Pioneer in profile

A stately bronze bust of John Riddoch - sculpted by the famous South Australian artist John Dowie AM, has been gifted to the Penola Cultural Association by Peter Rymill - great-grandson of Riddoch (1827-1901).

Peter originally commissioned the sculpture of his great grandfather in the 1990s, where it took pride of place at the Rymill Coonawarra cellar door complex for many years.

"Although the family sold the winery several years ago, I've been the custodian in the interim while I thought about how to best display the artwork again", Mr Rymill said.

"The Penola Cultural Association committee approached me a few months ago about another project, and it occurred to me that they could assist with rehousing the sculpture."

The bust has recently been relocated to the Penola Visitor Information Centre, where it can be viewed and enjoyed.

Chairperson of the Penola Cultural Association, Rick Paltridge said the committee was delighted to receive the artwork as Riddoch had great significance to the region.

"John Riddoch has played such a pivotal role in the formative years of Penola, Coonawarra and the greater Limestone Coast. We are honoured to be the new custodians of the bust, and we thank Peter very sincerely for bequeathing it to the community," Mr Paltridge said.

Though John Riddoch was born in Scotland in 1827, he and his family immigrated to Australia in 1852.

After being swept up in the Victorian gold rush, where he and his brother George sold provisions to gold miners, John relocated to Penola.

The Riddoch brothers purchased the 2,000-acre Yallum Park property from the Wells brothers in 1861; linking the family forever to the region. By 1880, the property grew to 35,000 acres and ran 50,000 sheep. It would soon triple in size to encompass the Glencoe estate from the Leake brothers.


According to the Penola Historical Collections (1981), "It was said at this time that their northern paddock was at Coonawarra while the southern paddock was at the present Mt. Gambier airport, with Glencoe the western boundary."

Riddoch's legacy lives on in the many buildings he commissioned across the region, but possibly his most outstanding achievement has been the original Coonawarra Fruit Colony where he released 1,000 acres of the 'Katnook' portion of Yallum Estate and had them surveyed into 10-acre blocks to be taken up by local settlers.

That endeavour would eventually become the renowned Coonawarra wine region.

"He was not only a pastoralist and philanthropist but took a great interest in state and local politics.

He was the first chairperson of the Penola District Council (c.1869), which held its first meetings in what is now the Penola, Victoria.

Road rage assault near Millicent

Police are investigating a road rage incident and assault near Millicent last Friday night.

Between 7.45pm and 8.15pm on Friday September 23, the victim was driving a white Toyota Hilux along the Princes Highway, between Mount Gambier and Millicent, when the driver of a small dark car attempted to force his vehicle off the road.

The victim took evasive action and drove through the pine trees near the southern Tantanoola intersection.

On Agricultural Bureau Drive, near Millicent, the Hilux was rammed by another vehicle, a grey utility, possibly a newer model Holden Colorado.

The victim was then assaulted by a number of unknown males and had his phone, wallet and car keys stolen.

He received hospital treatment for facial injuries.

Investigations are continuing to identify and locate the assailants.

Missing person

Likely late start to bushfire season

The upcoming bushfire season will likely start late, according to the South Australian CFS.

The Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) has called a third La Niña for the upcoming summer, which will likely mean above-average rainfall across the state for the upcoming months.

Jason Druwitt, Regional Commander for the CFS, said La Niña could indicate a late start to the season.

"It does not mean we will not end up with a fire season, but our fire season could be delayed," Mr Druwitt said.

"Depending on how much rain comes through, when it falls and when the La Niña pattern changes."

"Our traditional fire season starts in around about December, and that could go back into January or February.

"For us that will mean it is likely to see increase fuel loads, but we will be closely monitoring those, and see what the impacts are."

The previous season's La Niña did result in above-average rainfalls for most of the country, but not for the South East of South Australia. BOM has said they believe the South East region will see more rainfall this season, but Mr Druwitt said the CFS would be monitoring the situation closely.

"Our landscape was very dry last year, and as a result of that we saw those devastating fires across our South Eastern areas," he said.

"The Coles fire, the Wrattobully fire and the Crater Lakes fire were three of our main fires last year."

According to Mr Druwitt, it is essential the community does not become complacent this fire season, even if conditions are milder than in previous years.

"We would encourage everyone to start their normal preparation as the fire season starts to get closer.

"Even if there is information the fire season could be delayed or be a bit wetter, we are still asking our brigades to go through their normal preparation processes right now.

"We are doing our normal preparation, so we would like the public to follow and do their normal preparation as well."

A new Australian Fire Danger Rating System has been implemented nationwide since the last season. Mr Druwitt said community members will need to familiarise themselves with the new system and the steps ahead of the bushfire season.

"They will need to know where their bushfire safe place is, prepare their five-minute plan... and it is really important that they practise those things as well," he said.

Mr Druwitt said it was important ahead of the season to also recognise volunteers in the community that help keep everyone safe.

"It is amazing to understand we have members within our own communities who at the drop of a hat when their pager goes off will stop what their doing and go off and respond," he said.

"Whether it be through a fire, whether it be through a road accident, whether it is to help a member of the public in some other way, I just am continually amazed by their commitment."

"We do not want this to get out of control, we do not want the ACMA to take the licence away," Mr Walshaw said.

"The open invitation is still to the board, we are here. Engage with us, or at least some of us, to help break down some of these barriers that are stopping good community engagement.

"The next step for us is I am going to request with station management engage with a professional mediator, we have one here in the South East, to see if we can mediate our way through this."

A new date for the AGM has not yet been announced by the 5THE FM board at time of print.

Celebration of a top drop

The Coonawarra Wine Region is gearing up for a busy month ahead, as the Coonawarra Cabernet Celebrations Wine Festival returns this October.

And, with uninterrupted cross border travel, interstate visitors are expected to come in their droves to soak up the celebrations, having missed out on the event due to restrictions the past two years.

A highlight on the Limestone Coast's event calendar, the festival is designed to showcase and celebrate Coonawarra's signature variety, Cabernet Sauvignon, and boasts a program of over 60 events across five weeks, with no small number of Cabernets and other fantastic wines to be tasted as part of festivities.

The month-long festival, hosted by the Coonawarra Vignerons, kicks off this Saturday, October 1 with bespoke tastings and special events taking place at cellar doors and wineries across the region.

From high end wine dinners to vertical tastings, winery tours to masterclasses, exhibitions to workshops, the region will offer wine enthusiasts the opportunity to experience and discover the best of Coonawarra, and with October offering up five weekends, organisers have themed each one to appeal to a wide variety of tastes.

Heidi Guyett, Events & Marketing Manager of Coonawarra Vignerons said there will be plenty of opportunities for wine aficionados, foodies and families alike to explore and experience Coonawarra, whilst enjoying the world-class wines, country hospitality and sense of community.

"This year's program is as extensive as ever with over 60 food and wine experiences to be enjoyed. There'll be events where guests can sample vintages a decade old (- or older!), dine with winemakers and boutique winery owners, go behind the scenes in the winery, or taste wines that are yet to be officially released, all the while learning about the process and the passion that goes into Coonawarra's famed wines." Mrs Guyett said.

"We are particularly excited about the return of our cross-border neighbours. Victorians have always been among the most engaged and loyal audience for our region. They love coming to our events and we are seeing that they are as eager as ever to make up for lost time" said Mrs Guyett.

"Across the board we are seeing great demand for ticketed events. Unlike other large scale wine festivals, many events featured in the program tend to be very intimate in nature, which is half of the appeal. Visitors are almost guaranteed to spot the owner or winemaker floating around, be it pouring wines, talking to their products or sharing their passion for growing and winemaking in Coonawarra", Mrs Guyett added.

The first weekend will see the Coonawarra Cabernet Celebrations Golf Day and Family Fiesta kick off and the following weeks will see themes around blending wine and the marriage of Cabernet Sauvignon with other varieties, a weekend tribute to the original festival - which historically took place on one single weekend, along with an exclusive look at new

release wines - 'from barrel to glass', wrapping up with a 'showtime' theme on the weekend of the local Penola show.

"Coonawarra's wineries go to great lengths to make sure that there is a variety of offerings to suit a whole range of visitors. From lawn games to nature play, cooking classes, chocolate, cheese and wine tastings, as well as live music, there's so much to choose from! The hardest part really will be deciding where to go first!" Mrs Guyett said.

Leconfield Coonawarra has been involved in the festival since it's inception and will kick off their celebrations with a 'Great Day Out' on Saturday 1 October, offering visitors an afternoon of live music, food, wine and fun on the winery lawns.

Local duo Christy & Jason Wallace will be performing on the day and Cellar Door Manager Kerrie Marcus is looking forward to welcoming back the crowds for a relaxing afternoon - the perfect way to spend Saturday of the long weekend.

"It's always such a great event with a great atmosphere. We have such a loyal following of visitors that come back year after year. As the wine flows, so does the fun! We invite families to come along, pack a picnic rug or make

themselves at home at the tables & chairs provided" Mrs Marcus said.

Another of the feature events in the calendar is the Regional Cabernet Decade[nce] Tasting, which has long been a highlight in the festival program.

"This combined winery event brings together up to 15 producers and winemakers in one location to taste and compare wines 10 years and older along side current release Cabernets. Not all of our producers have cellar doors, so this is a great opportunity for them to be involved in the festival, and for guests to taste their wines and meet the faces behind them." Mrs Guyett said.

Tickets to the tasting are \$40pp and are available to purchase online, and interested parties are advised to book in quickly to avoid disappointment.

The Coonawarra Cabernet Celebrations Masterclass also returns as a feature event in the October program for the first time in 2 years and is already proving to be a highly sought after event. Hosted by the Coonawarra Vignerons together with Langton's, the Masterclass will showcase the 2019 Vintage with a lineup of 6 International Cabernets from regions such as Bordeaux, Napa Valley and

Hawkes Bay, alongside 6 of Coonawarra's own premium Langton's classified wines.

Acclaimed Coonawarra winemaker Sue Hodder of Wynns Coonawarra Estate will be leading the session alongside Ned Goodwin Master of Wine, and looks forward to presenting outstanding examples of the variety from around the world.

"The 2019 vintage has been heralded as 'exceptional' for the traditional Cabernet regions globally. This Masterclass will provide an opportunity to taste the versatility of this noble grape from noted wine makers from around the world." Ms. Hodder said.

For those venturing to the region, navigating your way around Coonawarra is a breeze with the region's cellar doors all scattered along one stretch of road, and a shuttle bus hop-on hop-off service is available each weekend of October to transport festival-goers to and from events.

The festival is made possible by the South Australian Tourism Commission through Events South Australia with funding made available through the Regional Events and Festival Program.

Concern at fire signs loss

Wattle Range Council will look into ways to support the Country Fire Service (CFS) in fire danger ratings following a decision by the service to stop using fire danger rating signs.

At a Council meeting earlier this month many elected members expressed their disappointment with the CFS decision to stop using the signs, as they believed to be well utilised by community members and tourists in staying aware of fire rating systems.

Wattle Range Council staff stated during the meeting that previous signage could not be repurposed and reused in other ways.

Cr Drew moved that Council request the Chief Executive Officer to devise a means of supporting the CFS in communication of the fire danger ratings to our community, which was seconded by Cr Duncliff and carried by a majority of council members.

There was extensive discussion at the meeting if Council should be involved in any type of fire communications, as it could confuse community members if any messaging differs to what the CFS publishes, and was a big responsibility for Council staff. It was decided at the meeting the communications would be basic, simply directing to official CFS channels for further information.

Cr Neagle then moved that Council write a letter to the CFS and the Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services, Joe Szakacs, to reconsider the removal and operation of the fire danger rating signs across the State which was seconded by Cr Dew and carried by the council.

Following the meeting, a spokesperson for the CFS said the change was backed by research and was unlikely to change at this stage.

“The CFS is not endorsing roadside signage as extensive local research found the public had little trust in the signage,” a CFS spokesperson said.

“Local councils and other stakeholders who are wanting to have the signage out can do so at their own cost and maintenance.

“Information on the forecasted fire danger

ratings are published on the CFS website four days in advance, and those without internet access can call the information hotline on 1800 362 361.”



Pain at the pump expected with fuel prices set to rise

Fuel prices are set to head back up in the coming weeks as the six-month fuel excise cut comes to an end.

Back in March, the then Federal Liberal Government announced it would halve the fuel excise for six months to combat rising fuel prices.

That cut was set to expire on Thursday, September 29, with experts not expecting the current Federal Government to announce an extension.

RAA senior manager mobility and automotive policy and fuel spokesperson Mark Borlace said consumers should not expect to see prices go back up immediately.

Mr Borlace said the excise is paid when it leaves the terminal gate, not when it is sold at the bowser.

"We don't expect [service stations] to have a 25 cent increase on the day and we don't expect it probably for a week or two," he said.

"They've got cheap fuel in the tanks, they shouldn't be living on the ignorance of people thinking it's just gone up 25 cents in a day.

"Depending on how quickly each service station sells it, if one sells all their fuel within a week, in a week they're going to have the dear fuel back in their tanks."

He said he expects regional towns to get a little bit more time, predicting up to three weeks before all service stations in town return to pre-cut prices.

"We don't think it'll be dramatic and we don't think it'll be uniform, but probably by two or three weeks it will have flowed through the whole gate," he said.

"Within a fortnight, you'd expect to see

the base prices being around \$1.80 or \$1.90.

"They've [servos] had notice of this for six months, they know that the price is going to come up, so they've had time to strategise what they're going to do with it."

While consumers can expect to see fuel prices eventually go up, Mr Borlace said it

might not stay that way in the medium-term.

"It'll be a bit of a hit, probably the equivalent of \$15 it adds to a typical car fill up," he said.

"The only good news is we've had a slow trending down of crude oil prices over the last five months - in fact, it has dropped \$20

in the last month.

"The medium term, the world price spike will continue to trend down slowly."

Mr Borlace advised people to continue using apps to compare fuel prices near them to find the cheapest option to save money where possible.

Jeep Grand hits the peak

Jeep has brought back an extra row of seats to its Grand Cherokee large sports utility vehicle range, turning it into a full seven-seat SUV.

While at it, the maker has boosted its iconic off-roader with more technology.

The replacement for the big five-seater, the long wheelbase L comes in three versions, beginning with the Grand Cherokee L Night Eagle, selling for \$82,250, plus on-roads, then the mid-range L Limited (\$87,950) and the L Summit Reserve (\$115,450).

The flagship Summit Reserve included Palermo quilted leather, 21-inch wheels, a McIntosh premium sound system, front-seat ventilation and massaging, four-zone climate control and air suspension, while a \$5500 Advanced Technology Group, with head-up display, wireless phone charging, night vision camera and front interactive passenger display, was added, taking the price to more than \$120,000, before on-road costs.

A new-generation five-seat model – with the same technology and styling as the seven-seat L – will follow to Australia later this year, with the option of 4xe plug-in hybrid power.

For a vehicle so big, at more than five metres long, the Grand Cherokee L Summit is well proportioned – width more than two metres, yet height well under two metres – gives the SUV a bold yet sleek aerodynamic coupe character.

The front consists of an upper metallic grille with Jeep's trademark seven slots flanked by LED headlamps.

Below is a full grille-width air vent incorporating LED daytime running lights.

From the rear, the SUV belies its bulk with simple horizontal lines incorporating wrap-around tail lights and twin alloy tipped exhaust pipes.

Side on, 21-inch polished painted alloy wheels, a standard fitment on Summit, support a sporty street presence.

The increase in the horizontal exterior allows for a boost to the wheelbase and cabin space in general, something not lost on occupants aboard the test vehicle.

In a first for Jeep, the Grand Cherokee L boasts Uberesque seating for a driver and six passengers in space and comfort.

All three rows are easily accessed, even the power-operated third row, with the second

row tumbling well out of the way, leaving the back to weigh in with adult leg room.

Carry-on bits and pieces find a home in a range of storage spaces, including a deep box in the centre console and bottle holders in the centre and doors all round.

Rear passengers have the advantage of retractable blinds, just in time for summer heat-wave predictions.

Luggage is not left behind in the storage stakes, with 487 litres available with all three rows in use, leading up to a cavernous 2395 litres with the two sets of rear seatbacks folded flat.

There's a cabin-wide cubby under the floor where the jack is stored.

A state-of-the-art McIntosh audio is now offered for the first time in a full-size SUV.

It is made up of a 17-channel amplifier producing up to 950 Watts of power through 19 custom-made speakers, including a 10-inch sub-woofer.

Apple CarPlay wireless support means an iPhone can be connected without having to plug it into the vehicle.

The system brings contacts, audio apps, Apple Maps and more on board, all through the Uconnect system.

A 10.25-inch digital instrument cluster

looks after sat nav, along with mechanical features such as tyre pressure monitoring and driving aids.

There's a roof-mounted rear facing 'kid cam' camera that will police questionable behaviour in the back two rows.

It even has a zoom mode.

All models are powered by the tried-and-tested 3.6 litre Pentastar naturally aspirated V6 engine, delivering 210 kW of peak power and 344 Nm of maximum torque to all four wheels through an eight-speed automatic transmission.

The flagship Summit adds a more advanced four-wheel-drive system with a low-range transfer case.

Top-shelf safety features take the Grand Cherokee L Summit to new heights.

These include adaptive cruise control with stop/go, full speed collision warning with autonomous braking and pedestrian and cyclist detection.

Then there's blind spot monitoring, rear cross-traffic alert and active lane management.

All these use a selection of loud warning beeps at times hard to pinpoint the source of the potential trouble, while driving assistance, such as active lane management, can

be over-intrusive.

At on-road cruising speeds the engine is refined and powerful.

However, intrusive wind noise is a bit of a blow and the expansive exterior mirror stands out as a blind spot for the driver on negotiating such obstacles as roundabout kerbing.

Fuel consumption is a downer – it's premium unleaded petrol - which nudged over 14 litres per 100 kilometres in city and suburban work.

This was trimmed to 12 litres per 100 kilometres on a motorway run.

The Summit boasts ground clearance of up to 276 mm, while higher levels of articulation work to keep all four tyres on the ground to maintain stability.

Off road, Jeep 4x4 systems ensure the right tyre has traction when needed.

Precision steering and optimal wheelbases enable all L models to negotiate tight spots and manoeuvre around rocks.

As for wading, high air intakes and special water sealing, combined with the Jeep Quadra-Lift suspension, can take the vehicles through up to 610 mm of water.

The Grand Cherokee L Summit is sold by Jeep on the pretext of its size and advanced technology.

Determined to include as many women sailors as possible, the regatta organisers made several Elliot 7 keelboats available for hire, with try-outs prior to the event, including the morning of Saturday, September 24, for crews - including Port McDonnell - who can not bring their boats from other places.

Competitors range from their teens to 70s and include several Sydney-Hobart and Melbourne-Hobart competitors, with others who have won national championships in smaller boats.

"Make no mistake, women sailors are seriously focused and competitive on the water," 2019 Sydney-Hobart sailor Mary Ann Harvey, skipper of School's Out, said.

"On shore, we're quite different from the men.

"Off-the-water time is for mentoring and exchanging ideas, making new friends, great conversations and a lot of laughter."

SA Cruising Yacht Club will host the regatta, partnering with the Royal South Australian Yacht Club and Port Adelaide Sailing Club in event operations.

Robe sailor Sharon Holmes will skipper a mixed crew, using her experience from sailing in Robe, Rivoli Bay and Port MacDonnell.

"Dad and Mum built a yacht (40 foot fibreglass spray) in our backyard because Dad always dreamt of living aboard, which they did, eventually, and I spent uni holidays with them," Holmes said.

"It was very suburban, my brother rowed the dinghy ashore before walking to Pittwater High school each day and we all worked in a boat factory then.

"But I really started to learn to sail at Port MacDonnell, crewing for club life member, Neil Dickins."

From there Holmes sailed dinghies at the Rivoli Bay Sailing Club at Southend.

"I loved the thrill of being on trapeze and surfing down waves with the spin-naker flying," she said.

"After my son was born I lost my nerve, but he has now grown up and left home.

"I am 60 years old now and getting back into it.

"During the past couple of years I have mostly been sailing Pacers at Robe, Port MacDonnell and Rivoli Bay Sailing Club.

"I'm very excited to sail in the first all-women's regatta."

Holmes said while sailing is still mostly male-dominated, more women are enjoying the thrills involved.

"I notice that women really find their strength and confidence when there aren't any men on board," she said.

"Although I have enjoyed all my sailing, including crewing and skippering with men and women."

"To start at the back of the field with all the quick drivers helps you set a good pace."

Sunday's long course saw drivers complete six 66km laps through the Tantanoola Pine Forest.

Gartner said he had to be careful on the first couple of laps on Sunday as his truck did not have the same levels of grip as the buggies.

"Once the tracks are made and it starts getting rough, that's when the truck gets better," he said.

"The truck was very strong but unfortunately we lost a bit of time in the middle of the race."

"If we had kept a little stronger in the mid-part of the race, we may have been close (to first)."

Gartner finished one minute and 57 seconds behind Danny Brown and George Apted, who claimed the outright victory after a strong

performance on Sunday.

Gartner was happy with how the event panned out after his truck was plagued with reliability issues at the Finke Desert Race earlier in the year.

"After having a lot of trouble with the truck earlier in the season, it is now really strong," he said.

Gartner said it was great to have an off-road event back in the South East.

"We do travel a long way because we like to travel the ARB Australian Off-road Championship rounds, so this being an ARB major round is good," he said.

"It is 45 minutes from home, the logistics are a lot easier and you can go home in your own bed, so it has been fantastic."

With the sun shining down on Millicent over the weekend, the track conditions were ideal for racing and Gartner said it was the best Pines Enduro in terms of conditions.

Hungry for record

Limestone Coast motorcycle racer Dallas Skeer will have a couple of points to prove when he tackles the Master of Mac Park this weekend.

Skeer will bring a pair of 600cc R6 Yamahas to the meeting and hope to reclaim his lap record in that class.

He will also look to claim the 600cc category, while pushing as hard as possible in the Master of Mac Park feature race.

It will be a big call to achieve either one of those feats, as Skeer has had little time on his bikes this Australian Superbike Series season.

Accident damage and electrical gremlins have thwarted his season, but he seems to be back on track after a recent top-three finish at the fast Phillip Island track in the Victorian Championships.

Skeer will bring a spare bike, set up to jump out of the corners, which he said should suit the McNamara Park track.

"I have ridden it there before," he said.

"It is set up a bit different the way the motor is tuned, which is probably more suited to Mac Park.

"It seems to have a lot more power down bottom.

"Being a bit tighter, you don't need the legs.

"It will be interesting to see how it goes."

However, Skeer does not expect to be able to keep pace with the likes of Arthur Sissis, who rides a Superbike and currently sits top five in the ASBK championship.

"The straight is not that long and it is rough so the Superbikes can't use the power they have," Skeer said.

"On a 600 I can hold it flat but they will pull away a bit.

"Arthur will be hard to beat on a 600.

"I would love to get a Superbike there to see how I go against him – I'm good mates with him.

"But he is a natural, he is top five in ASBK, so I don't expect to beat him in the Master."

As for the lap record, Skeer said it would take a big effort to reclaim that.

Tye Lynch took the lap record from Skeer at the Easter meeting, but by just 200th of a second.

"It will have to be a quick time and the weather will have to be perfect," Skeer said.

"Tye Lynch is second in the ASBK at the moment and his time is a 9.8 – I had a 10 flat.

"You are already on the limit and have to find that little bit in each corner.

"I have to be comfortable on the bike before I start pushing at that pace – that is national pace."

Overall Skeer said he is keen to hit the track and get some more racing under his

belt, which will be the ideal preparation for the next ASBK round at Phillip Island.

"I am looking forward to it," he said.

"It is a club race, a more chilled weekend.

"It will be good to get back to the roots, do some racing and enjoy it.

"I will just put my head down and see what I can do."

Millicent club pair for state

Aaron Emonson will travel to Queensland on September 28 and play through to October 6.


