Penola wants out

A group of concerned ratepayers in Penola and Coonawarra have written to the Premier requesting the recent amalgamation plebiscite to include a review of the Wattle Range Council.

The letter, signed by a handful of ratepayers, was sent to South Australian Premier Peter Malinauskas last week, expressing their longterm dissatisfaction following the amalgamation of Penola District Council into the Wattle Range council in 1997.

The group requested the Premier to undertake a plebiscite within the Wattle Range region to determine the "success or non-success" of the prior merger.

"The meeting felt the amalgamation of the Penola Council that occurred 25 years ago has not proved to be successful. There has been much dissatisfaction in the district regarding local issues and the Penola and Coonawarra area feels that its voice is not being heard," the letter read.

"As a result we suggest it would also be an appropriate time to reconsider the amalgamation of Penola and Millicent Councils. It is worth noting at this time there were no nominations for Mayor in Robe nor Kingston, This is highlighting the need for a re-alignment of councils within the Limestone Coast.

"Such matters require your urgent attention as the Wattle Range Council is contemplating expending \$9.2m for a new council facility when it has not sought ratepayer approval for the expenditure, only explaining its inadequate facilities, exhibiting the architect's proposal, and highlighting the staff approval for the project."

The District Councils of Beachport, Penola and Beachport were amalgamated in 1997.

Even 25 years later, some within the region stand by their belief their own towns would have been better served if amalgamation had never occurred.

One signee on the letter is Penola resident

Jodi Strother, who said since her return to Penola after living away for two decades she has been dismayed by the Wattle Range Council's treatment of the town.

"Since returning to Penola I can see the town going backwards," she said.

"Even in the twenty years I was away I can see the town absolutely has gone downhill, whereas it used to be such a beautiful little tourist town with thriving businesses, and a very proud population.

"The council just does not seem to be supporting it.

"It was seen as an opportunity to ask for one [a plebiscite] for Wattle Range as well."

Walshaw awarded

Limestone Coast resident David Walshaw was presented with a Red Cross Distinguished Staff Award at the Limestone Coast Zone Conference held in Mount Gambier September 12.

Mr Walshaw recently retired from Mount Gambier Red Cross on June 30 as Regional manager of South East, Mid Murray and Riverland.

Unaware of who nominated him Mr Walshaw first heard about the nomination after receiving an email from Red Cross asking if he would be willing to accept the national award

Mr Walshaw is the only South Australian recipient of the award and has received an official medal, pin and framed citation to acknowledge his contribution.

The award recognises the dedication, service and leadership of Red Cross staff over a significant period of time at a local, regional, divisional or national level.

Having the choice to receive the award at either the Red Cross AGM in Adelaide or the locally held zone conference Mr Walshaw chose the latter.

"The vice patron Libby Furner organised it, it was nice to do it in the South East where the people who nominated you may be in the room.

"It was unexpected because we don't do these things for the awards.

"We do it because it's the right thing to do, you do it because that's your job.

"It's nice that somebody has observed that and seen the impact we've had on community."

Covering a large part of the state Mr Walshaw explained that each region has different needs.

"The South East is different to the Riverland so programs we put up there are different from down here."

"The Mid Murray is different because it's closer to Adelaide, the more remote you get from Adelaide the greater the social needs supports are."

Mr Walshaw's framed citation notes he has provided exceptional services beyond the call of duty, and that he embraces diversity and inclusion in the course of his responsibilities.

The citation lists several successful initiatives such as translating Covid-19 information for the migrant community and partnering with Kellogg's to enable access to breakfast products for vulnerable families.

Mr Walshaw has organised a supply of SIM cards and mobile phones for women fleeing domestic violence and he helped promote Share the Dignity program locally.

"There are lots of those sorts of programs and we deliver to Millicent.

"Kellogg's provide us with a wide range of breakfast products and people just ring us.

"When the bus comes down on Tuesday and Thursday we put it on the bus and deliver to their homes.

"We do the same with feminine hygiene products and more recently it's \log food.

"If people are struggling to feed themselves then the pets are suffering as well, for some people their pet is the only being there for them"

Mr Walshaw was pleased to receive the award that acknowledged his service to the organisation.

"They don't' give many of these out as I understand it, being a national award it comes under close scrutiny.

"You have to be nominated, it goes before a committee and a decision is made on all the evidence that is provided."

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Restoration rings in era

The historic Glencoe Woolshed holds many mysteries but maybe none more so than how an antique ships bell, engraved with the name Sylphide, ended up marking the beginning and the ending of shearing each day in the

Researchers believe the brass bell came from an 1852 German made wooden barque that sank off the New South Wales coast in 1877 after colliding with a steel framed paddle steamer, but how it came to be a part of the historic woolshed remains a mystery.

The most likely explanation is that the bell was installed by the Lindsay family who leased Glencoe Station between 1868 and 1882 as Samuel James Lindsay was a ship's captain.

Last year the National Trust Glencoe Woolshed (NTGW) committee approached Penola based blacksmith Bruce Kennewell to refurbish the bell and to design and create a new bracket to fix it permanently.

Mr Kennewell was fascinated by the history of the bell and undertook his own research to ensure the tools, techniques and design were sympathetic to the era it was created.

"I was doing as much research as I could before I started mucking around with it.

"It was a fascinating story and even the name of the ship, in that era, was a common

"Sylphide came from an operetta that was popular at the time and is French for sveltelike, a ballerina type.'

With around 30 years of blacksmithing experience Mr Kennewell has his own forge at home and spent hours considering how to hang the bell safely.

"The thing that interests me is the anvil I'm using to forge those pieces was made within the era of when the ship was built, or at least when it was at sea.

'I was looking at trying to find out how the bell would have been hung in the first place.

"I think it would have been housed with timber supports on both sides, in a little alcove on the focsle of the ship.

"They (NTGW) wanted to hang it on one of the wooden uprights in the middle of the shed so there was bit of engineering involved, because the bell itself was 25 kilo.

"If somebody was swinging on the lanyard ringing it at any point, it's got to be pretty solid.

Before refurbishing the brass bell had been painted red, and due to the practicalities of trying to remove it, the inside remains paint-

"It was hard to get inside to get it off and it also shows a bit of the history, who put the red paint on and when?"

Branch secretary Carol Grbich is delighted with the outcome and said

"Bruce has fixed up the bell and made it

"He's done a lovely job and has framed it so now sits on one of the posts and looks stun-

"It makes a hell of a noise."

To add to the mystery of the bell's journey to Glencoe is the legend of the cannon that was used before it.

"Before the bell arrived at the woolshed they used a cannon and we are not quite sure where it came from.

"It was fired at the beginning and the end of shearing and on the Queen's birthday.

"We think what happened was eventually a couple of guys started putting soil into the cannon and thought they would see if that went off.

"It actually blew the whole of the cannon apart and went in all directions in the area.

"People heard about it from miles away and a piece of it got stuck in the front of a house which has unfortunately now collapsed." Ms Grbich said.

"The club has held this annual event for many years and the last lunch in 2019 was a great success





Artist captures art lovers

An unusual portrait exhibition by Harrow artist Ron Penrose opened last Sunday at Karatta Wines and Art Gallery with over 40 people attending the family friendly event.

Less than four months ago Mr Penrose met with 15 people at the gallery taking photos and chatting to the potential artist's subjects to get to know them a little better.

Heading back to his Victorian studio Mr Penrose undertook an intense period of painting to ensure the portraits, painted in oils, were completed for Sunday's launch.

"He is a total inspiration as are a lot of other artists as well.

"Up until Covid things were going really well, until no more portraits.

"This has been a great opportunity to have sitters again, so many different faces" Mr Penrose said.

Motoring

i20 N is for the enjoyment

In motoring terms, the letter 'N' mostly stands for 'neutral', or 'going nowhere'.

In the case of the Hyundai i20 N, nothing could be farther from the truth.

The maker has been spruiking the compact as bringing the DNA of its World Rally champion to the street as a daily driver.

Powered by a 1.6-litre turbocharged direct injection petrol engine, mated with six-speed manual transmission, maximum power of 150 kW is enough to fire the hot hatch from zero to 100km/h in 6.7 seconds.

There's much to admire in comfort and convenience for this class of car.

Pitted against the Ford Fiesta ST, Volkswagen Polo GTI and Suzuki Swift Sport, it serves up an encyclopedic list of performance good-

The price of \$34,990, plus on-road costs, which recently went up by \$2000, is nothing to be sniffed at.

It can be had in five different colours: Polar White and Performance Blue, at no cost; or Metallic Sleek Silver, Mica Phantom Black and Mica Dragon Red, all \$495.

A black roof adds \$1000.

The rally inspired look is designed to match high performance by minimising drag and boosting power.

Up front, air duct and splitter look the part, while out back a rather ragged design is topped off by a pared back rally-inspired roof mounted twin-layer spoiler which looks more of an afterthought.

Hopefully, it makes up in aerodynamic efficiency.

A black radiator grille, based on a chequered flag, is dominated by the Hyundai badge and the letter N.

LED headlamps on both sides incorporate tick-shaped daytime running lights.

Fog lamps flank a second grille strip low down

Whiz-bang wheel design, featuring red brake callipers peeking out from behind five Y-spoke 18-inchers, put the finishing touches to the hot hatch.

Inside it's Ns all round, with letter-specific touches such as N sport leather-trim seats with integrated headrests, leather wrapped N steering wheel and gear knob, plus sporty N alloy pedals.

The iconic red steering wheel-mounted Rev Button chips in with a tempting finishing

Wheels pushed out to all four corners of the car offer up a spacious cabin, capable of carrying five grown-ups in relative comfort.

Front bucket seats offer ample support in recommended enthusiastic driving, while shoulder and leg room in the back can take all but the bulkiest footy front row at a push.

There's a multi-level boot with a movable floor, incorporating a fitted cargo net, in the upper position.

Drop the 60/40 rear backrests and there's a

Taking the floor out unveils a deep cubby in spite of there being a space-saver spare underneath.

The i20 N encompasses a plethora of computer-age automotive menus presented in twin 10.25-inch dashboard digital displays, offering instrument and entertainment info.

Included are worldwide track maps with lap times; personalised throttle response settings, exhaust note and stability control all accessed at the touch of two steering wheel-

Also on hand is a red button which calls up rev matching tech for optimised downshifts.

The instrument cluster has a range of dis-

On a more relaxing note, the car is fitted

with a Bose eight-speaker premium sound system.

A 1.6-litre turbo-petrol four-cylinder pumps out 150 kW and 275 Nm, matched with a six-speed manual gearbox and a mechanical limited-slip differential that drive the front

Hyundai's Smart Sense Advanced Drivers' Assistance System tops up an already comprehensive safety package with such things as Forward Collision Assist City/inter-urban/ pedestrian, Intelligent Speed Limit Assist, which warns when the speed limit has been exceeded; Lane Following Assist, which keeps the car centred between lane markings; and Blind Spot Collision Warning, an alert when a vehicle approaches the driver's blind spot.

Passive safety is in the hands of six airbags.

Fuel (regular unleaded) consumption of 6.9 litres per 100 kilometres is claimed by the maker on the combined urban/highway cycle.

On test the lively hatch recorded 10 litres per 100 kilometres and 4.7 litres per 100 kilometres respectively.

An N Power Sense Axle up front and Dual Coupled Torsion Beam Axle at the rear provide stiff ride and handling, which did not miss a bump on the ubiquitous uneven Aussie road

Trackwork is more to the hot hatch's liking. Steering is precise and direct thanks to

reduced steering gear ratio over the standard model, while the limited-slip diff, plus 215/40R18 Pirelli P-Zero tyres, developed specifically for the i20 N, has the car efficiently carving through corners.

High performance brakes with bigger front discs resist fading, produce consistent pedal feel and maximise heat endurance.

Hyundai has put the brake on sending the i20 N Down Under, with the order book full and wait times approaching two years, so the above chance for fun and games would appear


