Festival success

More than 150 people attended the opening of the 30th Penola-Coonawarra Arts Festival at the Penola High School last Thursday where Penola artist, Dagny Strand was announced as the winner of the 2022 John Shaw Neilson Acquisitive Art Prize.

Taking home the prize of \$12,000, sponsored by the Balnaves Foundation, Strand was stunned when the announcement was made so much so that she struggled to find words in accepting the prize.

"I was just not expecting it," she told the Penola Pennant.

"I think I will have to wake up in the morning to make sure it is real," she said.

Strand won the same award some 15 years ago and has also been awarded several high commendations over the years.

She sincerely thanked the Balnaves Foundation for its continued support of this art award.

Created 30 years ago and growing in reputation every year, the art prize features paintings which must be inspired by the works of famous Penola poet, John Shaw Neilson.

The judge this year was Director of the Art Gallery of SA, Rhana Devenport who said: "The quality of the art was very strong and there was a lot of consistency across the entries."

"Both the local and the main winners' paintings were very strong."

"Having the aspect of being connected to the John Shaw Neilson poetry means its another dimension which is quite different to a lot of other prizes, and that's the kind of continuity that brings things together," she said.

Of Dagny Strand's winning painting, Ms Devenport said: "A potent yet majestic work, this carefully considered jewel-like work of painting and assemblage echoes the John Shaw Neilson poem of the same name."

"The paintwork is supremely confident

and easily transports the viewer into the frame of ideas, emotional states and poetic reverie."

Other winners announced included the Local Prize going to Stella Scanlon with her artwork called 'My Smiling Queens' inspired by the poem 'The Land Where I was Born' winning \$1000 sponsored by Penola artist, Lois Hodge.

Of this work, Ms Devenport said: "A joy-

ous work that utterly captures the spirit of the Neilson poem."

Ms Scanlon also won the Packers Prize.

There were also four highly commended prizes awarded to Lorna Beagan with her painting 'Neilson's Flowers' inspired by the poem 'To a Blue Flower', Rod Bax with his painting 'Magpie in the Moonlight' inspired by the poem of the same name, Narelle Smith

with her painting titled 'Furrows of Brown' inspired by the poem 'May', and Hamish with his art titled 'Strange Voices' inspired by the poem 'The Tales We Never Hear'.

A Design Prize was won by Natania Hollingsworth whose winning entry will be used to help promote the 2023 Penola-Coonawarra Arts Festival.

House prices doubling in 12 months

Millicent has had the largest real estate growth across regional South Australia in a 12 month period according to the 2022 March quarter figures recently released by the Real Estate Institute of South Australia (REISA).

In the figures, Millicent was named as having an increase of more than 50 per cent.

The statement, released earlier this month by REISA, claims the South Australian regional property market has recorded another strong year of growth with a new record median price across regional South Australia.

REISA interim chief executive officer, Cain Cooke said results continued to demonstrate outstanding growth in the South Australian regional real estate market in posting a 10.17 per cent median house price increase from the previous quarter and a 15.30 per cent increase from the same quarter last year.

"The volume of sales across regional South Australia demonstrated a cooling of the real estate market with a decrease of 14.85 per cent from the previous quarter," Mr Cooke said.

"Sales were up 1.7 per cent from the same quarter last year.

"Towns which have seen the largest growth over a 12 month period were Millicent, Berri and Mount Gambier with increases of 56.67 per cent, 36.47 per cent and 28.81 per cent respectively."

Millicent Real Estate owner Valerie Jones agreed and said: "Sales have been really good and prices have definitely gone up 50 to 60 per cent in the last 12 months, not all of them, but most houses.

"Listings are difficult to get right now because they are selling so quick, we are still getting listings but they have gone from sitting on the market for months to selling within weeks."

Tragedy memorial

It was a poignant occasion in Penola on Thursday when the families of four men killed in a tragic vehicle accident six years ago on the outskirts of the town gathered with other Penola community members to unveil a bench seat in their memory.

Christopher Sylvester, Steven Whitehead, Reece Wilkinson and Nick Roser lost their lives on their way to work on November 19, 2016.

Steven Sylvester, father of Christopher said: "On behalf of my family I would like to sincerely thank the Penola community for what they have done for us.

"Snow Merrett has been in touch with us the whole time, keeping us up to date on what was happening.

"We heard rumours that the tree was going to be cut down and we didn't want that to happen.

"If the tree went then we would have no reason to come here," Mr Sylvester said.

"We greatly appreciate the seat and special thanks to the Penola Men's Shed for building it with the assistance of the Wattle Range Council," he said.

Mr Wilkinson said: "It has been really, really wonderful the support we have had from the Penola community.

"We now have somewhere to come and reflect our memories.

"Snow Merrett (from Merrett Logging in Penola) has been absolutely fantastic in organising everything.

"We also thank the South East Car Club for their support in helping out with the car runs," he said.

Unfortunately members of the Whitehead and Roser families were unable to attend.

The whole idea was instigated by Snow Merrett's grandson Cameron who suggested a 'put out your hard hat' day with Snow suggesting a car run.

Merrett (Snow) said: "We organised the car run within seven days and the event attracted 172 cars."

Members of the South East Street Machines Club were also heavily involved.

Club secretary, Merve Heemskerk said:

"\$36000 was raised from the first car run and this money was distributed between the four families of the men that were killed to assist with funeral expenses.

"This amount came from car entry fees, sponsorship and donations."

A memorial run was held a bit later and the money from this, which was much smaller, was donated to the Emergency Services in Penola," he said.

The car club also donated \$250 to the Penola Men's Shed which went towards the making of the bench seat.

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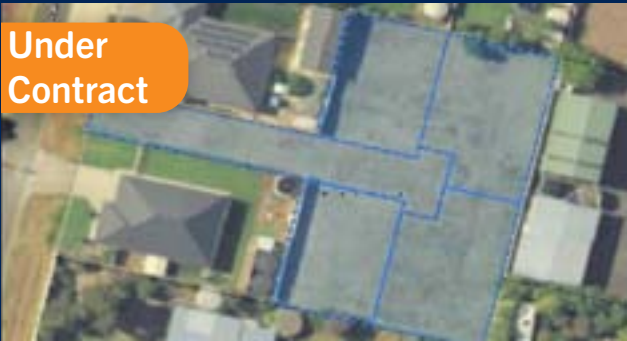

Junior innovation classes

Young Innovators Masterclass this Sunday is ideally aimed at year 7 students as part of a newly launched Innovation Festival presented by The Limestone Coast and Green Triangle Innovation Collective (LCGTIC).

Facilitated by Millicent High School tech studies teacher and international education consultant, Feresh Pizarro, the afternoon session promises to be full of rich ideas offering tools and strategies for young people to use in their daily life.

Ms Pizarro wants to create a memorable hands on experience and said: “For me education is trying to connect students to the real world that they are going to have to face.

“The Young Innovators Masterclass will give students the ability to identify real problems that they would like to try to solve and then they can create solutions.

“Once the solution has been identified, prototypes will be created out of cardboard, glue or sticks or drawn up as a plan and used to pitch the idea to the rest of the room.

“I’m going to give the students fake money and they are going to be investors.

“They can be creative and innovative and the skills they take from the masterclass can help them with their studies and everyday life.

“Things like embracing failure, being persistent, creative and critical thinking, that’s my hope.”

The Young Innovators Masterclass is open to 10-13 year old students and will be held at the Millicent Library this Sunday from 11.30am to 2pm. Tickets are \$5 (+ booking fee) and available online at <https://events.humanitix.com/young-innovators-event>.

Teachers and educators interested in entrepreneurial education are encouraged to contact Feresh Pizarro at Millicent High School to attend the session.

Ms Pizarro stressed the focus is not on money and is about giving the students the ability to identify what problems are worth solving.

“There are too many bad ideas out there that are making money and contributing to the problem instead of being a solution.”

Teachers are encouraged to attend if they are interested in seeing entrepreneurial education practice strategies in action.

“If teachers are interested in entrepreneurial education I’m more than happy to chat, that’s what I’ve been doing for the last two years, upskilling professional development for teachers to know how to apply this in every single one of their classrooms.

“It doesn’t matter what subject it is because

entrepreneurial education is about value creation for students and how students create value for others and themselves.”

Originally joining LCGTIC as a small business owner looking for connections Ms Pizarro soon noticed there was a need to represent young people in the area.

“There are all these events happening for everyone and there was nothing for young people and that is where we need to start,” Ms Pizarro said.

“I feel like I can leave them feeling empowered to not just wait until they are adults to do something.

“They can be creative and innovative and the skills they take from the masterclass can help them with their studies and everyday life.

“Things like embracing failure, being persistent, creative and critical thinking, that’s my hope.”

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Family connection to Kalangadoo farmers market

A family connection initiated the Kalangadoo Farmers market and its venue.

It all began when Kalangadoo resident Sandra Young purchased the former Kalangadoo Uniting Church and hall in 2010.

She had a special connection to the buildings as her late husband, Forrest, was a lay preacher at the church, and Sandra herself was a Sunday school teacher, until the church closed down in 2007.

“After my husband passed away in 2009, I wanted to buy some property,” Sandra said.

“It (the property) was advertised at what I had to spend, however when the owners knew it was me they dropped the price by \$20,000.

“This allowed me a bit left over to upgrade the toilets and the electricity,” she said.

“Then I had to decide what I wanted to do

with the buildings.

“My first thought was to convert them into bed and breakfast accommodation,

however that just seemed a bit too hard,” Sandra said.

Mrs Young had a love for farmers markets and had already visited the Adelaide Central Market and markets at Willunga and Angaston.

She wanted to make it something the community could be involved in so she called a public meeting to gauge the interest in Kalangadoo and district, and the establishment of the Kalangadoo market went from there.

When Mrs Young was doing her research she was advised that a market should open weekly and must have a membership to make it work.

The market officially opened 11 years ago and has been going strong ever since, only closing four times apart from when Covid-19 caused restrictions.

Every Saturday the market offers a range

of produce, candles, preserves and jams, cakes, pies and pasties, honey, plants, fruit and vegetables, crafts and knick-knacks.

Market President, Alex Guenther, who has held the role for seven years, said: “We have a wonderful market with people, including regulars, attending from far and wide.

“We also sell on commission where people can drop in their goods for sale and we take a small fee for the service,” he said.

A popular attraction is the sausage sizzle which is run by a small band of people each week.

In the church hall there is a small cafe where tea, coffee and homemade cake can be purchased and patrons can sit and have a chat.

Mr Guenther said: “We are always looking for volunteers, as many hands make light work.”

Options for rail signage

A survey on Wattle Range Council's website is asking people to vote on two design concepts intended for use to develop signs destined for the 30km Penola-Coonawarra Rail Trail which has been under construction since last year.

The survey is open for voting until 5pm on June 8 and results will be tabled at council's meeting on June 14.

At council's meeting last week, elected members selected the two designs that are now being voted on from four that had been developed for council by Melbourne based corporate identity and design company Cato Brand Partners which has experience with similar projects such as branding and signs for Melbourne's Royal Botanic Gardens.

Designed to provide historical, directional, distance and location information along the rail trail, the signs have a design budget of \$16,500 within the \$2m rail trail budget.

The two designs selected include one based around the shape of a grape vine leaf with locally inspired images within it, and the other has the same images as the leaf design of sites along the rail trail, such as Penola's railway station and Coonawarra siding, on either side of a railway line which incorporates the name of the trail.

Council's meeting was told Cato Brand Partners had visited the rail trail in late March to begin the process of developing the design concepts and initial consultation on the resulting four designs was undertaken by the designers last month with council staff, Riddoch ward councillors Dean Burrow and Chris Brodie, Coonawarra Vignerons, Penola History Group (which is assisting with historical information for the signs), and the Riddoch

Business and Community Association. The two designs selected for public consultation were those preferred by the majority of these groups.

In addition to voting by electronic means via council's website, people can also vote on the preferred option at council offices where paper copies of the survey form are available.

Once an option has been selected, further work will be undertaken to apply the selected concept to a detailed design for each of the specific types of signs required along the trail.

It is expected that the resulting signs will be installed on the rail trail by the end of the year.

While no date has been set yet for an official opening of the trail, council envisages opening sections of the trail as they are completed.

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Firey women workshop coming to Furner

Women are being encouraged to sign up for a two day workshop in Furner hosted by the Country Fire Service on May 29 and June 5.

The Firey Women workshops have been running for more than 10 years around the State and the Limestone Coast but this is the first time it will be held in Furner.

In an inclusive setting, women will learn the skills needed to protect their families and livelihoods in case of bushfire.

Through providing information and practical skills, the workshop's aim is to assist women in empowering and protecting themselves, their family and their community.

Being prepared emotionally, knowing how to operate fire pumps and equipment, and preparing a bushfire survival plan, are some of the topics covered.

Course facilitator, Megan Hurrell, a CFS Regional Community Engagement officer, told the South Eastern Times: “It is really important to have a plan in place and know what you going to do, whether you’re going to leave or relocate early or you’re going to stay at home and actively defend your property.

“While the fire danger season is finished now and we are going into winter, this is a really good time to do this course.

“It gives a lot of time to actually think about what you want to do and put those preparations in place, rather than rushing as it gets warmer leading into summer.

“You can prepare the plans, discuss them with your family and make the preparations with plenty of time, so it is a less stressful situation.”

Previous Lucindale course participant Sally said: “I was reluctant to do the course,

but I am so very glad I did.

“A great kick start coming into the next fire season.

“I feel empowered and equipped to write and prepare an adequate first bushfire plan.”

The workshop is open to all women, even those who live outside bushfire prone areas as people still regularly travel through high risk areas.

With embers able to travel 20kms in front of a fire-front Ms Hurrell stressed it is important to know where to go, what to do and what your family members are doing.

The Firey Women workshop is held over two Sundays with attendance required at both sessions.

Raidis was not the only winery in the region to succeed in the awards with Bellwether Wines winning Star Cellar Door, Wynns Coonawarra Estate winning Best Large Cellar Door and Ottelia winning Cellar Door with Best Food.

Incentive for apprentices

MED Electrical in Penola is the recipient of support with \$5000 payments to new apprentices from the Federal government.

Caleb Lythgo and Fergus Calderwood are the latest two employees who have benefited from the scheme.

Tony Pasin, Member for Barker, was in Penola recently to acknowledge the two \$5000 recipients to employees at MED Electrical.

Mr Marcus Devereaux, owner of MED Electrical said: "The scheme has not personally benefited me, however I wanted to employ some guys anyway."

"It is impossible to get qualified staff in the South East at present, so I went down the line of putting on apprentices."

"Hopefully they stick around and qualify in four years time."

Mr Devereaux said that the apprentice scheme helps out on smaller jobs.

"When apprentices can carry out smaller jobs it reduces the charges that I have to make to clients."

"I don't charge clients full tote odds if an apprentice carries out the work," he said.

MED Electrical has also had other forms of

government assistance in past years.

"The subsidy is an added bonus but I feel there could be another way where apprentices could benefit a bit more," he said.

"Apprentices get a fairly low wage and there should be more incentive."

"My number one priority is to employ locals," he said.

"If we can employ locals then the local community supports my business."

Mr Devereaux said: "I try to source my apprentices from local schools but this is extremely hard as there are so many other work opportunities out there."

"I started off on my own in 2014 and the business has grown immensely since then," he said.

"We are kept very busy as there is always something someone wants done."

"I am looking forward to continuing supporting the Penola community and employing more locals," he said.

"Youth employment has reached its lowest level in more than 13 years and there are a record 220,000 Australians in trade apprenticeships," Mr Pasin said.

national educational consultant, Millicent High School educator and small business owner has recently moved to the area with her family and built a new home.

Keen to do something within the community Ms Pizarro was quick to be involved in the LCGTIC when approached, recognising the region is rich with resources and wanting to connect people with opportunities they may not be aware of.

"We want to get things moving in the area, to celebrate businesses, motivate people to come to the area and also build the brand for the Limestone Coast."

Ms Pizarro is hosting the Millicent Young Innovators Masterclass event being held in Millicent and as a tech studies teacher is passionate about finding and teaching real world applications for her students.

"For me education is trying to connect students to the real world that they are going to have to face and tech gives a lot of opportunity to connect with industry that's what's really exciting for me."

Other Innovation Festival events being

held in the Wattle Range Council region are a free 'Look and Learn' tour focussing on innovative approaches in primary industry at Roundwood Solutions facilitated by Millicent Business Community Association Chair, Lee Morgan on May 24.

The tour will be followed by presentations given by local businesses Total Result Agricultural Consulting and Soil Food Web held at the Tantanoola Hotel.

Showcase SA is hosting the Business Accelerator event at Coonawarra which offers opportunities for business owners to learn tangible skills to take their business to the next level and be informed of emerging opportunities.

Taking place on May 25 participants get to enjoy local produce over lunch during the professional development opportunity.

Festival workshops are taking place in Millicent, Mount Gambier, Tantanoola, Penola and online.

Roadwork on route to Beachport

Roadworks on about 2.5kms of the Southern Ports Highway between Millicent and Beachport began on Monday.

A spokesperson for the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) said the work involved laying 30mm of new asphalt over the top of the existing roadway. The works are expected to be complete on June 3, weather permitting. An electronic advisory board was erected near the Saleyards Road intersection in Millicent to provide advance notice to road users of the works.

"Please plan ahead, allow extra travel time and take extra care when workers are on site," the DIT spokesperson asked of drivers.

"Observe speed limits, lane restrictions and traffic controllers when travelling through the area."

"The Department appreciates motorists' patience while these important works are carried out."

Beachport jetty work to start in August

Upgrades of the Beachport Jetty are expected to start in August.

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) has confirmed that the project is in its final procurement process stages and, if all goes to plan, will start sometime in August. The \$4.5 million project to ensure the long-term structural integrity of the jetty was originally planned to start in early 2022, before being pushed back. A representative from DIT has confirmed that upgrades are still expected to be completed by the end of 2022 at this stage.

The end of the jetty is expected to be closed while upgrades are ongoing, with sections of the shore end closed intermittently with notice. Once procurement details are finalised, updates on working hours and closures will be announced.



The upgrades will include refurbishment of the Beachport jetty along with adding safety ladders.

Market goes into hiatus

The Millicent Market this Saturday will be the last for awhile.

With Millicent's weather starting to cool, and winter sports beginning to impact stall holder and market attendance numbers, Wattle Range Council has decided to put the monthly Millicent community market into hibernation for a few months.

Market organisers will instead focus their time and effort on the Geltwood Market Day planned for October 16.

The community market this Saturday starts at 9am and ends at 1pm in the rotunda parklands and will feature stalls, live performances and children's activities.



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Close shave for a cause

Kalangadoo resident, Peta Rogers, put her head on the auction block Saturday night by offering the responsibility of shaving her hair off to the highest bidder.

Ms Rogers is raising funds for the Leukaemia Foundation, a charity close to her heart, and this is the second time in 13 years she has lopped off her locks for the World's Greatest Shave (originally named Shave for a Cure).

The head shave was the final item up for auction held at the Kalangadoo Clubrooms and was won by Peta's husband Nick who paid \$680 for the privilege.

Ms Rogers explained her support for the foundation: "My son Jack was diagnosed at the age of two with leukaemia.

"To be told that your two year old has leukaemia and you need to live in Adelaide for six to eight months was quite scary.

"Back then we didn't have any family in Adelaide and I didn't have any close friends that lived in Adelaide to stay with.

"But the nurses put us in contact with the Leukaemia Foundation and they were just magnificent, they gave us a fully furnished unit free of charge, it didn't cost us anything to stay there.

"Everyday they contacted me, they knew Jack's dad worked on a cray boat and it was right in the middle of the fishing season so he couldn't leave to come up.

"We also had my daughter Halle, who was 8 months old at the time and stayed home with her dad while I went to Adelaide with Jack for eight months.

"The Leukaemia Foundation were fantastic, they would ring me or pop in every day for a coffee, just to check up on us and just to see how we were."

For some unique people, their everyday job involves flying hi-tech planes, worth hundreds of millions of dollars, so they can protect their country from the air, if the need arises. For the recruits on this fly-on-the-wall British documentary, that's their reality. “It makes a big difference they know each other well,” he said.

“Pat came back this year but he is a local and knows all the boys.

“They are all friends, local boys and have played a lot of footy together.

“They have grown up together, have all been around the club for a long time and it makes it an easy group to work with.”

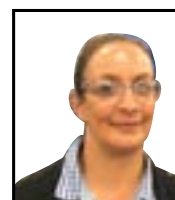
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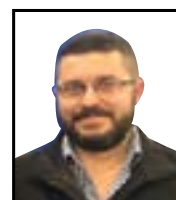
