# Quality Vintago

With the grape picking season now over, quality rather than quantity has been achieved with the 2022 vintage expected to rival the 2021 vintage in the Penola/Coonawarra area.

Picking for the vintage began in January and wrapped up in May.

While quantity is down, this is not the biggest issue affecting the industry with a current over-supply caused by a collapse in the Chinese market. Limestone Coast Grape and Wine Council executive officer Ulrich Grey-Smith labelled the season a success.

"Things did start a little bit later than average with the whites from Padthaway blooming in early March," Mr Grey-Smith said.

"Some of the alternative varieties from Mundulla were also picked early."

He said areas such as Padthaway, Wrattonbully and Coonawarra began picking red grapes around mid-April before finishing well into May.

"The greater Limestone Coast had a lucky season as far as weather with very little rain and hail compared to the rest of Australia and the State," Mr Grey-Smith said.

"We didn't have much rainfall at all during the ripening season which allowed us to pick most of the vineyards when we wanted to and the quality remains exceptional."

Despite the fantastic season, the executive officer said China's prohibitively high tariffs on many Australian products, including wine, had caused a significant over-supply but vignerons remained optimistic.

"Part of the bigger picture for all companies affected by the trade ban is to look for new markets," he said.

'China would be great to get back into but it would never be what it was for us and we would probably continue to expand our exportation and look for new markets including South-East Asia, Singapore, Japan and India."

"We're slightly down on yield but for the industry at the moment what's really important is the over-supply situation that has been

around the place - sales will need to be made in order for fruit from 2023 vintage to go in."

Mr Balnaves said the climate had provided good conditions for the vintage this year.

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### Saleyards research

Saleyards are fundamental to wellbeing, networking, information sharing and service provision in rural communities, new research from the Australian Livestock Markets Association (ALMA) has

Released this week, the ALMA 'Social Value of Saleyards' report outlines how saleyards provide an environment where people across a wide range of ages and demographics feel the positive benefits of social and physical connection to community.

The research - believed to be the first of its kind in Australia - collated the views, stories and experiences of more than 250 people through interviews and online surveys as well as observations of activity at six saleyards across the coun-

ALMA Executive Officer Kate McGilvray said, while previous research had measured the economic significance of saleyards, the organisation wanted to focus on what sale days mean to community members, service providers and saleyard stakeholders.

"This report highlights that saleyards are critical to the social fabric of regional communities," Ms McGilvray said.

"A visit to a saleyard livestock sale in regional locations helps to improve social outcomes for people living in rural and regional Australia.

"Saleyards reduce social isolation, provide connection to key services otherwise not available in isolated locations, facilitate exchange of information, enable deeper and more open conversations in a safe environment, provide informal support and maintain cross-generational connection.

"Saleyards are enablers of access to important services, such a mental health professionals and general health checks, rural financial services, employment opportunities and industry educa-

"One of the more surprising findings is that people even find love at saleyards with people in three states meeting, and later marrying, their life partner."

The report also documents the serious negative impacts on social wellbeing when sales are cancelled or attendance restricted, such as recently during Covid.

"Saleyards create a place for social connection and when people have limited access to be able to attend, they experience loneliness and social isolation," Ms McGilvray said.

"This was found to be especially important for interaction across age groups with people taking the time to sit and talk with elders, those retired or semi-retired from farming when visiting a saleyard.'



The future of the Millicent saleyards was in doubt however, the Wattle Range Council moved to spend almost \$700,000 on the yards.

## **New Trade Minister visits**

SA Minister for Trade and Investment, Nick Champion, visited Coonawarra last week as part of Showcase SA's regional Business Accelerator series.

The event was held at Hollick Wines with more than 100 people attending.

The day started off with a welcome from chief executive officer of Showcase SA, Steve Testar, followed by speakers including chief executive of the Department for Trade and Investment, David Reynolds, and export advisor for the same department, David Hill.

The Minister joined in discussions with wine growers and producers about the opportunities and challenges facing the local wine industry, which is famed for its exports.

Limestone Coast wine exporters will receive State Government support to showcase their products to the world through a program with the aim to upskill and create better connections for regional South Australian businesses.

The Showcase Roadshow SA has also vis-

ited the Riverland, Port Lincoln and Kangaroo Island with Coonawarra being the last of the series for this year.

In his address, Minister Champion said: "South Australia exports above and beyond our weight and a lot of commodity exports are going out the door and our relationship to the world is particularly important to our State's economy.

"Our Premier, only 72 hours after being elected, visited the Limestone Coast to acknowledge the South East as it plays a pretty unique role in our State's economy.

"The lockdowns and border issues in South Australia have certainly caused major issues and is an ongoing challenge for businesses.

"Freight movement and scarcity, especially in the building industry including steel, timber and every other building supply has been very challenging, however we are going to have to all address this together as there are no easy solutions," he said.

"On a positive note we have a majority government in South Australia, led by a Premier

who is very, very interested in this region.

"He can see all the potential in the Limestone Coast area and plans to visit regularly.

"Much of our economy is outside of the city and I am certainly aware of the great contribution the regional areas of our State give to the community.

"There are lots of challenges out there and we need to be very cautious but hopefully we can get a better pathway to China in the future.

"South Australia has suffered badly from the trade barriers," he said.

Steve Testar, chief executive and co-founder of Showcase SA said: "Showcase SA is committed to bringing opportunities into the regions of South Australia.

"Showcase SA are passionate about doing things that aren't just city centric.

"We bring export opportunities, mental health support and digital marketing opportunities to communities across South Australia.

"Collaboration over competition is key to post Covid-19 pandemic South Australian business success." Dan Redman from Redman Wines in Coonawarra, who attended the event, said: "It was good to see the State Minister visit our region.

"Although there are positive signs of wine export returning to China, I think it will be a very long time before that happens."

Redman Wines export a small amount of wine to Canada, United Kingdom, Japan and South Korea.

Emma Raidis from Raidis Estate Wines said: "It was a great opportunity to be able to get together and catch up with people we haven't seen for a longtime.

"The speakers on the day were very good and I gained some valuable information on the day that I have been looking for for quite some time," she said.

Raidis Estate export wine to the UK, Japan, Korea, Taiwan and Singapore.

Next month other local wine producers, along with Government support, will attend the London Wine Fair's 'Unearthed Wines' exhibition.

"Being mild and having very few heat spikes - days over 35 may have only been one - meant that it was a good season for wine makers to be able to take fruit off at its optimum level without having weather conditions determine too much," said Mr Balnaves.

"Some people are thinking it may well be a better vintage than 2021 from a quality point of view; 2021 has so far been seen as a very good vintage, a stand out vintage. "So all in all it looks good for 2022."

Mr Balnaves said staffing shortages had not been felt greatly during the vintage this

"It was tight but because the season was longer and there was not a compressed season it was able to be handled pretty easily," Mr Balnaves said.

"I think the international borders opened

just in time to allow some more staff to come in from overseas for various people around

the area which was good.

"Probably the most difficult thing was trying to juggle two, four day weeks in the peak period - due to Easter and Anzac Day on consecutive weeks - meant those couple of weeks were logistically challenging."

The Coonawarra Grape and Wine Incorporated's statement on the wrap up of 2022

vintage also reported a good result.

"Based on the colour and aromas that are coming through in the finished ferments, 2022 points to a good vintage with lovely firm acidity in the whites and good fruit expression and tannins across all reds, which will translate into wines that have good cellaring potential," said the report.

"Cabernet Sauvignon was a standout variety during the 2022 vintage."

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

# **Controlling Sirex wasps**

Made by members of Penola's Men's Shed, 24 innocuous looking black boxes at OneForty-One's Nangwarry depot are playing an important part in controlling a pest that devastated the region's softwood forests almost 40 years ago.

The boxes are part of a multi-pronged program aimed at controlling the potentially forest destroying Sirex Wasp which killed an estimated five million radiata pine trees in the Green Triangle area in the 1980's - a situation brought on by the 1983 Ash Wednesday bushfires which had devastated the region, burning through millions of trees and leaving many others stressed providing a perfect environment for the wasp to thrive.

That outbreak was the impetus for a concentrated control program to save the plantations - and therefore the region's timber industry as a whole - from complete devastation.

Then, whole teams of forest workers fought the war against the Sirex Wasp and, thanks to their efforts and a continued control and monitoring program, today outbreaks do not occur and just one person works on the program in the Limestone Coast and western Victoria for the region's largest forest grower, OneFortyOne.

He is Pest Control Officer, Damion McNair who welcomed the arrival of the new black boxes to his Sirex Wasp control toolkit.

"They have worked a treat," said Mr McNair of the boxes, adding that they were the first of their kind in the region and this summer was the first time they were put to use.

The boxes are used to house samples of thinnings which come from sites across the company's forest estate.

Built on legs for easy observance, the boxes have doors to enable the samples to be loaded easily and contained neatly, and gauzed openings to let in plenty of light which helps to draw out any Sirex Wasps and predator wasps that might be in the small logs.

Some of the logs come from patches of trees which are identified by annual aerial surveys as being under stress with the telltale sign of browning needles.

An on ground inspection of these patches determines if the stressed trees have been affected by Sirex Wasps or other causes such as nutrition deficiencies, lightning strikes or fungal disease.

Samples of any trees thought to be affected by Sirex - with the signs of holes bored by the wasps into the trunks, which kills the trees are taken back to the observation boxes.

Other samples come from 'trap tree plots' within the estate that have been purposely poisoned to make the trees stressed.

As the wasps only attack live but stressed trees, these 'trap tree plots' are used to lure any wasps that may be in the area.

When the trees begin to show signs of wasp infestation, a biological control in the form of nematodes is introduced into the trees by punching holes into the trunks and using a sauce bottle to squeeze a gel containing microscopic nematodes into the holes with the aim of the nematodes infecting wasps in the tree.

Effectively rendering the wasps infertile, the nematodes prevent an increase in the wasp population.

OneFortyOne annually releases 30 million of these nematodes throughout its plantations across the region.

"We fall and inoculate the trees and work out if there are any Sirex in them, then we can bring them back to the boxes," Mr McNair said.

"Every box has a different location written on them and then we can see what emerges from them.

"If a Sirex does emerge from them we know there are Sirex in the area and we can focus on that area."

Some of the Sirex captured in the observance boxes are dissected.

"If they contain nematodes, that is a good sign - it means inoculation has worked," said Mr McNair.

Others from the sample logs will be released.

"We still want some of them around so they can carry the nematode," Mr McNair said.

A Sirex Wasp - Originally from Europe and accidentally introduced to Australia, Sirex Wasps were first discovered in Tasmania in the 1950's and have since spread through Tasmania, Victoria, South Australia, the ACT and New South Wales. They kill radiata pines when they bore deep into the softwood to lay their eggs.

Another prong of the biological control program of the Sirex Wasp is the release of several species of 'good' wasps.

"What they basically do is where the Sirex is they will get into the tree and use the sirex wasp larvae as a host for their own so they are doing our job for us," Mr McNair said.

"We can collect them and then, where we know there is Sirex, we can release them.

"They don't cause the same damage as a Sirex because they will only go into a tree where there is already a hole."

This vigilant multi-pronged control program ensures that the outbreak of the 1980's will not be repeated and the new observance boxes are a part of this.

As members of the National Sirex Coordination Committee and the Green Triangle Health Operational Group, OneFortyOne was aware of observance boxes used in other areas of Australia and was keen to adopt the same in the Limestone Coast.

While the company could have sourced the boxes from elsewhere, it was so impressed by other work undertaken by the Penola Men's Shed, such as picnic tables built for Nangwarry's football oval and swimming pool, that the Shed members were invited to build the boxes.

"One of the bosses in town saw the projects

and said 'Get them to do it'," said Mr McNair.

Previously using 44-gallon drums, into which the log samples are loaded from the top

with gauze put over the top, Mr McNair said the new observance boxes were a vast improvement.

"With the drums you have to pull the wood right out to look at it or put head right down into it," Mr McNair said.

"With the new boxes, they are up on stands and you can see into them easily.

"It's a much better set up."

With some 44-gallon drums still in use, the first trial of the new observance boxes has proved so successful that Mr McNair is looking forward to the last remnants of the drums being replaced with another 24 boxes, again to be built by Penola Men's Shed, in time for next summer when Sirex Wasps are most active.

Millicent, and staff from the Department of Environment and Water (DEW).

Although initiated by the Friends of Canunda and Beachport Parks more than 20 years ago, the day is now a collaborative event supported by the National Parks, Limestone Coast Landscape Board, Burrandies Aboriginal Corporation and Friends Of Shore Birds South East.

It was fitting that the event this year was held during National Volunteer Week as the friends group had only the week before celebrated 35 years since forming under the guidance of the late Tom Prowse to help maintain the local national parks.

The group continue to meet weekly and assist in the upkeep of Canunda, Beachport and Lake Frome parks and take direction from Glenn Jackway, senior ranger at Canunda for the National Parks and Wildlife Service (DEW).

The grant for \$1,000 will assist show society members to install security cameras at the main gate and administration area of the showgrounds.

Secretary of the MAHPS, Sue Vanderheul, is looking forward to the installation of the cameras telling the South Eastern Times: "When the grants came through the secretary's office we asked Barb Nitschke, who has already done a couple of grants for us, if she could apply and Grace nominated it for us.

"I wanted some security cameras because we do have RV's camping on site; I want to see who comes and goes at the gate and just a few areas around the main admin area and we hope it will also cover down toward the animal nursery.

"As far as security goes it's so we know who is onsite; we've had people sneaking in and using the amenities and we've also had a few things go missing like hoses, sprinklers and plant pots.

"I'm hoping for a minimum of three or four cameras, and when someone comes through the gate the phone is going to buzz so I can see who is coming and going at odd hours of the day and night."

Ms Keatley was happy to re-nominate the show society saying: "They can do with some upgrades and being on the committee previously I thought it would be an opportunity to help get them some new security cameras.

"It has taken a bit of time, it's a bit of a process."

Last year the show society received a \$500 grant which was put toward upgrading the animal nursery area with new fake grass and upgrading of the pens.

Ms Keatley encouraged other non-profit groups to apply for the People of Post grants of up to \$1,000.

"If anyone else is interested in applying for a grant next year, come and let us know a little bit of information about yourselves and what you're up to and we will get something done," she said.

Long time Penola residents Ashley and Barbara Smith have decided to pull up stumps and move on to be closer to their family in Healesville, Yarra Valley, in Victoria.

Barbara moved to Penola when she was just three years of age and did her schooling from Year 1 to 11 in Penola before moving to Adelaide to complete Year 12 and then to Wattle Park Teacher's College.

After 20 years she returned to Penola and has been here for 38 years.

"My parents acquired a Soldier Settlers block on the Dergholm Road, just out of Penola, and that is where I grew up," she said.

"I loved the farm life of riding horses, making rafts with my brothers, however I always wanted to be a teacher.

"At Penola High School I found my love of books which led me to become a teacher-librarian."

Mrs Smith's first school position was in Whyalla in the 1970's.

"I had 35 students, with no school support officers around back then," she said.

"I then moved to Wolseley, near Bordertown, teaching 15 students.

"I loved this time as I could ride my horse to school and, at recess and lunchtime, the children would ride the pony around the town oval," she said.

Ashley and Barbara married in September 1972 and started their married life in Sydney as Ashley was in National Service.

In 1974 they moved to Adelaide where Mrs Smith taught 32 students at the Hope Valley Primary School and while there she went back to teacher's college to complete a Degree in Education.

During that time the couple visited Hermannsburg, a town west of Alice Springs, and were offered jobs at the Lutheran Mission where they spent four years.

They renewed their contact with their Aboriginal family in 2019, 40 years after they had left the mission.

"It was a wonderful and very special reunion," Mrs Smith said.

"My students are now parents and grand-parents.

parents.

"We are regarded as their Miya (Mother) and Karta (Father)."

Last year the couple returned to Hermannsburg and did volunteer work around the Lutheran manse, church and cultural centre

iron ore mining town of Newman in Western Australia where their two daughters Nareena and TJ were born.

"Living in the Pilbara with the red dust, we always took our shoes off before entering any homes," Mrs Smith said.

In Newman she taught English through TAFE to migrant women from Thailand and the Philippines.

"This was my first contact with Asian people which led to my love and interest in these people," she said.

In 1984 the couple returned to Penola where Mrs Smith was the teacher-librarian and teacher of English for 14 years at the Penola High School.

Mrs Smith also taught at Millicent High School and at Grant High School.

The couple finally decided to live in the Penola township and built their home in 2003.

After settling in town Mrs Smith was offered a teaching position on the APY Lands in

the north west of SA and accepted it as she always wanted to return to the Red Centre.

When they returned to the South East, Mrs Smith taught the beautiful Karen and Congolese students at Mount Gambier High School.

The Karen families came from Thailand's refugee camps in Zambia and Tanzania.

Many of these families are still in Mount Gambier and Mrs Smith still keeps in contact with them.

"After returning to Penola High School for 18 months, I retired from teaching and began casual work Patrick's Cellar Door," Mrs Smith

"In 2013 I went with a missionary group to work with the Laos people, living in the mountains of Thailand.

"They were homeless after the Vietnam War, and this is when I realised that I had to return to Asia to do missionary work," she said

"One of the highlights of my life has been

the four trips that I have had to Cambodia since 2016, where I lived in villages, taught English to children and being welcomed into the Khmer families and their homes."

Both Ashley and Barbara have travelled extensively overseas visiting Europe, United Kingdom, Canada, United States of America including Hawaii and Alaska, and many South East Asian countries.

"Our family is most important to us and this is why we are leaving Penola so we can be closer to them," Mrs Smith said.

"We both will help out with looking after the grandchildren and Ashley will potter around doing odd jobs.

"I will get involved with the local history group, join the gym, be involved with the Lutheran church and participate in volunteer

"We will be very sad to leave this wonderful community but are looking forward to the next chapter in our life," Mrs Smith said.

Silly Cows - Pandemonium in Penola last week

This is not about the cow which jumped over the moon, but about two cows which fell into John Tregenza's underground tank last Thursday morning.

Early on Thursday morning last at, to be precise, 6.50 am, was surprised to see several cows mixed up in Sid Hane's woodheap.

With the drover and his dog, plus several sleepy but willing helpers, confusion was rampant.

Finally the cows were induced to leave the wood heap and headed for Syd's back door.

Mrs Hane said: "The milk's been delivered thank you" and hastily shut the door.

It was with sighs of relief that the cows were finally ejected.

The incident was quickly forgotten but alas not for long.

Just two hours later and only a few hundred yards away these wild and silly cows had gone underground and it was only their snorkel tubes which kept them from drowning.

(Note - A snorkel tube is an attachment invented by the Germans during the last war which enabled submarines to cruise submerged on their diesel motors. The tube projects upwards and so allows the motor to be used underwater).

With a clatter and much bashing these two cows landed on the corrugated iron cover of the tank.

How were they to know it wouldn't hold a cow—no one told them, but they soon found out

The water was fine but a bit cold.

Drover L Jones was now properly stumped. Having driven the cows all the way from Berkins, Comaum, and with only about a mile to go they had now put this over him.

Sorry, but the history of these cows as supplied by Lance is not suitable for publication.
Frank Lowe's advice was sought—he

The rope was hitched on to the crane and away she went.

All oblivious of the protests of the cow up she went and was almost out when with a bellow and a kick the rope slipped up around her neck with her legs still in the loop.

The 'poor cow' was likely to choke so was smartly lowered down again, but it was then found she was likely to drown.

So up and down, up and down, and so on until a way was worked out to loosen the rope.

Following much ribald advice from the onlookers this was finally accomplished.

With the aid of a second rope the cow was finally landed on mother earth.

When her feet met it was she pleased and did she go - yes and did everyone else go too.

The feminine section took to the adjacent windmill and the way they went up it would have put a fireman to shame.

The male section also smartly placed large obstacles between them and the cow.

But, Miss Cow was still held by the hawser and not knowing, took off into the wind only to be rudely dragged back again - so with much bellowing, round and round she went like the merry-go-round.

Who could stop her - well no one wanted to but the truck did when she took one turn a bit wide and connected with it.

In came the enemy and Howard Dansie put a half-nelson on her - the brute - and the boys piled on wherever they could get.

# Penola Walk with History: 1850's Bond Store

### From The National Trust of SA Penola Branch

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called Penola Walk With History to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

### The Bond Store

This simple 1850s two-roomed building, constructed of random stone, has retained its masonry chimney. The verandah on the eastern elevation is a later addition.

The bond store was used to hold liquor

supplies from interstate because customs duty was payable on goods transported between adjacent colonies prior to federation in 1901.

From 1869 to 1871 it was listed as a cottage, garden and outbuildings occupied by Albert J Edwards, licensee of the Prince of Wales Hotel, and then as a stone store and yard still owned and occupied by him from 1872 to 1875, followed by his wife Catherine J Edwards until 1882.

The building was used as a residence until 1978 when it was purchased by the District Council of Penola, later Wattle Range Council, which donated it to the Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia in 2018.

### Iconic signage removed

Heading east from the end of George Street looks a little different now with an iconic sign that has long graced the Millicent's National Trust Museum roof now removed.

The painted sign had been above the original entrance to the museum, which now houses the museum's shipwreck room, for more than 30 years but as that entrance is no longer used it has caused confusion among tourists.

# Cruiser's Aussie history

The Land Cruiser wagon first chiselled its way into the Australian psyche during the development of the Snowy Mountains Hydro Electric Scheme in the 1950s.

Now nearly 60 years later the latest version of the iconic Toyota 4x4, the 300 Series, hangs on firmly to its exalted position in the pantheon of the large off-roader, paralleling a Henry Moore statue in the art world.

There's still a local link, with the owners of the upper-end variants able to take advantage of Toyota's Multi-Terrain Select system, which was developed Down Under with reference to Australian widely varying on and off-road

The new Land Cruiser also includes two new flagship variants, with the luxury Sahara ZX and the off-road-focused GR Sport joining the core GX, GXL, VX and Sahara.

Major upgrades include a new 3.3-litre V6 twin-turbo diesel engine, a new exterior design underpinned by the Toyota New Global Architecture platform and advanced driver assistance technologies to provide superb onroad performance and unmatched off-road

Prices range from \$89,990, plus on-road costs for the entry-level GX and top out at \$138,790 for the Sahara ZX.

Premium paint is a \$675 add-on.

The GXL on test tipped the scales into six figures at \$101,790.

For the first time on Land Cruiser, the Toyota Service Advantage has been extended from three years/60,000 km to five years/100,000 km, providing customers with capped-price servicing for their first 10 services at \$375 each.

Intervals are every six months or 10,000 km, whichever comes first.

Owners are able to extend their warranty on the engine and driveline to seven years by sticking to the service schedule.

Newly constructed from the ground up, the 300 Series extends Land Cruiser's long-standing statuesque stance in the big 4x4 market segment, combining trademark features with new, powerful styling.

From the front, new Land Cruiser pays homage to its heritage through its wide, horizontal grille, flanked by slimline headlights, both set higher than the previous model to avoid damage when off road.

The front bumper is more rounded.

In profile the cabin is set further back in line with early generations of the vehicle, the rear bumper curves more steeply upwards to improve off-road ability, while the whole rear end is tapered for better aerodynamics.

Rear lights are arranged horizontally in a new aluminium hatch.

Along with the significant upgrade in features and technology, the Land Cruiser's cabin has been extensively soundproofed to ensure occupants travel in quiet comfort, while the top of the console box, driver and front passenger kneepads and lower length on the centre console are all upholstered in soft-touch

The GXL test car joins the flagship VX and Sahara in offering seating for seven occupants.

The third row makes room for 1004 litres of luggage and seating for five when it is stowed away in the floor, with up to 1967 litres with both rear rows folded.

Storage includes a dual-opening centre console storage box, centre storage tray/box, overhead sunglasses holder, glovebox and a range of door bins and cupholders capable of holding 750ml bottles.

Information and entertainment are provided by a 9-inch display with a six-speaker audio system.

The new multimedia system is compatible with Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, and features Bluetooth connectivity, AM/FM/DAB+ radio and voice recognition.

Sadly, sat nav and CD / DVD are absent from GXL while all variants bar the entry-level GX feature Qi wireless phone charging.

Two USB terminals and a 12V socket allow further charging options.

All variants are powered by a new-genera-

tion 3.3-litre V6 twin-turbo diesel engine producing 227 kW at 4000 rpm and 700 Nm from 1600 to 2600 rpm, a 27 kW / 50 Nm increase over the V8 it replaces.

The V6 is mated with a segment-first 10-speed torque converter automatic transmission.

Thanks to its new-generation engine, Toyota has said intelligent transmission, weightsaving measures and fuel economy has reduced by 6.3 per cent on the combined cycle compared with the outgoing V8, to 8.9 litres per 100km.

All Land Cruisers take in the latest Toyota Safety Sense technologies including autonomous emergency braking pre-collision safety with daytime cyclist and oncoming vehicle detection, night-time pedestrian detection, intersection turn assist and steering assist.

Active cruise control now offers curve speed reduction, while road sign assist, and on VX grades and above, lane trace assist with steering wheel vibration, have been introduced for the first time. Other safety features on all grades include automatic high beam, reversing camera and 10 airbags.

New Toyota Connected Services offers enhanced safety and security with automatic assistance in the event of an emergency and vehicle tracking if the car is stolen.

The two-way turbocharging of the new 227 kW / 700 Nm V6 ensures smooth and efficient power delivery.

At low speed, the primary turbocharger is

engaged for responsive power delivery.

As engine speed increases, the second turbocharger is activated to deliver optimal power and torque with smooth acceleration.

Both turbos have been designed to maximise low-speed torque, perfect for off-roading or towing.

The 300 Series retains the Land Cruiser's 3500kg braked towing capacity, offering effortless towing thanks to a combination of greater torque, the sophisticated 10-speed transmission and a stronger, more stable chassis.

A tow wiring harness is also now offered as standard, making the process of connecting a trailer easier than ever.

Multi-Terrain Select features six different modes for off-road terrain - five in high range and four in low range - for ultimate traction in the harshest conditions.

Developed extensively in Australia, MTS offers dirt, sand, mud, deep snow, rock and new auto modes, the last able to intelligently sense the terrain underfoot and adapt the traction control systems accordingly.

Combining with MTS is the low-speed crawl control function and the multi-terrain monitor system which provides 360-degree and underfloor views of the path and approaching obstacles.

Fans of the V8 might be disappointed at the demise of the big block, but the V6 twinturbo replacement figures - more power, more torque, less fuel - go a long way to standing up for the newbie's case.

### Sporty, light-weight BMW M4 CSL coming to Australia

The lightweight BMW M4 CSL is coming to Australia later this year.

It has a kerb weight of 1,625 kilograms, giving it a power-to-weight ratio of just 2.95 kilograms per hp (4.01 kg/kW).

It will only be a two-seater as 21 kilograms were saved by removing the rear seats and seat belts, integrating a partition and making the associated modifications to the luggage compartment.

Using M Carbon full bucket seats reduced weight by around 24 kilograms compared with the standard seats fitted in the BMW M4 Competition Coupe.

Chassis changes, including the addi-

brakes and special light-alloy wheels, springs and struts, lowered the figure by around another 21 kilograms.

Paring back the amount of soundproofing tion of extra-lightweight M Carbon ceramic plus switching to ultra-lightweight sound in-

sulation saved around 15 kilograms, while the use of components made from carbonfibre-reinforced plastic (CFRP) deducted some eleven kilograms.

In addition to its CFRP roof, the bonnet and boot lid of the BMW M4 CSL are also hewn from this lightweight high-tech material, as is its centre console.

A titanium rear silencer cuts more than four kilograms from the weight of the exhaust system.

Detail modifications to areas such as the BMW kidney grille, rear lights, floor mats and automatic climate control shave off another four kilograms.

The body of the BMW M4 CSL is painted in the exclusive Frozen Brooklyn Grey metallic as standard.

This exterior shade teams up with exposed carbon-fibre surfaces and red accents.

The carbon-fibre structure of the body components is visible in various areas, including the two chiselled indents in the bon-

The surfaces of the indents, which are not painted in body colour, are highlighted by red outlines.

Red accent lines add extra emphasis to the two fins on the CFRP roof, the contours of its side sills, the black model badges, and the model-specific CFRP splitters and air curtain inserts in the front apron.

Priced at \$303,900 plus road costs the Australian introduction is set for Q4, 2022.

The price includes GST and Luxury Car Tax but not on-road costs.


