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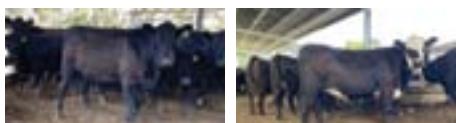

Councils step up

Wattle Range Council has joined with other Limestone Coast councils to support flood affected regions in the Riverland.

Three weeks ago WRC employees David Taylor and Tim Walker made the trip to the Berri Barmera and Renmark Paranga councils transporting urgently needed supplies to help manage the crisis.

The local government association in Adelaide, which represents 68 councils, put a call out through their emergency response centre for much needed equipment.

WRC co-ordinated the local response and worked with Naracoorte Lucindale, Grant and Mount Gambier councils to source the equipment.

Mr Taylor and Mr Walker drove one of the WRC trucks and transported large pumps, sandbags and event fencing to assist with road blocks.

Four days later two extra pumps were sourced and transported by WRC Chief Executive Officer Ben Gower to the Berri Barmera council.

"We had another request recently for a big generator and Kingston council is currently looking into it," he said.

"They recently bought one as a back-up for power outages for their sewer scheme.

"But they are investigating at the moment because if the sewer scheme runs out of power we are all in trouble.

"We are doing everything we can to help but taking a balanced approach so we don't leave our own communities high and dry."

Christmas festivities begin in Millicent this Sunday at noon as the Millicent Combined Christian Churches (MCCC) host their inaugural Christmas Fair and Community Carols event in the Rotunda parklands.

With Millicent Lights Up and the Carols in the shed not proceeding this year the MCCC decided there was an opportunity to begin a new tradition.

One of the highlights will see the return of the live nativity play at 4pm hosted by the Lutheran Church in partnership with St Anthony's primary school and the Catholic Parish Choir.

Following the play performances will take place by Newbery Park Primary School and other local talent before the community carol singing begins.

Earlier in the day a display by the Millicent Gymnastics Club will take place followed by a family fun challenge with prizes up for grabs.

President of MCCC Shaun Mulick said the family fun challenge is a number of challenges for family teams, ideally 3-5 people.

"Things like egg and spoon races, jumping jacks and little obstacle courses," he said.

"The team to complete it in the fastest time will win a \$200 voucher for Fosters Foodland and they have generously donated a runner up prize of \$50 as well."

At 3pm a walk up talent show will take

place with Mr Mulick keen to see the variety of talents hidden in the community.

From juggling to ukulele playing all are welcome to compete for the Millicent's got talent \$100 Toy Kingdom voucher.

Market stalls, cooking demonstrations, Rob's Carriages and face painting by the local Youth Hub participants will also been on site during the afternoon with Santa Claus appearing later in the day.

Mr Mulick said the MCCC had discussed hosting a larger event for next year with plans to close George Street with stages, fireworks and rides all a possibility.

"Maybe hold it more in the evening so it's carols by candlelight afterwards.

"This has come out of conversations in my chaplaincies at the mills (Kimberly-Clark and Timberlink) and also as president of the combined churches that people want this, they miss the old street party.

"Maybe being a combined Christian churches event we might have a similar thing at Easter, so Easter and Christmas would be our big community events."

There have been challenges in putting the event together with Wattle Range Council in caretaker mode creating some limitations and trying to avoid clashing with already established events in the region

Seating will be provided but people are invited to bring picnic blankets and folding chairs if they wish.

Kay's fond farewell

A total of 43 years working at a small country school is a wonderful achievement by any means, let alone most of that time being voluntary.

This was the situation recently when more than 90 people attended a retirement celebration for Kay Fenn of Nangwarry at the local football club.

Kay moved to Nangwarry from Mount Gambier with her husband who was employed at the Nangwarry sawmill in 1967.

She was also employed at the Bedisons mill at Nangwarry for three years and sadly due to a tragic housefire in 1975 lost her husband and son.

Kay then went on to raise her three children Jo, Trevor and Chris in Nangwarry.

In 1979 she started volunteering at the Nangwarry Primary school doing odd jobs, listening to students read and helping out in the classrooms.

"I did go on the payroll in 1984 for just five hours a week and in the last 20 years have volunteered in the library.

"I have met many people over that time, many becoming life long friends and the young students from back then have their own children and grandchildren now," she said.

Kay said one of the highlights in her career was when the Governor of SA, Olympian Marjorie Jackson came to the school and presented her with a 25 year service certificate.

"The students were so excited as she showed them the shoes she ran in at the Olympics, she said.

Kay said the enrollment at the school when she first started was 175 and now is just 22.

The closing of the local sawmill had a huge impact on the town as well as the school," Kay said.

At the celebration evening former Nangwarry school principals, Karyn Prelec and Erica Hurley along with current principal Jess Herrewyn spoke on the outstanding service Kay had given to the school and the community.

Many staff and parents from past years attended from all over the south east.

Kay has also been involved in the local football, netball and softball clubs and was heavily involved in the Nangwarry Community club.

I don't have any immediate plans for my retirement. I still love to garden so that will keep me busy, she said.

"My kids keep asking me when I am going to move to Mount Gambier and I say to them while I am capable of living where I am that is where I will stay.

Regional plan on land use

The State Planning Commission is looking to consult with Limestone Coast communities as it begins developing a new plan for the region.

Limestone Coast has been identified as one of six regions across the state in line for a new regional plan that will guide land use and infrastructure needs over the next 15 to 30 years.

Minister for Planning, Housing and Urban Development Nick Champion said the Commission is eager to hear from the Limestone Coast community.

“The regional plans will provide a long-term vision for each region to support sustainable economic and housing growth,” he said.

“We want to hear about what issues and opportunities regional communities see for land use planning, infrastructure and the public realm across South Australia, and what is needed to support sustainable growth over the next 15 to 30 years.”

The Commission is set to begin its first round of engagements with stakeholders and local governments in the area from December through to March 2023.

Those engagements will help form a draft of the Limestone Coast’s regional plan, which will be released for broader community consultation in mid-2023.

CEO raises works concern

Millions of dollars in projects may be altered, delayed or scrapped all together from the Wattle Range Council schedule, after consecutive years of stretching the staff to the limits.

Speaking to the Wattle Range Council meeting last Thursday, Chief Executive Ben Gower expressed concerns over the council's ability to deliver all its capital works.

"We have \$28m in projects, and next year, we have more carryover projects, and we won't be able to deliver," he said.

"It's not an exact science but looking at how we operate, we have the human capacity to deliver about \$7 or \$8 million in projects each year.

"Last year I said we had the capacity for \$8 million, and we put \$14m in our budget."

"We have staff shortages that we can't fill, critical roles that we can't fill.

"We have asked our staff what stuff we can't get to, and we will carry forward, scale back or cancel projects."

He said the delay was caused by many factors, including staff shortages.

Speaking the the South Eastern Times outside of the meeting he said it was not a matter of money, but people on the ground.

"We got the organisation to a point where we were delivering about \$8 million worth of capital projects per annum comfortably, and then COVID hit, and all this economic stimulus money started flowing in.

"We rapidly started to ratchet up our ex-

penditure, and at the same time, we actually put through two zero per cent rate rises and so that sort of limited our ability to get more staff to do the work.

"So we went from \$8 million to \$14 million and the last two years, we've done \$14 million worth of capital works.

"Now, last year, we weren't able to achieve it all and I did warn them the previous year that we didn't have enough resources.

"We've got the cash to do it, because we got grants and all that sort of stuff to help us, but we don't actually have the arms and legs to do it."

He said council had approved a \$14 million budget, despite warnings that they needed to be "ruthless" with the budget.

"I said, look, we've got all of our mandatory asset management plans that drive the maintenance on our roads, and our buildings and all that sort of stuff. They contribute millions towards that programme and we need to do those."

And I said, 'then we've got about \$6 million worth of carry forwards, coming from last year that we didn't complete. So you're gonna need to be ruthless on your capital projects next year'.

"I went on leave for a month and I came back and we're back at \$14m again so while I think they listened, they have an appetite, it's well-intended, they want to please the community, which is great.

"But it's burning my people out."

Wattle Range to go electric

The Wattle Range Council will be looking to go electric when it comes to their fleet of vehicles.

A report tabled at the the Wattle Range Council meeting last week reveals that a KIA EV6, has just been ordered for the council chief executive Ben Gower.

Councillor Dennis Muhovics asked Mr Gower about the vehicle and how he intended to charge it.

Mr Gower said he picked the vehicle as it was able to be repaired locally, and was the best option available.

He said he was hopeful charging stations would be installed around the Wattle Range council area in the near future.

"There are charging stations to go in at Beachport, and we want to match as closely as possible at Millicent and at the library, in our new offices and in some of the Visitor Information Centres in the network that are council owned and operated," he said.

"We want to change the whole fleet to electric vehicles."

He said private investors, such as business owners, are likely to invest in chargers in an effort to attract a "captive audience" for the length of a charge.

Telstra’s four-day blackout

Telstra gave four days notice via a social media post that telecommunications equipment sited at the Millicent water tower would be turned off between Monday December 5th to Friday December 9th.

The outage has inconvenienced businesses across the CBD with owners expressing disappointment about the lack of notification or information available about the outage.

Acky’s Takeaway owners Nigel and Kylie Ross have lost business during the outage and on Tuesday were relying on a staff member’s Optus phone data to be able to offer their customers the option of using EFTPOS.

“I heard through rumours on Friday the system was going to be down for four days” Mr Ross said.

“I made an enquiry and a Telstra representative told me there was no such outage and nothing was occurring, yet here we are, second day now.

“I didn’t receive any notice from Telstra there was going to be an outage in the area and unfortunately our merchant banking through our EFTPOS machine is only wireless and they have a Telstra sim card in them.

“With the network down we’ve had customers in and they are not carrying cash.

“They have card we can’t service them, so they turn around and walk out.

“We are losing business and it’s not easy with a small business for that sort of thing to happen.

Ms Ross said

“We’ve struggled, we’ve had customers come in grumpy because we can’t provide a service, they leave to get cash and they don’t come back.

“We can’t get phone orders, it’s been hard.”

McCourts Garden Centre recently had a new EFTPOS system installed and thought that was the problem Monday morning when they could no longer process payments.

“Someone saw it mentioned on Facebook and showed it to me” garden centre owner Christine Agnew said.



Nigel Ross from Acky’s Takeaway contacted Telstra last Friday and was told there would be no outage.

“It would’ve been helpful (if we were notified) because I would’ve been able to switch over to wifi if I had known it was happening.

“It was quite stressful because I was under the pump, it’s Christmas and we are really busy and I do all my orders on a Monday morning.

“I missed the order so now my seedlings are coming a day later, things like that, I could’ve had that sorted.”

The disruption to service is required so SA Water can complete repainting the 28 metre high tower and comes on the back of previous

work at the site which impacted Telstra customers during May and June earlier this year.

The telecommunications company explained through their online statement the three sectors located at the site will be turned off at different times to minimise the impact to customers.

A SA Water spokesperson told the South Eastern Times that work to upgrade the storage tank is expected to be completed by tomorrow with crews applying a protective paint coating to the outside of the tank as the final component of the project.

“For the safety of our crews, Telstra are temporarily isolating their equipment housed on the tank while we’re working on certain sections, which we’ve scheduled to help minimise any impact on telecommunications services for their customers.

“Sustained rainfall during recent months has delayed the completion of our upgrade.

“There has been no interruption to our customers’ water supply during the project.”

Telstra were unable to be contacted for comment.

Car charges

A man and a woman have been arrested in Millicent after being caught in an allegedly stolen car late Monday night.

About 10.30pm on 5 November, Millicent patrols were travelling on Williams Road at Millicent and spotted a reported stolen Victorian green Land Rover at a service station.

The car had apparently been involved in a number of petrol drive offs over the past couple of days and police recognised the vehicle.

Patrols pulled into the petrol station and when the driver spotted police he attempted to drive off however the officer jumped in the car and restrained the man.

A 27-year-old man from Adelaide was arrested and charged with illegal use and driving unlicensed.

The passenger, a 20-year-old woman from Mount Gambier was also arrested and charged with illegal use.

The pair was refused police bail and appeared in the Mount Gambier Magistrates Court on Tuesday 6 November.

Investigations are continuing in relation to the petrol thefts.

Reunited after surprising online search

A Google search has led to a connection between long lost relatives.

When family historian Jean Winterfield sat at her computer in search of stories about her relatives, she was surprised when she found comments from some distant relatives online in 2017.

“I got the old surname happening, and then the Surrey Historical Society page came up, and I looked at this person and I thought ‘gee, okay’, and then I looked at different names that were associated, and I thought, they’re on my family tree,” she said.

“There were little messages to society from these women saying ‘Oh, that’s my great, great uncle’ or something and I thought, ‘well, they’re alive!’ - with family research, they’re usually dead.

“I thought, ‘Oh, how am I going to get in touch with them?’

“So I just emailed the Historical Society and asked them to put me in touch with these people, and a couple of days later got very excited emails from these two women.”

Those women were Sheila Richards (nee Medhurst) and Annie Dean (nee Medhurst), of Sussex, who are Mrs Winterfield’s fourth cousins.

“We share the same three times great grandfather, Michael Medhurst,” she said.

“So their great great grandfather is Mark

and ours was James. For whatever reason, I think it was the hardships of life back in the 1850s in England, he upped stumps, and he and his wife and two little kids came to South Australia. And then they’ve just bred.”

James Medhurst settled in Glencoe.

The cousins have stayed in touch over the years, and even made plans to visit Mount Gambier, but Covid delayed their trip.

Now, five years later, the family has finally been able to come together in Mount Gambier, bringing with them Sheila’s husband Geoff and Annie’s husband Tony.

Flying from England last month, the family reunited in Mount Gambier for several days, and took a trip to Glencoe, where their rela-

tives settled after leaving England.

More than 35 Medhurst relations gathered in Glencoe during the visit to meet, reminisce and catch up.

“They flew in on Friday, November 4, and on Saturday, we did the tourist bit in the morning, and then went to lunch with 22 the cousins” she said.

“And then on Sunday, we all jumped in cars and went down to Glencoe because that was where it all started.”

While the cousins had to return home shortly after the visit, the family will keep in touch via email and Facebook, and other Medhurst relatives have discussed travelling to England.

WRC jobs go begging

Wattle Range Council is struggling to fill key job vacancies, despite some being vacant for more than two years.

The matter was raised at the Wattle Range council meeting last week, with chief executive Ben Gower saying they had exhausted all options to recruit a senior planner, a job which has been left vacant for two years, including employing head-hunters and looking internationally.

They have also taken part in programmes to help with attracting graduates to the region in an attempt to encourage them to stay.

Mr Gower said the vacancies mean the council will have to scale down projects, with no manpower to get things done.

Speaking outside of the meeting, he said it was part of the national skills shortage.

"There's actually a national shortage of planners, and they just not producing enough for the industry to soak them up," he said

"So we've been without a senior planner for two years. Now we contract that work to accompany in Adelaide, but that's not ideal, because they're 450k's away."

The council currently employs two planners, who were attracted here through a pilot programme, but not a senior planner.

"They are working towards their accreditation standards, but they're not at that senior planning level, yet. They're a number of years away.

"They're both international students, and while we'd love to keep them here forever, they're higher flight risk than locally grown planners, so it does come with its challenges.

"But there's a massive shortage. He said the vacancies applied to a number of key roles within the organisation.

"We've also got significant shortages with civil engineers and we've had that for years as well," he said.

"It's those sorts of roles have been long term, though more recently, we've found it very difficult to find senior finance managers."

"I would have thought with the advent of online banking systems and all that sort of stuff that that they'd be in abundance of senior finance people, but there's not there's actually a nationwide shortage.

"So we've all these positions, we've used head-hunters, we've done everything we can possibly think of. And we've got long term vacancies.

"It's happening right across the board, we know the other councils are struggling, and we know businesses are struggling to find these this sort of talent.

So we're just gonna keep chipping away at it.

"My message to the chamber was, while we've got these vacancies, there's certain things we're not going to be able to achieve for our community. We just don't have the resources to do it."

Drink driver warning

Limestone Coast Police have detected two drink drivers over the weekend.

Police wish to remind drivers that static and mobile driver screening tests will continue to feature in the Limestone Coast throughout the upcoming festive season.

Feds stump up with foreshore funding

Kingston SE will be further protected from erosion thanks to a federal grant.

Six projects aimed at protecting South Australia's iconic coastline will proceed with the federal government providing \$6.7 million to help South Australia mitigate the risk of climate change.

Seawalls will be constructed at Wyomi, south of Kingston SE, and at Victor Harbor to reduce the risk of erosion to the respective coastlines.

The six South Australian projects were among 34 funded nationally under the Coastal and Estuarine Risk Mitigation Program.

Recent modelling shows South Australia is expected to receive much more extreme weather including over the next 25 years and these projects will be vital in terms of reducing the impact on communities.

Projects funded under the scheme include the construction of rock seawalls and breakwaters, large-scale beach erosion protection and improving community awareness of coastal hazards.

Deputy Premier Susan Close welcomed the funding.

"I welcome the Albanese government's commitment and dedication to mitigating the risks to the environment associated with climate change," she said.

"It is absolutely critical we build resilience to climate changes within our communities and these project swill help to do this.

"Climate change is expected to increase the risks of flooding, storm surges and erosion, so it's vital we get on with these type of projects aimed at mitigating risk."

Minister for Emergency Services Joe Sza-kacs said one in two Australians live within seven kilometres of the coast, potentially exposed to coastal flooding

"As we experience increasingly severe weather events, we need to be better prepared and this means investing in disaster mitigation strategies and infrastructure," he said.

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

Long La Nina hits quality of 2022 harvest

The harvest of 2022 has been delayed for farmers due to a larger amount of storms and colder temperatures interfering, which has caused delayed growth and a significant challenge with weed control and increased disease.

Rural Business Support (RBS) has been offering its services by responding to enquiries submitted by farmers struggling with the 'wet drought' which has been used to describe the current weather and how it has been leading to major crop losses.

The latest storms over the weekend have had many farmers dealing with shot grain, spoiled hay or water-logged crops.

What should have been an exceptional harvest is now a cause for concern as farmers count the cost of the wetter than usual spring.

RBS CEO Brett Smith said croppers and mixed farmers who were already considering the financial impact of the 'wet drought' and down-scaling the quality of their crops to work through options would be in a better place to recover financially.

"By preparing contingency plans for the remainder of the season and considering the short and long-term implications on your business model sooner, farmers can take action earlier to ensure they are protected financially," Mr Smith said.

Mr Smith encouraged farmers who were concerned about their cashflow and ongoing delays to this year's harvest to reach out for a confidential chat about their options sooner rather than later.

Buy a Bale is back

The dire flood crisis continuing to grip huge areas of land and communities within New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia has prompted the urgent relaunch of Rural Aid's Buy a Bale rescue campaign in the lead up to Christmas.

Thousands of rural families face a bleak festive season, with recovery from what has been deemed Australia's most expensive flood event hampered by ongoing rain across the more than 130 local government areas already declared disaster zones.

Rural Aid has now made an urgent plea for donations through the Buy a Bale program, which first came to prominence when it raised \$100 million for drought-affected farmers between 2015 and 2020.

Rural Aid CEO, John Warlters, said the scale of this disaster made it necessary to bring Buy a Bale back.

"These floods have had unprecedented impact on rural Australians - families are losing their homes and livelihoods and entire towns are being wiped out," Mr Warlters said.

"Hay supplies are running out and stranded animals are drowning and starving. Crops are rotting in the ground.

"It's time to bring Buy a Bale back, not only to provide much-needed fodder deliveries, but also to offer financial assistance, clean drinking water, volunteer and counselling support to Aussie farming families facing this crisis."

Rural Aid predicts at least a two to three-year recovery for communities, with the funds required to adequately support farmers and families estimated to be in excess of \$50 million.

With concerns the extent of the disaster has not been fully communicated to policy makers, corporate Australia and the broader community, Mr Warlters is urging governments and private donors to commit to prioritising the wellbeing of affected communities.

"We're ready to execute an extensive recovery support program based on a tried and tested approach, but we need as much help as we can get," he said.

"With the generous support of the broader community, we can help keep our farmers going, get them back on track, keep homegrown produce on our tables, and stand with our mates in regional Australia.

"These families need help, and they need

it now. Without it, they face a frightening and uncertain time as the rest of the country gears up to celebrate Christmas."

Deniliquin farmer and Rural Aid board member, Airlie Landale, said the floods have been catastrophic.

"It is now summer, yet it still feels like winter is rolling on and haunting us. It feels wrong to be speaking about too much rain, but these floods have taken a toll on so many," Ms Landale said.

"Farmers have lost thousands upon thousands of hectares of crop, producers have lost livestock, fences and their homes, and rural communities and businesses have been isolated and inundated with water.

"It will take months - if not years - for people to recover, but I know the strength and resilience of our rural people will once again shine though."

All donations received by Rural Aid ensure the ongoing provision of critical economic and empathetic assistance to farmers, including the expansion of their national mental health and wellbeing program.

Flying in the face of rivals

The 2023 dual cab Raptor lives up to its wild-world moniker representing the bird of prey in all its elusive power and engaging street presence, the latter emphasised by contrasting black wheels and signature grille, plus 'RAPTOR' decals on its flanks.

The Ranger Raptor has been around for a while, four years to be exact, and like its predecessor, the latest generation, developed by the Australian design and engineering team with Ford Performance DNA, relies on Ford's F-Series trucks for its pedigree.

The newbie, with its own looks and more power, is streets ahead of the 'old bird'.

However, so is the price - \$85,490, plus on-road costs, as opposed to \$74,900, plus on-roads.

To my mind, the MY23 Ranger Raptor carries off the extra 'load' well.

Opposition includes Nissan's Pro4-X Warrior and Toyota HiLux Rogue.

The Ranger Raptor is surprisingly restrained in exterior looks - flashy chrome is conspicuous by its absence - relying on dark FORD block letter radiator grille, grey wheel arch extensions and functional fender vents, and black powder coated die-cast aluminium side steps.

Matrix LED headlamps are accompanied by LED daytime running lights and front fog lamps.

LED tail lamps can be found out the back with a rear bumper with integrated step pad and towbar.

Tow hooks front and back share company with front bash plate made from 2.3 mm-thick steel, while an optional factory fitted power roller shutter seals the lined tub from the weather.

The Raptor comes standard with 17-inch alloy T285 / 70 R17 BF Goodrich K02 high performance all-terrain tyres.

A full-size spare is slung under the vehicle.

Ford Performance seats embossed with Raptor signature logo, suede inserts and orange highlights and stitching.

Up front they are firm yet comfortable and supportive during spirited cornering.

The rear bench is wide enough to take three adults.

The sports steering wheel has room for a selection of controls including selective drive modes and paddle gear shifters.

Storage is made up of a deep centre console bin and phone charge pad.

Triple stack of glove compartments is designed to take stuff of multiple size and shape.

Doors incorporate bottle storage and cup holders pop out from the outer dash.

A centre mounted tablet-style 12-inch touchscreen with a Ford SYNC 4A system and wireless Apple CarPlay and Android Auto connectivity.

There's a 12.4-inch configurable digital instrument cluster directly in front of the driver, while the Bang and Olufsen audio has its quirks operating the on-screen controls.

The sound could be sharper too.

Half a dozen factory-fitted ready-wired auxiliary switches are handily sited in the roof, while the door release is not so, being a horizontal lever hidden inside the door pull.

If there was one thing wanting on the previous Raptor it was its shortcomings in the power department.

The 2-litre four-cylinder turbo-diesel engine was not up to it.

The MY23 model tells a different story.

Made from the same high-performance material Ford uses in its NASCAR racing engines, the 3-litre twin-turbo-charged petrol V6 unit is a different beast with up to 292 kW of power, plus 583 Nm of torque on tap, 85 per cent more power and 16.6 per cent more torque.

The prodigious power is put to ground by a ten-speed automatic transmission and front and rear differentials, giving the truck 2500 kg braked trailer towing capacity.

The Ranger's five-star ANCAP score cannot be extended to the Raptor because of differences in such things as engine size and ride height.

However, the list of safety features includes autonomous emergency braking, adaptive cruise control with stop-and-go, traffic sign recognition, blind-spot monitoring with rear cross-traffic alert, lane-departure warning and lane-keep assistance, automatic headlights and high-beam, 360-degree camera, front and rear parking sensors, tyre pressure monitoring and intelligent speed limit assistance.

For a start (literally) there was a surprising amount of turbo lag: unusual with the advanced turbo tech of today.

However, late in the test I discovered the racy Baja anti-lag system that, at the touch of a button, enables rapid delivery of boost on demand.

Thus engaged, the ute fairly flew off the mark accompanied by a unique and full-on exhaust note.

Ford claimed an optimistic fuel consumption of 11.5 litres per 100 kilometres on the combined urban/highway cycle with 98 RON premium unleaded, the test vehicle could do no better than 13.5 litres per 100 kilometres in a range of driving conditions.

The driver has access to a plethora of selectable drive, steering, damper and exhaust modes, all of which can be lumped into one at the touch of a single button.

Trail Control comes in handy off road, helping to maintain constant speeds up or down varying terrain, while unique 17-inch optional beadlock-capable wheels are designed to minimise damage from rocks while off-road driving.

Brakes, ventilated discs front and rear,

are boosted electronically, while Ford Performance developed Fox 2.5-inch Live Valve internal bypass shock absorbers and electronically controlled front and rear locking differentials do their part to make off-roading safe and comfortable for occupants.

Raptor's sheer bulk and large turning circle regularly called on the efficiency of its 360-degree camera with its dynamic guidelines to

avoid costly scrapes.

Maximum water wading depth recommended is 850 mm while maintaining steady speed of 7 km/h or less.

Despite the odd stumble, when all the talking ceased, the Ford Ranger Raptor showed itself to be worthy of its elevated position in the species.

Streets ahead of the Raptor it replaces.

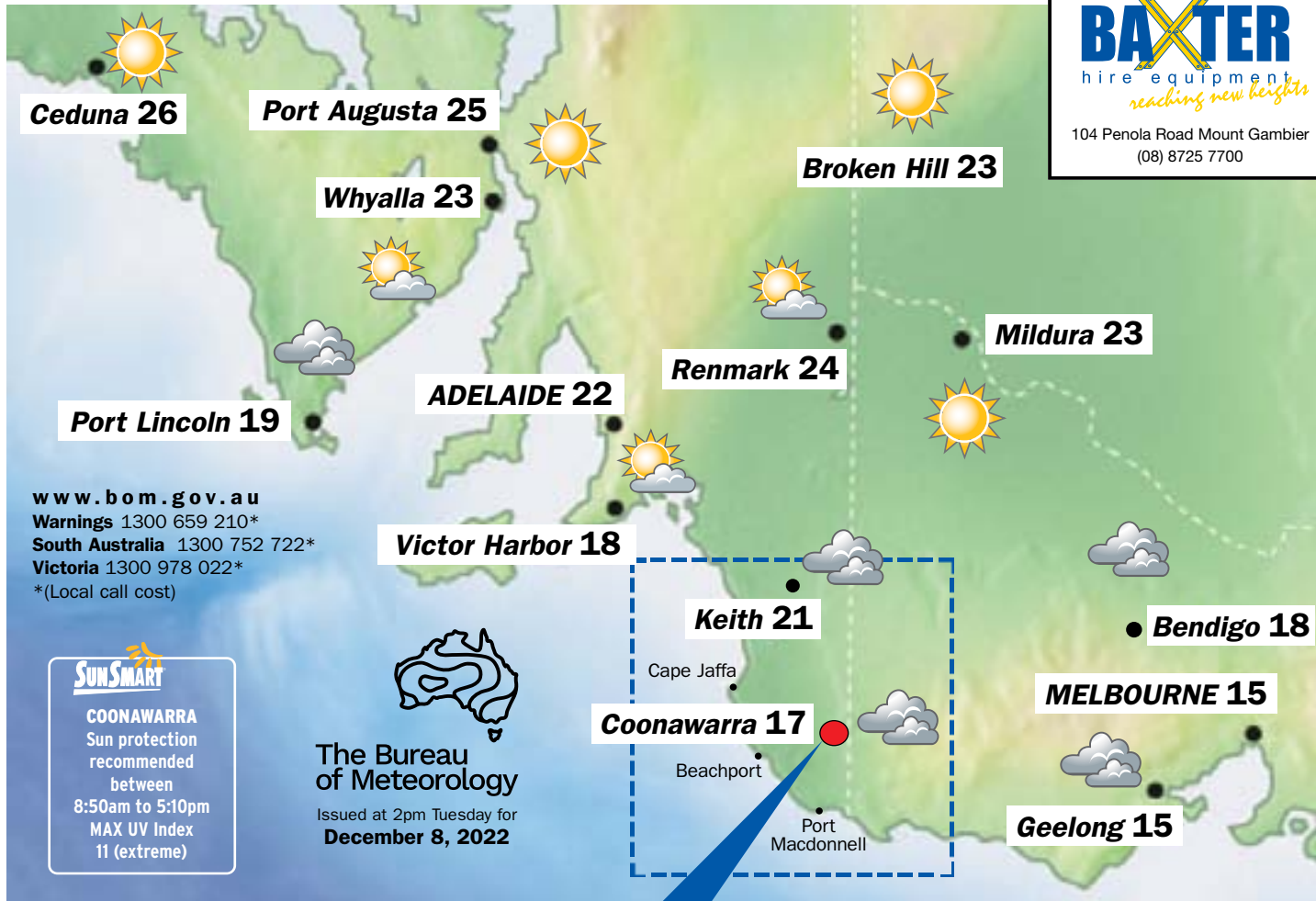

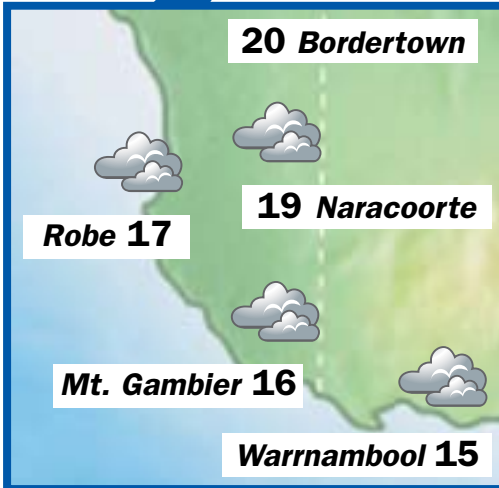
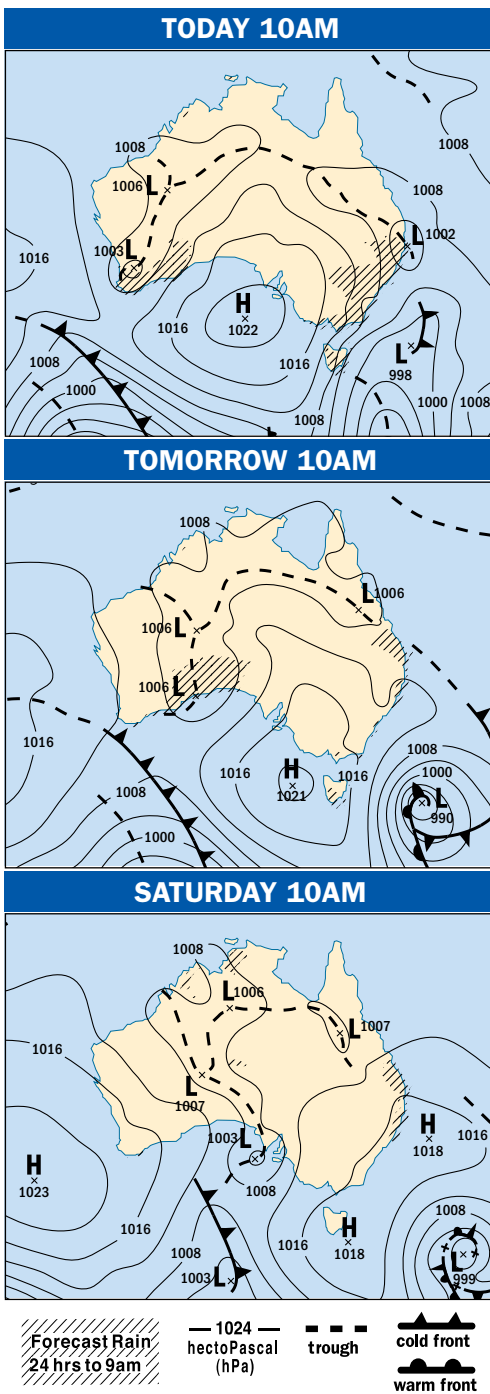

FRANKLIN
SBS, Sunday, 9.10pm

The grandeur of nature is the beating heart of this deeply moving doco. An eloquent feature film from art-house director Kasimir Burgess, two rippling currents propel the story. One narrative stream follows the historic early 1980s "Franklin Campaign" and the movement to stop a hydroelectric project in Tasmania's World Heritage-listed Franklin River. The other tide features eighth-generation Tasmanian Oliver Cassidy (pictured, right, with Bob Brown) embarking on a mentally and physically taxing solo rafting pilgrimage down the river in memory of his father, one of the protestors who fought to save the waterway from destruction. The mix of nature, politics and family ties anchor this gem.



WAR OF THE WORLDS
SBS, Thursday, 9.30pm

Returning for season three, this modern retelling of H.G. Wells's classic 1898 novel about an alien invasion of Earth plays a bit like *Terminator* meets *Independence Day*. The ambitious sci-fi drama has deviated quite far from its source material, with the focus now on wormholes, time travel and mass hallucinations. Brilliant scientist Bill Ward (Gabriel Byrne, pictured) has saved humanity but finds himself further estranged from his family. Bitter with his lot, he bristles at the distressing news that people around the world are experiencing a mysterious phenomenon. Meanwhile, an interstellar discovery leads astrophysicist Catherine (Léa Drucker) to investigate the crisis.

Sunny days for anglers

A hot and sunny weekend across the Lime-stone Coast was just what the doctor ordered for us southerners.

A good dose of sun, light winds and flat seas saw masses of people hit the water for the first weekend of summer, with plenty of fish caught right along the coast.

Offshore has been busy over the last week or so, with a massive list of species reeled in as anglers headed over the shelf while the weather has been nice.

Tyson from Want To Fish Charters put his clients onto some cracking fish over both days of the weekend.

The crew managed blue eye, hapuka, gummy shark, school shark, nannygai and snapper for the table in what looked to be a ripper few days on the water.

James Varcoe and crew found some excellent fishing out there too, managing a good feed of hapuka off the bottom and a ripper big eye thresher shark that weighed 85kg cleaned.

We go on about how good gummy and school shark are all the time on the table, but these thresher sharks are next level.

I think half of Millicent got a feed out of this big boy.

In a bit closer, the fishing from 60 metres through to 120 metres was excellent again.

Pete Haarsma and Ange Millar found some nice sharks over the weekend, with Ange managing her first ever gummy, a ripper 1.3m fish and a bit over 10kg.

Inshore this week we have seen heaps of snapper.

Just about everyone has been getting into them this week, from Green and Danger points, through to Factory Bay, Orwell Rocks, Hutt Bay and Cape Douglas all the way through to Carpenter Rocks.

There were a few ripper fish caught this week, but the snapper of the week, I would say, would have to be the one Shaky Von Stanke boated off Carpenter Rocks that was 82cm and over 7kg.

Matt Bell and crew found some rippers in Gerloff Bay on Saturday afternoon, boating snapper to 60cm and silver trevally to a couple of kilos.

The guys on the beach have been in to the

snapper as well, with more 60cm plus fish being caught off the sand.

Andy Barton has been landing a few nice fish each trip with plenty of his being around that 50-60cm range around the Factory Bay/ Danger Point area and a few rays, sharks and other bits and pieces in between snapper.

The whiting fishing this week has been red hot, the stir from last weekend matched with a few calm and windless days saw plenty get stuck into them.

Much like the snapper, the distribution of the whiting has been unreal.

Landbased and boat based anglers have all been in the thick of it managing fish to over 50cm and in good numbers.

Our usual haunts are all fishing well, from Port MacDonnell through Carpenter Rocks and up to Beachport and Cape Jaffa.

Last year we were all super impressed by the whiting numbers and this year is looking even better.

Plenty of waders made the most of the warm weather on the weekend to chase a feed of gar in their favourite spots and very few came home disappointed.

The gar are in great condition at the moment, they are in great numbers and they are spread out.

It is becoming more and more common now to see anglers catching some nice gar off the Port MacDonnell jetty, which is safe for the kids and accessible by everyone.

Speaking of the Port MacDonnell jetty, we are seeing some encouraging numbers of squid turning up in the evenings now and the size is quite impressive.

I spoke to one fella down there over the

weekend and he had squid with a hood length of 40cm, which has to be a couple of kilo or more.

The jig of choice at the moment seems to be bright colours, be it white, yellow or lumo, just something that stands out seems to be the go.

Sticking with the jetty, there has been some nice tommy ruff caught of an evening recently and there has been the odd mackerel starting to turn up too.

It has been a while since freshwater fishing has become a regular part of my fishing report, but now that Rocklands Reservoir is fully stocked and fishing well, Lake Toolondo is getting filled up and all our other inland lakes are chock-a-block, it has become a weekly thing and I love it.

Lake Charlegrark was abuzz with speedboats and skiers over the weekend, but that does not stop the cod coming out of an evening.

Campers soaking a bait overnight will often wind a cod or two in while it is dark, or even first thing in the morning as the sun comes up.

There have been more fish caught in Rocklands Reservoir this week – both yellowbelly and cod have been on the radar, but a few redfin and Aussie bass have been nailed too.

Dark soft plastics seem to still be the biggest producer, but we are seeing more and more taken on spinnerbaits, chatterbaits and bib-less vibes.

The Glenelg River is starting to regain more and more clarity by the week and although there is still a heap of water to come down, it looks good and is fishing well.

The bream and perch have been on fire – some really big samples of both have been caught anywhere from the Caves area and downstream, but it is still quiet on the mullo-way front.

There has been the odd very small whisper of a few fish down there, but nothing major just yet.

We are hearing of pretty good numbers of big fish spotted on the sounder, so hopefully they turn on soon.

The weekend forecast looks like it should be another good one.

Low seas and easing winds should make for a great weekend on the water.

Until next week, safe fishing.

The class is a support act for the V8 Supercars Adelaide 500 and Gartner said it was a surreal experience to race at the famous Adelaide circuit.

"To be able to race at the Adelaide 500, the biggest event in the year for motorsport in South Australia, it is huge," he said.

Gartner said racing at the support events for the V8 Supercars at a national level was massive for him to promote his name and develop as a driver.

In the 19-year-old's first open-wheel event, Gartner took some time to adapt to the car which he previously said was nothing like he had driven before.

"It was very challenging, we didn't get the hang of it until the first qualifying on the Friday," he said.

"It was a tough gig in the open-wheeler but that was expected with it being the first time on a street circuit and first time in an open-wheeler but I really enjoyed it."

The first practice run of the weekend saw Gartner's best lap set at 1:25.308.

It was a rocky start for the young-gun as he crashed the car in the opening session, which affected his confidence in the second session.

"Practice 2 was probably our worst session because I was so nervous and not real confident through that certain corner," Gartner said.

"I had a chat to a driver that has raced these cars for a long time and he helped me on the Thursday night and my engineer gave me some pointers.

"We watched the footage to see where I went wrong in the crash and after that I had to overcome it and got a lot better in qualifying."

After practice it was pedal to the metal for qualifying where Gartner again improved on his personal best to set a time of 1:20.02, more than five seconds faster than his best time in Practice 1.

He said throughout the weekend his pace around the circuit was a massive improvement compared to where he was in practice.

Gartner claimed 13th place in the first race with his best lap time in the 1:20's again.

He then put in an impressive performance on Saturday for Race 2, where he finished ninth with a best lap time of 1:20.05.

The final race of the weekend saw Gartner

finish just outside the top 10 after a battle with Sebastien Amadio.

Gartner's consistency was prominent throughout as his best lap in the final race was a 1:20.025.

"I loved it, I moved up into the top 10 in one of the races so couldn't ask for much more on my debut," he said.

It has been a successful year behind the

wheel for Gartner, as he made his presence felt with a round win at Tailem Bend in the Circuit Excel SA Series in September before more recently claiming his first victory in the TA2 Muscle Car Series.

Gartner said he intends to continue racing the TA2 Mustang next year but remains open to any opportunity which presents itself.
