Finding their voice

Penola and Coonawarra is bringing back the ratepayers association after demand from the local community.

At prior gathering of interested people in September, community members decided an official Penola and Coonawarra Ratepayers and Residents Association to help represent their interest in the Wattle Range Council.

Penola previously had a ratepayers association after the amalgamation of the Penola and Coonawarra Councils, that represented the

towns on key issues such as the Penola bypass. But the group has been in recess for a number of years.

Local Penola resident Jodi Strother helped organise the initial gathering and will be a member of the group after its first official meeting this week.

"There has been a lot of suggestions by the next generation coming through that we need a group to fight for our town, because we do not always feel we are being looked after," Ms Strother said. "The consensus is that we need to start questioning what is going on in our town. We want to work with Council to help get better outcomes for Penola and Coonawarra."

Ms Strother said town infrastructure and road maintenance were key concerns for the group.

"You tell Council about it, and they basically tell you it is on the list," she said.

"They [Wattle Range Council] have a set policy on how they go around and assess roads, and it seems like there is a significant weather

"The consensus is that we need to start event, there is no flexibility to go and fix it."

The group is encouraging all interested community members to be a part of the association, especially renters who Ms Strother said can sometimes be overlooked as they do not pay rates.

"There are people that live in the town and have lived here for a long time, that are in rentals, and they are just as valuable as anybody who owns land," she said.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 10 October at the Royal Oak Penola from 6pm.

Local tourism is on the rise, with one operator looking to capitalise on increased demand in the Coonawarra area.

Coonawarra Bush Holiday Park owner Steven Moignard is looking to add more tents to his business following a surge in demand for glamping.

Mr Moignard said he has needed to turn people away on long weekends or during holiday periods as spaces fill up very quickly.

"It's cost-effective for us to expand," he said.

"That means a lot more solar capacity here, a lot more waste water infrastructure, and a lot more camp kitchen and bathrooms.'

A lot of this demand has come on the back of increased tourism as people becoming more confident in travelling after Covid restrictions started easing.

Mr Moignard said he used to get a lot of international visitors and backpackers, but that has changed in recent years. "I think we're beginning to see a bit of

a return to what 2019 was," he said.

"After 2019, obviously all your internationals and backpackers dropped off altogether and we had a lot more South Australian visitation over the following two years

"Overall visitation was down, or at least the growth was curbed because of all the lockdowns and restrictions."

He said he believes the park is back on the growth trajectory with more local and Victorian visitors, but he could not predict what the coming holiday season will hold.

"Most people don't book for glamping hugely far in advance," he said.

"You get less notice now of what the season is going to be like.

"We've had such an up and down period, you count your blessings even to still be in business.

The prize for the winner was \$5000 and a study tour which is to be arranged at a later date.


"I encourage young people to become involved their local show and community. This program is a wonderful experience and can open up alot of avenues," Courtney said.

Childcare plans moving forward

The Kingston District Council remains confident that the Australian Labor Government will make good its pre-election commitment of \$1.8m for a new childcare facility in the upcoming federal budget, set to be handed down on 25 October 2022

Despite a bi-partisan commitment prior to the federal election this year, in recent correspondence to the Council, Dr Anne Aly MP, Minister for Early Childhood Education has indicated that the commitment must wait for approval in the federal budget.

Chief Executive Officer Nat Traeger said she was disappointed in the delay but remained hopeful that the Labor government would not turn its back on the Kingston community at the eleventh hour.

"A promise is a promise, we were not expecting that promise to turn to a process", she said.

Despite the delay, the Council, in partnership with its Kingston Early Learning & Childcare Services Working Group (KELCS) have partnered with Department for Education (DfE) Officers

(infrastructure team) to progress discus-sions about a new purpose-built early learning and childcare centre on the grounds of the Kingston Community School.

In an update report to Council last week, Mayor Kay Rasheed said "the partnership has yielded some significant progress with the DfE funding an architect to develop spatial plans for the purposes of cost estimates for a capital build.

"These plans are for the express purpose of defining proposed places and square metre area for costing. Also included in the planning scope is a proposed site plan, which indicates where the architect, in consultation with the working group, has determined the most appropriate site within the grounds of the Kingston Community School."

Ms Traeger, who is part of a small working group which includes the Principal of the Kingston Community School, Director Kingston Early Learning Centre, KELCS Chair (plus two KELCS representatives) have been regularly meeting with relevant DfE representatives

"I am very appreciative of the DfE coming to the table and partnering equally with our community representatives to see significant progress".

"Whilst the letter from Dr Anne Aly does not make good the promise of \$1.8m towards the capital build, Council and the community have every reason to feel confident due to the state government having a "proceed with confidence" attitude in its partnership with Council and KELCS.'

Other than awaiting the announcement of the Federal Labor Government's budget, the next steps include a combined workshop to be facilitated by an independent professional regarding a governance model to be held October/November as well as the advancement of the spatial design and site plans for detailed design and costing.



"Today we re-enact the tradition of asking God to bless all those involved in the fishing industry, all those that are there to help and feed us and sustain us." Fr Sulzberger said.

Readings were also undertaken by Yvonne Sargeant from the Church of St Brigid's and Hazel Watson of St Matthews Uniting Church.

Following the foreshore service around hundred people gathered on the town's jetty while skippers, deckhands and their families ventured out to their boats.

The local boats circled the bay and passed close by the jetty to mark the beginning of a safe season while being blessed by Fr Sulzberger.

Once the fleet's blessings were completed the traditional throwing of the cross into the ocean took place.

Two young girls, Matlida Lush and Rose Fry, registered to brave the cold waters of Rivoli Bay.

Swimming for a cross thrown in by Fr Sulzberger as part of the ceremony to pray for a safe year ahead for fishermen.

In a close competition Rose retrieved the cross only inches ahead of Matilda.

Maritime construction crew are currently undertaking large scale maintenance work on the jetty but worked with organisers to allow access to the public and set up a ladder for the registered swimmers.

Biosecurity passes tests

The National Farmers' Federation (NFF) welcomed the completion of a review which found Australia's biosecurity system to be strong and sound.

However, the organisation also stated they want no time wasted to address the 14 previously identified recommendations.

In the four-week project, the Joint Interagency Taskforce: Exotic Animal Disease (EAD) Preparedness stress tested the complex biosecurity system through a cross jurisdiction and industry lens to ensure a coordinated national approach in the event of a Foot and Mouth or Lumpy Skin Disease incursion. NFF President Fiona Simson said ensuring farmers, industry bodies and all jurisdictions were working from the same set guidelines was imperative in the face of a biosecurity incident.

"We don't want a messy situation like we had through the COVID-19 pandemic with people stuck at borders and unsure what rules apply from state to state," Ms Simson said.

"Borders don't matter when it comes to feeding people in Australia.

For example, our farmers in Western Australia are feeding people on the east coast and vice versa, so a seamless and well communicated approach is important, not only to protect our animals and environment, but to ensure if a situation arises, the impact to our food supply chain is minimised."

While the Taskforce responsible for the test confirmed Australia's strength in biosecurity, it also pointed out improvements which could be made including strengthening communications and cross-border cooperation and ensuring the system is up to date with technology.

"While it's critical to have the best plans in place, we have recently seen with Varroa Mite how incursions put extreme strain on our resources," Ms Simson said. "The 14 recommendations must be urgently actioned, funding remains farmers' primary concern and they are expecting the government to deliver on its pre-election commitment for sustainable, long-term biosecurity funding in next month's Federal Budget."

The NFF welcomed the Taskforce's continued work on the country's biosecurity system, including a live simulation of an FMD scenario sometime next year.

The NFF was one of eight industry partners involved in the Taskforce's National Livestock Stand Still Discussion Exercise as part of the review.

Kona N covers new ground

Following the performance upgrade to the i30 and i20, the most recent model to get a booster is the most unlikely – the Kona sports utility vehicle.

Lifted from the underpinnings of the Hyundai i30 hatchback, it's hard to fit it into the pantheon.

For a start, there's no all-wheel drive, so it is a high-riding hot hatch rather than an SUV.

Front-wheel drive only has helped keep the weight down, enabling a claim by the maker of a zero-to-100km/h figure of 5.5 seconds, just a tenth slower than the i30 N hatch.

Two models have come to Australia – Kona N and Kona N Premium – priced from \$48,000 and \$51,000, plus on-road costs respectively.

Metallic paint adds \$595 and matte paint \$1000.

Both are powered by a 2.0-litre turbo-petrol four-cylinder engine, mated with an eight-speed dual-clutch transmission, serving up 206 kW and 392 Nm through the front wheels.

The standard Atlas White Kona N test car turned heads more than once.

The front followed the Hyundai N tradition with the black grille, following the rally team, being based on a chequered flag.

The Hyundai 'H' and performance 'N' were in there for good measure.

Below is another grille, less of a stand-out, while an LED headlamp set-up features on either side capped by strips of LED daytime running lights.

The rear roofline incorporates a discrete spoiler, while the dominating features are twin trumpet-tipped exhausts totally in keeping with the brassy note emanating from them when the engine is fired up.

In profile, the features probably responsible for the onlooker interest mentioned above, are unique 19-inch alloy wheels shod with Pirelli P Zero HN tyres, playing host to bright red brake callipers.

All these captivating aspects of the standard Atlas White Kona N test car exterior were linked by a fine red line skirting the lower body.

The Kona N inside is far from basic.

Sports seats, with a nice line in fabric and contrasting stitching, are bucket-style up front, while the second row can take three grown-ups.

Leg room there is average to skinny depending on the position of the front occupants.

Fancy suede/leather coverings are left to the Premium model.

The steering wheel is the exception, with leather wrapping giving the driver a touch of luxury.

The Kona N Premium also weighs in with auto-dimming rear-view mirror, head-up display, front parking sensors, powered, heated and ventilated front seats, heated steering

wheel, glass sunroof and ambient lighting.

The driver has the benefit of a new 10.25inch digital instrument cluster, while another 10.25-inch display screen in the central dashboard supplies information on vehicle systems and wired Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, plus factory fitted satellite navigation.

Quality audio is served up with DAB+ digital radio being blessed with an eight-speaker harman/kardon sound system.

Wireless phone charging caps off the line-up.

Power is provided by a 2.0-litre turbopetrol four-cylinder engine putting power to ground, via an eight-speed double clutch automatic transmission, to ground through the front wheels.

Standard equipment includes autonomous emergency braking with detection of the pres-

ence of pedestrian or cyclist, adaptive cruise control, blind spot warning, lane keep and lane follow assist, rear cross-traffic alert and auto high beam.

Driving the Kona N was full of ups and downs.

The stiff suspension picking up every blemish in the road, even in Normal drive mode.

The racetrack would be more welcoming. Peak power is on tap between 5500 and 6000 rpm, with torque chiming in from 2100 to 4700 revs.

Gear changes are some of the smoothest, with just a slight nudge between cogs.

Hyundai puts the combined urban/highway fuel (premium unleaded) consumption at 9 litres per 100 kilometres.

The test car came up with more than 11 litres per 100 kilometres in town and 5.9

se on the motorway.

Everything worked a treat while going forward but in reverse, the vehicle tended to stutter when setting off on an incline.

Not the best when backing out of the drive-way.

Exhaust performance ranges from producing from a peaceful background noise when cruising to a gravelly chorus when called on to get a move on.

'Grin Shift' is hard to take seriously.

Brought into action by the press of a red button on the steering wheel, the throttle response and gear shifts are speeded up for 20 seconds with an accompanying crackle and pop of the engine.

The same sound is on tap all the time in the programmable N Sport+ mode.

The claim to SUV status of the Kona N was

put to rest by the lack of luggage room in the back.

Boot space is piddling at 361 litres with rear seatbacks raised.


A reasonably flat floor, taking 1143 litres, is released when they are folded.


Finally, a trap for the unwary when the tailgate is opened, doubling as shelter from hot sun or rain.

However, in the wet a hollow where the number plate is attached fills with water, which cascades down on the owner when they close the door – a serious design fault.

Somebody said the Kona N looked like a white basketball boot.

However, the Hyundai SUV's sporting pretensions are on the other foot although there are occasions when the hot hatch(ness) sneaks through.

Sun shines on anglers

A big weekend of fishing along the southeast was enjoyed by lots of anglers, both on the boats and land based.

The weather played the game right across the long weekend and I know of plenty of fish caught.

The offshore fishing over the weekend was arguably as good as we have seen.

It did not appear to matter if you were fishing over the shelf or in closer, the fish were on. While the weather was near perfect, plenty

of anglers made the trip to the shelf.

I have seen all the pictures and there were bigger waves in the Blue Lake and the fish certainly played the game.

I saw some nice hauls of hapuka, school shark, blue eye and a few pink ling.

The boaties who fished in a bit closer found excellent shark fishing, both gummy and school shark over 20kg, some ripper red snapper, blue morwong, flathead and snapper.

There did not seem to be any secret depth fishing better than another, but anywhere from 40 metres through to the shelf was productive.

In a bit closer along the coast we saw some lovely shark in that 5-15m zone and spread out too, from Green Point all the way through to Blackfellows Caves and Carpenter Rocks.

Graeme and Carly Ploenges managed a number of solid gummies down that way, definitely making the most of the weather.

The surf fishos made good use of their time and hit some spots that have not had much attention lately.

A big group of lads headed up to the Coorong for their first run of the year and found no shortage of gummy sharks.

I am not sure on the exact location, but it was a fair way up.

I am also not sure of how many gummies were caught, but there were a few hours worth of filleting.

There has been a bit of action locally this week, with the majority salmon news and everything from salmon trout to 2kg+ jack salmon have been reeled in.

The best areas have been the Beachport salmon hole, Canunda NP and Carpenter Rocks, although there have also been plenty through back towards the river mouth.

The size down that way is generally a bit bigger than our side of the mouth, and this weekend has proved no different.

A couple of kilo was the average from the river mouth through to Bridgewater and I also saw a couple of gummies from that way too.

If the walk over the hill does not put you off, the fishing is very good.

The garfish this week have been in great numbers again.

They are spread out, they are big and they are hungry.

I have heard of some great catches from all over the place such as Livingstons, Pelican Point, Blackfellows Caves and Cape Douglas just to name a few.

There has been a good mix of boaties and waders, so whichever is your style, it will not matter because they are both working.

As per usual there is plenty of by-catch again.

I am hearing of a lot of silver trevally and mullet, and there is even the odd gents-steal-

The fish I have seen this week have been perfect eaters, from 35cm through to 45cm, but the odd bigger 50cm+ are lurking around and don't you know it when you hook one of those.

The freshwater fishing in Rocklands Reservoir is picking up nicely and in coming years, don't be surprised when we have a monster write up in each fishing report about this place.

The stocking program that has been going on over there in the last three or four years is starting to produce some nice fish and as those fish mature, it will be a fishing destination much like Lake Eildon.

The cod are anywhere from 35cm to 70cm, the yellowbelly are up to 50cm and there are also some stonking bass, not to mention the trout, redfin and carp that call the lake home.

Boat and land-based anglers are all a good shot at landing some excellent fish, and they are getting bigger every day.

The Glenelg River, despite its very muddy and fast flowing appearance has actually been producing some top quality bream and perch.

There have been some nice bream caught up as high as Sapling Creek on whitebait and prawns and that success has flowed down as far as Sandy Waterholes.

The bulk of the news though has still been from the bridge area and down, on a mixture of baits and lures.

ing whiting about in the shallows and they are always a welcome one.

Speaking of whiting, there have been some rippers caught.

It is only early, but how good is that first feed of whiting for the season.

There are no surprises as to why they are a favourite, their fighting ability is excellent, the distribution and fact you can catch them land based or out of the boat is a big tick and finally their table quality.

I think I am still yet to meet anyone who is not a whiting fan.

They have been spread right along the coast this week.

Good catches have come from Cape Jaffa and Beachport, right through the Limestone Coast to Carpenter Rocks, Nene Valley, Hutt Bay and inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater.

The baits doing the damage have been prawn, whitebait and live podworm, while the lure of choice has been the three-inch powerbait nemesis in cappuccino colour, plus the new gulp four-inch sandworms in a camo colour.

Small 35-50mm diving hardbodies have been getting the runs on the board for the perch fishos, with lots of those 35-45cm fish caught along the edges of the mud lake.

Mulloway news has been light on again, but there hvae been a few to 90cm caught over the weekend, just not in big numbers.

There is more rain forecast for this weekend, so no doubt more water to come down.

The forecast for the coming weekend is a bit iffy for the offshore guys, but it is likely it should be good enough for just about everything else.

Until next week, safe fishing.
