# **Riddoch race is o**

The election race for the Riddoch Ward has begun with current incumbents Dean Burrow and Chris Brodie on the ticket again and they are joined by Emma Castine.

Mr Brodie is still relatively new to the council, having been elected in a by-election in October last year, after the resignation of former councillor Rick Paltridge in August 2021.

He was elected unopposed as the only nominated candidate for the position. Mr Burrows has served on the council for many years, and is now hoping to continue to advocate for and be a voice for the community.

Candidates will be hard on the campaign trail in the coming weeks, and Local Government Association of South Australia CEO Clinton Jury urged residents to get out and talk to the candidates about what they can offer to the community.

"Nominations for the 2022 local government elections have closed and now it's over to you, the community, to have your say on who will be elected to represent your council for the next four years," he said.

"We are imploring all eligible residents and business owners not to waste their ballot, or take it for granted, and participate in this vitally important democratic process.

"Take the time to speak to your local candidates and ask them questions, read and listen to what they have to say, and ensure you make an informed decision when you return your ballot paper in October.

"Your vote will determine who will represent you and your community, and make decisions on your behalf - some which can impact decades into the future - so it's crucial to make it count.

Ballots will begin to arrive in letterboxes after October 7 and voting closes on November

Tameka said "We have a little bit to go with our new extension but can finally see the dream coming all together, which is very exciting."

Tameka and Julie, noticed the number of visitors coming to town to visit the Glencoe Woolshed, camp at Lake Leake or walk the Honan Mint Trails.

"We have a group of bike riders who have

supported us for the last six years, coming out most Sundays for a bike ride and stopping for a coffee at the shop.

Cathy entered the experienced section, one of four sections that were available, as she used to teach clothing design and construction at TAFESA in the 1980's.





## Coonawarra road show hits the mark in capital cities

The Coonawarra Cellar Door in the city events wrapped up recently following a string of sold out events in five capital cities.

"After a two year hiatus our winery members couldn't have been more excited to get back on the road and showcase their wines to the country.

And it seems that the public were just as excited, with high consumer demand leading to waitlists for tickets for the sold out events," Coonawarra Vignerons Events and Marketing Officer, Heidi Guyett said.

The national wine tasting event attracted more than 1600 wine enthusiasts across five cities, with up to 26 wineries presenting a collective wine list of over 180 premium Coonawarra drops.

Executive Officer of the Coonawarra Vignerons, Ockert Le Roux attended each of the five events and was thrilled to see the events draw large crowds of loyal and upcoming Coonawarra wine enthusiasts.

"Sydney was by far the most engaged audience with just shy of 450 ticketholders flocking to the event at the Sydney Town hall.

More than 300 wine enthusiasts attended events in Melbourne, Brisbane and Adelaide, where attendees learned more about the Coonawarra wine region and our world class wines", Mr Le Roux said.

Mr Le Roux said as far as he was aware Coonawarra is the only wine

region in Australia that hosts a wine tasting event on this scale.

The event also involved more than 50 winery staff at each event, consisting of a mix of winemakers, cellar door staff, boutique winery owners and Coonawarra Vignerons.

Wynn's Coonawarra winemaker, Sue Hodder supported Mr Le Roux's comments and shared the appreciation of consumers and wineries for the work that goes into delivering the events.

"No other wine region has an enduring roadshow like this. Wine enthusiasts from across the country contact us (wineries) all the time to relay their praises for the effort that our region goes to, to deliver these events," she said.

Long time winery roadshow attendee, Brian 'Prof' Lynn of Majella Wines has been exhibiting at the wine show events for more than two decades.

"The Coonawarra roadshow has been occurring in different formats for more than two decades. It is an institution of wine promotion for our region and the consumers just love it," he said.

Between 100 and 185 wines were showcased at the varying events with a greatb range of varieties and styles up fort tasting. Coonawarra is famously known for producing predominately red varietals, which evident in the wine list with 80 percent of wine being poured being reds, from Cabernet Sauvignon to Shiraz, Merlot, Cabernet Franc, red blends and even sparkling reds.

"But Coonawarra's white varieties are not to be underestimated. Sparkling whites, Chardonnay, Riesling, Sauvignon Blanc, Pinot Gris and even Rose` were included during the roadshow," Mr Le Roux said.

The wines presented at this year's event featured recent releases in the 2018-2021 vintage range, with wineries encouraged to bring along a mystery bottle that is usually from a back vintage or museum wine to demonstrate the age ability of Coonawarra's reds.

Coonawarra will be on the road again in August 2023, with preparations underway to ensure that the event continues to provide the ultimate tasting experience.

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## **Turning blue for a cause**

German Flat's Poonada Road will be busier than usual this Sunday night as the Wattle Range Suicide Prevention Network (WRSPN), in partnership with Vestas service technician John Hutchison, invite the public to view the lighting up of one of the service provider's wind turbines.

The 67-metre wind turbine owned by Engie (Canunda wind farm) will turn blue for at least three hours for mental health and suicide awareness.

Last year Mr Hutchison set up lights to see what a turbine would look like lit up with the vision of using it raise awareness for mental health "I didn't know how effective it would be in lighting up a 67-metre tower from the ground, so I organised some blue cellophane just to see if we could get the turbine lit from the ground and it looked pretty amazing.

"It was a bit of an experiment and an inhouse thing and was pretty effective the first time, the next time we invited out some photographers and this year it is open to everybody."

This year's event is set closer to Poonada Road with toilet facilities, heaters and some shelter if needed, organisers have arranged for Let it Bean coffee van to be onsite and soup to warm people while the sun sets.

A 38 metre blade that sits on the ground at the site will be used as a projection surface highlighting the work of the WRSPN through a slideshow and blue hand-knitted beanies will be available to purchase on the night.

"The last turbine did stand out quite bit

from the landscape, you should be able to see it from a fair distance.

"We will set the lights up as the sun is setting, you don't even know they are on but as the sky starts to change in colour it looks pretty effective" said Mr Hutchison.

The community is invited to rug up and bring a chair from 6pm on Sunday September 11 to see the wind turbine turn blue at 736 Poonada Rd, German Flat.

Google maps will assist in finding the location.

The event follows World Suicide Prevention Day on Saturday September 10.

## **Council race starts** Complaint

Des Noll will remain as Mayor of Wattle Range Council after no other nominations were received for the position.

Nominations closed on Tuesday, and the race for council positions has officially begun with the candidates announced and ballot positions decided after a ballot draw on Tuesday afternoon.

However there will be no contest in Robe or Kingston Council's with no nominations for Mayor received in either council district.

Over the next two months, nominees will be campaigning hard, prior to the close of the election on November 10.

The local government election is mail-only, and the Electoral Commission of SA will mail out around three million ballot papers to eligible electors.

Candidate profiles and voting guides will be sent in batches over a week, with large and regional councils prioritised and locals can expect ballot packs to start arriving from October 17.

Completed ballots must be received back or placed in the local council offices ballot box before 5 pm on November 10.

It is recommended that ballots are posted before November 7, or even earlier for regional locations, so that completed ballots are received before 5pm November 10.

She said highland dancers have faced a lot of challenges in the last few years due to Covid, which meant extra work was needed to maintain a championship standard.



## Complaint about Noll dismissed

A code of conduct complaint against Wattle Range Council Mayor Des Noll was formally dismissed at a Council meeting on Monday.

The code of conduct complaint was made against Mr Noll by Sheryl Lowe on behalf of the Board of The Millicent Community Access Radio Station, 5THEFM, on July 11.

Ms Lowe was given one month by deputy mayor Moira Neagle to substantiate her claims with evidence, but according to the correspondence at the Council meeting this week none was forthcoming.

Ms Neagle therefore decided to dismiss the allegations, as she was "unable to assess whether the allegations can be substantiated".

Following the dismissal of the allegations, Mr Noll released a statement on the matter for the sake of transparency.

"It is my personal belief that any elected member who is subject to a Code of Conduct complaint should be making the community aware of it," Mr Noll said.

"I have previously made statements in the media concerning the Millicent Community Radio Station, 5THEFM. These statements have been expressed as my personal position, in my personal capacity and have not been delivered in my capacity as Mayor or on behalf of the Wattle Range Council.

"Concerns about the radio station management, transparency of business and local volunteer involvement have been a subject of concern within our community for some time."

"An internal Code of Conduct investigation was conducted in accordance with due process as set out in the Local Government Act and Council's Complaints Handling Policy under Wattle Range Council's Member's Code of Conduct Procedure," he said.

"The complaint has been dismissed in its entirety due to a lack of evidence."

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### TEXT TO EDITOR

I was disappointed to recently read in the media that the South Australian Police regional country review highlighting the future of the Kalangadoo Police Station has not yet been completed. I am acutely aware of the Covid-19 situation during the duration time of the Country Police Station review. The country policing review commenced back in 2017. Covid-19 commenced in 2020. I commend Commissioner Stevens for the role he played as the State Co-ordinator for Covid-19. Mr Stevens did an outstanding job keeping all of us safe.

What does this mean for the Kalangadoo and district community?

The Kalangadoo community lost its permanent Police member position some five years ago, describing it as a change in its operational delivery of policing services. Country policing is about the local police member connecting into the community; living in and being a part of the community; getting to know the locals and being the local's go-to person when required. A significant position for local policing that cannot be underestimated.

Kalangadoo is an active and growing community with a strong football and netball club, bowls club, busy railway station museum, hotel, which is the heartbeat of the community (consisting of nine accommodations rooms and a RV camping area), two general stores, hairdressing salon, primary school, steel fabrication manufacturing business, large timber mill operation, CFS brigade station, farmers market, Wattle Range Council equipment depot, a growing tourism trade, Garden Centre, active Lions club and a robust agriculture primary production community

Has anyone from the South Australia Police Country review project team actually visited Kalangadoo and spoken to the businesses and residents about the future of the police station and the potential removal of a permanent police member position and get their views? Surely that would be part of a review to consult with the community. If this has not happened, I invite Commissioner Stevens to ensure this happens and if the decision is to permanently close the police station, then at least inform the community of your decision. The community has lived with an empty and unmanned police station and a vacant government residence within the township without knowing what is happening. This vibrant community deserves better.



# Water partnerships blossom for schools

Students at Nangwarry Primary School will be developing their environmental and sustainability knowledge through the development a new community garden.

The garden is a partnership with SA Water, as part of the utility's 2022-23 Community Partnership Program.

Funding will go towards the installation of a 25,000-litre rainwater tank at the school, as well as plumbing and irrigation, creating a sustainable watering system for the on-site garden.

The annual program provides a total of \$75,000 in financial support towards initiatives or events focused on environmental sustainability, climate change and improving community health and wellbeing.

SA Water's General Manager of Strategy, Engagement and Innovation Nicola Murphy said the exciting project at Nangwarry is among eight new partnerships in metropolitan and regional South Australia this year.

"Sharing our vision for a greener environment, the rainwater tank will be an important tool for the students to learn about water-wise gardening techniques," Nicola said.

"It will capture stormwater run-off from three buildings on site, and the design incorporates a swale system to help spread water evenly across the garden."

St Martins Lutheran College in Mount Gambier is also partnering with SA Water for the 2022-23 program, with funding going towards construction of a seasonal wetland in a nearby nature reserve.

SA Water's 2022-23 Community Partnerships Program is assisting initiatives of dif-



ferent shapes and sizes, ranging from a watering habitat in Monarto to a new sensory garden in Port Pirie.

"We're also partnering-up to deliver an incredible feature garden at this year's Royal Adelaide Show, where tens of thousands of visitors each day can learn about creating cool, green spaces in their community," Nicola said.

"We know grassroots groups and events have faced challenges throughout recent years due to COVID-19, and we can't wait to work together with all of this year's program recipients to achieve great outcomes."

"I have always wanted to help make a change as I was affected by mental health at a young age.

# Numbers stack up in Jeep

Jeep has brought back an extra row of seats to its Grand Cherokee large sports utility vehicle range, turning it into a full seven-seat SUV.

While at it, the maker has boosted its iconic off-roader with more technology.

The replacement for the big five-seater, the long wheelbase L comes in three versions, beginning with the Grand Cherokee L Night Eagle, selling for \$82,250, plus on-roads, then the mid-range L Limited (\$87,950) and the L Summit Reserve (\$115,450).

The flagship Summit Reserve included Palermo quilted leather, 21-inch wheels, a McIntosh premium sound system, front-seat ventilation and massaging, four-zone climate control and air suspension, while a \$5500 Advanced Technology Group, with head-up display, wireless phone charging, night vision camera and front interactive passenger display, was added, taking the price to more than \$120,000, before on-road costs.

A new-generation five-seat model – with the same technology and styling as the sevenseat L – will follow to Australia later this year, with the option of 4xe plug-in hybrid power.

For a vehicle so big, at more than five metres long, the Grand Cherokee L Summit is well proportioned – width more than two metres, yet height well under two metres – gives the SUV a bold yet sleek aerodynamic coupe character.

The front consists of an upper metallic grille with Jeep's trademark seven slots flanked by LED headlamps.

Below is a full grille-width air vent incorporating LED daytime running lights.

From the rear, the SUV belies its bulk with simple horizontal lines incorporating wraparound tail lights and twin alloy tipped exhaust pipes.

Side on, 21-inch polished painted alloy wheels, a standard fitment on Summit, support a sporty street presence.

The increase in the horizontal exterior allows for a boost to the wheelbase and cabin space in general, something not lost on occupants aboard the test vehicle.

In a first for Jeep, the Grand Cherokee L boasts Uberesque seating for a driver and six passengers in space and comfort.

All three rows are easily accessed, even the power-operated third row, with the second row tumbling well out of the way, leaving the back to weigh in with adult leg room.

Carry-on bits and pieces find a home in a range of storage spaces, including a deep box in the centre console and bottle holders in the centre and doors all round.

Rear passengers have the advantage of retractable blinds, just in time for summer heatwave predictions.

Luggage is not left behind in the storage stakes, with 487 litres available with all three rows in use, leading up to a cavernous 2395 litres with the two sets of rear seatbacks folded flat. Coming soon: A new five-seater model of the Cherokee Summit, with the same tech as the seven-seater, will arrive in Australia later this year.

It even has a zoom mode.

All models are powered by the tried-andtested 3.6 litre Pentastar naturally aspirated V6 engine, delivering 210 kW of peak power and 344 Nm of maximum torque to all four wheels through an eight-speed automatic transmission.

The flagship Summit adds a more advanced four-wheel-drive system with a lowrange transfer case.

Top-shelf safety features take the Grand Cherokee L Summit to new heights.

These include adaptive cruise control with stop/go, full speed collision warning with autonomous braking and pedestrian and cyclist detection. Then there's blind spot monitoring, rear

cross-traffic alert and active lane management.

All these use a selection of loud warning

There's a cabin-wide cubby under the floor where the jack is stored.

A state-of the-art McIntosh audio is now offered for the first time in a full-size SUV.

It is made up of a 17-channel amplifier producing up to 950 Watts of power through 19 custom-made speakers, including a 10-inch sub-woofer.

Apple CarPlay wireless support means an iPhone can be connected without having to plug it into the vehicle.

The system brings contacts, audio apps, Apple Maps and more on board, all through the Uconnect system.

A 10.25-inch digital instrument cluster looks after sat nav, along with mechanical features such as tyre pressure monitoring and driving aids.

There's a roof-mounted rear facing 'kid n

the potential trouble, while driving assistance, such as active lane management, can be overintrusive.

At on-road cruising speeds the engine is refined and powerful.

However, intrusive wind noise is a bit of a blow and the expansive exterior mirror stands out as a blind spot for the driver on negotiating such obstacles as roundabout kerbing.

Fuel consumption is a downer – it's premium unleaded petrol - which nudged over 14 litres per 100 kilometres in city and suburban work.

This was trimmed to 12 litres per 100 kilometres on a motorway run.

The Summit boasts ground clearance of up to 276 mm, while higher levels of articulation work to keep all four tyres on the ground to maintain stability.

Grander than grand: The Grand Cherokee has become grander, with increased dimensions, seven seats and boosted technology.


Off road, Jeep 4x4 systems ensure the right tyre has traction when needed.

Precision steering and optimal wheelbases enable all L models to negotiate tight spots and manoeuvre around rocks.

As for wading, high air intakes and spe-

cial water sealing, combined with the Jeep Quadra-Lift suspension, can take the vehicles through up to 610 mm of water.

The Grand Cherokee L Summit is sold by Jeep on the pretext of its size and advanced technology.

This weekend the Magpies will have to deal with the tall timber of the Demons, namely Mail Medalist Tim Sullivan and Will MacDonald.


Both provide strong targets up forward, around the ground and in the ruck.



She was 0.1 off her upgrade, with a highest placing of 13th on vault out of 24 gymnasts.


