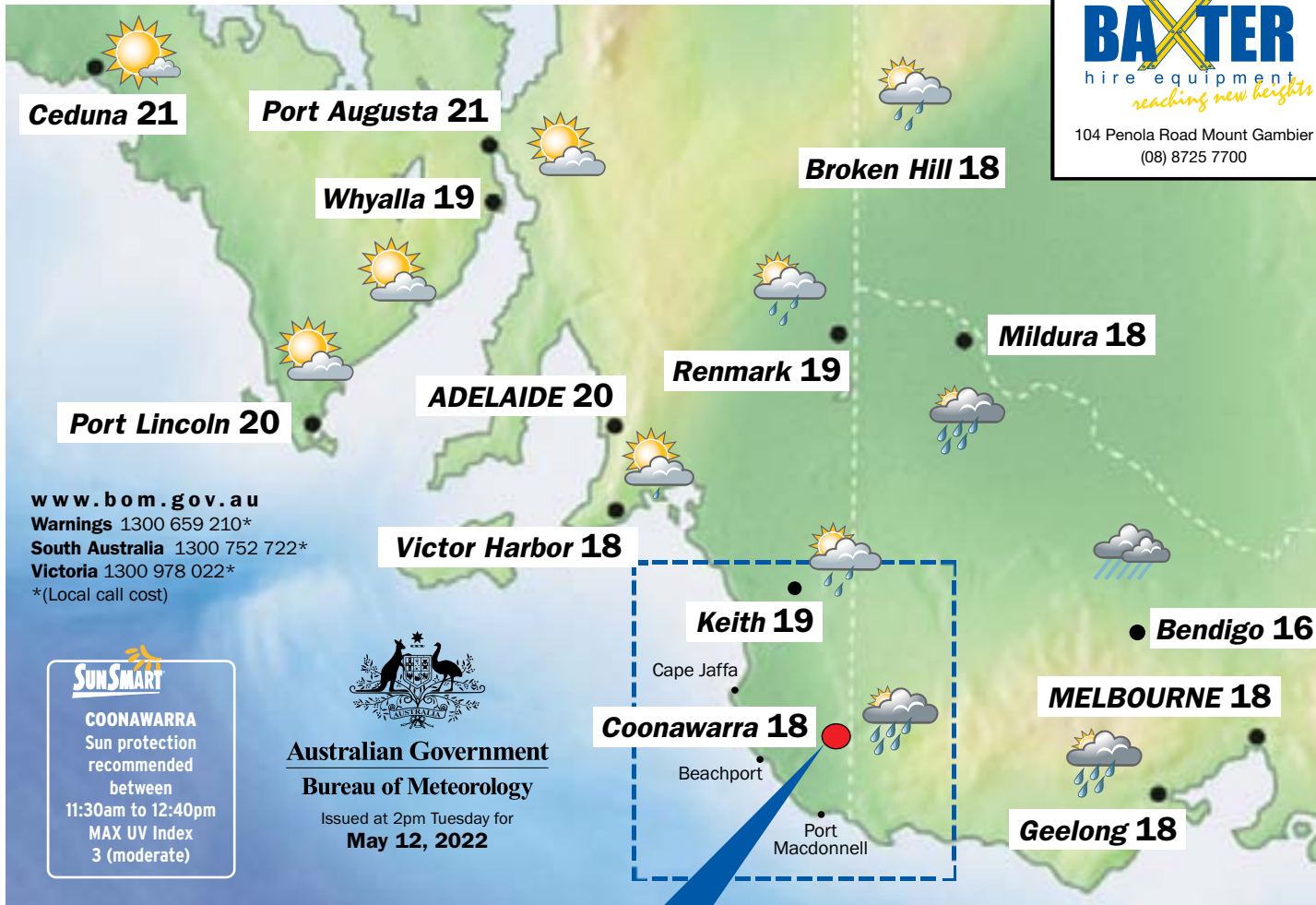

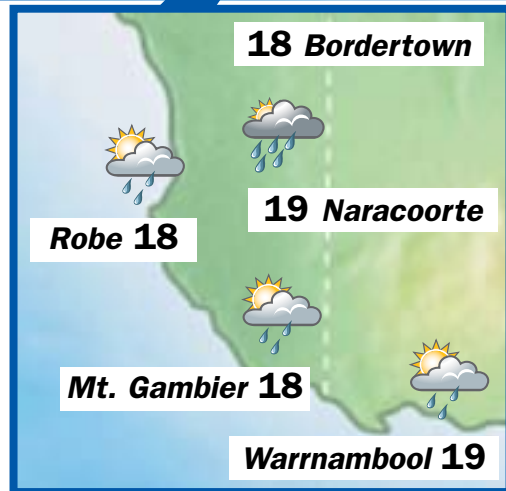

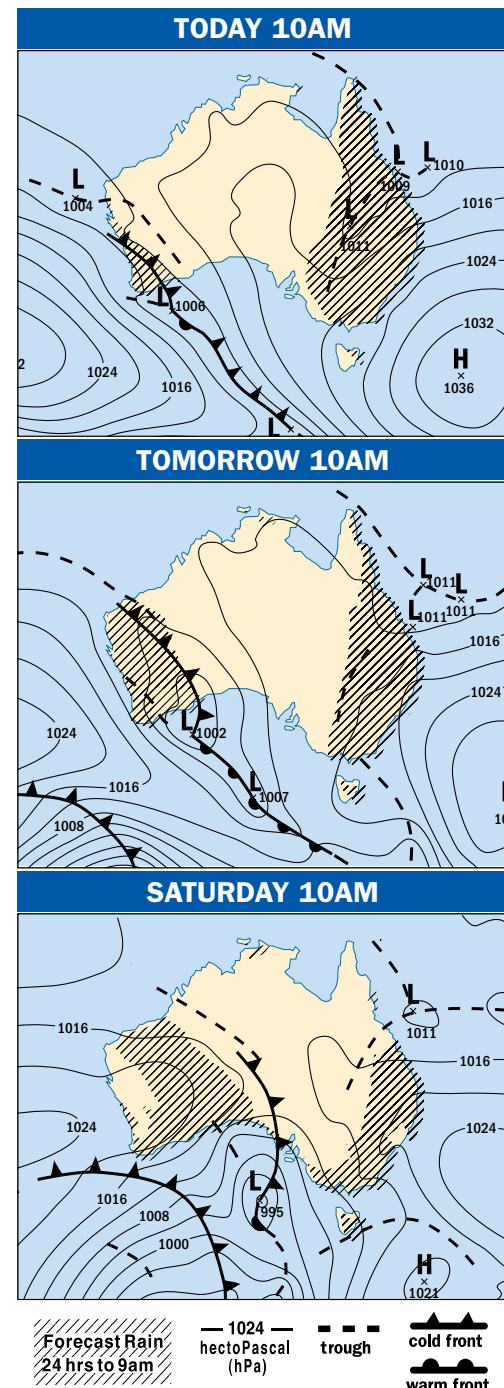

However, after stumbling at the business end of the season last year, it appears they are leaving nothing to chance in 2022.

“At the moment, I couldn't ask for anything more,” Stark said.

“We have some testing games to come - Nangwarry coming up, then Robe at Robe and Hatherleigh in Round 9.

“Those couple of games will show where we are at.

“But we never got to see a full-strength Port Mac last year until finals, so we are not getting carried away yet.”
