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

Current Robe District Council Mayor Alison Nunan will not seek another term in the role at the Council elections in November.

In the Robe Council's August newsletter Ms Nunan stated she would not be nominating again for the Mayoral position in the upcoming election.

"Bradley [Nunan] and I have recently expanded our business, and I am finding the time commitment of both roles too much to manage effectively," Ms Nunan stated in the

"I am happy to provide an insight to anyone who might be interested in what I have found to be an interesting and challenging role."

Ms Nunan had spent one term in the position, having been elected in 2018 convincingly over opponent James Yates.

The announcement will mean new leadership for the Council following the elections in November.

As of yet, no one has publicly stated their intention to run for the mayor position in Robe.

Councillor Ned Wright told the South Eastern Times last week he is planning to nominate again for another term in his posi-

Councillor Bob Bates said he would not be renominating for a position on Council. At the time of publication, other Robe Councillors had not publicly stated if they would be nominating for any positions. Contenders in the race for mayoral and councillor positions will not be made public until nominations close on Tuesday, 6 September.

The trek ran from Parkes in NSW westwards to Cameron Corner (border of SA, NSW, and Qld) and then eastwards to Hervey Bay on the

Testing is bang on

International companies Schlumberger and TGS have lodged an application to conduct a 3D seismic survey in a massive area of the Otway Basin, part of which lies off the coast of Robe.

A spokesperson from the Department of Industry, Science and Resources confirmed last week that the Otway 3D special prospecting authority was validly lodged on August 16 and was currently at the screening phase.

"The Australian Government releases offshore petroleum acreage annually," they said.

"All areas are nominated by industry but nomination of an area does not mean an area will be released.

"Feedback from all stakeholders, including government agencies, industry associations, fisheries, environmental organisations and the wider public will be considered prior to any release of areas."

The spokesperson further said that all companies are required to abide by stringent regulations.

"Under the stringent requirements of the offshore petroleum regulatory regime, companies are required to identify, evaluate and reduce all environmental impacts of their proposed seismic survey to as low as reasonably practicable and acceptable levels," they said.

'When demonstrating that impacts will be managed to as low as reasonably practicable and an acceptable level, companies must identify specific control measures, address relevant comments received during public consultation and demonstrate good practice consistent with relevant standards.

"Commonly applied management measures include avoiding overlap with important areas at biologically sensitive time periods for certain marine fauna, reducing the levels of sound being produced by applying engineering controls and powering down or shutting down the seismic source when marine fauna are observed within close proximity of the vessel.

The spokesperson said the government was committed to protecting the marine environment and ensuring sustainable practices by all marine users, now and in the future.

"There are strict safety and environmental standards for offshore oil and gas exploration activities, including seismic surveys, overseen by Australia's offshore regulator - the National Offshore Petroleum Safety and Environmental Management Authority (NOPSEMA)," they said.

"A proposed seismic survey cannot proceed until NOPSEMA is satisfied that the environmental impacts and risks of the proposed seismic survey will be reduced to as low as reasonably practicable and an acceptable level.

"Where scientific understanding of potential environmental impacts is limited, NOPSE-MA applies precaution to its decision-making

to safeguard the protection of the marine environment.

Depsite these claims, Lisa Deppeler from Otway Climate Emergency Action Network (OCEAN) object to the proposal.

"We need to take urgent action on the climate and biodiversity crisis, not continue to allow massive, speculative expansion of fossil fuel industries," she said.

The organisation claimed that during seismic surveys, destructive blasts of up to 250 decibels are let off every 10 seconds, 24 hours a day and said that these blasts are known to injure and kill marine species, either by the impact of the blasts themselves or by displacing species from traditional migration, feeding and birthing routes.

"Any gas located would take 15 years, at a minimum, to come online and be productive, by which time we need to have transitioned away from fossil fuels and their harmful emissions," Ms Deppeler said.

"Moreover, Schlumberger and TGS have bypassed the process by which exploration titles are granted by the federal government, and have undertaken minimal consultation with affected communities.

"In effect, they are calling the shots here, not the elected government.

"It's like the tail is wagging the dog. We are calling on the government to stop this proposal proceeding any further."

Five years waiting

There is no end in sight to Kalangadoo's fiveyear wait to determine if the town's police station will be reopened.

The station has been left unoccupied since its police officer left in January 2017, but never officially closed by SA Police. Instead, the building has been left dormant for five years, pending the results of a review into regional policing.

Kalangadoo's community was promised by the SA Liberal party if voted into Government in the 2018 election it would be reopened, but no attempt was made to do so.

The Regional Policing Review has been underway for years but was put on hold in 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

The Border Watch was told the report was in its final stages in September 2021, but 11 months later, the review outcomes are still to be released.

SAPOL did not respond when asked when outcomes of the review could be expected.

"The date for the release of the Regional Policing Review outcomes has not yet been determined," a police spokesperson said.

"The Kalangadoo Police Station is part of the ongoing review of all Regional Policing Services by the Regional Review Project. The Kalangadoo response area will continue to be covered by the neighbouring police station of Millicent."

A Regional Policing Review consultation paper dated February 2020, which was obtained by a freedom of information request, suggested one and two-person police stations may be scrapped after future reviews to better centralise operations.

Member for McKillop Nick McBride said he is aware the report has been drafted, but has not been alerted to its outcomes.

"I understand it is up to the Commissioner of Police to release," Mr McBride said.

"It has always been my view that local police services should be maintained in our community, especially in regional areas. When in Government, I had numerous conversations with the then Police Minister regarding the review – and the future of the Kalangadoo Police Station.

"I do believe that we need to have clarity about the future of this station, and policing in regional areas in general. I look forward to hearing the outcome of the review, which is now long overdue.

"If the review has been finalised – the public should be able to access it."

Chairperson of the Meals on Wheels committee for Millicent Graeme Richardson said there are around 80 volunteers that help

"They like the society they live in, and they want to contribute back to it," Mr Richardson said.

"But we are always happy to take on more volunteers. It is not a difficult process."

Mr Richardson said those in the commu-

nity have come to rely on the meals.

"It is daily social contact, and they look forward to their meals," he said.

"We get good feedback from them. The meals are cooked at the Millicent hospital." Down the road in Beachport, Meals on

Wheels started five years ago.

Margret Grieve was one of the locals who helped start the program in the town.

"Sue Wheel, Chris Bellinger and I sat down one day and decided that Beachport needed Meals on Wheels," Ms Grieve said.

"We just decided it was time, we sat down and set it up."

Currently, around 10 clients between Southend and Beachport are signed up to receive meals. The meals for those in the area are made in Adelaide, snap frozen and then sent down to be distributed.

"We have not got that many clients at the moment, but it has been difficult with Co-

vid-19," Ms Grieve said.

"It is not just supplying a meal, it is also checking on people. Because with Covid there has been lots of isolation, it has been difficult for people."

Ms Grieve said in her experience, the Beachport clients have loved the services.

"They like the meals, they like the contact," she said.

"They like the fact someone is popping in every day with a hot meal for them, but to also have a chat about what is happening around town."

The service allows volunteers to undertake a welfare check on clients, ensuring they are feeling healthy, according to Ms Grieve.

"I think it works extremely well," she said.

"People have been very happy with the service, and we have helped keep people in their own homes if possible."

"We just had our rock pool redone and de-

cided that a wooden canoe would fit the bill and be different to other sites."

When the Martins delivered the canoe for installation Ms Cook asked about the possibility of a wooden slide as well with Ant saying he had the perfect log.

Ms Cook said "The kids really enjoy them and it's open-ended play.

"The canoe was a floating bed the other day, they (the children) had all the sheets and pillows in it and were on their floating bed which is just lovely.

"For us it is unique and something we stand out for, the kids love it and I think we are very very lucky.

"To boost our economy and a local artist was a win win situation, for us and for Ant and Hat as well, especially during Covid."

Mr Martin agreed it was a good situation and said "We had a few interstate jobs that just dropped off at the time and the gallery was affected as well.

"Everything just died off, I could still go to the workshop and do pieces, and selling firewood also helped get us through."

Mr Martin enjoys seeing children interact with his carvings and said "I've always wanted to make a wooden slide and here we are we've made one, we just happened to have a big redgum log that lent itself to the job."

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Students help with rejuvenation of pond

Students from the Mary MacKillop school in Penola gathered to help revegetate the wetlands surrounding the Penola Mary MacKillop Centre.

The wetlands were part of the original architectural design to connect the 1867 schoolhouse, church and interpretive centre, and was a nod to the marshy conditions the early settlers would have encountered.

It also serves to hold stormwater run off from the buildings.

Established more than 20 years ago, the wetland/pond area needed some rejuvenation

Interpretive Centre spokesperson Marie Valenzuela said over the last year a major revamp of the wetland area has been undertaken.

It included replacing the pond liner, which took several months and involved local businesses and many volunteer hours.

Once that was completed the trees, which had grown quite large, were trimmed and branches thinned.

A new pumping system was set up to help with the aeration of the water.

"Advice was sought from the Nature Glenelg Trust to provide a plan to restore the high aesthetic and biodiversty standard that the site previously held," Marie said.

The centre was successful in obtaining assistance from the OneFortyOne commu-

nity program to help with the purchase of a diverse range of local native plant species which were then planted by the students.

The students are part of the Environmental leaders group which consists of year five and six students.

"It is hoped that the wetland area will be used by many school groups as a place to learn about biodiversity and other environmental issues," Marie said. Plant identification labels are also being installed.

"The wetland area provides a tranquil place for relaxing, reflecting and taking our minds off the hustle and bustle of daily life.

"Water naturally attracts people and water loving creatures, so maintaining and restoring areas as wetland is worthwhile and benefits the whole community," she said.

"What can one say when someone does something like this that means so much to a family he loves as his own," Andi said.

"You showed us what family is all about.

"We saw our beautiful parents together for the first time in 21 years and not only for us to see, but for a cause to raise awareness for MND."

Postcards reveal history

Millicent's South East Family History Group (SEFHG) has recently been gifted a collection of 100 postcards dating back over 100 years ago.

Ruby McMahon's (nee Varcoe) collection of postcards date from 1905 to 1929 and include cards received from family, friends and servicemen.

The collection was offered to the group by Ms McMahon's grandson, Stephen Cocks, after the family came across them when cleaning up his mother's estate after her death last year.

Born in 1864, Ms McMahon was one of three girls of Hulda (nee Boneham) and John Varcoe who lived at the Wyrie on their property Monrovia.

After the death of her grandfather Ebenezer Boneham, Hulda moved into her grandparents home on Mount Gambier Road, Woodbine Villa.

Both Monrovia and Woodbine Villa have since been demolished but the postcards remain and offer a glimpse of the social history of the area, reflecting several different addresses Ms McMahon lived.

Group member Penny Richardson showed an interest in the cards due to her own connection to the Boneham's of Kalangadoo and soon discovered that Ruby was her own second cousin three times removed.

Ms Richardson was delighted to find two postcards among the collection sent from a direct ancestor, her third great aunt Laura Kent, who was Ruby's cousin.

"I was interested in reading the postcards to see who they have come from because of my distant family connection, my second great grandmother was Annie Boneham from Kalangadoo who married Thomas Kent from Millicent.

"The postcards give a fascinating insight

of the family, like Lillian Mott who has sent some of the cards, whether they are school friends or relatives."


The glimpse into early 1900's Millicent includes formal postcards sent for new year and birthday's with other cards showing family photos printed as postcards.

House has long history

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called Penola Walk With History to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided

The following is one of the subjects from this app

MCELROY HOME (Private Residence)

This site marks the location of one of the earliest homes built in Penola.

The land was originally purchased from the tablished adjacent to the house.

Government by Alexander Cameron in 1854 and sold to Stephen McElroy in 1855.

Stephen and his wife Margaret, together with children Mary and Antony, arrived in the South East in early 1847 having driven some stock overland for David Fletcher Minnitt, who held the lease of Krongart at the time.

The original dwelling, built by Stephen, was a four roomed slab house with a shingle roof and two wooden chimneys.

It faced Portland Street.

A vegetable garden and fruit trees were es-

At the rear of the dwelling a well was dug, this spot being the highest point in a relatively

A cool cellar was also excavated which was trellised with grape vines over the top.

Margaret played her part in early Penola by taking in Irish immigrant girls arriving here from Portland and other ports.

She would care for them until they found suitable employment.

The two youngest children, Antony and Margaret, who were born at Piccanninni Yabba just south of Penola in 1848, were both

married in their parents' house. Anthony married Helen Shaw Neilson in 1866.

The house was later burnt to the ground and a more substantial home was built, sited closer to the Arthur Street corner.

Antony and his wife Helen lived there until their deaths in 1912 and 1917 respectively.

The house, which was modified over the years, remained in the family until the death in 1973 of Mrs GW Pannell, one of Antony and Helen McElroy's 12 children.

Descendants of these early pioneer settlers still reside in the district.

"But I think at the show it goes back to developing that relationship with animals, how to work as a team, being independent, all those sorts of life skills.

"The students do have to be quite independent at the show, they need to be organised, so those skills have been developing leading up to the show, and that is when you see it all come through."

Ms Naele said the students had missed the opportunity to attend the show over the last two years.

"Over the last couple of years, we had still prepared them for competition," she said.

"We still did the program. We just have not been able to get to the part where we can exhibit the animals, which is the most exciting part for our students.

"This year will be fantastic because they will get to do that again."

Schools from all across the state participate in the show, when asked Ms Neale said you could never know how well other schools will perform, but she knows her students have been working hard.

Gary King: 1946-2022

GARY KING: 1946-2022

Never one to be the centre of attention, locals were surprised that this modest man living in Millicent, South Australia, was once a member of one of Australia's biggest '60s pop groups, with hit records and a string of television appearances.

Gary Lawrence King was born 16 May 1946 in Helensburgh, a small coal mining town situated roughly halfway between Sydney and Wollongong. Growing up he attended Helensburgh Primary School before heading to Sutherland High School. Gary always felt a strong connection to Helensburgh throughout his life.

Born into a musical family with six siblings, it was perhaps inevitable that Gary would learn to play a musical instrument, being taught the bass guitar by older brother Brian. Gary would later say that he chose bass as there was a distinct lack of bass guitarists in the otherwise fertile grounds for musicians that was Helensburgh.

By 1966 Gary had joined Brian's band The Kingwoods, playing regular gigs across Wollongong's northern suburbs. The band would become The Associates, and, after linking with manager Harry Widmer in late 1966, The Executives.

As a member of one of Sydney's most popular, if not most successful, music acts of the '60s, Gary's life for the next three years was one of endless tours and concerts, with the band performing all over Australia. Between 1966 and 1970 The Executives released eight singles, including the top ten hits 'My Aim Is To Please You', 'Sit Down, I Think I Love You' and 'Windy Day'. The band was a regular feature on Channel 9's 'Bandstand', and made cameo appearances in shows such as 'Skippy'. Gary even appeared on Graham Webb's TV dating gameshow, 'Blind Date', where he won a date with blonde model Marian Richardson!

But it wasn't just about music, Gary also had a love of cars. Having a preference for Fords, he owned a V8 Ford Falcon during the '60s. In the early '70s he kept himself busy during his spare time rebuilding a green Austin Healey sports car, which he subsequently sold to fellow-Executive Ray Burton. More recently, Gary took great pride in his blue V8 Ford Mustang GT. But he was also very grounded, owning more practical vans for his day-to-day activities.

When The Executives left Sydney for Los Angeles in early 1970, Gary found himself in the thick of the west coast music scene, even partying with Janis Joplin the night before she died. For the next two years he did session work in LA and played the live circuit in Seattle and Vegas, performing with the likes of Robert Blackwell, best known for his work overseeing the early hits of Little Richard, and oud-master John Bileziklian.

The earth shook - quite literally - when Gary met Gloria Kenyon during the San Fernando Earthquake in 1971. The pair married in 1972 and with Gary effectively retiring from performing they returned to Australia the following year where Gary started a milk run in Canberra. However, the USA beckoned strongly and in 1975 Gary and Gloria returned to LA where Gary secured an accounting posi-


 $tion\ with\ ABC/Dunhill\ Records.$

In 1977, now with young daughter Aimee, the family moved north to Mendocino County. Always practical with his hands, Gary built a large house overlooking the Pacific Ocean, where they settled in the early '80s. It was here where he and Gloria opened a record store, and, during this time, he re-wired the sound equipment at Mendocino's Hill House Inn, the setting for the popular TV mystery series 'Murder, She Wrote'. He spent what was left of his spare time playing soccer in the local community.

Over the next 17 years the King family would share their time between Mendocino and Australia, before Gary returned to Australia permanently in 1999. After spending time at the Gold Coast, Northern NSW, and St Mary's Tasmania, Gary settled in Millicent.

It was here where Gary would rekindle his love for woodworking, making many pieces from chopping boards through to windows, French Doors and full kitchens. There was always a story behind the wood chosen for any particular project, and the practicalities of using particular cuts. Earlier this year Gary had enthusiastically commenced building a new house on his Millicent property. Having a long time interest in cooking, he also owned a food van, and could be seen at festivals and markets around Victoria selling his famous fish tacos, salsas and other delicacies.

However, proving that one can never rid themselves of the music bug, in 2015 he returned to playing the bass guitar and hit the stage again for the first time in 43 years, playing at various open mike/jam sessions around Millicent, Mt Gambier, Canberra and Mel-

bourne, and using the same cherished cherry-red Fender Jazz Bass that he purchased in 1970. More recently he was a member of Millicent band, 4 On The Floor, where they got to experience his love of puns, extremely dry wit and infectious, positive approach to life, along with his steadfast bass lines and many years' experience 'in the biz'.

Gary passed away suddenly on Sunday, 31 July 2022, aged 76, after a short battle with cancer. Gary was his usual high-spirited self throughout his fight but it appears an infection was just too much for his body to endure.

Gary will be sadly missed by daughter Aimee, son-in-law Esam, grandsons Ikkai and Keahi, along with brothers Brian and Keith and sister Margaret and their families. And, of course, his beloved dog Cooper, who was by his side wherever he went.

Toyota Yaris Ascent Sport

It may be short on words but 'family car' is long on the desirable characteristics of a passenger vehicle: affordability, space, versatility, comfort and convenience, power reliability, fuel economy, safety and looks, all jostle to be taken into consideration.

This goes a long way to explaining the success of the five and seven-seat sports utility vehicle, or Mum's minibus, the eight-seater people mover, which can take the kids and all their kit.

However, there is another side to family life. Sons and daughters leave home and start families of their own.

It is often left to Mum and Dad to bring the family together with visits to their offspring.

A gas guzzling minibus is the last thing the downsized duo needs.

This is where a small economical runabout comes to the fore.

Something like the Toyota Yaris Ascent Sport hatchback, a versatile compact capable of carrying four adults, or a couple and all their luggage, the latter on a considerable road test distance.

At an affordable \$22,130, plus on-road costs, the car is the entry level to the Yaris line and the only variant with a six-speed manual transmission.

The others, including petrol/electric hybrids, have a direct shift CVT, which adds just \$1500. A CVT-equipped hybrid on SX and ZR attracts a further \$2000 over their equivalent petrol variants.

Ownership costs include a five-year warranty, extendable to seven years, up to 10 years on the hybrid battery and five annual services capped at \$195 each.

Conveniently to hand on Ascent Sport is standard equipment which includes Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, LED daytime running lamps, tail and stop lights; auto retractable door mirrors with LED turn signals; and power windows.

For the first time on a Toyota vehicle in Australia there are safety features designed to make Yaris the world's safest compact car.

They include front-centre airbags, sensors that can detect vehicles or pedestrians at intersections when making turns and secondary collision braking.

The all-new Yaris is shorter and lower than its predecessor, with a longer wheelbase (40mm).

Despite the lower roofline, interior headroom is not compromised, the driver and passengers sitting lower thanks to the new Toyota B-platform.

A sporty exterior boasts a stand-out cascading grille, longer bonnet, sculpted door panels, character lines and a shorter rear overhang.

There are 12 exterior colours, including Cherry Blossom in the case of the test vehicle, which elicited compliments from onlookers who marveled at the subtle change of hue from off-white to lavender, depending on the light.

The Toyota Yaris Ascent Sport has an allblack interior, offering an open, spacious and comfortable cabin with ample headroom and an up-market ambience with high-quality seat fabrics.

Despite a wider centre console, there is no room for an armrest, hence no leaning post for the driver.

Gearshift and cup holders take up the space.

However, the new platform allows the driver's seat to be set lower and further back towards the centre of the car, creating an appealing driving position and helping to lower the vehicle's centre of gravity by around 15mm.

The steering wheel is set closer to the driv-

er, with wider tilt and telescopic adjustments.

Electric steering is tuned for a light feel at low speed and responsive feeling at high speed.

Driver information is sourced through a 7-inch touchscreen and a 4.2-inch multi-information display in the instrument cluster.

Bluetooth connectivity includes phone and music.

With enhanced voice recognition, there's access to Siri, Eyes Free, Google Now voice commands.

AM/ FM/DAB+ digital radio is in the hands of six speakers, while USB video playback is on offer when the vehicle is stationary.

The new direct-injection three-cylinder 1.5-litre petrol engine's 88 kW and 145 Nm forge gains of 10 per cent and 2.7 per cent over the previous 1.5-litre four-cylinder engine, the result of a lighter block and crankshaft, reduced frictional losses and high-speed combustion technology.

Advanced safety technologies include a pre-collision safety system with autonomous emergency braking, active cruise control, automatic high beam, and technologies to assist with cornering, staying in the intended lane and detecting speed signs.

A reversing camera and a full suite of brake assist and traction-control systems, including active cornering assist are also standard.

Eight airbags include driver, front passenger, two front centre, two front side, two curtain shield.

The new front-row centre airbags are designed to offer additional protection in a range of accidents.

They can act as energy-absorbing cushions between the driver and front passenger in side crashes, or in passenger-side crashes when the driver is the only occupant.

They can also provide safety benefits in rollover accidents.

The entry-level Yaris Ascent Sport had the last laugh, lapping up the highway kilometres, or taking on heavy traffic in the country's two

largest (and congested) cities.

Although the lack of factory-fitted sat-nav was a drag.

Google is no competition here.

The new 1.5-litre petrol engine produces more power and torque, while using less fuel than the 1.3 and 1.5-litre four-cylinder engines it replaces.

Tagged with the 'Sport', engine performance is not all that impressive.

In slow city traffic high revs are the key otherwise stalling is the downfall.

Toyota claims the new Yaris manual uses just 5.4 litres of fuel per 100 kilometres on the combined cycle.

The test car clocked 7.9 litres per 100 kilometres while flitting around towns on the route and 3.7 litres per 100 kilometres on the open road.

The little motor was quiet enough at low revs but let out a raspy reply when urged to

work higher up the scale.

The manual gear shift at times was not of Toyota's usual high standards and needed firm handling to avoid connecting with the wrong gear.

On the upside, the new platform underpins a significant increase in body rigidity, which contributes to agility, stable handling, ride comfort and lower noise and vibration.

A 270-litre cargo area incorporates a two-level deck board.

Big items can be accommodated with 60:40 split-fold rear seat backs folded flat.

Front door pockets take up to a dehydration-beating 1.5-litre bottle, rear door pockets up to a 600ml bottle.

The test took place mostly under clear winter skies, all on sealed roads, the Yaris also coping with early morning frost in the Southern Highlands and being rain bombed on the Hume, all the way to drawing together relatives and friends – a genuine family car.
