Positive season

The seeding is done, the sun has shone, the rain has been, the crops have a green tinge and this all augurs well for a very good cropping season ahead for farmers in the Penola district.

Local farmers Trevor and Simon Zadow crop 1700 acres in the Penola area which consists of wheat, barley, oats, canola, broad beans and carrots for seed.

They also run 2000 ewes which have just finished lambing.

"With the dry season we have had we had to dry sow our crops, however the rain we had after was most valuable," Trevor said. "In January 1981 we moved to Dorodong from Lameroo where we purchased 560 acres and grazed sheep for 20 years.

"We sold that land in 2020 and purchased 1000 acres of sheep and cropping land near Penola.

"We have also purchased other land in the meantime so we are kept very busy," he said.

Trevor said he loves farming and had his first taste of cropping at the age of 15 with his father.

"It takes us about four to six weeks to seed dependent on the weather and harvest is ready in December and January."

The crops will be sprayed about six weeks

after seeding for weeds and then again later in the year to control insects.

At the end of harvest all the silos will be full. "Our main shearing is in September and October and with breeding our own ewes, we have plenty to do in the off cropping season," Trevor said.

"I won't be retiring anytime soon as I enjoy what I do and will continue on as long as I can."

Trevor was a shearer for more than 30 years and travelled around the country shearing in the Murray Mallee, Western Australia, Adelaide Hills and the South East.

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Workers in high demand

Millicent is not immune to a nationwide shortage of workers with local employers searching in vain to fill positions that would traditionally have a line up of willing takers.

Almost a third (31 per cent) of employing businesses in Australia are having difficulty finding suitable staff, according to survey results released last week by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS).

And, according to new seasonally adjusted figures from the ABS, there were 423,000 iob vacancies nationwide in February which is 27,000 more than in November 2021 and around 200,000 more than in February 2020.

Four of them are on offer at Millicent crash repairer, Dave Reilly's Panel and Paint.

Owner and operator of the business, Dave Reilly is looking for a vehicle detailer, an apprentice panel beater, spray painter, and a car wash attendant.

Some are full time jobs and they represent a 50 per cent increase on his current staff of eight.

Finding anyone to take on the jobs has been more difficult than Mr Reilly has ever experienced in his 43 years in the business.

"I can't get anyone, not even work experience kids," he said.

"I've never had to advertise before for apprentices, they usually just come in wanting a iob.

Mr Reilly believed the situation was Covid-19 pandemic related but also blamed a shift in interests among the younger generation.

"Back in the day we could modify our cars, put on big wheels and loud exhausts and things like that; we tinkered with our cars," he said.

"Now they are just an A to B thing and the kids aren't that interested in cars like we were, it's a different set of interests.

"And cars aren't as mechanical as they used to be either; you can't just tinker with them at home because of the electronics and computers in today's cars.

"So there doesn't appear to be any real interest in the trade; no mechanical mindedness anymore

"If you could fix cars with an iPhone there would be a line up for the jobs," he said.

Mr Reilly said he'd been busy putting the "word out there" that the jobs were up for the taking, asking around among crowds at local football matches, and even letting the high

schools in the area know, but to no avail.

He's even prepared to be flexible with hours to attract possible candidates.

"We're prepared to make the detailing job a 9 to 3 position, perfect school hours," he said.

Mr Reilly said filling the jobs was important for his business to cope with the workload and said there was a definite longevity in the industry.

"A car is still the second biggest purchase people make; people are stilling going to have cars and there will still be a need to fix them,' he said.

"We're busy as and we're months behind; deliveries are slow, parts are hard to get, everything is snowballing; and there are lots of kangaroos," he said indicating that kangaroo hits are the major cause of panel and other damage on cars.

Mr Reilly recognised he was not alone in his quandary.

"It is a problem everywhere; everyone is having trouble filling jobs," he said.

"Everyone knows about the electricians and carpenters [being in demand] but automotive is screaming out as well.

"Every aspect of the trade is looking for people and there are real opportunities in the industry for people.'

The Australian Chamber of Commerce and Industry (ACCI), in its 'Overcoming Australia's Labour and Skills Shortages' submission to the Australian Productivity Commission in March this year, recognised the situation as the most difficult seen in decades.

"The most pressing challenge facing business today is a shortage of skills and labour," said ACCI chief executive, Andrew McKellar, in the report.

"With workplaces under enormous strain, it is placing a handbrake on economic growth.

The report said businesses of every size, in every industry, in every corner of the country, are experiencing the worst skill and labour shortages in decades - a challenge that is worsening by the day.

The unemployment rate of 4 per cent in February 2022 is the lowest rate since the peak of the resources boom in 2008," the report said.

"It is predicted that, as a result of unprecedented fiscal stimulus in response to Covid-19, unemployment will decline even further to around 3.75 per cent by the end of 2022 and remain at this level during 2023.

"Australia has not experienced unemployment rates this low in the past half-century the last time we had the unemployment rate below 4 per cent was in the early 1970s.'

South Australia's unemployment rate is the highest in Australia at 4.6 per cent as at May, with the national rate at 3.9 per cent.

Opportunity to voice opinion on council's draft budget

Verbal submissions on Wattle Range Council's 2022/23 draft budget will be heard at a public meeting next Tuesday.

Released for public comment earlier this month, the \$31m draft budget and annual business plan includes council raising an additional 5.36 per cent in rate revenue.

As a result, the rate revenue will increase to \$20.44m and there will be an operating deficit of \$3.151m.

Rural, commercial and industrial properties will pay a lower rate-in-the-dollar than residential properties, with primary production paying 67 per cent and commercial and industrial 92 per cent of the residential rate. Written submissions on the draft budget will be received until 5pm tomorrow and a

public meeting will be held at the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre supper room next Tuesday where verbal submissions can be made.

The meeting will begin at 5pm and must

allow at least an hour for submissions to be heard. Copies of council's 2022/2023 draft budget and annual business plan are available from each of council's offices and the Millicent Library or can be downloaded from council's website at www.wattlerange.sa.gov. au/haveyoursay

Upgrade for course

The new system will replace one installed more than 30 years ago.

Beachport Golf Club President Lyn White said the club decided to push ahead with the upgrade with the support of its members, after missing out on grants.

"We were not deterred by that," Ms White said.

"We were lucky enough that we have a few generous members who said they were willing to give some money as long as it goes to this project only."

The new system has meant excavations on sections of the course.

Earth movers and plumbers have been hired, but the club has saved money due to locals who have helped voluntarily.

"We are lucky we have a retired surveyor who has laid the course out for free," Ms White said.

"Spinner MacGregor, who is a local builder in town... is running the project, so he has given up his job basically for two months."

Around \$50,000 has been funded from loans, with the remainder of the funds coming from members, community groups and sponsors.

"It is just fabulous, for a small club with less than 100 members to be able to pull off a \$350,000 project is pretty impressive," Ms White said.

"It is a great club, and the spirit within the club and the support from the community for the club has been great.

The club expects the new system to last the next 30 years.

"We know we had to do it," Ms White said.

Festival canned

Beachport's Crayfish Festival will not go ahead next year, despite being a success when held earlier this year.

Wattle Range Council has not included any funding for the festival in its 2022/23 draft budget released for public comment earlier this month.

The festival this year made a profit of about \$9000 and attracted almost 2000 visitors.

Wattle Range Council chief executive officer Ben Gower said the event may return in 2024, but there was no official budget at this stage.

"We are going to have a breather for a year, and then have a look after that and see if we will have another one," Mr Gower said.

"It will depend on a range of things.

"We would like to think given its success we would like to run future festivals, but that will be a brand new council by then as elections are coming up this year. "We will see if the community still wants to support it."

Mr Gower said that if there was an appetite for the event to be run completely by the Beachport community, council would consider what support may be offered.

"Normally what we try and do with these types of events is we will auspice and help run them for the first couple of goes until we find a sustainable solution," he said.

"And then if a community group wants to take it over from us, we are more than happy to transition it.

"There are around half a dozen to ten events every year that are perpetually funded by council, not all of it, but a proportion.

"There is no reason to suggest we could not find a sustainable solution, given the success of this year's event."

Event volunteer Heather Burdon said it was disappointing the festival would not go ahead in 2023.

"We got really good feedback from this year's festival," Ms Burdon said.

"People were saying they were looking forward to coming back next year.

"It is just a shame it will not happen."

New era for iconic shop

Millicent Toy Kingdom, the South East's only dedicated toy shop, is on the market.

"It's time," said owners Bill and Helen Davis who are looking to retire after more than 34 years in the business.

Their shop, on the corner of Davenport Street and Kentish Place, is a mecca for children with aisles of shelves packed with a wonderous array of toys from Barbie dolls, jigsaw puzzles and board games to trampolines, remote control cars and the latest craze, fidget toys.

The shop also specialises in push bikes with a large selection in-store including the newest invention being electric push bikes, known as e-bikes.

Also available are buckets, plastic containers and a variety of rubber and foam products, harping back to Mr Davis's family history in business in the South East.

In the 1920's, Mr Davis's grandfather, Stan Davis was in business with Mr HS (Stan) May in a mechanics garage and service station in Mount Gambier.

The partnership of May and Davis was also a car dealership, conducted a booking service for air services from Mount Gambier to Adelaide, was instrumental in establishing an aerodrome at Mount Gambier in the 1930's, and also conducted bus services in Mount Gambier in the 1940's.

Mr Davis's father and uncle, Alec and Colin Davis, began Davis Bros Tyre and Battery Service in Mount Gambier in 1946 and went on to open 12 branches around the South East and Western Victoria.

Millicent's branch opened in 1957 and was originally situated where Banner Mitre 10 has its hardware store today.

The current building was constructed in 1972 with Davis Bros operating its tyre business in one part of the premises, and a new venture, Rubber and Plastics, which included Toyworld, in the other part of the building.

Mr Davis's introduction to Davis Bros began at the age of 10.

"I was banned from the business during the week, because I had to go to school," he said.

"But it was much more fun going down to the shop and changing tyres so I went straight down every Friday after school and on Saturdays first thing."

After he left school, Mr Davis did an apprenticeship with Beaurepaires in Adelaide in 1974 before managing Davis Bros' Mount Gambier store in 1976 and filling in as a manager when staff took leave in some of the business's other branches.

In 1977, he settled in Millicent and managed the Millicent branch of the tyre business.

When Davis Bros sold its tyre business to Dunlop Olympic, Mr Davis worked for the new owners before spending two years as a car salesman at Bohner Ford (now Mac Ford).

He married Helen (nee Johnson) in 1982 and the couple took over Millicent Rubber and Plastics/Toyworld on May 1, 1988.

Staff at the time included Jim Mather with casuals Beryl Leonard and Jenny Hodgens.

Originally employed by Davis Bros in the tyre business as a 'fill in job', Mr Mather went on to manage the Rubber and Plastics/Toyworld store for Davis Bros for 30 years.

"When Helen and I took over the place, Jim was told he could stay in the job for as long as he wanted and he ended up staying here until he retired," Mr Davis said.

"Jim passed on all of his knowledge to me and was instrumental in helping us get on the right track," he said in admiration of Mr Mather.

In the ensuing 34 years, the couple have brought up their three children - Chloe, Ben and Adam - while riding and enduring the ups and downs of business.

Today, with the next closest dedicated toy shop in South Australia being at Victor Harbor, Millicent Toy Kingdom has customers coming from a wide area to shop from their impressive array which includes a selection of what Mr Davis believes has been the most successful toy.

"Lego has been the most popular toy - it was back then, and today it is stronger than it has ever been," he said.

"A lot of stuff comes and goes but the most consistent would have to be Lego."

While stepping away from the business will be difficult when it sells, the couple will have the knowledge that they have made many children happy.

"We've served children and then watched them grow up and served their children and we're almost at the third generation now," said Mrs Davis.

"It's all about seeing kids with smiles on their faces."

Pest goldfish found in Lake McIntyre

Lake McIntyre volunteers are urging people not to release aquarium fish into the popular bird attracting lake at Millicent after a large goldfish was found there recently.

As a result of the find, volunteer Rosey Pounsett provided a statement to The South Eastern Times as follows.

"What happens when your cute little goldfish outgrows its small fishbowl or aquarium?" Ms Pounsett started.

"What do you do with it?

"Well one thing you should never do is release it into your local waterways, be it a lake, river, drain or dam.

"Once released into the environment they can grow to extraordinary sizes.

"Some released goldfish have been recorded as growing to 1.9 kilograms and released koi carp grow even larger; up to one metre long and eight kilograms.

"These huge fish have been recorded and caught in the Vasse River in Western Australia.

"Several years ago, three goldfish were sighted in the shallows of Lake McIntyre, obviously having been put there by a member of the public.

"Perhaps this person thought they were doing the right thing, but releasing any sort of fish into an area where it does not belong is not being kind - either to the fish or the environment. "We can only hope that the goldfish released were all the same sex and therefore have not bred, and that they will not cause any insurmountable problems to our native fish or the aquatic environment.



Shopping bag boom at Kingston

Receiving national recognition for their handmade shopping bags, Kingston SE Small Steps group have made more than 20,000 and delivered them to businesses for free.

Volunteer Liz Wingard said the project took off "like wildfire" when the group began making bags for Kingston's two supermarkets.

She said the group had received numerous donations of fabric and other material from the local community and beyond to enable the bags to be made.

"Now that we are becoming more well known, we have been getting fabric from all over Australia," Ms Wingard said.

"We have expanded the project to putting shopping bags in about half the businesses in Kingston."

Ms Wingard said the idea originally came from a conversation with her friend about their dislike towards singleuse plastic bags in supermarkets.

After a while, the idea of using upcycled old material to repurpose it into fashionable shopping bags came to fruition and the group started off using old pillow cases and doona covers.

"We just thought it would be a good environmental thing to do rather than the same plastic being used everywhere," Ms Wingard said.

"Lots of people and individuals within the community [donate material] as well as upholstery and curtain fabric shops."

She said although the bags were free, donations would still be welcomed to support the group's cause.

She said the bags had not been distributed beyond Kingston due to them having a small Kingston logo printed on them, but there had been requests from other towns for the bags.

"Since there has been a little bit of publicity we have had requests from all over Australia and we have sent a few further afield to people who are talking about setting up a similar program in their town," Ms Wingard said.

She said the project had been financially supported by the Stand Like Stone Foundation in starting up and with ongoing costs such as machine maintenance and purchasing thread.

Ms Wingard also said she never expected the project to have such a large amount of recognition adding it had never entered the group's minds.

"It has been overwhelming actually and we have had a huge response such as lots of messages from people instantly wanting to know about the bags," she said.



"Introduced fish of any sort can do a lot of damage to our native freshwater fish and their natural environment.

"Goldfish are carnivorous, so they will eat other fish, tadpoles, and the eggs of our native fish.

"Their feeding habits stir up the bottom of the waterway, disrupting plants and making the water turbid and muddy which can be a cause of algal blooms.

"They can also introduce diseases which can dramatically impact the number of native fish. The goldfish caught at Lake McIntyre recently; it was bigger than an adult's shoe. Pictures: SUPPLIED

"Once released it is notoriously difficult to eradicate them.

"Earlier this month one of the goldfish that was released into Lake McIntyre was found floating and at risk of being eaten by a pelican. "It was caught and removed from the water but had died of an unknown cause.

"If this fish had any type of exotic disease, it may have caused harm to the pelican or any other predator that could have eaten it.

"So remember, having any sort of pet is a responsibility.

"When the time comes for you to give up that pet, the responsibility does not end.

"Please do not release your goldfish into any of your local waterways."

Recycling pays off

A Robe business has been named as an Australia Post Local Business Hero.

'Transmutation' is a plastic recycling workshop and retail outlet, turning waste plastics into bowls, doorknobs, and pens on site.

The business also sells other items such as clothing, accessories, and homewares made from recyclable materials.

One of only four South Australian businesses to receive the honour, Transmutation will receive a 'Heroes Package' worth up to \$5000 from Australia Post, as well as being featured on their website and in-store.

Bradley Scott, co-owner of Transmutation, said it was nice for the local post office to nominate them.

"We sort of knew we were in with a chance, but it was still a surprise," Mr Scott said.

"It has been great."

Mr Scott, along with his wife Narelle, settled in Robe after travelling across Australia.

"We started this plastic recycling business based on things I had seen on YouTube," Mr Scott said.

"So, we built the little machines ourselves and then started recycling plastics.

"One thing led to another and then we had a collaboration with Aussie Bread Tag for Wheelchairs, who provide us with bread tags, and we donate to the charity, and they buy wheelchairs with our donations.

"They have 65 wheelchairs so far and we have done seven tonnes of plastic, so it has worked out well.'

The business has also collaborated with Country Road, creating items made from white bread tags for the brand.

Mr Scott said they will need to add some extra space to keep up with recent demand.

"Business is growing quickly," he said.

"We are going strong, we are about to put another shed up.

Australia Post Executive General Manager Retail, Catriona Noble said the program helps build connections between post offices and local businesses.

"Many of the small business heroes were nominated thanks to an established and strong relationship with their local Post Office team, so it is wonderful to see these connec-

"We have a worm garden and all the scraps are added which in turn is used for fertiliser," Ms Smith said

"Our harvest so far this year has included tomatoes, pumpkins, zuchinni, garlic, potatoes, broccoli, cabbages, beetroot and silverbeet," she said.

"Our aim is to produce it, cook it and eat it," she said.

Students collect the produce and a market is held each Wednesday from about 2.30pm to 3.10pm and is open to the public.

Proceeds from the sales go back into purchasing seeds and other requirements for the garden.

The winter seeds will be sown in the first

week of Term 2 with the crop taking 12 to 14 weeks to mature.

With the soon to be completed science room and kitchen at the school, students will be able to harvest the vegetables, cook and eat them, and share with staff.

The Penola hardware shop has been most supportive of the program and has offered advice in many ways.

They also nominate how they plan to continue connecting with nature at home.

"I hope the students will be inspired to take their family on adventures in local forests and reserves now that they have a deeper appreciation of the local Limestone Coast landscape," Ms Freebairn said.

The next young Environmental Leaders event will be held in Term 3 and will include students taking part in controlling environmental weeds such as boneseed and bridal creeper.

Pranksters caused chaos

The Pennant Penola, Thursday, August 24, 1961 **CAUGHT – BUT GOOD**

A section of the local pranksters produced their most astounding brain child to date over the weekend, but unfortunately for them it landed back in their laps a few hours afterwards due to some very smart detective work by our local police.

It's smart to flout the law and get away with it for a time but in the end the law always turns out to be the smarter.

It is expected that the bench will give these lads something to smart about for some time to come

However, we must admit that when we viewed the setting so neatly arranged in the main street early on Monday morning that we chortled as much as other observers did.

Here's how it was arranged.

A council hut on wheels was towed from the precincts of the pound on the Casterton Road early in the evening of Sunday along the road at the back of the hospital, parked and chained to one of the verandah posts of the shops occupied by the fruit supply and W Shipham.

It was both seen and heard by residents as it rumbled its way to its resting place.

Then a stop sign and a pole was wrenched out of its lawful resting place and placed against the end of the hut facing up the street.

On the corner of the other end the Casterton-Dergholm road sign was neatly placed. The post had been neatly sawn through so

it could be moved.

Then to give the residence a more homely appearance a mat was placed at the front door and a green four-gallon oil drum placed upon it

To complete the setting two white garden

seats, requisitioned from outside the council chambers, were placed, one at the end of the van and the other on the footpath with several empty bottles lying beside it.

Everything was council property, excepting the empties, and it could be reasonably interpreted that the lads were having a crack at the recently appointed council public officers.

The same Sunday night around the north end of the town gunshots and 'whoopees' followed by accelerating cars were heard, and its happened before in the same locality.

This is how it ended on Monday:

Penola Police have interviewed persons responsible for Sunday night's movement of council property into the main street, the names of several men have been taken and further action will be taken.

The offenders were not teenagers, they are all over 21 years.

The Pennant Penola, Thursday, September 14, 1961 £10 PENALTY IMPOSED

Before Messrs P H Ferris and R J Skinner; JP's last Tuesday, Sgt H C E Brooks prosecuted M J B. PIH. THD. HIH.

The prosecutor in presenting his case, said the offence could not be treated lightly, but he felt and asked the bench to take into account that no intended viciousness was apparent but only to play a joke on others.

Mr R J Skinner, JP, in addressing the court stated the bench could remember when they were young men, and they trusted the defendants would take the occasion as a wellearned lesson.

A fine of £10 was imposed with 10/- court fees in each case.

The history of the first stone cottage built in Penola

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called Penola Walk With History to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

RENFREY HOME

This four-roomed cottage with a lean-to at the back was locally known as the first stone house built in Penola.

It was possibly built by John Hogg, who officially owned a cottage and garden on the site from1869 until his death in 1900, when it became the estate of his widow Sarah nee Stone.

Her nephew John Renfrey, who conducted a carrying business with a horse and dray in Penola, became the owner in 1909. This dray was also used to transport friends, relatives and the Penola younger set to picnics.

John Renfrey married local girl Margaret Condon and was one of the district's most popular residents, renowned for his kindliness and cheerfulness.



He was keenly interested in the civic and sporting activities of the town and for many years was a committee member of the Racing Club, Show Society, Flower Show, Institute and the Public Park.

The Renfrey children were Edmund John, Marie, Nathaniel who bought a truck and took over the carrying business following his father's death, Isabel who worked for many years as a bookkeeper at Balnaves Store and was the last of the family to live in the cottage, and Thomas James who died at a young age following a career as a distinguished musician.

In about 2015 the property was purchased as a private residence for rental by builder Heath Mitchell, who renovated the house and added a new semi-detached kitchen and bathroom.

The weekend started with the Prologue time trial where Gartner finished ninth out of 150 competitors.

Sunday's first 226km leg started strong for Gartner and his team. After 60km he caught the car in front continued to push hard.

"We couldn't get past the truck in front because the dust was so bad," Gartner said.

"We nearly had seven crashes trying to get past them so we just had to sit behind them."

He said the hold up cost him potentially six or seven minutes, which cost him second place on the grid for the final leg.

Instead, Gartner had to settle for seventh for Monday's final leg.

"We were pretty disappointed because we put a lot of hours into the truck," he said. Gartner said his truck remained in good

shape and was confident ahead of the final leg.

"Sixth was 25 seconds in front, so we knew we had to really push hard because we would have been in his dust," he said.

"The first 40km to Alice Springs is not very dusty and you can find spots to pass.

"So we knew we had 40km to get him."

Gartner moved up to sixth place just before the 40km mark and began to push hard in clear air.

With 30km left in the race, Gartner's truck gave a "flutter" and had no fuel pressure.

"We had fuel issues and the truck kept stopping and starting," he said.

Gartner said his car stopped just 1km from the finish and would not go.

"We sat there for 10 minutes and everyone we overtook, went past us," he said.

"We gave it one more go and idled it in first gear for the final stretch to finish ninth.

"It was a pretty testing race but to finish in the top 10 is a good achievement."

Despite the unfortunate end to the race, Gartner remained upbeat about finishing the final leg.

"The Finke Desert Race is a challenge to finish at any level, so to finish the Finke in the top 10 was great," he said.

This was Gartner's 16th Finke Desert race and has driven alongside Mount Gambier's Jamie Jennings and had Craig Carrison as his engine builder for each of those races.
