Help for health

Local residents undertook a mental health first aid course this week organised by the Coonawarra Running Festival.

The workshops run by Breakthrough Mental Health Research Foundation helped educate the participants with mental health information, symptoms and how to help those suffering from its impacts.

Workshop educators Sharn Elder and Cecilia Ronson said the course had been well re-

ceived by the participants.

"We have had amazing people attend, they are highly engaged. They want to be engaged, they want to make a change, they want to be a part of a change, they want to help people," Ms Elder said.

"The feedback has been phenomenal, that we have helped them understand

"You can see in the group they want a cultural change," Ms Ronson said.

"The workshop is aimed to help equip par-

ticipants with some basic mental health skills and knowledge, as well as taking away the stigma.

"This course does not make them experts, it does not make them counsellors, it will give them the tools to be able to have those conversations and take it to that next level," Ms Elder said.

"They are also able to identify some signs and symptoms [of poor mental health] that they would not have before."

"Knowing more about mental illness and

mental health is important. We give awareness of how common things are, and you see the eyes have a lightbulb moments," Ms Ronson said.

"We talk about vocabulary and how it is changing."

Breakthrough Mental Health Research Foundation are one of the beneficiaries of the Coonawarra Running Festival and have been running the workshops to thank the community.

Celebrated

Rural women are being celebrated this week, with Saturday marking International Day of Rural Women.

As they are celebrated across the world this week, South Australian women are being reminded to apply for the 2023 Agrifutures South Australian Rural Women's Award.

International Day of Rural Women is on Saturday, October 15, highlighting the theme of 'Rural Women Cultivating Good Food for All'.

The Government of South Australia, through the department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA), supports initiatives that acknowledge the essential role women play, and their influence, in rural industries, businesses and communities.

This includes the Women Together Learning (WoTL) Stepping into Leadership program specifically aimed at women in agriculture and agribusiness.

The Rural Women's Award is Australia's leading award empowering and celebrating the inclusive and courageous leadership of women involved in Australia's rural and emerging industries, businesses and communities.

Each state and territory winner will receive a \$15,000 Westpac grant for their project, access to professional development opportunities and the alumni network. The winner then goes on to represent South Australia in the National Awards in Canberra, with the national winner receiving a further \$20,000 grant and the runner up \$15,000.

The 2022 South Australian winner, Robyn Verrall, from Keith in South Australia's South-East, was recognised for her work to reduce food insecurity and increase food affordability in rural, regional and First Nations communities in South Australia and the Northern Territory.

Complementing the Rural Women's Award is the Rural Women's Acceleration Grant, providing a learning and development bursary of up to \$7,000 to enable rural women to bring their idea, cause or vision to life that benefits rural and regional communities or businesses in Australia.

Applications for the Rural Women's Award and Acceleration Grant close on Wednesday 19 October 2022.

“Anne-Marie Williams has been running the Coonawarra Running Festival and involved in the wellbeing program,” Ms Elder said.

She has been heavily trying to push that mental health focus and improvement so I think that is absolutely key and driven most of it.

“We are beneficiaries for that [the Coonawarra Running Festival] and our way to give back to them was to provide these courses as well.

“Mental health and mental illness within rural communities is not where it needs to be.

“This area is so engaged in that and wants to build that.”

Ms Elder hoped those who attended the workshops will be able to share their experiences and new knowledge with the greater community.

“The awareness and support in regional areas is not where it needs to be,” she said.

“There has been a lot of death by suicide recently, including the Limestone Coast, and I

think it has opened people up to want to support more.

“We hope they will be able to help make positive changes in their communities and increase awareness after their time with us.”

Quilters sew generous

The local quilting community has once again come together and generously made and donated over 30 handmade quilts for the Geltwood Festival's Quilts for a Cause initiative.

Members of the Geltwood Festival committee displayed the quilts in the Millicent Visitor Information Centre earlier this month to take advantage of the South Australia and Victoria long weekend.

Quilts for a Cause has long been a part of the annual Geltwood Festival with both events suffering due to Covid-19 forcing cancellation of the 2020 and 2021 festivals.

SA Cancer Council were the last recipients of the generous donations in 2019 and once again will be receiving the quilts later this year.

Event co-ordinator Kathy Patten said

"We have 21 quilts hanging, with 26 on display all together in the visitor information centre.

"I have at least another 10 that the craft ladies and craft groups have donated and they will all be delivered to the SA Cancer Council

in Adelaide for use in their lodges.

"Anymore than 30 it starts to get too hard to transport them, and they have to store them at the other end before they can use them.

"They use them on the bed in the lodges or

they can choose to raffle one, they also let the cancer patients take them home if they feel they want to.

"Once we pass them on it's up to them whether they use them, donate them further

or whatever they choose."

The majority of this years quilts have been donated via Rendelsham, Hatherleigh and the Live n' Learn Craft Groups, with individuals also donating to the cause.

Over 80 people attended the official opening of the Mount Burr CFS station and Wattle Range Group Award Presentation Ceremony on Sunday.

Dignitaries from across the state were in attendance with CFS volunteer brigades families and friends.

Chief Officer of CFS Brett Loughlin said "We don't get the opportunity to celebrate things very often.

"We had the reunion at Naracoorte and the opening of the Coonawarra station, presenting National Emergency medals, National Medals and CFS Service Medals.

"Representing hundreds of years of service to members of the brigades.

"This new facility was built in 2020 but because of Covid we haven't been able to formally open it.

"Kalangadoo received a brand new 34 appliance which is a \$410,000 state of the art 4WD firefighting vehicle.

"It's a huge investment in our local communities and shows the professional world class service the CFS provides.

"We've got the brand new Glencoe truck being handed over today, Mount Burr's new truck as well, and the fantastic facility at Mount Burr and medal presentations.

"We have Mike Kemp who is receiving a 50 year medal which is a significant honour.

"Mike's previously been awarded the Australian Fire Service medal, he's a stalwart.

"A number of others are receiving national emergency medals, national medals and CFS service medals so there is a lot on the agenda.

MC for the afternoon was Mount Burr brigade member Peter Gandolfi and the Hon. Clare Scriven MLC, representing the Minister for Police, Emergency Services and Correctional Services addressed the gathering.

Ms Scriven presented a plaque to Mount Burr brigade captain Trevor Schultz to commemorate the opening of the station and Glencoe CFS captain Sue Foureur received the keys for the Glencoe 34 appliance.

Ms Scriven acknowledged the long and proud history of the Mount Burr CFS established in 1973 and referred to her own memories of the Ash Wednesday fires in 1983.

Medal presentations were conducted for over 30 members of the Wattle Range groups at the ceremony, with Beachport brigade member Mike Kemp receiving the 50 Year Service medal presented as a box set.

The presentation of awards to volunteers included the National Emergency Medal for the 2019-20 Bushfires.

Member for Mackillop Nick McBride said "We've been to all three of these events and it's been an absolute pleasure and privilege to be a part of it, it's been good."

Remembering Frank, Oct 1935 - July 2022

Frank Corigliano was born in Sommerville nursing home in Mount Gambier on October 5th, 1935 to Frank and Francie Corigliano.

His father, Frank Snr, was the Harbour Master at Beachport and Frank grew up in the Harbour Master's residence.

He remembered his father taking supplies out to the lighthouse keepers on Penguin Island when it was still a functioning light station.

Frank was influenced in his early years by his civic minded father Frank Snr, and grandfather Charles.

Who were both heavily involved with the community, through council, school committees and the foundation of SAFCOL in Beachport.

Frank went to school in Beachport and left at the age of 14 to go fishing with his brother Morris on the 'Dolphin' for four years.

Later, he bought his own fishing boat, the 'Albatross' and went cray and shark fishing.

He went on to build his own boat the 'Coltana' and continued fishing until his retirement.

He was a keen footballer and played for Beachport in the Southern Ports league at 14 years and played for Robe's B-grade team when they joined the Mid South East Football League.

He also served on the Beachport Football Club committee for many years.

At 19 years of age, between 1954 to 1959, Frank did National Service and graduated as a cadet.

During this time he met Phyllis Hunt from Robe and married her and they had four children together.

For 18 years, while their children were at school, Frank served as a member of the School Council.



In conjunction with the School Council, he was on the Beachport Recreation hall organising committee and chairman of the fund-raising committee.

Raising funds for the establishment of a hall serving both the community and the school.

As well as his day job fishing, Frank was directly involved in the development of the fishing industry in Beachport.

He served as CEO and President of the Beachport Professional Fisherman's Association and was a delegate for South East Professional Fisherman's Association (SEPFA).

Frank played a large part in SEPFA and was on the buyback committee which eventually removed 40 vessels with 60 pots per vessel.

These were bought back by the state in efforts to maintain a sustainable fishery for future generations.

Personally, Frank was guarantor for 20 fishermen starting out in the industry over the years.

Frank's father, Frank Snr., was a founding member of SAFCOL and in 1973 Frank was elected Vice Chairman for four years.

He then served as Chairman of SAFCOL for the next 8 years until 1985 when SAFCOL ceased operating as a Co-op and transitioned to a private company.

In later years, after his football days, Frank served on the Beachport Golf Club committee of which was President for four years.

The committee was responsible for the establishment of the golf course in its present location, established on the football grounds where Frank had played in his younger days.

Along with Kevin Chambers, Frank was a member of the Beachport Progress Association and the two men were responsible for the organisation and running of the New Year's Day regattas for many years.

He was also president of the Beachport Country Fire Service.

He retired at the age of 58 due to hip replacement.

Frank has left a large legacy and will be remembered for his long and lasting commitment to this community.

Vintage workshops wrap up

This year's series of Vintage Workshops organised by Wattle Range Council (WRC) recently ended with the last of seven sessions held Sunday afternoon.

The workshops were added to the event program as a soft launch to the Geltwood Festival which has suffered three years of disruption due to Covid-19.

The long running Geltwood Festival had been impacted by event cancellations in 2020 and 2021 and this year's event was postponed from the traditional March date to October.

WRC Manager Community Development Caroline Hill explained the idea behind the workshops.

"The Geltwood had quite a bit of traction before Covid times so we wanted to build up that traction for attendance again, there needed to be something to pre-empt the festival.

"The Vintage Workshops introduces people to the Geltwood Festival and it also helps us garner the interest in it.

"It raises the anticipation of the activities ahead and gives the opportunity to talk to people about them.

For six weeks preceding the Geltwood Festival the free and low cost workshops have been held in Millicent to demonstrate the skills of people in the region.

Offering the opportunity for people to participate in workshops before the official Geltwood activities begin.

"Not only were we introducing people into vintage arts and crafts but importantly we were demonstrating the capacity of our community presenters and craftspeople" Ms Hill said.

"All of our presenters were local and generous enough to offer their services and put on a workshop.

"It demonstrates the amazing craft and tal-

"We had quite a few from outside the immediate Millicent area, but within the Wattle Range community, be involved in the workshops.

"We've had everything from stained glass to basket weaving, boro stitch and crochet.

"They've been extremely popular and most have been pretty much booked out.

"A lot of people have indicated in their feedback information that they would like to do them again."

Secretary of the Millicent Craft Group Pat Muhovics commended WRC on their support for the Geltwood Festival and the Vintage

Workshop initiative.

"I think it's fantastic and there was a lot of support but because several workshops were free some people didn't turn up on the day.

"This meant numbers were down a little which was disappointing because there was waiting list for those workshops" Ms Muhovics said.

Good power play by Kia

The Sorento has been a major part of the Kia playbook for two decades, with the fourth generation seeing the light of day in 2020 in petrol and diesel variants.

Now the range has been topped up with petrol/electric hybrids.

Kia's only seven-seat sports utility vehicle comes in the top GT-Line specification only, the straight hybrid version in front or all-wheel drive guise, while the hero model is a plug-in electric hybrid vehicle.

The common-or-garden hybrid Sorento kicks off the range with the front-wheel-drive variant selling for \$66,750 before on-road costs.

The all-wheel-drive version carries a \$3000 premium, pushing the price up to \$69,750.

The plug-in hybrid Sorento is on sale from \$80,330 before on-roads.

More spacious, more versatile with class-leading innovations wrapped in finely tailored style, says the maker, the new Sorento not only is the most high-tech Kia car ever made, but also leads the way in SUV design.

While retaining much of the Sorento family physical features, the Hybrid has evolved with a new interpretation of the trademark 'tiger nose' grille, with a wider shape wrapping around the integrated LED headlights on each side.

This assertive nose is complemented by a wider lower air intake, incorporating wing-shaped air curtains to channel air around the car.

Quilted Nappa leather appointed seats (front heated and ventilated) set the theme for a cabin of quality materials and craftsmanship.

Three-stage climate control air-conditioning means comfort all round for occupants, while a panoramic sunroof lets in light, while keeping heat at bay with a blind.

Finding a long journey on the boring side?

Take time out to choose one of the 64 colours that bathes the cabin in ambient light, pick something from the Sounds of Nature soundscape, or just switch off entirely with the quiet of the passenger talk in-car intercom.

Connectivity is front and centre with a 10.25-inch colour multimedia touchscreen linked to Apple CarPlay and Android Auto. A 7-inch LCD instrument display carries range of system info.

The position of the touch screen on the centre dash of the test car had its problems, with air-con controls underneath easy to catch accidentally while resting the palm on working the screen.

Audio is handled by a six-speaker system, while dual-zone air-conditioning keeps occupants in relative comfort.

Customising is the name of the game with a 10.25-inch full colour touchscreen atop the centre console, plus a 12.3-inch digital instrument cluster directly in front of the driver who also has a colour head-up display, including speedo and speed limits on the windscreen.

The touchscreen comes up with Apple CarPlay or Android Auto connectivity, satellite navigation details, including a sharp map display, and access to the 12-speaker Bose audio.

The Sorento Hybrid is powered by Kia's 132 kW/265 Nm four-cylinder turbo-petrol engine combined with a 44 kW/264 Nm electric motor, charging a 1kWh lithium-ion battery situated under the boot floor.

Power is put to ground via a six-speed torque converter automatic transmission and constant all-wheel drive.

The Sorento gained a five-star safety rating in 2020 and includes autonomous emergency braking with vehicle, pedestrian and cyclist detection, junction assist, lane-keep assist, lane follow assist (centring), blind spot assist, rear cross-traffic alert, parking collision avoidance, adaptive cruise control with stop and

go, front and rear parking sensors, driver attention alert, multi-collision braking and safe exit assist.

Additionally, there is also a 360-degree view of the vehicle when parking and blind-spot assist, on activation of a turn indicator, the wide-angle surround view monitors will display live footage of other vehicles in your blind spots on the instrument cluster.

It also helps wheels keep their distance from scuffing the sidewalk.

Passive safety is taken care of with seven airbags, including front-centre side.

This well-bred youngster has brought a new purpose to the Sorento family, thanks to a sophisticated powertrain and some of Kia's most advanced technology.

Setting off is under the auspices of the electric motor alone producing maximum torque on tap instantly.

The petrol engine joins in tandem only when needed for added acceleration or under load.

These switches back and forth are so smooth as to undetectable to the driver.

Indeed, the only indication that the car is acting only as an electric vehicle is by the letters EV displayed on the instrument panel.

It is not possible to control these actions manually; they are automatic powertrain decisions.

Drive modes, such as ECO, Normal, Sport and Smart can be dialled up by means of a centre-console knob.

Kia claims a combined urban/highway patrol consumption of 5.8 litres per 100 kilometres.

The test vehicle recorded 7.1 litres per 100 kilometres in the CBD and suburbs and 5.2 litres per 100 kilometres when let loose on the open road.

Anxiety about where the next battery charge is going to be is non-existent as the

engine and regenerative braking do that automatically.

There is a petrol price premium here as opposed to the cheaper charging of the fully electric, or plug-in hybrid vehicles.

Terrain Select is also on offer to help take care of tricky conditions off road in sand, mud, snow etc.

By activating the turn signal, the wide-angle surround view monitors will display live footage of other vehicles in your blind spots on the instrument cluster.

Loading is made easy by the hands-free smart power tailgate, which can be brought

into operation by the key holder pausing behind the vehicle for three seconds for the tailgate to automatically open.

There's 187 litres of cargo space behind the third-row.

Fold these seats flat to increase space to 616 litres.

With the second-row seats folded flat 2011 litres of space is freed up.

The Kia Sorento Hybrid may be a quiet achiever but it states a compelling case for being one of the best large seven-seat sports utility vehicles around.

She then held her nerve on the first extra hole to win the championship in front of a small but appreciative gallery.



Another undefeated campaign came from the Under 16 girls Glenelg side, with Penola's Heidi Berkin part of that squad.

Glenelg fielded separate metro and country Under 15 boys' teams, as well as an Under 14 and Under 16 girls side for the event, which pitted the Tigers against teams from rival SANFL clubs.
