Petition to keep trees

Penola locals are fighting to save some trees that are planned to be removed.

Almost 30 people have signed a petition to object to the proposed removal of trees in Clarke Street, which was due to begin this week.

Lead petitioner Jodi Strother said the concern was not about the trees themselves, but the view of the industrial estate that will be left if they are removed.

Rail trail reduced

Wattle Range Council has voted to scrap more than 7km of the Coonawarra Rail Trail.

The decision was made at a council meeting on Tuesday night after councillors were asked to consider the scope of the Coonawarra Rail Trail project due to a major cost blow-out.

The councillors were given two options - increase the project's budget to \$2.6m to allow for the increased costs of the project and complete all four stages, or reduce the scope of the project by cancelling works to complete Stage 3 and also not install footpath lighting within the Penola township.

The first option presented to the meeting

would have cost an extra \$500,000 while the second option maintained the costs within the original project budget of \$2.06m.

Council voted for the second option.

The section of the trail which will now not be completed as a result of the decision - Stage 3 - was 7.2km between Glenroy Bool Lagoon Road to Penola Hundred Line, the last section of the intended route.

Council engineering services director Peter Halton told the meeting that the trail would still be functional without Stage 3.

The report to council considered at the meeting detailed that various aspects of the

trail had already been reduced including the removal of all bike racks, water fill stations, bike maintenance stations, connections to significant landmarks, toilets outside of what had been completed at Coonawarra Memorial Park, and car parking works (excluding works at Coonawarra and Penola sidings).

Councillor Sharon Cox raised concerns about potential impacts from the removal of toilet facilities along the trail.

Mr Halton said existing toilet options should be sufficient for riders and compared the project to other trails in the Limestone Coast, such as a rail trail in Grant District Council which did not include any additional toilets.

Councillor Peter Dunncliff moved the motion to adopt option two, which was seconded by Councillor John Drew, who said he had no appetite for a half-a-million-dollar budget blow-out considering the council was in deficit.

Councillors voted unanimously for option two to down-scale the project.

The overall budget for the project is \$2,064,648 of which \$200,000 was contributed by council, with the remainder coming from State and Federal government grant funding.

Mr Halton indicated that the Federal and State governments would be notified of the variation.



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Office discussions

Community members are being urged to attend a community information forum next Tuesday to have questions answered about Wattle Range Council's (WRC) proposed new Council Service Centre in Millicent which has an estimated total cost of \$9.2 million.

WRC has resolved for the proposed project to move to the detailed design phase, with the development application approval process now underway.

Previous community consultation was held in 2020 for the selection of a preferred location with an online survey attracting 419 responses and the majority of responses supporting the proposed site on the corner of North Terrace and Williams Road.

The current stage of the process includes public consultation on the proposed design and key features of the development.

WRC Chief Executive Officer Ben Gower is urging community members to register for the event.

"My message is the enrolments are low and we really want people to come along," Mr Gower said.

"We are going to gauge whether to go to Penola or Beachport based on the Millicent event.

"If we get a lot of interest we are happy to do more of them, but at the moment there's not many people registering to attend.

"We have got someone neutral to MC for the night, and I'm going to run a presentation that covers four key topics so everyone knows what is going on."

Mr Gower listed those topics as "why" there is a need for the new service centre, "what" is being proposed, "when" it would be built if approved and "how" it would be funded.

"I think most people are worried about how we can afford this so we will unpack that on the night," he said.

"I want as many people to come along and ask all the questions they like, and we are happy to answer everything we can."

Community member, Sue Vanderheul, has an interest in the new build and has been encouraging friends to register for the event, receiving a mixed response.

"I've got my free ticket online which I think they could have done a better way, because people don't always do online ticketing; I

found it easy but the majority of my friends won't," she said.

"I'm trying to encourage others to attend but they are not interested, they think council are not listening anyway and that's the attitude."

Ms Vanderheul recognised the need for a new office building but expressed concerns that rates would rise to cover the costs saying: "I don't have concerns about them having a new office, they have needed one for 20 years, but I think they need to keep it simple.

"I like the site, they own the land, that is a cost saving and there's plenty of room and they need a decent building but I don't think it needs to be top of the range, it should be very simple, very plain, only basics.

"Even if your rates don't get increased your bins are going up and everybody is having to tighten their belts, the cost of fuel, the cost of food, the cost of everything is going up.

"There's a lot of talk among my friends asking why they are going to spend nearly \$10m, if that's what it costs, on a fancy new building."

The community forum is part of the consultation process with the final decision to

build the service centre being made in early 2023 by what will be newly elected WRC members with local government elections being held this coming November.

Council will host the forum on Tuesday July 19, from 7pm at the Millicent War Memorial Civic and Arts Centre.

Man arrested

A man faced court last Friday after police allegedly discovered a stolen vehicle and bobcat at his Beachport property the previous day.

Police attended the Beachport residence and allegedly located a stolen Toyota Hilux utility.

The Hilux had been reported stolen from Bordertown on July 5.

A yellow CAT skid steer, along with heavy industrial attachments, stolen from Furner in September 2020, were also recovered.

Investigations are continuing into other property located at the address.

A 55-year-old Beachport man was arrested and charged with two counts of theft and one count of unlawful possession.

He was refused police bail and will appeared in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court last week.

SES search for person

Police called in the State Emergency Service (SES) volunteers on Tuesday to help with a missing person search near Rendelsham.

A police spokesperson confirmed SES were in attendance in relation to a mental health incident at Rendelsham Tuesday morning.

It is understood a foot search was undertaken by those in attendance to locate the missing person near Canunda Frontage Road and Bevilacqua Ford Road.

At the time of print it was unknown who the incident involved, or the outcome of the search.

Rate rises on the way as council passes budget

Wattle Range Council ratepayers will contribute an extra 5.46 per cent in total rates collected by council following the adoption of its budget on Tuesday night.

New rateable properties make up .36 per cent of the total increase. The minimum rate will remain the same as last year at \$610.

According to a report presented to council on Tuesday night, the increase in rates "is in line with current the consumer price index (CPI) amount, and given these inflation-

ary pressures the proposed revenue increase keeps pace with a majority of proposed expenditure increases".

"For the 2022/23 year the focus of the Annual Business Plan is the continuation of the recovery from the Covid-19 emergency and development of strategies that capitalise on attracting residents and tourists to the council area," the report said.

"In addition, council has an increased focus on investment into resources and plant

and equipment to increase service delivery across the council roads and parks and gardens network."

Council forecasts an operating deficit of \$3.15m based on an income of \$28m and operating expenditure of \$31.4m.

It also plans to increase its current staffing levels according to the report presented to elected members at Tuesday night's meeting.

"Provision for further employment oppor-

tunities to our community with the proposal to employ new staff members," the report stated.

Council also adopted discounted rates for various land uses with commercial and industrial paying 92 per cent of the residential rate and primary production 67 per cent.

Curb-side bin collection charges will be reduced by 3 per cent and a rebate will be made available to pensioners of \$120 for the three bin service and \$90 for the two bin service.

Milk factory investment

Work on a multi million dollar upgrade at the Union Dairy Company (UDC) in Penola is almost complete.

UDC owners, the Midfield Group, is currently completing work on a high efficiency air heater which will reduce it's heat energy consumption by approximately 20 per cent.

The new machinery will be ready to go early next month, ready for the new season.

Chief Operating Officer Andy Wellington said the machinery was a big step towards the company's plan to be carbon neutral.

"Right now we are spending just shy of \$3m on capital improvement for energy savings," he said.

"Energy costs are going up and Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) criteria for us in super important.

"Our business will grow with buyers who value an ESG philosophy and have a good ESG plan, so now we are installing a new, highly efficient heat energy source, because we burn quite a lot of gas.

"We are going to save 20 per cent of our heat energy by putting this in.

"Three million dollars is a significant investment to save some energy, but it is really investing in the future and having people recognize that we are taking this seriously."

It is one more milestone for the company which has grown from it's beginnings in 2017, almost doubling the workforce from 24 to 44 in that time, and processing 250 million litres of milk a year.

Even as many industries slowed down or stopped altogether during Covid, the plant kept on ticking.

"Agriculture was a winner during Covid, given that agriculture, as an essential sector, was able to keep going, but it was really about navigating the constant change," Mr Wellington said.

"It became part of business and part of life.

"The business probably became stronger out of it, in that it made us look at how we did business - you always had to see business people or rely on face to face interaction - but now we have been through it, we are so much more efficient."

UDC is hoping to keep up with the demand for their products by increasing employment through the gap year placement program and through the creation of career paths.

"My concern is the industrial estate behind the trees, which is very ugly," she said.

"There are some beautiful deciduous trees just behind them, and the cypress trees do need a clean up, if not removal, it's not about that.

"It's about the fact that the council seem to be good at removing things, but don't always put something back there.

"There's been proposals about beautifying the area, but I am concerned because they have run out of money to complete the rail trail, because of other issues in the construction of it, so what's the first thing that's going go, will it be the beautification of that area or will it be the removal of the trees?

"I am concerned that they will remove them but there will be nothing put back there."

She said the industrial estate will be visible to the residents in the vicinity as well of tourists and locals using the Rail Trail.

Even some councillors have fought against the proposal to remove the trees, with Riddoch ward councillor councillor Dean Burrow trying in May to move a motion that the council rescind its previous motion to remove them but

his motion failed.

Community consultation regarding the future of the trees was held earlier this year, with six written responses received from residents, and additional comments on social media.

Eight of these responses were against the removal of the trees and six were in favour.

Although there was community consultation, Ms Strother said it was not sufficient, and did not believe it had been fully considered.

"There was, during the consultation process, some community feedback given but none of those people have received any acknowledgement to their submissions," she said.

"Someone put a post on the Penola News Facebook page and there were a lot of people talking about the consultation and no one had any awareness of it.

"A lot of this seemed to have happened while we were in and out of lockdowns, we didn't have a local paper and people just weren't aware of what was going on.

"People have come reeling out of lockdowns and it's gone through council without any consideration of the community feedback being taken."

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EV charging station plan from council committee

Establishing an electric vehicle charging station in Millicent is a priority of Wattle Range Council's draft Climate Change Action Plan backed in by a \$50,000 commitment in council's budget for this financial year.

Council's draft Climate Change Action Plan was approved to be released for public consultation at council's meeting on Tuesday night when council's budget for the financial year was also formally adopted following a period of public consultation.

The draft plan revealed that an audit, undertaken last year, of council's operations found that 80 per cent of council's greenhouse gas emissions came from fuel consumption.

To address this, council, according to the draft plan, has begun replacing some of its diesel fueled vehicle fleet with hybrid vehicles as they fall due for renewal.

However, the plan acknowledges that this technology does not exist, or is not yet viable, for the other heavy plant and equipment that council uses.

The draft plan states that council is "committed to continuing trialing and implementing electric and hybrid vehicles, plant and equipment, whenever the opportunity arises".

"Council will commit to achieving a 100 per cent electric/hybrid light vehicle fleet and 80 per cent renewable energy for our buildings by 2030," the draft plan reads.

Action 1.1 of the plan, and listed as a priority A, is to "install an electric car charging station in a suitable location that can be utilised by council staff and the public".

Speaking to The South Eastern Times about council's budget line of \$50,000 for Climate Change Action Plan initiatives, council's Director of Development Services, Emma Clay and Director of Engineering Services, Peter Halton said the prime target of the budgeted money was the aim to have an electric charging station installed in Millicent.

The officers said they were talking to the RAA (South Australia's motorists association) about the opportunities to "piggy back" off its project to install electric vehicle charging stations across South Australia in a \$12m State Government funded project announced early this year.

This statewide project includes four new charging stations to be installed in Mount Gambier, two for Beachport, four in Robe,

three in Naracoorte, three in Kingston and one new station in both Bordertown and Keith, but none for Millicent.

Mr Halton said he understood that the planned new charging stations had been targeted by the RAA to be about 150 to 200kms away from one another, which recognises the range of some electric vehicles, but the discussions revolved around Millicent being central to council's activities, the largest town in the council area and one of the larger towns in the region.

Mr Halton said he understood one of the RAA's charging stations allocated to Beachport may be located at council's visitor information centre and this may be an option for Millicent as well.

"The majority of council's emissions come from fuel," he said.

"Council is moving quickly towards addressing that by working towards putting an electric vehicle charging station at a few locations.

"One proposed location is at the Millicent Visitor Information Centre, another is the carpark next to the Civic and Arts Centre, or the new council office.

"No one wants to buy an electric vehicle if they can't charge it," he said adding that the establishment of a charging station in Millicent would encourage the uptake of electric vehicles in the community.

He said council officers were also having discussions with the town's car dealers, petrol stations and other establishments about the possibility of a electric vehicle charging station for Millicent.

Mr Halton and Ms Clay said another target of the climate action budget for this year was transitioning street-lighting to more efficient LED lights.

Speaking to The South Eastern Times, RAA Program Director for Electrical Vehicle Charging, Andrew Howard said the roll-out of the State's electric vehicle charging network would begin later this year and was expected to be complete by January 2024.

"The network will comprise more than 530 chargers at 140 sites within 50 locations across SA, making it Australia's first state border-to-border electric vehicle charging network," Mr Howard said.

"For locations outside of the State Government's specified network, RAA is happy to discuss opportunities to install EV [electric vehicle] charging infrastructure outside the scope of the project."

Precautions at Boneham

Boneham Aged Care Services (BACS) went into full lockdown on Tuesday as several new Covid-19 cases were confirmed.

The first positive test at the facility, since the previous outbreak ended in late June, was returned over the weekend.

Chief executive officer of BACS, Michael Filsell, announced on Tuesday through the facility's website and social media site that a total of eight positive RAT tests had been returned.

Several symptomatic residents returned negative tests and are being managed as potential positive cases.

The latest cases impact all wings across the site which led to the decision to implement full visitor restrictions while establishing control over the outbreak.

Mr Filsell said in his online statement that the onset of this outbreak was sudden and strongly suspected it to be the new strain, BA4 and BA5, that is currently spreading rapidly across the state.

Telling the South Eastern Times: "This is a fluid situation that we are re-evaluating on a daily basis and one that is rapidly changing.

"People can get daily updates via our social media and website as previously."

BACS is now unable to access on-site testing from Clinpath Pathology due to a recent change in Clinpath's protocols with the site now relying on RAT testing as the most readily

available tool to diagnose emerging cases.

Staff at the site are PCR testing for residents which are then sent to SA Pathology, however this is not providing the rapid results previously received via Clinpath Pathology.

All families of positive cases and symptomatic cases at the facility have been contacted directly with visits limited to end of life cases or residents who have special support needs.

All visitors are required to wear full PPE at all times on site and will also be required to undertake a RAT test on arrival at Boneham to ensure they are Covid clear.

Window visits and phone/Skype visits can be arranged with all other residents by contacting our lifestyle team.

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Astonishing prices received from sale

Thomas, DeGaris and Clarkson (TDC) agents in Penola completed the second of two clearing sales last week at a Glenroy property.

Rural Sales agent at TDC Tom Pearce said: “The sales have been the biggest that we (TDC) have ever had and probably the biggest in the Limestone Coast.

“It took our staff probably eight weeks to catalogue everything, advertise the sales and set up every individual piece of equipment in place.”

There were 326 items for sale at the first sale and 197 items at the second sale.

Sold on the on the first day included broad-acre equipment, 24 vehicles, 50 tractors, six trucks, numerous trailers, air seeders, and boom sprays with some machinery brand new or with very low hours registered.

“Some of the tractors reached more than new price due to unavailability to purchase

with some farmers having to wait 12 months,” Mr Pearce said.

“The sale happened to be very good timing as there were also 22,000 potato boxes sold as

it coincided with the potato season, attracting many bidders from several states.”

On the first day, bidders flew in from New South Wales with other attendees and online bidders from every state in Australia.

A total of 1600 bidders online and on site saw bidding competitive with some machinery reaching more that new price.

“Auctions Plus certainly opened up the buying capability,” Mr Pearce said.

The second sale featured horticultural and harvesting equipment and handling gear for onions and potatoes.

Registrations for this sale reached 100 on site buyers as well as on line bidders.

The 5000 acre property has been sold to a group of 11 local family farmers and they were very pleased with the outcome of the sales.

“It is great to get back from corporate to local ownership,” Mr Pearce said.

The land will be used for broadacre cropping and will run livestock.

Crush down

Wine Australia has released the 2022 Vintage Report, with Coonawarra recording a 28 per cent drop in tonnage.

The figures are based on the results of a survey of more than 620 responses from around Australia.

More than 36,000 tonnes were crushed in Coonawarra this year, 28 per cent less than last year.

The total crush value was more than \$40.8m, which was down on last year, due to the decrease in volume and a 13 per cent decrease in value per tonne to \$1145. Cabernet Sauvignon made up a majority of the crush at 60 per cent, followed by shiraz at 19 per cent.

For the wider Limestone Coast, 110,319 tonnes were crushed this year, which was an almost 30 per cent drop from 2021.

The total crush value was more than \$12.1m, which was also almost 30 per cent down.

However, the average value was up 1 per cent.

The region is not alone, with the entire Australian winegrape crush estimated to be 1.73m tonnes, 2 per cent below the 10 year average of 1.78m tonnes and 13.5 per cent below the record crush of 2.01m tonnes recorded in 2021.

South Australia had the biggest drop, with the whole state crushing a total of 889,254 tonnes, a 14 per cent drop.

However SA still produced the largest percentage of the crush, producing 51 per cent of the total.

Successful leaders program launched

The Riddoch Business and Community Association (RBCA) in conjunction with Generation Thrive, hosted a successful evening last week where 35 people attended.

Attendees included business people, youth and Wattle Range Council representatives including Mayor Des Noll.

Generation Thrive General Manager, Ms Courtney Grigg gave an presentation and thoroughly explained the program.

Ms Grigg has been a participant of the program since she was a 15 year old and has never left the organisation and she is now 35.

“I was able to win a \$100,000 grant some five years ago so I could come to the Limestone Coast to launch our leadership programs in schools and we now have six local schools participating,” she said.

“It just feels so rewarding to see we have a region that is flourishing and to come a full circle now and be able to offer the program to the wider community and business community is just fantastic.”

To follow this initiative, the RBCA has partnered with Generation Thrive, to deliver a series of self-paced online personal leadership workshops for 15-35 year-olds.

“This type of training is more important than ever, especially after the distractions, restrictions, and isolation young people have experienced over the last couple of

years,” RBCA President, Nicole Reschke said.

“The program will develop and enhance participant’s social and emotional capabilities while increasing personal accountability, self-leadership, resilience, and well-being.

“This will better prepare our young people and adults for success in their personal and professional lives,” she said.

Generation Thrive has been conducting its programs throughout the Limestone Coast for several years.

The program is aimed at trainees, apprentices, front-of-business staff, and high school and university students.

The 12-week online program includes five facilitated group workshops, four individual personal leadership coaching sessions and a practical toolkit designed to provide the skills, habits and attitudes to thrive across all areas of their lives

The RBCA is offering two full scholarships for the program valued at \$1250 each.

The RCBA is also holding some fundraising to assist participants with an online auction of a painting by artist Matthew Brookes who donated the artwork.

Expressions of interest can be made at Koonara Wines in Penola.

Applications for the scholarships close on August 1, with expressions of interest for the program closing on August 8.

The program will commence on September 5.

“We are looking for individuals to put their hands up to participate and businesses to support their younger workforce to participate and anyone else who may have the means to support a young person to participate,” RBCA secretary, Mrs Simone Kain said.

Pat Merrett from Merrett Logging said: “I came along to listen to the program so I could take the information back to our business to discuss.

It sounds like a great program.”

Rachel Messenger from Messenger Grape Harvesting said she was very impressed with the program.

“I am sure we have some staff that could certainly participate in the program,” she said.

Mayor Noll commented that he has had a history with youth opportunities for a very long time.

“I have seen recipients come from graduating to be leaders in their communities,” he said.

Mayor Noll congratulated the RBCA and Generation Thrive on forming this partnership and said it has a huge potential.

At the end of the 12 week program there will be a graduation day.

Pat’s ‘chook shed port’

During the late Pat Tocaciu’s early winemaking career he was also responsible for making and blending fortified wines.

One of his responsibilities was to craft and blend a consistent, house style Tawny Port from several hundred batches of varying age, style and complexity.

With a company merger and a decline of fortified wine sales in the 1980’s, he was told to cease making any more fortified wines and blend all current stock into one big tank.

Patrick Of Coonawarra winemaker, Luke Tocaciu (son of the late Pat) said “The thought of losing all his efforts and hard work over the years was devastating so he negotiated the sale of one of his favourite batches before it was lost,” he said.

Twelve barrels of this ‘liquid gold’ followed him from the Barossa Valley to Coonawarra and it was probably about 20 to 30 years old when he purchased it. They came to rest in a small, dark building adjacent to the chook shed near his Coonawarra home.

“Over the next 20 years the wine achieved cult status amongst dad’s friends, colleagues and extended network,” Luke said.

Siphoned from one of those barrels into the nearest available empty bottle at the end of the night a smiling Pat could be heard saying “You must try my chook shed port”.

“We haven’t got too much left and it is only available throughout the July Cellar Dweller event each year,” Luke said.

All proceeds from the tastings go to the NuroSurgical Research Foundation.

Mural ideas sought for Millicent commercial building

A collaboration between local Millicent gym, Ignition Fitness, and Imagine Millicent Arts Group (IMAG) is aiming to see Millicent's next mural brighten up Davenport Street by the end of April 2023.

An expression of interest has been released for interested artists to develop a concept plan and budget for the large area, which can be undertaken as a whole or in different sections.

"We are quite proud that we've got a fitness facility in a small town of this size but I think to be able to add something else and have something else to draw people in would be another

The training and grooming of cattle participating in the annual junior heifer expo to be held at the Adelaide showground from July 18-21 has been happening over the past few weeks by local young people who will be making the trip to showcase their talents.

The South Australian junior heifer show started in 1985 and is one of Australia's most regarded junior heifer shows with the key focus being on educating the next generation of leaders in the agricultural industry.

This year the expo has attracted 200 entries and was filled within two days of entries opening. Participating in this year's event are Mia and Ruby Gartner, and Addison and Sophie Wilson from Penola.

Mia, Ruby and Addison have participated before but it is a first for Sophie.

The girls have been spending time with the cattle since January preparing them to have them in tip top condition for the event.

They will be taking three Limousine cross steers and one Limousine heifer, all aged 15 months.

Mother of Addison and Sophie, Mrs Kim Wilson is no stranger to the heifer show.

She has participated several times since a 13 year old along with her siblings Mason, Amie and Jordan.

Mrs Wilson's parents, David and Alison Galpin have also been heavily involved in the event and catered for all 200 attendees along with their parents feeding them breakfast, lunch and tea for five years.

Mrs Wilson said "On the Tuesday of the expo participants enjoy an educational program consisting of topics like marking calves, good animal husbandry, marketing, AI when special guest speakers attend.

Wednesday is handlers day when participants are judged and Thursday is animal judging. For the junior classes buddies are allocated to the young leaders to assist them in the ring.

"It is a great opportunity for the kids to

develop their skills, make new friends and to take on board what they learn throughout the week.," Mrs Wilson said.

There is a presentation of wards on the Thursday afternoon with the ultimate trophy being awarded to the over best herdsman who will win an interstate trip.

There are also many other awards made throughout the expo. Penola's Mrs Jill Fiebiger has been involved in the heifer show since its inception in 1985 and is also a past president of the group.

"In my time involved I transported 88 cattle to Adelaide for the event for people to use.

The cattle, all heifers, were aged between 16 to 18 months.

I also helped train participants in breaking in, leading and grooming the cattle," she said.

"Young people that I trained came from Penola, Naracoorte and Adelaide. Mrs Fiebiger said "They all stayed on site in the lockers at the showground and had alot of fun and learnt so much in the week long program."

"It is a wonderful opportunity for young people to learn and venture into the cattle industry," she said.

The event was established by a group of South Australian beef producers who recognised the potential short and long term benefits of such an event.

More than 3000 people have participated in the event since its inception from all states of Australia as well as New Zealand.

The average attendance at the expo yearly is 180 people aged between eight to 23.

High risk logs: Council

The Wattle Range Council has identified a section of Beach Road near Beachport Brewing Co as a high risk.

Following a request to the council received from Beachport Brewing Co to extend the line markings of the existing No Standing Zone, council staff investigated the area.

An engineer for Wattle Range Council reviewed the conditions and determined there was a high risk to road users and pedestrians and recommended extending a no-standing zone at the site.

Beachport Brewing Co placed large logs in the vicinity earlier the year in an attempt to resolve the issue themselves.

According to the Council Director of Engineering Services, the logs appear to be sitting partly on the business's private land, and partly on council land.

Community comment is being sought on a proposed No Standing Zone to be created on Beach Road, Beachport, in front of Beachport Brewing Co. Once the extended No Standing Zone is in place, Wattle Range Council will be requesting the logs be removed by Beachport Brewing Co, as these

also pose a safety issue.

At the Wattle Range general council meeting last month, Councillor John Drew said he believed the log placement was "dangerous", while Councillor Moira Neagle said the move had been "disappointing".

Walk With History: Colourful past of Naomi’s Villa

From The National Trust of SA Penola Branch

In association with State Heritage, Penola’s branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called Penola Walk With History to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

NAOMI’S VILLA

Local stonemason William Blight was well known for his work on many buildings in Penola, including St Mary’s Church, the Foresters’ Hall and his two storey home opposite the Royal Oak Hotel.

He built this smaller villa-style home for his retirement but moved from Penola in order to take care of his grandchildren following the death of their parents.

Francis Redfern Temple – Government Stock Inspector, Justice of the Peace since 1891 and later a merchant – became the owner in 1914.

He sold wholesale goods from the front verandah and grain and hay from the loft at the back of the house.

He was a great supporter of schools in Penola.

Their daughter Naomi conducted Penola’s first hairdressing business in the front room and in the 1950s and 1960s operated three salons in Melbourne.

When Mr Temple died at his residence in November 1948 Jack Brodie became the owner.

His auntie, Penola-born Charlotte Mary Webber nee Brodie, was an active member of the Presbyterian Church, Country Women’s Association and Agricultural Bureau.

Following the death of her husband, Thomas Arthur Webber, she acquired this property in 1953 as an exchange with relatives Jack and Marion Brodie who moved to her previous home at Coonawarra.

Thomas had first worked at Yallum as a gardener then as caretaker of the Nursery at Coonawarra for John Riddoch, after which he moved to the Coonawarra Fruit Colony block now owned by Zema Estate.

He and Charlotte had four surviving daughters, one of whom, Amy, became Mrs Roy Lynn. In 1992 James and Anne Yates purchased, renovated and refurbished the building as a bed and breakfast venue.

They met Naomi Temple in a nursing home in Melbourne and decided to name the building after her.

The building returned to private residence status in 2002 and remains so today.

The outreach component of the program continues with a day of activities being held today in Tantanoola beginning with a tour of the Tantanoola Cave followed by two other events held at the Tantanoola Institute.

"The outreach program was something we try to make a whole day of, so people go out there and have lots of things to do, have a look around and spend some time in the

town," Ms Clay said.

"Plus it gives the people that live in those communities the opportunity to have something in their own town they don't have to travel for."

Plenty of favourite activities are still on the timetable until next Friday including art and craft events, play activities, cookery and gaming console competitions.

Full Throttle in Wattle winds up on Friday, July 22 with a ping pong competition including prizes, music and pizza on the menu.

Helicopter line check

A helicopter seen flying in the Millicent area last week was SA Power Networks checking power lines in readiness for summer.

Spokesperson for SA Power Networks, Paul Roberts said aerial patrols were undertaken annually to inspect power equipment in bushfire risk areas.

"We use a combination of helicopter and ground patrols; helicopters are an efficient way to check our lines and equipment in regional locations," Mr Roberts said.

"Helicopter inspections provide a bird's eye view of the network to identify any obvious faults or potential defects we might miss from the ground.

"Not all inspections can be done by helicopter and will be patrolled from the ground if required.

"Aerial patrols also form part of our annual maintenance program to inspect our powerlines and other assets in bushfire risk areas.

"We do this to ensure our network is safe and reliable, and meets the higher demand for power in the warmer months."

Mr Roberts said SA Power Networks looks for a range of risks including vegetation close to powerlines, birds nests, low hanging powerlines and damaged equipment.

"Using a helicopter also reduces the impact on properties as there's no need to drive through paddocks or crops," Mr Roberts said.

"We recommend moving livestock from paddocks with powerlines when we're doing inspections in your area, as the helicopter may hover at low heights."

In addition to the Millicent area, helicopter patrols in the South East will also include Bordertown, Mount Gambier and Naracoorte areas.

The inspections began in May and are expected to be completed by the end of August.

Outlander plug-in hybrid

Available in 5 and 5+2 seat configurations, the latest Mitsubishi Outlander Plug-In Hybrid EV range goes on sale in August.

Mitsubishi says, “it offers a smoother, more responsive and quieter drive, with sharper acceleration and longer EV only driving range.”

Featuring a new-generation 20 kWh lithium-ion battery pack, twin electric motors, and a revised, specifically-tuned, Atkinson cycle 2.4-litre combustion engine, the new Outlander Plug-In Hybrid EV offers up to 84km (NEDC) of pure electric driving range.

It has front- and rear-mounted electric motors. The front axle motor generates 85kW, up from 60kW, while taking up a similar space within the vehicle.

The rear motor produces 100kW, up from 70kW previously. It has a new integrated motor control unit occupying a smaller space than before, enabling the new Outlander Plug-In Hybrid EV to offer a three-row, seating configuration for the first time (on Exceed and Exceed Tourer).

The new drive battery is situated low in the chassis, fitted between the axles for optimum weight distribution. At 20kWh, its storage capacity is an impressive 45 per cent larger than the previous version’s 13.8kWh system.

A new battery cooling system ensures optimum battery operation by using the vehicle’s air conditioning unit, while an upgraded power drive unit is equipped with a voltage boost function bolstering front e-motor performance, while simultaneously reducing power consumption through improved efficiency.

There are six adjustable regeneration levels, capable of being set by the driver.

Pulling the left-side, steering-wheel mounted paddles engages the third level of regeneration as a default; the fourth and fifth are deployed with additional left-paddle pulls, while a reduced regeneration rate is realised by pulling on the right paddle.

Maximum energy regeneration is now realised by the new ‘innovative pedal operation’ mode, accessed via a centre console button. This makes it possible to accelerate and decelerate just by controlling the accelerator pedal.

Mitsubishi says, “Brake pedal must still be used when stronger deceleration is required, or when stopping the vehicle to a standstill.”

A 2.4-litre petrol Atkinson cycle engine acts primarily as an on-board generator (or range extender) in series hybrid mode now generates a 98kW power peak - up from 94kW.

Combined maximum power and torque outputs are measured at 185kW and 450Nm respectively.

A larger fuel tank (up from 45 to 56 litres) makes a 900km plus combined driving range possible depending on the driving style, terrain and weather conditions.

"I have been speaking to most of the Western Border coaches just to check in and see how guys are going.

"We are going on true form and a bit of reputation.

"I think we have picked the right squad and the right bunch of blokes to take away to Whyalla this week."

Kelly said it is difficult to know what his team will be up against, with rival zones a bit of an unknown.

"It is hard to know what other zones are up to this time of year, but I think we will be right in the mix," he said.

Saturday will see South East contest two minor-round games, with the first against the Eastern Zone at 10.25am, while its second will be against Northern at 2.25pm.

From there the competition progresses to

finals on Sunday, which leaves little room for error.

As such the focus will be on a quick start to try and kick off the championships on the front foot.

Kelly said he was honoured to have the opportunity to coach the South East Zone team and looks forward to seeing what the team can produce over the weekend.
