Council candidate Cassidy

The question was "What is the number one thing you hope to achieve in the next term, if you are elected to council?"

Mr Cassidy's answer is below.

This is a very difficult question to answer for me because there are so many issues that I would like to address in my term if elected to the Wattle Range Council.

If I was to focus on one thing in my ward, I would like to see some action taken regarding the current coastal erosion.

Southend has severe issues with the sand disappearing and the ocean eating away the land in front of the Caravan park.

The dunes at the Salmon hole in Beachport are also eroding and this could mean losing the scenic drive route as it currently is, but the real issue is what are the actual consequences if we let this happen to the townships themselves. I would like to see more funding and better ideas, which would lead to better outcomes on this subject.

This is a large problem but by working with council and lobbying the state and federal government's I'm sure better outcomes could be achieved.

I'm also aware that old local knowledge plays a leading role in understanding these erosion events and would like to seek advice from locals on these projects also.

Kintore candidates forum well attended

Art means life for Peter Muller

Long-standing contributor to the arts in the Penola Coonawarra region, Peter Muller, has been recognised for outstanding and continual service to its regional Festival.

At its most recent meeting the Penola Coonawarra Arts Festival Committee bestowed Peter with committee life membership presenting him with a unique cheese knife carved by local artisan blacksmith Bruce Kenewell.

"I headed off to the normal monthly festival meeting and was absolutely gobsmacked when I was made a life member," Peter said.

Commencing in 1992 with the John Shaw Neilson Commemorative Week which formed the kernel of the Penola Festival, this year the Penola Coonawarra Arts Festival celebrated its thirtieth year.

In a delightful twist, Peter and his wife Margaret this year celebrate 40 years since their arrival in Penola.

"Forty years ago I was appointed principal of the Penola High School and moved here with my family – I have been involved with the festival for 30 of those," Peter said.

Peter was quick to acknowledge that his role with Penola High School enabled him to be involved, becoming a conduit between the festival and the community.

"It's thanks to the Penola High School's unwavering support of the festival over many years – from hosting its first exhibition featuring James Darling, to becoming the permanent home for the John Shaw Neilson Award when it grew too large for Penola's Local Images Gallery – that the Penola Coonawarra Arts Festival has become the success it is," he said.

"We have been incredibly fortunate to have their support, along with all the countless volunteers who band together to bring it to life every year," he added.

During his 30 years on the committee, Peter has been president for nine, and since 1995 has coordinated the hallmark Co Opera event.

New heights of play

Children at McKay Children's Centre will be climbing to new heights, as they enjoy a new climbing tree.

The tree, which was built using natural materials, was partly designed by students, who drew up plans of what they would like it to look like.

Director Kylie Tull said the idea for the new plan came about due to educators identifying that a few of the children were actively looking for a physical challenge.

"We felt that our outdoor environment was not meeting this need for them," she said.

"Our teacher, Kathia Martin began an inquiry with some of the children to explore what they would like to see added to our outdoor area.

"The children developed their own plans for a space within our yard and then Kathia reached out to The Climbing Tree to see if they could make the children's designs come to life.

"Troy from The Climbing Tree was able to develop a plan for our space that incorporated many of the features from the children's designs, including a fireman pole to slide down, a ladder to climb, a servery down the bottom and a log scramble.

"We could not be happier with the final result. Special thanks go to our committed Governing Council who were incredibly supportive and happy to fund this project."

Cutting the ribbon to open the climbing tree was Aunty Michelle Jacquelin-Furr, which works in with another new development at the centre, a Reconciliation Action Plan.

"As part of this work, we have decided to come together each day around the sand pit as a whole centre to share our acknowledgement of country.

Dazzling double fireworks planned for Beachport

Hosts of Beachport's annual New Year's Eve fireworks display are keen to see the extravaganza go ahead for the 2022 celebrations.

Traditionally the Beachport District Development Association (BDDA) have provided two displays annually for tourists and local with one at 9.30pm and the second held at midnight.

Rising insurance premiums and supply chain issues meant the cost of hosting the fireworks had more than doubled since they were last held in 2019 putting the traditional event at risk.

With original estimates between \$20,000 to \$25,000 the BDDA approached Wattle Range Council earlier this year requesting an increase in funding from \$2,000 to \$10,000 annually for four years to help the two displays continue.

In April Council resolved to increase funding to \$5,000 and questioned if both fireworks sessions were needed on the night.

Recently the BDDA announced they would proceed with the two displays asking the public to contribute financially to the event.

Through negotiations with fireworks contractor the group have been able to keep the fireworks cost to \$15,000.

The organisation has set up an online Go Fund Me page asking locals and those who visit Beachport to contribute to the fundraising effort.

Secretary of the BDDA, Roslyn Brown said

"The Go Fund Me page was a decision



made by the BDDA at a general forum in response to Covid.

"We had that hiatus where we couldn't do any of our effective fundraising for two years.

"There were still costs that need to be met such as insurances and utilities and our bank balance was reflecting that there wasn't any money going in.

Ms Brown said the event will still go ahead even if the Go Fund Me goal is not reached.

"It will definitely go ahead, the contractor is booked in and all of the paper work that is required to hold the event is in progress.

"We will find the money somewhere" Ms Brown said.

At the time of print \$1,200 had been raised toward the group's goal of \$15,000.

Marine trash is tidy art

A white Holden ute covered in colourful crochet blankets captured plenty of attention during the recent Geltwood Festival.

The car was 'yarn bombed' by the owner, Helen Joyce, and parked outside of her colourful two storey residence in George Street.

"I sewed together granny blankets and crochet blankets and pieces I had collected for that purpose" Ms Joyce said.

"I wanted to use them somehow in Geltwood and decided I was going to bomb the car by putting the pieces together.

"It was raining and I was sitting out there in my raincoat sewing it together, talk about dedication.

"But people have enjoyed it, it's a bit of fun."

It's not only the front of Ms Joyce's home she enjoys decorating as a series of unusual sculptures line her driveway off Davenport Street.

Through crocheting, weaving and wrapping the artist has made a series of colourful

works from marine debris washed up on Geltwood beach and collected by herself and husband Colin Davies.

"There should be outrage about the rubbish that is found on the beach, which I have used to create a few pieces.

"Fishing line, fishing rope, bits of nets, floats, tubing just little bits of plastic, lots of plastic bottles and wire.

"What I've seen out there are pallets and all sorts of things that are too big for us to bring back.

"The amount of plastic is disgusting, some of it has been washed from the sea, but some is just from people being on the beach and leaving it there."

No stranger to colour, or controversy, Ms Joyce had previously offered the front of her home as a canvas for a large mural painted by Mimby Jones Robinson in 2018.

More recently the avid arts supporter commissioned three Adelaide based artists to paint the wall that lines her rear driveway across from her beach trash sculptures.

Mastery by the glassful

In what is an entire month dedicated to celebrating Coonawarra Cabernet, visitors to the Coonawarra Wine Region were treated to a myriad of events recently.

The weekend had barrel loads on offer to 'celebrate, educate and activate the senses', from sparkling cabernet at Balnaves of Coonawarra to an afternoon of 'Burgers and Beats' at Brand's Laira Coonawarra, a decade of Cabernet tasting at Majella Wines to a VIP wine dinner at Katnook Estate.

Among the events, the iconic Coonawarra Cabernet Masterclass, was held in the historic Wynn's Coonawarra Gables building led by Langton's wine ambassador, Ned Goodwin Master of Wine, who spoke to a sold out audience.

"It is an immense privilege to be able to taste the wines we have on show today. 2019 is heralded as an exceptional vintage around the world and in the majority of cases, these wines are yet to have been officially released to consumers." Mr Goodwin said.

Mr Goodwin MW was joined by Wynn's Coonawarra Estate winemaker Sarah Pidgeon as co-presenter of the masterclass who recently returned from Europe showcasing Wynn's Coonawarra's new release wines.

"There is great excitement around the 2019 vintage around the world" Ms Pidgeon said.

"The anticipation of the quality coming from all of the great wine making regions is real", she said.

The 2019 Vintage was the theme of the Cabernet Masterclass, with 50 attendees reviewing, tasting and examining 12 wines ranging in age and price from \$30-\$600 per bottle, from across the globe.

The international contingent was made up of a selection of highly regarded wine houses from renowned cabernet producing regions; Bordeaux - France, Napa Valley - California USA, Hawkes Bay - New Zealand, Bolgheri - Italy, Stellenbosch - South Africa and Maipo Valley - Chile.

Of the 12 cabernets that featured in the line up, six were produced in Coonawarra and hold the esteemed Langton's classification, with five of the winemakers present in room to provide comment on their respective wine.

Winemaker Doug Bowen spoke to the 2019 Bowen Estate Cabernet Sauvignon being tasted.

I am very pleased with this vintage. At Bowen Estate our style reflects our commitment to producing 100% estate grown fruit from our unique trellised vines, maintaining a reputation for producing consistent quality wine year in year out.

"We seek finely woven tannins in a medium bodied wine that has layers of classic Coonawarra flavour. This has plenty of year's ahead of it and should age wonderfully."

In assessing the wines in the line up Ned Goodwin emphasised how important viticulture management is in translating into quality tannins. "Some of these wines have very sophisticated tanning regimes" he said.

Wynn's Viticulturist, Ben Harris, was on hand to provide an overview of the conditions of the 2019 growing season.

"A warm spring in 2018 set up well for great flowering. 2019 delivered an even growing season in Coonawarra, with very even flowering and long-even growing season. All in all, it was a cool, dry vintage, which has made for ideal ripening conditions." Mr Harris said.

A highlight of the tasting line up was undoubtedly the 2019 Ducru-Beaucaillou Zeme Cru Classe, Saint-Julien which was flown in by Langton's especially for the masterclass event.

"This is the first group of consumers to taste this wine in Australia - pre release and pre sale. It is not expected to hit the market until 2023."

Among the guests in the room were national and internationally acclaimed Winemakers from Coonawarra and the Limestone Coast, Viticulturists, wine aficionados, wine judges and consumers.

Visiting international Limestone Coast Wine Judge, Master of Wine and Editor of Gourmet Traveller in New Zealand, Jane Skilton MW, applauded the authenticity of the event and the generosity of Coonawarra's winemakers.

"The line up of wines we are tasting here is truly superb and plentiful! This is one of the

presence of an international wine expert is a big draw card, and something for our region to get excited about. And this year's masterclass was no exception" Mrs Guyett said.

"Not only that, but it is also the genuine commentary that comes from our own industry people in the room that differentiates it from any other masterclass. Its not every day that consumers can attend a masterclass where nearly 50 per cent of the people in the room is made up of winemakers, viticulturists and the like" added Mrs Guyett.

Coonawarra Vignerons Executive Officer, Ockert Le Roux said is evident that the six Coonawarra wines stood up against best in the world in this tasting.

"Although still in their infancy, they already carry the hallmark of their great ageing capability. In another decade from today they will show why Coonawarra is renowned for its Cabernet Sauvignon" said Mr Le Roux.

Key issue for candidates

This week The South Eastern Times asked all candidates “What do you feel is the biggest issue facing the residents of Wattle Range and what are your plans to address the issue?”

Answers are given in the candidates own words.

Moira Neagle

I would rather ask this question of our rate payers. Many who use unsealed roads might say doing better on that score. I have learnt that yearning for every unsealed road in the Council area to be in top condition is like expecting every fence on the farm to be in top condition – a goal extremely difficult to achieve all of the time. There will be others who will want to see the new Council service centre built without a blowout in price. I’m in agreement with them. There will be those who are keen to improve disability access within our communities and the Council is progressively addressing such issues. I know people are concerned about climate change because they contact me to find out what the Council is doing to address this issue. We have a Climate Action Committee and we have a plan to guide policy and budget decisions to reduce carbon footprint. I suspect the biggest issues confronting our residents are beyond the power of the Council: energy costs, the challenges to employ more staff, providing quality care for our elders. Housing: I know there are empty government houses in our town and people desperate to rent.

The biggest issue facing residents is the cost of living. The main ways Council can help are to minimise rates, reduce waste collection costs and improve efficiencies. I recently made a strong case to the Landscape Board to reduce their levy in the Limestone Coast to bring it in line with city dwellers. I’ll pursue this further. Forestry pays much less rates than our farming community for the same land. Forestry can be a source of increased rate income, as can the Wind generators. Both are undervalued. Bringing them in line will reduce rates for the community.

I will ensure the Council follows the waste cutting strategies in the newly developed plan to reduce our carbon footprint and save money. Reducing the number of projects for the District will reduce costs but maintenance of existing facilities must continue.

The Council’s road network is very important. This year much has been spent on machinery. Following a period of expansion to get projects and maintenance done I will work to achieve a period of moderation, cost reduction and value for money. I will work tirelessly to control spending and therefore rate increases.

Even though Council doesn’t have much control over cost of living expenses, Council can be prudent with fees and charges. Rates should be maintained at C.P.I. levels, but must ensure sufficient funds are raised so it can operate at levels expected by ratepayers.

Wattle Range Council must continue to advocate for funding from various quarters for major infrastructure improvements such as a complete rebuild of the Southern Ports Highway between Millicent and Beachport.

This is a State Government responsibility, while the Federal Government must continuously be lobbied by Council to urgently upgrade its National Highway One between Millicent and Mount Gambier.

New governments have been elected in Canberra and on North Terrace in 2022 and Wattle Range Council must double



down on its efforts to secure a commitment to fund remedial works on these busy roads.

They both carry large volumes of freight and tourist traffic, and motorists deserve better than roads which are pot-holed, narrow and lacking in passing lanes.

Coastal erosion remains a problem at Southend and Beachport, significant portions of the council area remain mobile phone reception black spots and more funding from the two other tiers of government also needs to be injected into our health services and education.

Wattle Range Council should also work alongside the State and Federal Governments to attract more employment-generating enterprises to our area.



Dairy tackles labour issue

One in four dairy farmers are unable to find labour or access the skills they need on farm, according to a survey by Dairy Australia.

It is an issue compounded by Covid-19 and the nationwide skills shortage across a range of sectors beyond agriculture.

“Some 22 per cent of dairy farmers were also unable to fill vacant positions within three months with 40 per cent losing at least one or more workers,” said Dairy Australia’s general manager regional services, Verity Ingham.

To help tackle the problem, Dairy Australia recently launched a new national marketing campaign to promote the benefits of working in dairy farming and encouraging Australians to explore a job in dairy.

Featuring dairy ambassador Jonathan Brown and seven dairy farmers, the campaign showcases why working in dairy matters, highlighting factors that have shown to motivate people to consider a job in dairy.

These factors include working with animals, working outdoors, career progression, job variety and training, job security and the contribution Australian dairy makes to the community through production of a highly nutritious food.

Launched on Saturday 24 September, the workforce attraction campaign will be delivered into dairying regions across TV, YouTube, radio, social media and local newspapers and encourage jobseekers to visit dairyjobsmatter.com.au for more information and where to go

to find job opportunities in their region.

Farmers will be encouraged to take advantage of an increased interest in jobs on dairy farms, and tap into information on attracting and retaining new workers.

Ms Ingham said the aim of the campaign was to bring people into the industry – and keep them.

“Competition for jobseekers in regional areas is fierce, so finding good, reliable people is a priority for dairy farmers. Keeping them is just as important.

“We need workers on our farms to keep

the milk flowing, the cheese on tables, the yoghurt in our lunchboxes and we really are looking for people who want job security, who like working with and caring for animals; people who are looking for variety, flexibility in their work life or wanting career progression.”

Dedicated Dairy Australia staff in dairy regions will also provide employment support and will help connect farmers seeking workers with jobseeker networks.

“We’ll be working with recruitment agencies and local networks to attract, connect

The boards meet annually to formalise ongoing discussions about the barriers and opportunities around water resource management and to review progress against the Drainage and Wetland Strategy.

The meeting, which took place in late August, included a mix of on-site visits and presentations from staff from both boards.

The on-site visits had a coastal focus this year with stops at the Narrow Neck drain, Mt Hope drain and the Lake George outlet.

Attendees were also updated on the current South East Coastal Lakes Project presented by the Department for Environment and Water (DEW).

Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LC Landscape Board) chair, Penny Schulz highlighted the ongoing collaborative and strategic approach.

“We are excited that water projects linked to the Drainage and Wetland Strategy are progressing and that our collaboration is investigating further opportunities to protect and balance the region’s water resources, while supporting Limestone Coast primary production, biodiversity, industry, social and cultural requirements,” Ms Schulz said.

“The partnership with the South Eastern Water Conservation and Drainage Board is critical to achieving success, and supports the LC Landscape Board’s ‘Making Every Drop Count’ strategic direction.”

LC Landscape Board Wetland Restoration ecologist Dr. Emma Maxwell delivered an update at the joint meeting on regional management actions which were identified

in the Drainage and Wetland Strategy and the progress being made towards some of the actions.

Actions include but are not limited to the Lake George diversion and retention feasibility study, groundwater dependant ecosystem monitoring, incentives grants to support projects that seek to retain water in local wetlands, watercourses or drains, managed aquifer recharge feasibility study and regional recharge farms.

Audi Q5 35 a fuel miser

The diesel Audi Q5 35 Limited Edition diesel is billed as the most fuel-efficient, diesel SUV on the Australian market, with a theoretical range of more than 1400km.

It also happens to be the cheapest model in the Q5 mid-sized SUV line-up, priced from \$68,000 before on-road costs.

Sounds too good to be true, but a closer inspection reveals the 2.0-litre diesel has actually been detuned and, get this -- it's two-wheel drive.

No Quattro here.

You can look at it as a cynical marketing exercise or maybe a more practical approach to the SUV phenomena, given who is buying these vehicles and what they are using them for?

Reducing power and equipment levels is a sure sign of price cutting as premium brands strive to woo customers lured by 'lesser' brands whose top end models are giving them stick.

Apart from a nip here and a tuck there, Q5 does not look remarkably different from the first model launched here in 2009.

The cars performed impeccably and so too did the car we have just finished testing.

Three models are offered.

Q5 35 TDI Limited Edition is priced from \$68,350.

Q5 40 TDI Sport Limited Edition is priced from \$77,600 and the petrol Q5 45 TFSI Sport Limited Edition from \$79,400.

Our test vehicle was standard apart from metallic paint which adds \$1531, bringing the price as tested to \$69,881 plus on-roads.

Standard kit includes 20-inch alloys, LED headlights, daytime driving lights and tail lights (includes cornering lights and all-weather lights), and an electric tailgate with handsfree opening (gesture control).

Inside there's leather-appointed upholstery, three-zone climate air, electric front seats with heating and four-way lumbar support for driver and passenger, leather steering wheel with multifunction plus, shift paddles and hands-on detection, auto-dimming mirror and ambient colour interior lighting.

Q5 is covered by a 5-year/unlimited-kilometre warranty.

Service intervals are 12 months or 15,000km.

A pre-paid five-year service plan costs \$3140.

A standalone 10.1-inch touchscreen infotainment system offers MMI navigation plus, eight-speaker sound, DAB+ digital radio, wireless Apple Carplay and Android Auto connectivity, plus two USB outlets in front with charging and connectivity functions and another two USB outlets in rear with charging functions.

The 2.0-litre turbo diesel develops 120kW of power and 370Nm of torque, the latter between 1500 and 3000 rpm.

It's actually a 12-volt mild hybrid setup with auto engine stop-start and power to the front wheels through a seven-speed dual-clutch automatic.

Five-star safety comprises eight airbags, pop-up bonnet and pre-sense city with Autonomous Emergency Braking (AEB) including pedestrian detection (detects impending collisions at up to 85km/h and can reduce speed by up to 40km/h).

There's also pre-sense rear and pre-sense basic, active lane assist, blind-spot warning, exit warning, rear cross traffic assist and auto high beam.

It also comes with front and rear park sensors and a rear-view camera.

What you don't get is adaptive cruise control which is part of the optional Assistance pack.

In fact, six safety items are optional extras,

including collision avoidance assist and a 360-degree camera.

Some people take a dim view of charging extra for safety.

Fuel consumption is rated at a measly 4.8L/100km and it's pretty clean for a diesel, producing 125g/km of CO₂ (thanks to twin catalytic converters and a 'twin-dosing' Ad-Blue system).

Add to this a largish 70-litre fuel tank and you've got a theoretical range of more than 1400km.

We were getting 5.9L/100km after more than 400km, with 700km to go – excellent fuel economy but not quite what we were promised.

To put this in perspective, a five-year-old Kia Sportage puts out more power and torque than this, with 135kW and 392Nm.

The current version puts out even more.

Costs less too.

Perhaps it's one of the reasons this model is not offered in Sportback form.

In fact, it's the first time a Q5 of any flavour has been offered in Australia without all-wheel drive.

Performance is fine but is not going to set the world on fire, with the dash from 0 to 100 km/h taking 9.0 seconds.

Drive select offers five modes: Efficiency, Comfort, Auto, Dynamic and Individual.

The drive experience is smooth, quiet and mainly leisurely.

Inside it's all a bit doom and gloom with an over-abundance of black and featureless surfaces broken only by some strips of metal looking plastic.

The one relief comes a strip of ambient blue lighting that splits the dash from side to side.

Despite power adjustment, fore, aft and angle, the seats dig into the back of our thighs and are not comfortable.

Rear seat passengers get air outlets, but leg-room is limited.

The boot offers reasonable storage, with a collapsible space saver spare concealed under the floor.

You need to inflate it with an onboard 12-volt compressor which you'll find stored in a hidey hole to one side of the luggage area.



Sounds like a lot of mucking around and will probably result in an endless stream of calls to roadside assistance.

A big, bright 10.1-inch responsive touchscreen commands the infotainment system from the top of the dash.

The instrument cluster is not digital and lacks the pyrotechnics of more recent models, with two standard analogue style dials that flank a centre information screen where speed and navigation can be displayed.

The Q5 35 TDI is in its element cruising effortlessly in the slow lane.

If you demand more from the car, you will have to start making specific requests to the transmission.

Either by putting Drive Select in Dynamic mode, or changing gears manually using the paddle shifts provided.

Drive select is on the far side of the centre stack and is a stretch as the seat belt cinches tight.

Dynamic mode as you might expect locks out seventh gear, keeping engine revs higher than normal, making the car more respon-

sive to the throttle.

Plonk it off the line or after it has been cruising for a while and the transmission takes a second or two to work out what you want before the power kicks in.

It could also result in some scuffle from the front tyres as they search for traction.

From there on the transmission understands and responds accordingly, but constant braking and acceleration can and will confuse it -- it is after all a dual clutch setup.

Q5 corners flat and the ride from the 20-inch rubber is surprisingly good.

Corner to corner in manual mode works best in fourth gear where the engine revs hover around the 4000-rpm mark.

Tight corners may require a change down to third.

Of course, if leaving it in Dynamic mode or a lower gear will inevitably drive up fuel consumption.

While the Q5's fuel efficiency is to be applauded, we're left wondering if that is a major drawback for the average Audi buyer?


