Residents of Penola and surrounds are encouraged to join the newly-reactivated Penola and District Ratepayers and Residents Association.

The association, which has been in recess for many years, is now coming out of recess, with their first meeting and AGM to be held next Monday.

Organiser Jodi Strother is encouraging anyone who wishes to be involved to come along.

She said the group will be adopting the constitution as it was, before the recess, and would work to address local issues and support and work with local councillors.

"There's a lot of things around town, that certainly need addressing," she said.

# Big grant to tackle erosion along coast

Kingston District Council is celebrating the announcement of funding, which will help them fight erosion issues at Wyomi Beach.

The Council will receive \$1.953m funding support for a much-needed extension of its existing Wyomi Beach Rock Seawall.

Erosion at Wyomi Beach has been of significant concern for Council and the community over a long period of time.

Mayor Kay Rasheed acknowledged that coastal management challenges, such as erosion and inundation, will only increase into the future.

"We needed a well-informed, planned approach for effective and responsible coastal management for future generations," she said.

This came by way of a Coastal Adaptation Strategy (CAS) which identified future pathways and priority actions.

"The CAS identified that the beach area, to the north and south of the existing Wyomi seawall, experiences on-going erosion of approximately 1m/year and is highly vulnerable to storm erosion and that given the proximity of assets and properties to the shoreline, the Wyomi beach area was identified as requiring immediate adaptation to reduce risks."

"The last thing our community needs is a repeat of the devastating dune and infrastructure damage caused by severe storms in 2016,

which saw a large slice of our coastline disappear into the sea, leaving roads and residential properties exposed," she said.

Since then, the Council with state government support, has invested millions of dollars in both interim and long-term protection measures including geotextile sandbags, a 412m rock seawall and in more recent time, annual sand nourishment campaigns to protect either end of the rock seawall which has become vulnerable and exposed to ongoing erosion during the winter months.

"Even with the existing seawall in place, the CAS identified that the beach, dunes, geotextile sand containers, footpaths and other private infrastructure remain at risk and that if we do nothing, by 2050 Marine Parade and multiple foreshore properties will also be at risk", Ms Rasheed said.

Chief Executive Officer Nat Traeger said that the Council has been undertaking annual sand nourishment campaigns whilst it undertook significant engagement with its community about adaptation pathways for Wyomi Beach. The pathways, which focussed on 'defend' or 'retreat' were considered by the community in late 2021 and early this year, where it was unanimously considered that 'defend' was the only palatable option.

Ms Traeger said no stone was left unturned in reaching the decision to defend and said the council was very satisfied to have reached the right decision for the community and rate-payers.

"In reaching the decision to defend without nourishment, our community needs to be aware that whilst this is the most cost-effective outcome at \$3.9m net present value (NPV) by 2050, it will result in loss of the beach in front of the seawall in the next few years," she said.

Whilst the NPV is \$3.9m, overwhelmingly the immediate cost is the construction of the rock seawall itself, coming in at an estimated \$2.6m for a design option that strikes a balance between beach and dune impacts. The preferred seawall alignment envisages a 175m extension to the south and a 170m extension to the north of the existing seawall.

The Council is very appreciative of the funding announcement, which is through the Australian Government's 2022-2023 Coast and Estuarine Risk Mitigation Program.

Planning and detailed design for the construction of the rock seawall will start immediately.

Council will continue to engage with the community about the project, specifically once a timeframe for completion has been finalised.

The 2022 Wattle Range Art Exhibition launches tomorrow night with this year's event coinciding with the Millicent Art Gallery celebrating 30 years since it opened.

A wide variety of work will be on display showcasing Limestone Coast and Western Victoria artists

Prizes are awarded to the overall winner of the Wattle Range art prize, youth, mayoral award and first time entrant.

Judges for this year's exhibition are Dr Lisa Slade and Kay Lawrence AM.

Dr Slade is the current Assistant Director, Artistic Programs at the Art Gallery of SA and Ms Lawrence an Emeritus Professor at the University of South Australia with an international profile as a tapestry weaver.

Ms Lawrence was instrumental in the design and lead artist/teacher for the 1986 Millicent Tapestry located in the Millicent Gallery Library.

The exhibition opens Friday, November 11th, 7pm at the Millicent Art Gallery.

## Spring into gardens at local open days

The name is Aboriginal and means elbow, referring to the shape of the large watercourse near the homestead.


In 1957, Mr Murray McCourt dug a three metre wide channel through one kilometre of the Woakwine Range to Lake George, draining a large swamp to create agriculturally sustainable land. A look out provides views of the cutting, Lake George and the coastal dunes beyond and the machinery used for what was a huge engineering feat for its time is on show.

Woakwine can be found at 509 Beachport Penola Road, Magarey and money raised will go to the Royal Flying Doctor service.

Also open for visitors that weekend is Spindrift, at 3 Northwest Terrace, Beachport. The gardens will be open from 10am until 4.30pm, both Saturday and Sunday. Entry is \$10, with children under 18 free. Open Gardens SA members and concession tickets are \$8.

# Rail Trail on the right track

The Coonawarra Rail trail has been officially opened.

The project, which has been long-awaited by the community has finally been completed and is open.

The opening of the project coincided with the Coonawarra Running Festival.

The project has seen 18.7 km of sealed walking and cycling trails from Riddoch Street in Penola through the Coonawarra to Glenroy-Bool Lagoon Road in Glenroy.

Member for Barker Tony Pasi MP opened the Rail Trail along with Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll.

Mr Noll said he was pleased to see the project finally completed.

"It's been some time in the planning, as we all know, and then to have the Member for Barker Tony Pasi to open it last Saturday was just the highlight," he said.

"This is the importance of this sort of infrastructure, where federal government, state governments and local governments work together, this is what we can achieve."

Although the trail is now officially complete, Mr Noll there would be regular maintenance work on the trail.

"There'll be always ongoing maintenance, and then there's sections that have got to have some further maintenance on it," he said.

"It'll be one of those things. It's a bit like the Sydney Harbour Bridge. There's always some-

thing to do., and I anticipate just making it better will continue."

Member for Barker Tony Pasi said the \$2 million project was a long-term vision for many in the community which has now been realised thanks to \$1.66m funding from the second phase of the Coalition Government's Local Road and Community Infrastructure program.

"The Coonawarra and Penola communities have been advocating for this project for many years and its fantastic to have been able to deliver Federal Government funding to see the project come to fruition," Mr Pasi said.

"Not only is the trail an exciting new addition to the region for local residents, but it's an addition to the already vibrant tourism offering in the Coonawarra."

"To be able to walk or cycle along this trail through the beautiful red gums and vineyards is a major draw card. Tourism is an important industry for the Coonawarra and this project is strengthening that industry now and into the future," Mr Pasi said.

"It's projects like this that make our communities better places to live, work and raise a family."

The opening was held in conjunction with the Coonawarra Running Festival which raises funds and awareness for mental health charity Breakthrough Mental Health Research Foundation.

I feel really fortunate for this opportunity and really appreciate this support," they said.

Mr Babolka said he was proud of what the scholarships could help students achieve.

"We really encourage all those students and families in the Limestone Coast that are needing some support to get on board and apply," he said.

Scholarships are now open, with applications closing Wednesday, November 30, 2022.

# A lost photo discovered

More than 100 years after he was killed on the battlefields of the First World War, Percy Lewis Butterworth is being remembered this year by local connections with the recent discovery of a photograph of the fallen soldier.

The search for a photograph of Percy began almost a decade ago when a small committee of local history enthusiasts connected to Millicent's South East Family History Group began work on compiling the book 'Honouring our Fallen - Stories behind the names on First World War memorials in Wattle Range Council, South East of South Australia'.

While the book researchers were able to find photographs of 95 per cent of the 105 fallen soldiers, a handful eluded them, including Percy.

A couple of photographs have come to light since the book was launched in 2016, and Percy is the latest of these; supplied from Victoria by a great granddaughter of one of Percy's siblings, an elder sister Mary Frances Butterworth.

Percy was the youngest of eleven children born to William Edmund Edward and Annie Elizabeth (nee Barnes) Butterworth who were married in Penshurst, Victoria, in 1869.

Percy was born in Millicent in 1883.

His father was employed as an Inspector for the Mount Muirhead Drainage Board's Vermin Board but he died in 1886 of a bronchial disorder, followed by Percy's mother just three weeks later, leaving three year old Percy and his ten siblings as orphans who were split up and adopted by strangers.

Some of the siblings have descendants who remain in the Millicent area today.


One of them was Adelaide who, when she turned 18, with the help of friends and the Salvation Army, reconnected with her brother Percy.

Adelaide and her husband, George Skeer, operated the Hatherleigh store and post office, and later a store in Millicent, but relocated to Dulacca in Queensland for 12 years and Percy followed his sister there where he worked as a farmer.

In Queensland, he enlisted for the war in July 1916 and became a Private in the 13th Australian Machine Gun Company which was largely made up of men from Queensland.

The company served in many of the major battles of the First World War and gained a reputation for heroism.

With this heroism came many casualties and the Company became known as 'The Suicide Club'.

Percy was killed during an attack on the village of Noreuil, near Bullecourt, France, in April 1917; he was 33 years old.

His body was not recovered after the war and his name appears on the Villers-Bretonneux Memorial in France, along with more than 10,000 other Australians with no known grave.

Percy's name also appears on a war memorial at Miles in Queensland and on the Millicent Cross of Sacrifice.

During the Second World War, Percy's nephew, also Percy Lewis Butterworth (son of Percy's brother WH Butterworth, of Rendelsham), was killed in Syria in 1941.


His name appears on the Rendelsham War Memorial.

The book, 'Honouring our Fallen' contains photographs and stories of 105 men whose names are listed on First World War town memorials within the Wattle Range Council area.

The book is on sale for \$30 at the South East Family History Group in Millicent and the Millicent and Penola Visitor Information Centres, with proceeds being donated to Legacy by the South East Family History Group.

# Motoring

## Suzuki gets a stylish grip

Little has changed over the years, with the SX4 generally flying under the automotive radar, while its siblings – Jimny, Swift and Vitara – led the way in design and innovation.

The latest S-Cross could be about to change the order of things.

The second generation SX4 in 2013 took on the S-Cross suffix and an optional all-wheel drive system named AllGrip.

It has four selectable driving modes – Normal, Sport, Snow and Lock.

Following a facelift in 2016, the third generation first saw the light of day in 2021, and has now been given a makeover for the model year 2023, in the form of a freshened cabin and restyled exterior, plus new technology.

The 1.4 litre turbocharged petrol engine stays pretty much the same but now puts its power to ground through a new AllGrip all-wheel drive system.

There is a price to pay – \$40,490, plus on-road costs, \$10,000 more than the base figure.

A Prestige model, with even more goodies, tips the scales at \$44,490.

Like all present-day Suzuki cars, the S-Cross is covered by a five-year, unlimited kilometre warranty and five-year capped-price service scheme, the latter at 12 months or 10,000-kilometre intervals.

Updated S-Cross styling retains the somewhat angular look of days gone by, while most modern rivals show off slick coupe-like looks.

Included here are a new front and back, doors, bumpers and lighting.

Up front the two-storey grille is dominated by the stylised Suzuki 'S' and leaves oncoming drivers in no doubt as to the car's pedigree.

A sleeker bonnet, black diamond lattice grille and redesigned automatic LED headlights have the SUV standing tall, while square wheel arches wrapping polished alloy and silver highlights on the bumpers make for a more robust profile than before.

Quality leather appointments are not enough to detract from the firmness of the seats.

Little lateral support is forthcoming too.

On the upside, the steering wheel adjusts for rake and reach.

Behind the wheel is an instrument cluster comprising two analogue gauges with a digital trip computer between, which includes a speedometer.

Dual-zone climate control adjustment is within easy reach.

The S-Cross AllGrip is the same dimensions as its predecessor, which is enough to keep an average build adult in some comfort, especially in the rear.

The boot opens up to an expansive 430 litres with the seat backs up, extending to a large 1230 litres with seat backs folded.

Hardwearing fabric material covers the deck and extends up the walls.

There is also an underfloor boot-wide compartment.

A nine inch touchscreen is a step up from the seven inch system in the base model.

A clear colour display supports factory-fitted satellite navigation, camera with all-round view and digital radio info.

Apple CarPlay customers enjoy wireless communication, while Android Auto folk have to make do with wired connectivity.

Lift the bonnet, there's nothing new to see here.

Those familiar with the previous model will recognise the engine, a 1.4 litre four-cylinder turbocharged petrol motor producing 103 kW and 220 Nm, mated with a six-speed torque converter automatic transmission, now taking in the new Suzuki all-wheel drive system, AllGrip.

Standard safety comes with autonomous

emergency braking, lane departure warning, driver fatigue monitoring, blind-spot monitoring, rear cross-traffic alert, front and rear parking sensors.

The featherweight BoosterJet engine has a spring in its step, with plenty of low-down torque and a well-matched torque-converter auto.

Plastic paddle shifts are best ignored.

However, the spicy motor, well-sorted ride and handling package were good enough to throw the S-Cross assuredly around on corners, while feather-light steering pointed the nose in the desired direction and slow-speed parking in tight spots was low on trepidation.

A claimed combined urban/highway fuel consumption figure of 6.2 litres per 100 kilometres translated in test car terms to 8 litres per 100 kilometres in city traffic and 5 litres per 100 kilometres on the open road.

Not too much of a financial burden on the recommended 95 RON fuel.

Getting to grips with a wide range of conditions under foot, the car's multi-mode all-wheel-drive system offers Normal, Sport, Snow and Lock stages, running predominantly from the front wheels in Normal to 66:33 split in Snow.

Front bias helps keep the vehicle on a straight course on ice.

Snow also firms up stability control, while leaving traction control unfettered in snow.

Lock serves up a steady-as-she-goes 50:50 split.

Sport takes charge from the rear, partly freeing stability control, while calling on transmission operation to be more responsive.

All are to hand via a knob on the centre console behind the gearshift lever.

ki, with the aforementioned Jimny, Swift and Vitara, atop the podium positions.

However, with the spritely performance of the latest generation, the S-Cross is making a gallant effort to grab the attention of people.

Note that Suzuki Queensland is a separate entity to Suzuki in the rest of Australia, but it's expected that the two entities will be very much the same.

If you're in another State or Territory and

considering buying a Suzuki we suggest you talk to the dealer of your choice about the new model.

The 2022 S-Cross is being released in Queensland with two specification lines: GL-Plus and GLX with the GLX also having the option of a sunroof.

The model names elsewhere are All Grip and All Grip Premium respectively with the latter having the sunroof as standard.

# Records are set to tumble

A Legend of the Lakes record is on the line when the iconic hill climb hits the Valley Lakes precinct this weekend.

Dan Day will look for his seventh straight win to equal Peter Gazzard's record of victories at the same time.

He will take a bit of stopping too, with changes made to his Subaru STi to ensure it is on the pace and the course time record is also up for grabs.

Day set that record back in 2017 with a scintillating run of 49.89 seconds.

Since then he has come close to a new record, but has always fell just short.

With all those scenarios on the table, it is not surprising Day looks forward to the 2022 event.

"It doesn't feel like too long ago when we were there the first time, when the car was brand new in 2016," he said.

"We just keep doing another one, year after year and they all add up.

"From memory, when we set the lap record it was perfect conditions.

"Since then the weather has been touch and go.

"Each year we have tried different things on the car and each year we have been close, about .1 of a second away.

"We are as fast, just not faster.

"This year we hope to reset it because we have done a few drastic changes to the car."

However, to make up such a small margin takes a lot of effort.

It must be a perfect run, with good weather and track conditions, with everything going right.

The driver must be in the right frame of mind and not have a lapse of concentration, or the margin has gone in the blink of an eye.

"It can be the difference between 1.5 metres braking somewhere, picking up the throttle slightly later or too early and getting too much wheel spin, or me miss-shifting out of the torque range," Day said.

"When you are talking about that fine amount of time, it could be down to anything."

For that reason Day said his team keeps a detailed log of each run to work out where they can go that little bit faster.

One of those logs is the top speed up the big, open sweeper, with the Subaru reaching speeds up to 188kph and more.

"We have logged 190kph up the hill which is our fastest," he said.

"We are always around 188, depending on the run.

"If can get fifth gear in my usual spot we get that speed.

"I hope to get over 200 kph this year and I think the car will do it because of the changes."

Those changes include a new set of development heads to allow the engine to produce more torque, with Day the first to use them.

Add to that a bigger twin-scroll turbo, dif-

ferent headers, bigger valves and paddle shifters which allow Day to change up or down without the clutch and it all starts to come together.

"The power cones on 1000 rpm earlier, so where I used to struggle out of corners with turbo lag, that shouldn't be a problem any more," he said.

"The heads have bigger valves and extra flow, but we are the guinea pigs for these, so we are nervous and excited.

"We have had it on the dyno and running in it seems happy so far.

"It makes around 50kw extra down low, but we haven't turned the boost up yet."

One more change is as likely to have as much effect on the final times as any other, with a Borg Warner Motorsport ABS braking system.

"It is quite an elaborate system," Day said.

"I can brake deep into the apex without locking a wheel.

"You have shade, bits of gravel and cold

tyres, so you are always braking on eggshells.

"It should be a big advantage going into the bus stop – we are in fifth gear up until that point and I am always cautious in that corner.

"Now with ABS we can really fire it in there, so it will be a big gain there."

Despite all the changes, minimal testing means the Subaru is still somewhat of an unknown quantity.

It is capable of producing around 1000 horsepower, but Day said he will use around 840hp at the lakes course.

Any more and he risks losing control or breaking out in wheel spin and losing precious time.

Of course, pressure from other drivers also has a bearing on the pace at the pointy end, with Kevin Mackrell back this year to keep Day honest.

That is something Day said he is looking forward to.

"Kevin hasn't been there the last couple of years and the gap back to second place has

been a little bit broader," he said.

"There is usually .1 or .2 of a second between us and that is what I live for in this type of racing.

"Who knows what he might have done to the car.

"He may have developed it further looking for a win, but that close competition is what it is all about."

One other major factor may come into play as well.

With the changes to the car untested in anger, the Lakes will be the first time Day puts them to the test.

If they work, he should have a fast ride up the hill, in theory.

"It is all good on paper and in my head," Day said.

"But I have to go up and do it.

"Either way, it should be a very fast car."

The Legend of the Lakes hill climb kicks off on Friday, November 11 and runs through until Sunday, November 13.
