Beach departure

Penola environmental activists are celebrating news that Beach Energy is leaving, having packed up their Church Street office and made plans for the Katnook Gas Plant to be mothballed in the coming months.

The company has declared that it has no plans to continue with gas exploration in the South East in the future and in a statement, it confirmed that although Katnook plant is still producing gas into the South East, with the natural decline in production, they will temporarily "shut-in" the Katnook processing plant in the next three to six months.

"Supply of gas to the South East customers will not be impacted by the shut-in of the Katnook plant, as the South East pipeline connects into Port Campbell in Victoria, where Beach has already added significant production capacity in 2021, with more planned in the coming year," it said in a statement.

"Beach today accounts for about 12 per cent of the total production of the total East Coast Gas Market (which includes SA) which will grow to about 16 per cent in the near future.

Chair of the Limestone Coast Protection Alliance Angus Ralton, of Penola, said Beach Energy leaving was good news for the whole community.

"Their [Beach Energy's] time here created division in the community, created unrest in the community, created uncertainty for farmers and created uncertainty for the communities thinking about their water supplies," he

"It was an overall bad move from a company that doesn't know better."

The work will not stop for the Alliance however, with Mr Ralton and his team waiting in the wings for Beach Energy's return.

Radio coup gathering

A special general meeting of Millicent Community Radio Station 5THE FM has been called by members after requests to the station's management were ignored.

Last month 15 of the station's members wrote to 5THE FM management board and requested a meeting, in a letter signed by Des Noll. Mr Noll states he was acting as a concerned community and station member, and not in his role as Wattle Range Council Mayor.

As no response to the request was received, the group has been forced to call a special general meeting, to be held later this month.

The members are seeking clarity on current governance and management structures, and the station's compliance with key regulatory bodies such as the Australian Communications Media Authority (ACMA), South Australian Community Broadcasting Association, and the South Australia Consumer and Business Services (CBS)

Requests for this information to 5THE FM have not been provided to the concerned group of members.

Des Noll said the meeting would help get to the bottom of how the station is currently run.

"The purpose of this meeting is to identify the current governance, management structure currently in place, and its compliance with the following," he said.

"[The meeting will] identify and establish a transitional governance board of management to operate the Millicent community ra-

Mr Noll said he encouraged the public to attend the meeting, official members or not.

"Any interested community members who are concerned about the current status of operations are welcome to attend," he said.

The meeting will be chaired by an interim chairperson, current 5GTR FM chairperson

In May the South Eastern Times revealed the station is being investigated by ACMA, which regulates Australian media, following a complaint. The outcome of the investigation is not expected for a number of months.

The radio station was contacted for comment about the meeting but did not respond by print deadline.

The special general meeting will be held next week on July 21 at St Alphonsus Hall, starting at 7pm.

Budget concerns

The Riddoch Business and Community Association (RBCA) has raised concerns about the 2022/23 Wattle Range Council's Draft Annual

In a submission to the Wattle Range Council, the association said it was pleasing to see that Wattle Range Council has put a focus on economic development, tourism, and updates to our road network through the significant priorities list, but also raised a number of issues.

Key concerns include the increase in emplovee costs, additional funding for both the Millicent and Penola Masterplans, more funding for roads across the council area, increased spending on community events grants programs, the percentage of funds going towards drainage in Penola, and a lack of funding for youth opportunities, as well as other issues.

"Having reviewed and considered the Draft Business Plan, it is pleasing to see that Wattle Range Council has put a focus on economic development, tourism, and updates to our road network through the significant priorities list," the submission said.

"The Riddoch Business and Community Association also support the recommendations for the improvement of the visual ame-

nity of Penola. However, we have questions and concerns regarding most of these budget items that we wish to query.

Association representatives Nicole Reschke and Simone Kain spoke at a special council meeting on Tuesday, where they asked a number of questions to the council on topics outlined in their submission on how spending has been decided, and if the amounts were accurate. Wattle Range chief executive Ben Gower responded to some of their queries in the meeting, highlighting an increase in service delivery being responsible for increased staffing costs.

He indicated that a response would be given to the association on their submission, hopefully by the end of the week.

Questions from the public were also taken during the special meeting, with many in attendance utilising the opportunity.

The questions asked included subjects such as the Beachport Crayfish Festival, road maintenance, and rate valuations.

Primary production rates were also discussed after a question from the public prompted council to reaffirm it would continue to advocate to the State Government for forestry to be moved from primary production

into a separate rate category.

There were five other submissions received by the council, some of which highlighted similar issues. Jodi Strother, in her submission, said she objected to the rate rise, saving there were other ways for the council to save money, referencing the council's proposed new council chambers- predicted to cost more than \$9m, and "projects that are of no benefit."

John Andre echoed the concerns of the RBCA about the 14 per cent increase in staffing, which has seen employee costs become one of council's biggest expenses.

Anne Miller, of Penola, raised concerns about a lack of funding for Penola footpaths in the budget, saying that a survey that was completed last year indicated that improvement of footpaths and drainage was a high priority for

Millicent resident Elisabeth Stephan said she was disappointed by the lack of funds for the toilet facilities at Surf Beach in Beachport, and the Glencoe Progress Association asked for ongoing interim funding for Lake Leake.

After the submissions were noted Mr Gower committed that council would respond to all the submissions received.

Businesses encouraged to enrol to vote

The Electoral Commission of SA (ECSA) is encouraging regional businesses and sole traders to have their say in the local government election to be held in November.

Local council elections are held every four years for the 67 councils across the state, with up to 1500 people nominating for the 224 council or mayoral positions across South Australia. Many business owners may not realise they are eligible to vote in the council elections, but unlike individual voters in South Australia who, if they are on the electoral roll for the State election, automatically get a vote, businesses need to enrol by Friday, July 29.

Electoral Commissioner Mick Sherry said

they were calling on regional businesses to enrol to vote in the local council elections.

"Just like homeowners, businesses based in a local council are eligible to vote in the local council elections," he said.

"This is an opportunity for businesses to have a say on key council-related areas, including rezoning, local traffic management, permits and fees, development and planning, parking and business development

"If a business is in a different council area or ward to where the business owner lives, they may be eligible to vote in both the council area where they live and the council area where their business is based.

"South Australia is home to around 145,700 small businesses – so we encourage them to get online and register their business so they can vote and have their say in the 2022 council elections.'

Individuals who have moved to South Australia from overseas may also be eligible to vote in the local council elections.

This includes temporary, permanent, student and holiday visa holders but they must be a resident for more than one month to be eligible - they must also enrol to vote.

Show Society President, Mrs Kinta Wilson said: "It was fantastic to win the grant.


"We are in discussions with what type of trees and the location, however it would be nice to be able to plant an avenue of nice





Trail signs survey

Results of a survey on proposed signage designs for Penola's new Rail Trail will be presented to Wattle Range Council's meeting next

The survey, completed early last month, asked people to vote on two design concepts for rail trail signage.

More than 100 responses were received during the survey period, and the majority of the responses supported Option B of the two concepts being voted on.

Option B included images of sites along the rail trail - such as Penola's railway station and Coonawarra siding - on either side of a railway line which incorporates the name of the trail.

Option A, which has become the least preferred of the two options according to the survey responses, consisted of the same locally inspired images enclosed within the shape of a grape vine leaf

In May, council's elected members selected these two designs for the survey from four designs that had been developed for council by Melbourne based corporate identity and design company Cato Brand Partners which has experience with similar projects such as branding and signs for Melbourne's Royal Botanic Gardens.

The design concepts had been developed after consultation by the designers with stakeholder groups including council staff, Riddoch ward councillors Dean Burrow and Chris Brodie, Coonawarra Vignerons, Penola History Group (which is assisting with historical information for the signs), and the Riddoch Business and Community Association.

The two designs selected for the survey were those preferred by the majority of these groups.

Once a sign design concept has been adopted by council, further work is expected to be undertaken with the stakeholder groups to apply the selected concept to a detailed design for each of the specific types of signs required along the trail.

This will include deciding exactly what is on each of the signs and where they are going to be placed.

Aimed at providing historical, directional, distance and location information along the rail trail, the signs have a design budget of \$16,500 within the \$2m rail trail budget.

It is expected that the resulting signs will be installed on the rail trail by the end of the year.

While no date has been set yet for an official opening of the trail, council envisages opening sections of the trail as they are completed.

Cypress trees to get the chop next week

Removal of a row of cypress trees on Penola's Clarke Street will begin next Monday.

A contractor will undertake the work in line with a decision made in March this year by Wattle Range Council, after community consultation, to cut down the trees.

In May, Riddoch ward councillor Dean Burrow tried unsuccessfully to reverse the decision, and at council's meeting in June he attempted, also unsuccessfully, to prevent remnants of any trees, after they are cut down, being stored and burnt on the Penola Commonage.

He moved a motion asking Council "to make a regulation prohibiting the stockpiling and burning of waste timber, sourced from anywhere other than that which is grown and generated from the Commonage land".

This motion was voted down.

In March, council's successful motion read: "remove the cypress trees from the parkland

and replace them with appropriate trees as part of a Coonawarra Rail Trail landscape development".

Council plans to develop the site as the starting point of the new Penola/Coonawarra Rail Trail.

Council's chief executive officer, Ben Gower told the South Eastern Times that once the Cypress trees are felled they will be temporarily stored at a Council depot site on the southern end of the Penola Commonage commonly referred to as The Kettles.

"This site has been used for these types of activities for decades and already has a stockpile of green waste there ready for burning," Mr Gower said.

"Council has no objection to the timber being repurposed for any reason, however there is not a lot of usable timber in these trees so the opportunities are limited.

"I am aware of at least one party who may be interested in the timber and we have put them in touch with the contractors to see if anything can be arranged.

"Given cypress has a high oil content and burns quite well when it is green, it will be burnt soon after it is relocated to the Kettles."

"We will be waiting just in case - the last time they said they were gone, they came back and did the exploration near Furner - we will be waiting," he said.

"We will always be here for the community, and even though we have lives to lead and will get on with that, we are only a phone call away."

The group has been vocal opponents of the company, with fears the energy company's exploration of gas in the region could lead to fracking, and it was their pressure on the former State Liberal Government that led to the introduction of a 10 year moratorium on fracking in 2018.

In the lead-up to the 2022 State election, the then Opposition Leader and now Premier Peter Malinauskas reaffirmed Labor's commitment to the moratorium.

Beach Energy Community Manager Jon Conti said the company will begin assessing opportunities for future additional gas production at the Katnook Gas Plant using data obtained from a recently completed Dombey 3D Geological Survey, but the Penola office will close this month as there are "no current activities planned in the region".

"We are still running Katnook Gas processing facility, and that will continue its operations, but we have no exploration planned," he said.

"Our plan is to wait for the Dombey 3D seismic survey and work out what resources, if any, that we have there to connect in the future to Katnook.

"Geological surveys provide us with a map of what is beneath the ground, allowing us to target future gas reservoirs with more precision."

The results of the survey are not expected until late 2023.

Despite having no exploration planned, they will maintain their current permits and obligations in the area.

"We will retain tenure on our permits in the Penola region - some of those permits we run 100 per cent Beach and some are with a joint venture partner - but we have no plans to exit out of those permits or our obligations in the area," he said.

Mr Conti said Beach Energy will continue to maintain a local presence in the region with local resident, Lucille Bailey, available to support the community and information sharing in the region.

"We are closing the Penola office, but we will still be in the region," Mr Conti

"The interpretation of the Dombey survey may yield opportunities for future energy production. If this happens, the Penola office shop front may be reopened."

Mr Conti said furniture from the office had been distributed to local community groups.

Journey to amalgamation

Former and current mayors, councillors and employees gathered last Friday night to celebrate 25 years to the day since Beachport, Millicent and Penola councils amalgamated to form Wattle Range Council (WRC).

More than 50 people attended the event held at the Millicent Gallery and current WRC Mayor Des Noll welcomed guests, and speakers who talked about sentiment at the time of the amalgamation and the hurdles overcome to achieve this.

The last mayor of Penola District Council, Andrew Eastick, congratulated the WRC on its achievements and said the decision by the District Council of Penola (DCP) to join the amalgamation was a considered approach.

"We did a poll of our community as part of the consideration and the overwhelming majority of the DCP who were faced with choices of going to Naracoorte, south to Mount Gambier or coming with Millicent and Beachport decided overwhelmingly to come and join the WRC," Mr Eastick said.

"They understood and had an appreciation of the bigger picture and it was a view that over the years the DCP had suffered from time to time for not having a big enough picture of the opportunities for the district, that's why we supported the idea of a merger.

"One of the things that has happened for Penola is the bypass and I don't believe that had the DCP continued as an entity the bypass would've been achieved.

'To me that's a demonstration of the value of the WRC to Penola people, not everyone is going to agree with me in Penola I can tell you

"The fact is the council needed to be bigger so that the breadth of experience, knowledge and expertise was sufficient to benefit the district and I believe the WRC has achieved that."

the amalgamation and went on to spend over three decades with both Millicent and WR

Reflecting on the process that led the amalgamation Mr Brennan explained to those in attendance the 1996 Ministerial Advisory Group report on local government amalgamations included a number of different scenarios for amalgamations.

"The one that really stood out to me as a ripper was a coastal council, Kingston, Robe, Beachport, Millicent and Port MacDonnell,' said Mr Brennan.

"The government at the time decided there would be no forced amalgamations, with councils encouraged to explore opportunities so Millicent approached Beachport.

"Penola and Robe were our other targets so we approached them to see if they were interested, we are still waiting to hear from Robe."

Mr Brennan went on to explain a marketing campaign was undertaken to promote the idea of amalgamation, sharing comparative information and statistical data and taking the information to the communities.

"I recall having a number of community meetings and we had a meeting at Kalangadoo hall with a number of people there.

"We had slide shows about the costs and the vision and we invited comment from the community.'

Once the councils agreed on the amalgamation the proposal was put to the local government boundary reform board at the time and council's objectives were set in place with the three councils initiating an implementation committee with representatives from the three councils.

They discussed and debated issues around rating and wage equalisation, staffing, offices, the Penola bypass and what to call the new amalgamated council.

"The first name that was promoted and supported by the implementation committee was Coonawarra Coast Council, what a dream name," Mr Brennan said.

"Marketing it couldn't have been better, well we couldn't have been more wrong the name Coonawarra is very much guarded by those that live within that area with a passion.

"So we finally decided on Wattle Range Council, as the old Wattle Range homestead is near the middle of the council area and it seemed a way to bring the three councils to-

Mr Brennan finished his talk by reflecting on the diversity of the towns and rural community within the WRC, saying the diversity of people, business and industry is a main strength of the amalgamation and drives our

Former WRC Mayor Mark Braes was the final guest to speak and spent 11 years as both

Potholes are back after road resealing

A hole appeared in the Southern Ports Highway near Millicent within days of roadworks being completed there, but the problem has now been fixed.

Mayor of Wattle Range Council, Des Noll brought the hole to the attention of councillors in his Mayoral Communications to council's meeting last month in which he said he had complained to the Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT).

Completed in early June, DIT contractors had undertaken work on about 2.5kms of the road on the outskirts of Millicent towards

DIT had advised at the time that the work involved laying 30mm of new asphalt over the top of the existing roadway. Mayor Noll welcomed the re-sheeting work but was dismayed to find a hole had appeared within days of the contractors finishing the job.

"I drove along the new re-sheeted section ... to find a large pothole," he wrote in his re-

"When I examined the pothole, I found it day."

had gone all the way through the underneath bitumen surface. How does this happen?" A DIT spokesperson told The South Eastern Times that the repairs had been undertaken before Mayor Noll raised the issue.

"A defect on the Southern Ports Highway, near Millicent, was reported to the Department's road maintenance contractor on 6 June 2022, and was repaired the following day," said the spokesperson.

"It was caused by a combination of wet weather and a defect in the bottom layer of

Feline lock-up to be built

Wattle Range Council plans to open new cat lockup facilities, to help alleviate the pressure of feral and lost cats on local vet clinics.

The council's draft budget plan has flagged \$11,000 to go towards the construction of a cat impound facility.

Council chief executive Ben Gower said the new facility will help control feral cats.

"What the cat pens are for is a storage location for cats so that we can search for pet owners for a period, without putting all that burden on the vet clinics," Mr Gower said.

Any cats brought to the facility will be checked for microchips.

"You are never sure if a cat is owned or not unless they have a microchip in it," Mr Gower said

"So it will continue to be important for any local cats to be microchipped.

"If we can find a microchip or it looks like the cat has been cared for and owned by somebody, we will advertise and let people know we have got the cat and wait a reasonable amount of time for somebody to collect it.

"If we find a microchip we will return the pet, if not after a period the cat will be appropriately euthanised."

There will be the chance for cats that do not have owners to be rehomed if possible.

"We can try that [to rehome cats], we often do, the vet clinics do as well, I have taken three kittens home myself that has come into council." Mr Gower said.

"The preference is to rehome, and if there is no other alternative option once we have exhausted all of those, then unfortunately the animal needs to get disposed of because they are not good to be out roaming for our native flora and fauna."

Mr Gower said council has been liaising with the Millicent Veterinary Clinic on the plan.

"Much of the initiative has come from the conversations with the Millicent Vet Clinic," he said.

"Quite often stray cats will be brought in, either caught by council or members of the community.

"Sometimes they bring them to council, and sometimes they bring them to the vet clinic."

Practice manager Michelle Gysbers said the vet clinic was supportive of the project.

"We think it is a great idea," Ms Gysbers

"It is something we have had a few discussions with the council about.

Currently, a lot of stray cats are being brought directly into the vet clinic, which use their own resources to house them and attempt to find their homes.

"The rate they come in is seasonal," Ms Gysbers said.

"At the moment and we are probably having two stray cats a week brought in here, and in summer it can be four or five a week."

Ms Gysbers said the influx of cats puts pressure on the clinic.



The new facility will save some of the burden of stray cats falling on local vet clinics.

"Our vets take time to assess them, quite often we will run blood tests which is at our expense," she said.

"We do not want to put a cat back out in the community that may have a condition like Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV), so we do have to be careful.

"We do have to house them and advertise to check if it is owned."

Consultation on the draft business plan and budget ended on Friday, with the plan expected to be passed at the next council meeting

Last say on strategic plan

Phase two of Wattle Range Council's Strategic Land Use Plan is nearing the end of public consultation with recent question and answer sessions attracting more than 30 people to discuss their concerns and support for the plan.

The final three sessions were held last Thursday at Millicent, Penola and Beachport by Adelaide based planning consultants, Holmes Dyer, with the main points of interest raised being coastal erosion control and aged care and health services availability in Beach-

Holmes Dyer Director Stephen Dyer said: ' One thing that got considerable emphasis and we've got it in the plan, is a desire to have a stronger emphasis on the priority that needs to be given to erosion control works in Southend and Beachport.

"To address the erosion that's occurring along the beachfront in those locations.

"Not surprisingly, given the age group of most of the people that came in, there was plenty of support for better aged care facilities or the actual introduction of aged care facilities in Beachport and enhanced medical services given the aging population particularly in that town.

"There was good support in Beachport for the growth of Muggleton that was strongly recognised.

"We had quite positive commentary about the strategic plan itself, not just the fact that we are doing it but what's contained in it was generally very positively received.

"We have had comment from representors coming to the public consultation saying how commendable it was that the Wattle Range Council was undertaking this work and that no comparable work has been done by other

councils in the whole of the South East.

"They were very appreciative of the councils role in this.'

and will be used to initiate amendments to the Planning and Design Codes and possible zoning changes.

Honda Civic Iongevity

In the middle of the last century the only thing populating shopping centre car parks more than Honda Civic models were discarded supermarket trolleys.

Indeed, my little brother was convinced that the latter, metal baskets on wheels, were aliens taking over the Earth.

Since then, the little Honda hatchback diaspora has matched the 'invaders' in longevity, if not in numbers.

How things have changed, now it's the ubiquitous sports utility vehicle that has taken over from Honda's compact car.

Hang on, what's this? There is a single Civic that still stands sentinel like Dr Who's Tardis over shoppers' world: the 11th generation VTi-LX is the only 2022 Honda of its ilk to land Down Under lately, and at \$47,200 drive away, \$16,200 above the entry-level VTi-S of the current generation and \$7600 more than the previous RS range-topper.

The new model could not be more different in looks than those little Honda hatchbacks of

Bigger than the current model, even, the newbie has taken on a sportier character with sleeker bonnet and lower coupe-like roofline.

Minor changes to the present 1.5-litre turbo-petrol four-cylinder engine have upped output to 131 kW (up 4 kW) and 240 Nm (up 20 Nm) on 91 RON petrol. Power is boosted to 134 kW on premium unleaded. Transfer is via a CVT automatic transmission through the front wheels.

Honda claims the all-new 2022 Honda Civic Hatchback, on the outside, has been refined with sleek curves, giving a luxurious and seamless feel.

Inside the vehicle, intuitive and cuttingedge tech have been positioned to give the owner the best experience - let's see.

Styling

Bigger than the current model in length (4.5m), with a height of 1.4m from ground level, the new Civic's front pillars have been moved to the rear by 50 mm, the roofline and windows have been lowered.

This, together with a sleek bonnet line, adds up to a sportier look than before.

LED headlamps are capped by a striking pattern of LED daytime running lights, while out back things are less 'out there' than the previous model, with a spoiler integrated in the tailgate, no longer interrupting the driver's

Interior

The increase in dimensions is translated into a spacious cabin, which despite a lower roofline, is not short on headroom. A clever touch are the front air vents, which are hidden behind a honeycomb panel across the width of

Seating is black leatherette with red suede accents. Red stitching pulls the whole theme together.

Infotainment

A plethora of car system info, such as fuel consumption and distance to empty, plus at this time of year need-to-know outside temperatures, is on offer via a 7-inch LCD screen directly in front of the driver. while occupants can stay connected to the outside world with Apple CarPlay or Android Auto.

'Indoors' can be bathed in relaxing sounds, or otherwise, from a 12-speaker Bose premium sound system with sub-woofer. The cabin is designed to offer an immersive space for listening.

Engines / Transmissions

The MY22 Civic calls on the reworked 1.5-litre turbocharged four-cylinder petrol engine from the previous model. It now produces 131 kW of power (+4 kW) at 6000 rpm and 240 Nm of torque (+20 Nm) between 1700 and 4500

Power is put to ground through a continuously variable automatic transmission, driving the front wheels. Safety

The new Civic is fitted with Honda Sensing, a suite of features that support the driver to keep as safe as possible.

Standard features include autonomous emergency braking, lane-keep assist, adaptive cruise control, blind spot monitoring, rear cross-traffic alert, traffic jam assist and driver

A pop-up bonnet is designed to reduce possible head injuries of a pedestrian making contact with the vehicle in a frontal impact.

Driving

The new Civic is quite civilised when it comes to the drive. Honda says it has been engineered to 'minimise environmental impact and maximise performance'.

The 1.5-litre turbocharged engine behaves in an unruffled manner under day-to-day city conditions, seemingly slipping through 'gear shifts' with time on its hands.

The driver can become more involved via the steering column-mounted shift paddles, switching from Normal to Sport driving mode via a button on the centre console, directly behind the gear lever, for a sportier ride.

The steering is direct and has a firm feel, some might say too much at low speeds.

Ride is untroubled on smooth surfaces and handling assured even at speed through bends and on inclines.

Combined urban / highway fuel consumption is put at 6.3 litres per 100 kilometres by the maker. On test, figures varied from 6.7 li-

With almost constant rain during the period with the VTi-LX, much appreciated was the windscreen wiper system which focuses the spray in the direction the wiper is headed, keeping things extra clear, especially at night with the glare of oncoming headlights.

Summary

In looks, performance, comfort, convenience and premium pricing, the new Civic VTi-LX is light years away from Honda's original compact hatch. Pestilence, war and climate change: different times, too.

Beauty is in the eye of the beholder with this one

By David Pike

In 1968 Dodge introduced a new car, aimed at recapturing former glories at Daytona.

It was built around the 6980cc 90-degree V8 hemi engine of the Charger and although the power output had to stay the same to comply with the rules there was some advantage to be gained from changing the bodywork.

This was the time when automobile aerodynamics were first in vogue. For Dodge this meant a new plastic nosecone designed to conceal pop-up headlights and at the rear a really large spoiler. The spoiler was so large you could not miss it no matter from which angle you viewed the car.

These aerodynamic design elements improved airflow over the car by some 20 per cent.

The practical advantage of this was a higher top speed and the extra km/h meant that the new aerodynamic car gained 450 metres for each lap covered over the previous car in NASCAR events.

The Daytona Charger had a four-seat ports car body with independent from suspension by coil springs and wishbones and semi-elliptic leaf springs at the rear. It was capable of a top speed approaching 320km/h.

The fabled 317 kW hemi engine played a major part in Dodge performance.

It was dubbed the Orange Monster and used by both Dodge and Plymouth whose development ran more or less along parallel lines, especially when it came to the low volume specialist cars.

With this engine they both achieved a long list of victories in drag racing and NAS-CAR events during the early 1960s, hence the reason it was selected for the Daytona Char-

Only 505 cars were built, just five more than were needed for homologation.
