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Ratepayer gripes

A resurgence of the inactive Penola Ratepayers Association is being considered following a failed petition to save a row of trees.

The move comes after some Penola residents were left disappointed by a recent decision made by the Wattle Range Council to chop down a row of cypress trees in Clarke Street.

"If a section of the community want to set up those small community committees they areentitledtodothatandthatiswhatdemocracy is - people can get together and discuss these issues and bring them to council and have a sit down discussion around those," he said.

Earlier this year, public consultation was held with 14 comments received; eight in favour of keeping the trees and six in favour of removing them.

Ms Strother is now very keen to bring back the former Ratepayers and Residents Group and will have discussions with former members of the group in the near future.

The group was active years ago, but folded due to a drop in membership.

"I have spoken to a few locals who are very keen to start up the former Ratepayers and Residents group for Penola and Coonawarra district which went into recess some years ago," she said.

"I will need to make some more enquiries and go from there."

The main focus of the group would be local issues.

A former chairman of the group said that at the time the group was formed, the council "just wouldn't listen", and said the group initially started with some 180 members, but many got extremely disappointed with Council not listening to residents and the membership dropped off quickly.

The former Chairman said the whole aim of the group was to let the Council know what residents wanted for Penola and district.

Riddoch Ward councillor Chris Brodie said he would be happy to have conversations with the group, if it reforms, and added that ratepayers are always invited to contact him if they had issues to discuss.

"It's always good to get feedback," he said.

"I was a member of the group in the past, and I am a ratepayer, so I support it."

Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll was also supportive of the group.

"If a section of the community want to set up those small community committees they are entitled to do that and that is what democracy is - people can get together and discuss these issues and bring them to council and have a sit down discussion around those," he said.

"That's what the process is about.

"I am more than happy to work with them."

Letter to the Editor

On Friday, July 1, I attended a civic function arranged by the Wattle Range Council.

The purpose of the function was to celebrate, as a result of the amalgamation of the District Councils of Beachport, Millicent and Penola, the anniversary of the commencement of the Wattle Range Council on July 1, 1997.

I was invited to give a brief description of the District Council of Penola's participation in the then State Government's Local Government Reform Initiative, and the decision, after a comprehensive poll of residents, to enter into the merger with the District Councils of Beachport and Millicent.

I also took the opportunity to make some observations about how I saw the merger had benefited the township of Penola and the Penola district more generally.

The construction of the Penola Bypass is a mighty achievement that I doubt would have been able to be achieved by a District Council of Penola.

Local opposition to the Bypass, and debates around the eastern or western route would have, in my view, stymied progress.

The resolve of the Wattle Range Council to see the project through, reliant as it was on significant Commonwealth and State Government funding, was in my mind critical.

As for the route, the western side was in reality the only option, given the location of Penola's light industrial zone.

The more general benefit to the district that I mentioned is the skills, experience and expertise that is now available to the district in the Wattle Range Council, skills, experience and expertise that a District Council of Penola would not have been able to assemble.

The experience of the last District Council of Penola (1995-1997) demonstrated that the level of complexity and diversity of responsibilities in local government administration had long exceeded the capacities of the Council to administer the District for the maximum benefit to residents.

I have no doubt the Penola district is well administered due to the skills, experience and expertise within the Wattle Range Council.

I also made several observations in relation to the future of the Penola district.

Whilst the Penola Bypass is of enormous benefit to the town the Bypass does create a challenge, to ensure the rich attributes of the town are widely known and draw in the travelling public.

That is, by the Penola business community and civic interests (Mary MacKillop Centre, National Trust, Wattle Range Council and others) working effectively together to promote those rich attributes.

The District should continue to ensure that representatives the Penola district (Riddoch Ward) are always strong advocates for their district, whilst also being strong advocates for the Wattle Range Council.

And for those that are yet to do so, embrace the Wattle Range Council and use it to full advantage of the district.

AFL star's off-road driving lesson fail

Brownlow Medal winner and Australian Football Hall of Fame inductee, Gavin Wanganeen found himself in a sticky situation in Beachport last weekend, becoming bogged on a local beach with friends.

On Saturday morning the AFL legend and his family were enjoying a morning fourwheel-driving with another family along beaches between Beachport and Robe.

The car became bogged on a beach near Beachport.

At first, another car drove onto the beach to help them, but it also became bogged.

As the tide started to come in, all involved knew they might be in some trouble.

Luckily a group of Beachport locals were able to lend a hand to recover the vehicles from the beach.

Beachport resident Shannon Moran was one of those who helped get the car from the beach

"We thought we better go down and see what we can do," Mr Moran said.

"We made a rope up that was 80 metres long, and it took three four-wheel drives tied together to tow it out.

"Then the loader came along to help us get it off the beach.

"It all came together, and not one got hurt which is the main thing."

Mr Moran said the group was careful not to get bogged themselves, staying clear of the beach when towing the cars out.

"We did not want to put anyone else's vehicles at risk," he said.

"The vehicles that were towing were up on hard ground, they could not have gotten bogged if they wanted to.

"We did it deliberately like that, the last

thing we wanted to do was go down and help and end up creating a miserable day for somebody else if they got bogged as well."

According to Mr Moran the ute's doors were automatically locked after the water started crashing over it, and with the keys in the car there was no choice but to smash open the window to unlock the steering.

"There is always a comedy of errors that always happens when you are under pressure like that," he said.

The Ute was written off following the incident, but the second car managed to drive away still mostly intact.

Mr Moran said the car's owners were a family from Padthaway.

"They [the family] were nice people, they were so thankful," he said.

"They wanted to pay their way, and we said no you have had a bad enough day."

Not completely put off by their experience, the families came back that night to the Beachport Hotel.

"Gavin came back to the pub that night, put some money on the bar and came and had tea with us," Mr Moran said.

"It was to say thank you to us."

The beach in question has a bit of a reputation for being dangerous to drive along.

Mr Moran said it is the second time in the last year he has helped recover bogged vehicles from the incoming sea.

"That beach seems to be the one that brings a lot of people undone," Mr Moran said.

"Usually on the other beaches if you get bogged you do not lose your car, but on that one you can.

"Every person that was there that day learnt a lot about that beach."

Building meeting

Wattle Range Council held a community forum on Tuesday night to answer questions and take feedback on its proposed \$9.2m administration office.

Held at the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre, more than 50 attended the interactive session which lasted almost two hours.

Council chief executive Ben Gower gave a presentation during the session outlining the main details of the project.

The new centre would provide for all office-based council staff who are currently working in three separate locations including the main office which was built in the 1930's as a school and Mr Gower said was beyond renovation.

The majority of questions asked during the session were centred around costs, consultation and design.

While many public questions and responses indicated there was support for updated office facilities for staff, much time was spent discussing the site's intended location on North Terrace.

When answering questions about the centre's location, Mr Gower highlighted that it had already been a three-year process to decide on the current site and there had been many different opinions expressed during that time.

"The message is it is really hard to make decisions like these when you have got so many options and so many different views," Mr Gower said.

"It is a very democratic process, but it can take a long time."

Council staff and most elected members were present for the forum, with some taking the opportunity to answer questions and make comments.

The impact of inflation was brought up by

community members, who were worried the lengthy process could mean higher building costs.

When responding, Mr Gower said that ultimately decisions on the project have been and would continue to be made by elected members.

Mr Gower said the plans for the centre have considered future organisational growth and should remain fit for purpose for the next 50 years.

During the presentation, Mr Gower offered to show community members the current council offices following the session and answer any further questions.

Following the meeting Mr Gower and Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll said they believed the forum had been successful.

Millicent United sometimes struggles to retain senior players because of education or work commitments

"The ones we do retain are very good. They stay, they are very loyal and helpful," he said.

Mr Lines said the junior ranks are doing well.

He said it's a matter of building from the

ground up.
"It's a work in progress," Mr Lines said.

"In the men's senior grades it's a rebuilding process and my wife has run the girls competition for 15 seasons.

"We're vey competitive and looking to make finals and going from there."

He said Millicent has faced a player retention problem for the past 10 years.

"Either kids going on to Uni or moving to Mount Gambier or bigger cities for employment," Mr Lines said.

"It's starting to turn around now.

"It's a reducing young population and a big issue for Millicent."

Mr Lines is also a big supporter of female involvement in sport.

"We are very strong on that and girls should be allowed to play what sport they want to," he said.

"They love it, they enjoy it."

Ian 's two daughters have played and his son continues to.

In fact, involvement with the MUSC has been a family affair.

Ian's wife, Sue, is the secretary of the club.

"She's heavily involved, we run the Mini Roos and the women's side of things as well as the men's and we've got a very good working committee", he said.

The Lines's are also active in other community activities, including the Tantanoola Progress Association.

Millicent United fields girls and boys\junior, men's and women's senior sides and the the MiniRoos.

Ever the club man, Ian has never held a position on the LCFA, preferring instead to have strong input at the club level.

"It's important that the country clubs are

represented because they tend to be a little bit forgotten," Mr Lines said.

"We have to make sure we've got a good representative."

The avowed soccer man conceded Aussie rules football is the number one sport in the district but said soccer is still competitive.

"Soccer is very popular but football and netball are very strong sports in our area but we're matching them." he said.

Ian said Naracoorte can source players because of local meat works employment.

He said the best thing about being involved with Millicent United is the volunteering side of it.

"You get more out of it than you put in," Mr Lines said.

"It's not me - It's about putting back in.

I've got a son who plays , daughters who have and grandkids that want to and you've got to help out.

"The club is all about community and apart from that, I still enjoy playing," Mr Lines said.

Ms Bishop printed sheets with Indigenous symbols the participants could copy from with some choosing to expand on those suggestions by adding snake and flag designs to their boards.

"The day went really well, the kids enjoyed it and it was really good to see their faces when they finished their artwork.

"I had the printouts (of Indigenous symbols) to give them a bit of an idea, and once they seen that they just went ahead, they were a really good bunch of kids each and every one

"With those symbols they created their own little story on their skateboards, and when asked what the story was about they explained it and what the symbols meant to

"Some of the kids even got to learn about the Aboriginal flag because they didn't really know what it meant until I explained to them.

With Ms Bishop telling the curious artists that the black colour at the top of the flag symbolises Aboriginal people, the red stands for the earth and the circle in the middle represents the sun.

"I think everybody needs to know what it means because it's huge, and they understood that in the end.

"When they get out in the community and explain about that stuff because they've been taught about it, it's good."

Wattle Range Council's (WRC) Manager Libraries and Cultural Services, Janice Nitschke said the idea to include an Indigenous art workshop was floated when the organisers were discussing the upcoming programming.

"Emma (Clay, WRC Director Development Services) came up with an idea that she would like to see some Indigenous art included and to be part of their everyday lives.

"Through using these skateboards, which is something that they all can use, they've been able to look at the symbols, put together their story and understand Indigenous art.

"I think that's really important and want to thank Jenny for being involved."

Workshop participant, Hunter Josephs, summed up the day "Loved it, can't wait to pick it up tomorrow and then head straight to the skate park.

stolen classic

A \$20,000 reward is being offered to anyone who can give information leading to the return of a much treasured 1970 base model HT Holden Monaro recently stolen from a West Range property, north of Kingston.

The plum coloured car is valued at between \$50-\$60,000 in its current unrestored condition and originally belonged to Nick Downward's grandfather who left the car to his grandson after he passed away around 20 years ago.

"It is a pretty special car, my grandfather had restored it when he was in Dunkeld on a farm where he lived," Mr Downward said.

"He restored it with his neighbour, another farmer, they did a pretty good job back in the

"When he passed away he left it to me, I was a bit of a car buff as a young fella."

While currently holidaying in Queensland Mr Downward received a phone call that his car had been missing from the property where it was being stored.

"I was just devastated to get the news, being a family owned car and I've been collecting parts to do a full showroom restoration for the last 15 years or more, it's horrible," he said.

"I've been building a big shed in town specifically to restore this car in, it was only a week or two away from getting moved to the

"I've had it for a long time and I'm only in the position in my life now where I've got the money to do it, and about to do it, that's the most frustrating thing.'

Mr Downward, has been sharing information of the theft and reward he is offering to social media sites, in particular ones dedicated to Monaro's, with the posts garnering plenty of attention leading to thousands of shares and comments.

"I've been following just about every known Monaro HT/HG/HK site on Facebook, I got onto them and shared the information with a reward of \$20,000 for anybody that can lead us to get the car back," he said.

"They [the thieves] are pretty brazen, they've taken it away with a trailer it was in an undrivable state.

"I have all the original paperwork, registration plus photos of ID tags and body numbers so it can never be registered as is.

"Its the sentimental value, I just want the car back."

Council member allowances to increase

Wattle Range Council elected members will travel allowances for elected members. soon de taking nome almost \$1500 extra a year in their allowances.

The South Australian Remuneration Tribunal announced the increases in allowances last week as part of its standard review undertaken once every four years for all South Australian councils.

Currently a Wattle Range councillor's allowance is \$13,900 annually, but this will increase to \$15,381.

The mayor's allowance will increase from \$55,600 to \$61,524, four times that of a councillor.

The deputy mayor receives one-anda-quarter times the annual allowance of a councillor and will have an allowance increase from \$17,375 to \$19,226.

Modest increases have also been made to November this year.

Increases were made for all councils across South Australia.

The allowances vary based on the level in which a council has been categorised.

The levels are broadly based on the population and size of the council area, with Level 1A given the highest allowances and Level Five the lowest.

Wattle Range is a Level Three council, with surrounding councils Naracoorte Lucindale being a Level Three, Grant District a Level Four, and Robe a Level Five.

No submissions from councils on the Limestone Coast were received by the tribunal during the review process.

The change will not come into effect until after the the local government elections in

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Travelling Magpie Goose

A Magpie Goose, which arrived at Millicent's Lake McIntyre recently, probably came from Bool Lagoon, according to local ecologist Abigail Goodman.

The arrival of the goose at Lake McIntyre had some locals intrigued as the species is more commonly associated with northern

However, Dr Goodman said the goose most likely came from Hacks or Bool Lagoons, near Naracoorte, where a Magpie Goose reintroduction program was undertaken from the late 1960's through to the 1980s.

Using her own research and that of former Bool Lagoon Ranger, Mike Harper, Dr Goodman concluded that Millicent's Magpie Goose has favoured Lake McIntyre's permanent water body in preference to Bool Lagoon which has been dry since December 2021.

"The birds disappear from the lagoon in periods of dryness and return when the water returns but we mostly don't know where the birds go," said Dr Goodman.

Dr Goodman said Magpie Geese became extinct in the South East in the early part of this century but had been prevalent at Bool Lagoon prior to 1900.

"It was then a permanent wetland which would regularly flood out over the Mosquito Creek and Naracoorte Plain," she said

"However, with reduced inflows, declining groundwater and drying trends the Lagoon dries out more frequently and for longer periods than it once did.

"The Magpie Goose was also regarded as an agricultural pest at the time so it was shot out.

"Published reports state that Magpie Geese had vanished from South Australia by 1911, however there are reports that the last bird was shot at Bool Lagoon in the 1930's.'

In the late 1960's the then Fisheries and Fauna Department of South Australia, which managed Bool Lagoon Game Reserve, began a

During the 20 year life of the program, Magpie Geese released at Hacks and Bool Lagoons were obtained from various locations including the Northern Territory and Victoria's Serendip Wildlife Research Station with the most successful introduction resulting from 271 hand reared birds from eggs obtained in 1985 from the Adelaide River floodplain in the

At Hacks Lagoon, two large enclosures were built - the largest covering seven hectares - over land and water to provide an environment into which the birds could be released without flying away with the aim of having the birds re-establish the area as a breeding location for the species.

The program faced a number of hurdles, including foxes breaking into the enclosures, birds escaping and limited successful breeding despite incubators being used where possible to increase the chances of eggs hatching.

With the area being a game reserve, the program was also hampered by some birds dying from ingesting lead pellets left from shooting activities, while dry periods discouraged the birds from nesting.

However, persistence paid off and today thousands of Magpie Geese can be seen at Bool and Hacks Lagoons when there is water, with estimations of up to 4,000 birds and reports of other smaller flocks seen on neighboring farming properties from time to time.

"The enclosures have all been taken down

now and the Magpie Geese are free flying at the Lagoons," said Dr Goodman.

With Bool and Hacks Lagoons being among her study sites when she undertook her PhD (Doctor of Philosophy) in Wetland Ecology, the areas are particularly significant to Dr Goodman.

"They are my 'heart place'," she said.

She has been so inspired by the area that she has recently set up a guided tour business, called South East Safari, focused on Hacks and Bool Lagoons and Butcher Gap Conservation

"There are lots of people who like birds, plants, frogs etc but don't necessarily know what they are looking at ... they will definitely finish a tour with more knowledge than when they started," Dr Goodman said.

New mental health staff to start at Penola school

Students at Penola High School will have improved mental health and better learning outcomes with new mental health support staff due to start next term.

The State Government announced the start of the mental health support in schools, which was an election commitment to invest in the mental health and wellbeing of students.

Penola High School and surrounding schools will have access to the school based mental health professionals, who will provide a range of mental health services, including assessing and supporting students with newly developing mental health concerns.

The pilot will inform the roll out more broadly, seeing 55 new staff working in schools across South Australia by the end

In a statement on Facebook, Principal Lesley Okholm said the program would be open to other schools.

"The beauty of this position is not only that Penola High School hosts it, but that we are working alongside our three feeder schools to enable students from Reception to year 12 to access support," she said.

"Penola Primary, Kalangadoo Primary

and Nangwarry Primary are a part of our trial and will continue over the next five years to work with this professional as they

'What this means is we do not wait until high school age before support is given, but instead aim to ensure our students are supported before their issues seem insurmountable.

"As a trial, we are able to explore how this position can best support our entire student population."

Premier Peter Malinauskas said supporting every child to get the most out of their school experience was at the centre of their education policy.

"More and more school students are experiencing mental health concerns that are having an impact on their learning," he

"These vital practitioners will help triage students, potentially providing early intervention options and referring students to external services.

"I am really pleased we're getting started early on what is a key investment in the mental health of young people in our

Penola Walk with History historic site

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called Penola Walk With History to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

JOHN RIDDOCH CENTRE

Mechanics' Institutes were first founded in the 1820s in the United Kingdom as adult learning centres for craftsmen.

The Penola Mechanics' Institute was established in January 1863 with President George Byng Scott, Vice Presidents Alexander Cameron and John Riddoch, and Secretary Thomas

During the early years lectures were held on many topics.

Father Julian Tenison Woods gave the inaugural lecture on 'The Advantages of Mechanics' Institutes' and members could bring a lady to this meeting, and subsequently even allow women to borrow a book.

A later lecture, 'Ten Years Experiences in the SE', was translated by Mrs Emily Neilson's father, Mr Wennerbom, into Swedish and sent home to Sweden.

Erected in 1869 – heralded by a grand procession led by Freemason, Richard McClure, which started at the Royal Oak Hotel for the Laying of the Foundation Stone by John Riddoch – this building was designed by architect WT Gore and built by George Gladstone.

The land was donated by Mr Donald MacArthur of Limestone Ridge.

It immediately became a great addition to the township as the scene of a great many social events such as balls, banquets, and public meetings.

In the 1880s it was reported that only the Adelaide Library contained a larger collection of books than the Penola Library which had 1531 volumes by 1867.

Silent movies, under the name Palace Pictures, were shown regularly from 1923 to 1932 by Eric Balnaves, John Bott, later Perc Bott, Mel Clayfield and Bill Raselle.

Mood music was played by Mrs Mooney, Mr Walter Balnaves, M Glynn and Mrs Davv.

A fire in the projection room caused much consternation.

Mr Perce Reid took over the lease until 1949 when Mr Frank Squire opened his Chevron Cinema.

George Mepstead was the indomitable caretaker and lamp lighter, and Mrs Willisa Warner was the committee chairperson.

Previously a Penola Primary School teacher, she was a great campaigner for all things Penola.

Surviving several attempts at renovations and additions for a new Civic Centre, this building has since been used for many events including a children's activity centre run by Audrey Tregenza, assisted by Judy Rymill.

Since Council amalgamation it now houses the Tourist Information Centre and Wattle Range Council Office; Local History Display; Neilson Gallery where the original Library Reading Room table now resides; Local History Research Room & Penola Branch National Trust SA Collection.

Lifelong passion

Tanya Hunter does not remember a time in her life when she was not painting or creating

From winning a father's day drawing competition as a child to creating marketing displays in her former job at the ANZ bank she has always found enjoyment in observing things and rendering them in some form.

Ms Hunter, with other members of the Limestone Coast Art Collective (LCAC), is currently preparing for her next exhibition as part of the annual South Australian Living Artists Festival (SALA) and spoke to the South Eastern Times about her arts practice and her involvement with the collective.

"I haven't had any formal training and just want to throw together whatever works to achieve my desired outcome and I do a huge amount of research before investing in tools and supplies

"I love exploring different mediums and want to try everything.

"Currently I am exploring encaustics where I paint predominantly with bees wax and a blow torch.

"I have worked with resin in the past and find they are similarly fluid and somewhat unpredictable, which I enjoy.

Inspiration for Ms Hunter's work is whatever piques her interest at the time, poetry, nature, emotions or a pre established theme.

"I like doing things that challenge me and stretch my abilities, which is why my work is not often repetitive, I do some and then move on to the next challenge.

"I like to work with mediums that I think suit the project I am working on, for example bees will feature in my current work done in encaustics.

The Nature of Resilience is the title and theme of the upcoming exhibition with the eight LCAC group members interpreting the theme in their own way.

"I was initially going to use lighthouses as a metaphor for strength and endurance, I moved from this to using bees as a litmus test for the fragility of natural resilience.

"I have been tested over the last few years and as a result I am sharing a variety of works produced over this time to demonstrate my own resilience."

Appreciative of the opportunity to be involved in the SALA exhibitions through her involvement with the LCAC Ms Hunter said

"My art practice is generally a very isolated meditation, I disappear alone in to the back corner of our shed where I have what passes as a studio set up and get lost in my art for whatever time I can spare.

"I love it when I sign it and bring it out to share with people and the best way for me to do this is through things such as SALA.

"I love that the arts are encouraged and supported, and being part of a group (LCAC) who share your passion is a great motivator and helps keep me on track.

"While we work individually on our project

Second in the race was W Werchon and L Telford who are believed to be pictured with the sixth wheelbarrow.



This old photograph of the Mount Muirhead School is from the Millicent National Trust Museum collection. While the date it was taken is unknown it is certainly from the school's earlier years. The school was built in 1885 by Mr W Inns, assisted by James Mott, of Millicent. It opened on January 25, 1886, with 18 students who were George Matheson, Mary Matheson, Frank P Major, Walter R Major, Mary Jane Fensom, Henry Fensom, Adolph Northern, Charles Northern, Marie Northern, Mary Ann Black, John Black, Hector Gillis, Alice Dean, Agnes Dean, Ellen Grey, Alfred Thomas Grey, John Towers and John Matheson. The first teacher was Fred W Martin.

Muirhead's last teacher

The last teacher at the long gone Mount Muirhead School, Myra Lillywhite, now of Adelaide, will celebrate her 99th birthday next Monday.

Almost 80 years ago, Miss Lillywhite was fresh from teacher's college and came to Millicent for her first teaching appointment at Mount Muirhead School only to have it close forever just a few months later in May 1943.

However, it was the start of a long and accomplished teaching career for Miss Lillywhite and her written reminisces, which include entries about her time at the Mount Muirhead school, prompted her eldest nephew Bob Stace to visit Millicent recently to research the little school that launched his aunt's career and in turn inspired him to also pursue a career in teaching.

While holidaying in the Mount Gambier area, Bob visited the South East Family History Group (SEFHG) research centre in Millicent which resulted in him providing a photograph taken in 1943 of his aunt and the last students to attend the school, following appreciated assistance given to him by SEFHG President, Noel Boyle.

He was unable to see the school itself as there is nothing left of the building and the site is distinguishable only by an unfenced triangle of land on the south east corner of the junction of Rocky Camp Range Road and Mount Burr Road at the base of Mount Muirhead.

Bob said Miss Lillywhite had never married.

"As a female teacher back then, if you married you had to resign, so she just kept on teaching," Bob said.

"I admire her and she was a real influence on my life to become a teacher and school principal."

Miss Lillywhite was 19 years old when she came to Millicent; her first time living outside Adelaide, new out of college and with no support in her role at the one teacher school.

"My first appointment was at the Mount Muirhead School, a little one room building with side porch and verandah, situated about four or five miles from the South East town of Millicent, just before the road rises up to the Mount Burr forest area," Miss Lillywhite wrote in her memoirs.

"I lived in Millicent with an elderly couple who provided board and lodging for the local

"I rode my bicycle to school and back each day and got to know some of the farming families en-route.

"There were seven children on the roll, one in each grade, and it really was a co-operative effort to ensure all were appropriately occupied and involved.

"As a city girl, this was certainly a new experience for me.

"Soon after the school year began we decided to have a good clean up around the grounds.

"I came across a piece of hoop iron and gave it to my Grade 7 lad to put on the rubbish heap.

"'Oh No, Miss,' he said, 'that's for you to kill the snakes'. Oh! No!

"On another occasion, when the autumn leaves were falling in abundance, we swept the

grounds, made a big bonfire and lit it to get rid of the rubbish; very satisfying!

"But sirens sounded very shortly and out came the local CFS [then Millicent Bushfire Fighting Association, now Country Fire Servicel.

"Alas, my city upbringing was showing up once again.

"However, all was well, and we'd learnt another important lesson.

"My seven students came mainly from the Mount Burr area, and there was already a bus taking secondary students from that area into the Millicent High School.

"So, at the end of the first term, the decision was taken to close our little school and transfer our students to Millicent Primary School."

Miss Lillywhite was sent to Claypans Public School, near Mannum, which was also a one teacher school.

She was only there for two weeks when she had an opportunity to visit Adelaide to see her family for the weekend and called in on the Department of Education at the same time (the Department used to open on Saturdays back then)

"As a result of that visit, the Department advised her of yet another transfer, this time to Mount Gambier High School to fill an urgent vacancy there," Bob said adding that there appeared to be a bit of a "tug-of-war" for his aunt's services due to a shortage of teach-

ers during the war years and as she was more qualified than most at the time having spent two years at teachers college instead of the normal one year.

She spent the rest of 1943 at the Mount Gambier High School and wrote that she had fond memories of her six months in Mount Gambier.

"It was an interesting place to live and work and I enjoyed exploring the many areas of natural beauty," Miss Lillywhite wrote in her memoirs.

"I celebrated my 20th birthday in July that year with a few friends in a shelter over-looking the Blue Lake, enjoying a hamper of homemade goodies which my mother had lovingly baked and sent from Adelaide."

Miss Lillywhite went on to teach at Strathalbyn, Mount Barker and in the Northern Territory where she became the senior mistress at Darwin High School.

In 1960, she became the founding headmistress at Elizabeth Girls Technical High School, and then Dean of Women at Salisbury Teachers College which later became part of the University of South Australia.

"She was a pioneer in girls and women's education in South Australia," Bob said.

"Her life has been a model for everyone

'Barwell Boys' 100yrs on

Compiled with the assistance of the South East Family History Group

A meeting of two ladies in Beachport recently had special significance as they were daughters of 'Barwell Boys' who arrived in the district 100 years ago from England.

'Barwell Boys' refers to the participants of a South Australian Farm Apprenticeship Scheme which employed British boys, aged between 15 and 18, to work on farms in South Australia.

While the scheme began in 1913, a special push was made by South Australian premier, Henry Barwell, in London in early 1922 to help replace thousands of men who were killed at the First World War.

Last month marked the centenary of the arrival of the first 'Barwell Boys' at Port Adelaide's Outer Harbor on the steamship 'Largs Bay' in June 1922.

Other ships followed until the scheme was abandoned when Premier Barwell was defeated at the State elections in 1924.

The scheme had attracted less than 1500 of the 6000 participants hoped for.

Some of the boys came to the Millicent area, including the fathers of Pat Hateley and Gloria Glencorse who met in Beachport recently.

Mrs Hateley lives in Beachport and Mrs Glencorse travelled from her home in Renmark for the visit.

The pair are related by marriage but also specially linked by their fathers' shared histories as 'Barwell Boys' who arrived in the Millicent district 100 years ago in 1922.

Mrs Glencorse's father was Alfred 'Alf' Dyer who arrived on the ship 'Ballarat' and was appointed to Ebenezer Frank Rivett Boneham, of 'Monrovia' at the Wyrie, Millicent.

Mrs Hateley's father was Charles 'Charlie' Mole who arrived on the ship 'Balranald' and was allocated to Mal McDonald, of 'Woomera', at Furner.

ALF DYER

Alf had dreamed of joining the English navy and when he was 12 he won a scholarship to Greenwich Naval College and later served on the training ship 'Arethusa'.

At the age of 15 he was due to step up his training and before doing so he made a trip home to see his family.

Travelling on a steam train, Alf got a hot cinder in one eye and the doctor told him he would no longer be able to join the Navy because he had lost most of the sight in that eye.

He was told of the Barwell Scheme and Alf sailed from Gravesend on July 6, 1922, arriving in Adelaide six weeks later.

On August 23, Alf was among six boys who were put on a train to the South East.

Allotted to Frank Boneham of 'Monrovia' on the Wyrie, Alf worked there for several years, and the Boneham family continued to assist him even after he had left their employ.

At 'Monrovia', Alf was taught to muster and handle sheep and cattle, ride a horse, drive a car, chop wood, milk cows morning and night, and make butter.

He also grew vegetables and plated dahlias, fed the chooks, mowed the buffalo lawn with a hand mower and trimmed a boxthorn hedge; and Vasey Watts taught him to drive a team of horses pulling harrows.

When one of the shearers - Jack Whennen - contracted measles, Alf learnt to shear and afterwards Mr Boneham allowed him to go shearing elsewhere while continuing to stay at

He later moved to a neighbouring farm where he worked for Jack Alleyn for three

Later Alf share-farmed with Mrs Boneham's brother, Hughie Agnew, and went fencing and potato digging with Len Whitehead; surviving through the Great Depression breaking stones for the council, and planting pines trees for the government.

He met his wife, Coral Hateley, through the Salvation Army which held services in a former Presbyterian chapel at The Wyrie.

The Hateleys had arrived in the area the same year as Alf and Coral played the organ in church, accompanying Alf when he sang there

Alf converted from the Church of England,

married Coral in 1929, and built a house on 20 acres purchased from the Hateleys.

The couple had two children, Bernie, born in 1930, and Gloria in 1933.

By 1938 Alf had sold his first block and, with assistance from Mr Boneham, purchased 70 acres he called 'Comely Brae'.

He later worked for IT Williams at Chet-

wynd and Alf's singing prowess fitted in with Mrs Williams' own love of singing along with her daughters, Arvon and Pearl, as accomplished musicians.

Coral developed Tuberculosis (TB) and

Coral developed Tuberculosis (TB) and was advised to move to a warmer climate so, in 1943, the family moved to a fruit block at Renmark.

Coral died in 1948 at the age of 42.

Alf remarried in 1949 to another Salvation Army girl, Eunice Mellor, and the couple had two sons, John and Graham.

Alf's first son Bernie died of cancer in 1964 at the age of 31, and his second wife Eunice died of cancer in 1985.

Alf died in Renmark in 2004 just short of his 98th birthday.

His daughter, Gloria, still lives in Renmark from where she travelled to visit her relative and fellow 'Barwell Boy' daughter, Pat Hateley (who married Gloria's cousin Ronald Hateley) whose father was Charles Eustace Mole.

CHARLIE MOLE

At the age of 16, Charlie was one of 106 boys who were in the second contingent of 'Barwell Boys' to come to South Australia.

A photograph of the contingent was sent home to England to Charlie's mother, Harriet, who responded in a letter: "... they do look a smart lot of boys and I am proud to think my boy is amongst them. I feel sure they will all get on and make good. I only wish we were all out there, things are not very bright here and we thought we would give Charlie a chance, from being a tiny boy he's always wanted to be a farmer."

"He was a ve

He married Clare Ryan, daughter of Phillip and Margaret Ryan, of Tantanoola, in June 1928.

By 1939 he decided to move into Furner itself at about the same time a new school was being built there.

The couple had two daughters at the time, Francie and Pat, while Phyllis and Terry were born after the move to Furner.

Charlie was well respected in the district and he was usually the Master of Ceremonies at most gatherings in the area.

For 18 years Charlie was employed by the highways department and was camped at the Millicent depot of the department.

At the time of his sudden death in 1961, the South Eastern Times printed an obituary which read: "He was of a cheerful nature and known throughout the district by many motorists, for whom he was always ready with a friendly wave.

"He was a very keen player of indoor bowls and won the match at Furner on the evening prior to his death."

Charlie is buried in the Furner cemetery, where Clare also joined him in 2000 after her death at the age of 90.
