Penola High School has celebrated a remarkable achievement, with 100 per cent of their year 12 cohort completing their SACE.

SACE results were announced on Monday, with the top ATAR results in Penola going to Aaron Zerk with a score of 84 and Kiana Cabarrubias, who received a score of 79.95.

Principal Steve Carli-Seebohm congratulated all Year 12 students on their achievements.

"It's always exciting to see 100 per cent completion. This number reflects the hard

work and dedication of not just the students to their studies, but to the teachers who have guided and supported them across the year," he said.

"I am immensely proud of each Stage 2 student from Penola High and what they have achieved.'

Students completing in 2022 represent the first cohort to spend their entire SACE journey in the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite this, a record high 98.7% of Year 12s finished their SACE in 2022.

Further to this, a record 27,095 students

completed a Year 12 subject in 2022.

Of these, 806 students are of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) descent, representing a 16.3% increase for these stu-

SACE Board Chief Executive Michaela Bensley aid she is proud of this year's students' toughness and ability to shine through a period of uncertainty.

"Whilst previous completers experienced disruption from COVID, we're now seeing the first group of SACE students who have only known COVID through their SACE. Their Year

10, 11 and 12 classes have all been disrupted, especially through a Year 11 of lockdowns and remote learning," she said.

"It's important for students to have a strong connection with their school especially their friends and teachers.

"Throughout 2022, both students and teachers have shown an incredible amount of resilience and adaptability to stay connected. I'm looking forward to hearing more about their stories and the amazing things this group will go on to achieve."

The Emergency Department at the Penola War Memorial Hospital will be closed for the rest of the year, due to a Covid outbreak.

The department closed on Tuesday, December 20, and is expected to re-open on Tuesday, January 3, 2023. While closed people seeking emergency care should travel to

the nearest hospitals, which are in Naracoorte, Millicent and Mount Gambier.

The hospital has apologised for the inconvenience.

Learn more about Penola and it's story

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

Donald Mcdonald's Home

In 1868 Alexander Cameron had a stone cottage built for Donald McDonald, publican of the Royal Oak Hotel, to separate his private life from his business life. He and his family occupied the cottage until 1883. During that time Donald's sister, Flora and her family, which included her daughter Mary MacKillop, were frequent visitors.

This property was purchased in 1888 by Leonard William Peake, who in 1889 added part of the section facing Riddoch Street and named it St Helier after his former Channel Island home in Jersey. An extension was added to the stone cottage in 1899. Leonard Peake served for thirty five years as District Clerk and his youngest son Lyle R Peake for eighteen years. Another son Archibald T L Peake, a schoolteacher, occupied the building until the early 1920s.

It became a private hospital owned and run by Sister Margaret A (Daisy) McKay in 1930 with Dr Bourke in attendance. Matron Florence Hill of Kalangadoo became the owner in 1937 and there was accommodation for ten patients with renovations providing installation of electric light, an equipped operating room and the availability of surgical, medical and obstetric cases. In 1944 it was purchased by Dr Oaten to become the Penola District Hospital and a men's ward, nurses' quarters, staff room, bathroom and morgue were added. After a new hospital was built in 1955, this building was divided into flats to accommodate emigrant Catholic families fleeing Europe after World War 11.

In the 1970s it was in a state of disrepair and was purchased by the Symons family as a residence and carefully restored. The building continues in that capacity.

New words for civil prayer

Wattle Range Councillors will no longer pray the "almighty god" before meetings, following a vote at the last council meeting.

Last week, councillors voted to adopt new wording for the civil prayer.

Councillor Dale Price raised the matter, stating he wanted to adopt a more inclusive approach to the prayer.

"I am not seeking to take away a person's capacity to speak or pray to their god, whoever that may be, but I am giving people from other faiths the ability to speak to their god," he said.

"I think this change will address the think-

ing and the aspirations of each one of us as moving the words almighty God and Amen. councillors and I am mindful that it is a personal statement between myself and the deity I want to address.

Councillor Peter Dunnicliff agreed.

"I can see Councillor Price's point, because if the word god is in there and that's not your deity, you would be speaking dishonestly," he

Mayor Des Noll said he had spoken with local pastors over the weekend about the issue and read out a short prayer.

Councillor voted to change the prayer, re-

Councillors will now say 'We pray that in this meeting we speak honestly, listen attentively, think clearly and decide wisely, for the good of our District and the wellbeing of our people.

They also voted to adjust the welcome to country

Mr Price said he wanted the acknowledgment to be 'more inclusive

"Previously we had quite a narrow statement. I would like to recognize that this community has many people who have made this country a place of envy to the world," he said.

"I would like to have this as a statement because it is more inclusive to people of all ethnic backgrounds."

The new wording will replace the previous acknowledgement and replace it with the wording 'We acknowledge the Boandik people as the traditional custodians of the land on which we meet. We pay respect to all Australians who have made and continue to make a positive contribution to our culture and way of life.

Rural Matters

Dairy prices rapidly rising

Australian consumers are seeing significant price increases across dairy products – based on the national Consumer Price Index (CPI) data – with milk prices having risen at the fastest rate since records began, according to a new report by agribusiness banking specialist Rabobank.

In its Global Dairy Quarterly Q4 2022 – Walking the Tightrope into 2023, Rabobank says while the Australian consumer has shown resilience in the face of cost-of-living pressures, signs of dairy demand weakness are emerging as a willingness and ability to spend on discretionary items softens.

"Households are trading down to private label offerings, with volume declines in grocery and foodservice channels being more evident – it looks set to be a tough year ahead for Australian consumers," report co-author Michael Harvey, senior analyst for Dairy and Consumer Foods at Rabobank, said.

"For Australia's dairy producers, farmgate margins remain positive and are supported by the record milk prices," Mr Harvey said. "Average farmgate milk prices across Australia's Southern Export regions range between AUD 9.50-10/kgMS.

"The high milk prices have mostly offset major cost headwinds – fertiliser, fuel and feed – for dairy farmers. While labour availability remains a major challenge for dairy farming businesses." Mr Harvey said Rabobank is not expecting further major lifts in milk prices as the season draws to a close.

Production

Rabobank is revising its milk production fore-cast downward for 2022/23, with the impact of production constraints, the result of flooding and excessive rainfall, becoming visible in the peak production months – October and November. The report said as of October, Australian milk production is down 6.6 per cent for the season to date, with widespread decreases across all states/regions.

"A wet summer is in play across much of eastern Australia – driven by the La Nina in the tropical Pacific Ocean and a negative Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD)," Mr Harvey said.

"And many dairy production regions on Australia's east coast have been dealing with excessive rainfall and flooding.

"There has been significant feed and fodder losses as a result of the rain and flooding – it is one of the key challenges faced by impacted farms. Some supply chain/logistics issues have been reported as a result of the wet weather – including some dumping of milk – but not to the point of having a material impact on milk processing," he said.

Dairy farmers can look forward to access to plenty of supplementary feed in the months ahead. Rabobank is expecting a large winter wheat crop, with harvest now underway – albeit somewhat delayed by rain and flooding.

Exports

Australia's dairy exports continue to grow despite falling milk supply. Mr Harvey said this is supported by improvements in global freight markets and normalising consumer behaviour – post COVID – across export markets in Asia.

"Australia's total dairy export volumes (tonnage) were four per cent higher in the first two months of 2022/23 season. However, it was a mixed bag – liquid milk exports are running strong, but it has been a slow start for cheese and whey," he said.

${\bf Global\ outlook}$

Weaker global dairy markets remain a key theme as 2022 comes to a close, the report says. But there is clear divergence between regions and dairy products.

The Rabobank report says cheese and butter prices in the US and EU have performed the best, while Oceania Global Dairy Trade (GDT) powder and butter prices have been on the decline. Oceania skim milk powder (SMP) prices led the way, dropping 14 per cent on average from Q3 2022 end prices and plummeting 34 per cent since the peak in early Q2 2022.

The second half of 2022 has tested dairy's affordability for importing countries. "China remains conspicuously quiet on the buying front compared to last year as it digests local inventories and imported stock," the report said. "The US dollar lifted by six per cent on a broad dollar index basis at its peak during Q3, before eroding much of the gains by mid-November. Yet, weaker US dollar-priced dairy commodities have incentivised tier two and tier three buyers to return to the market, taking the opportunity to refill inventory pipelines as tourism returns and hospitality recovers."

Rabobank expect the global milk supply 'recession' experienced for the past five consecutive quarters to end, with production having progressively declined over that period.

"Q4 2022 brought another period of weather-disrupted production to Oceania. But traces of life from the global export engines are sprouting, driven by Europe and the US. Rabobank expects milk supply will gain modest momentum in 2023 from most regions apart from Australia," it said.

Milk production from the big seven dairy exporting regions – New Zealand, Brazil, Ar-

gentina, Uruguay, EU, US and Australia – is anticipated to grow by one per cent year-on-year, enough to offset the 0.8 per cent decrease in 2022 and remain on par with 2021's production, the report said.

Meanwhile, consumption growth in some export regions is becoming more challenging as consumers juggle significant price increases in the dairy cabinet.

"Dairy demand in the US has remained defiant in the face of cost-of-living challenges, while European consumers are now feeling the pinch at the retail level. Some resilience in Southeast Asia is evident, but smaller sales volumes and downstream margin pressure illustrate the headwinds," the report said.


Rabobank analysts say all eyes remain fixed on China.

"Buying patterns will remain subdued across 1H 2023 if rolling lockdowns remain a feature, milk production continues to be set on growth mode, and consumption wavers as challenging economic conditions take hold. China is likely to re-enter markets in Q2 with a bigger presence from Q3 2023 onward," the report said.

Kia upgrades its small SUV

Kia has given its Seltos SUV an update with enhancements to its styling, tech equipment and powertrain.

Seltos is one of four SUVs in the Kia range, smaller than the Sorento and Sportage but larger than the Stonic.

It has been on sale here since late 2019 and competes strongly against vehicles such as the MG ZS, Mitsubishi ASX and Hyundai Kona in the crowded small SUV market segment.

As before the new Kia Seltos comes with the choice of four variants: S, Sport, Sport+ and GT-Line. Likewise, there are two powertrains, a naturally-aspirated 2.0-litre Atkinson cycle

unit and a 1.6-litre turbo-petrol Smartstream.

The latter engine has been upgraded with a 12% boost in power to 146 kW as well as a new eight- torque converter automatic transmission replacing the previous seven-speed DCT.

The $2.0~\mathrm{MPI}$ engine retains the previous CVT transmission.

Styling changes are minor with a new front bumper and more prominent skid plate. Other changes vary according to the model.

Standard safety features include Front & Rear Parking Sensors, Intelligent Speed Limit Assist (ISLA), Lane Following Assist (LFA), Rear-Cross Traffic Collision Avoidance Assist

(RCCA) and Blind-Spot Collision-Avoidance Assist (BCA).

Inside MY23 Seltos has been refreshed with analogue gauges now replaced by digital displays across the range. Seltos S features a compact digital driver display, while Sport, Sport-and GT-Line trims gain a dual 10.25" display similar to the award-winning all-new Sportage and EV6, along with a newly designed Climate Control Panel.

Seltos Sport and above also get the new Kia Connect system providing benefits in safety, security, convenience, connectivity, and LIVE services by using telematics systems to transfer real time data, such as weather and traffic information.

The Kia Connect smartphone app allows users to connect with their vehicle remotely.

Drivers can sync calendars, plan journeys with online navigation and access onboard features including live traffic alerts and real-time weather forecasts.

Valet Mode protects the owner's personal information when being driven by a third party, by disabling control.

Vehicle Information created during Valet mode can be viewed from the Kia Connect App.

As with all Kia vehicles Seltos gets a sevenyear, unlimited kilometre standard warranty.

We'll be testing the new Kia Seltos early in the new year and will report our findings then.

Honda's iconic Civic makes a return as a hybrid car

It's been several years since the Honda Civic range has included a hybrid.

But it's back, as promised, boasting fuel consumption of 4.2L/100km and CO2 emissions of 96 g/km.

Oddly, in releasing the car, Honda makes no mention of the fuel or emissions figures -- one needs to consult the specifications to extract those details.

If those numbers are of interest, then you

might also be interested to learn the price, at \$55,000 driveaway (\$8000 more than the petrol only model).

The hybrid Civic e:HEV LX is the second stage of a three-phase rollout for the new generation of Honda's iconic small car.

It joins the 1.5-litre turbocharged VTi LX and will be followed soon by a high-performance Type R version in early 2023.

Civic is the third mainstream Honda model to be offered with an electrified powertrain in the Australian market, following HR-V and Accord.

The new Civic e:HEV LX has been engineered to ensure that its powertrain, steering and suspension deliver the engaging levels of performance, dynamic response and feedback that have always been central to Civic's appeal.

Honda says the result is a vehicle that blends a rewarding driving experience with high levels of real-world efficiency and refinement.

The newly developed e:HEV powertrain combines a power-dense lithium-ion bat-

tery and two compact, powerful electric motors with a 2.0-litre Atkinson-cycle petrol engine, which achieves exceptional thermal efficiency and features a direct-injection system optimised for faster and more efficient combustion and greater torque.

In addition to direct injection system, a number of technologies such as low temperature active catalyst and a modified intake port design contribute to improved fuel efficiency while achieving specific output.

The result is a combined maximum motor output of 135kW of power and 315Nm of torque, the highest outputs ever offered on a Civic with the exception of Type R, ensuring Civic e:HEV LX delivers a compelling driving experience.

Four drive modes -- Eco, Normal, Sport and a new Individual mode -- that allows separate control of the engine, transmission and instrument cluster.

This advanced powertrain is capable of shifting seamlessly between Electric drive, Hybrid drive and Engine drive to ensure optimum performance in both urban and highway driving.

The arrival of new Civic e:HEV LX also marks the introduction of Honda Connect, a mobile app and server platform that allows customers to access vehicle information and interact with their vehicle like never before, through a Telematics Control Unit (TCU).

Five years of Honda Connect services is included in the price and features "Geofence alert" that notifies anytime the vehicle enters/leaves a pre-set region.

A total of 11 airbags are fitted, including knee airbags for the driver and front passenger, along with new side airbags for the rear seats and a new front centre airbag to help prevent a collision between the driver and front passenger during a side impact.

Civic e:HEV LX, comes with a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty, five-year premium roadside assistance and five low-priced services.

Pleasant change in offshore conditions welcomed

At long last we are finally getting that lick of sun that we have all been craving.

The forecast is for a bit of heat, calm seas and light winds, the three things that we all look for down here.

There has not been a tonne of action from the last week, but the below average conditions have a major part to play in that.

However, there were a few anglers who hit the water.

The offshore fishos in the South East have had a rough trot in the recent months.

We have copped wind, big seas and unseasonal cold weather, but there have been windows of opportunity and we have made the most of it.

The bottom fishing in the 60-100m depths has been excellent.

Plenty of shark, snapper, nannygai, morwong and flathead to go around, with both traditional bait fishing and jigging getting the job done.

Fishing out over the shelf is still very productive when the conditions allow, with hapuka, blue eye, pink ling and gemfish all getting a mention, plus the other weird and wonderful things that come up from the depths.

Tuna news has been a bit patchy from the Beachport and Robe area, but there have been schools spotted again this past week, although I am yet to hear any anglers having a fish for them.

The upcoming Christmas week looks like it is going to be good, so it would not surprise me if we see one caught before the year's end.

Much like the offshore fishos, the beach and surf anglers have been peppered by the bad weather.

There has been weed and soft beaches to contend with, but despite all that, there have still been some great fish caught.

Snapper have still dominated what I am hearing, with some solid samples coming from right along the coast.

There have been some chunky 60cm and bigger fish coming from the Nene Valley and Jones Bay area, but the weed through there has been a bit of a headache.

Canunda has been a bit cleaner on the weed front this week and I am hearing of a plenty of salmon through there, plus some great sharks after dark.

With the incoming holidays and no doubt a massive influx of interstate tourists hitting our beaches, just be careful on the tracks in there.

It is only one vehicle wide all the way through so keep an eye out for sand flags on the hills, stick to the tracks and we will get to enjoy the place for many more years to come.

Whiting anglers have had a ball this past week.

While there has been plenty of stir going on, there has been plenty of whiting.

Inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater has been red hot and even with strong winds, it is still a fishable area.

The land-based guys are also getting in on the action, with the jetty producing some great fish in the evenings.

Surf anglers have found some nice fish along the Nene Valley and Blackfellows Caves beaches in the late arvos or early mornings, with some of the fish down that way well over 45cm.

I have heard reports from Beachport, Robe and Cape Jaffa by the whiting fishos, so those areas are all worth a crack if you are up there.

Garfish have been good when the weather has been kind.

The waders have probably fished more than the boaties in recent weeks thanks to the conditions, but the fish have been good enough to not have to get the boat wet anyway.

The usual haunts such as Cape Douglas, Pelican Point and Livingstons Bay have all been productive, as have most of the other protected but lesser-talked-about bays around the South East.

Tommies are still pretty small, but the odd bit bigger fish is starting to turn up in a few areas.

Silver trevally and mullet are still sniffing

around too, but can become a bit of a pest after a while.

The Glenelg River is producing some

more lovely fish, with bream and perch on the menu for most.

The sandflats of the estuary has been

good for boaties and waders, with baits and soft plastics both getting the job done nicely. Cut whitebait, cut crab or podworm are

Cut whitebait, cut crab or podworm are go-to baits, or 2.5inch grubs or three-inch minnow style soft plastics for those who prefer lures.

There were whispers of a big mulloway down the river over the last week or so.

I have seen the photo and it is a very big fish, a 22kg fish, but that is all I know.

I do not know the date, the time, the area or anything else about it, but it is an absolute ripper.

The forecast looks very good in the lead up to Christmas.

Plenty of sunshine, flat seas and light winds will be an absolute delight to locals and visitors.

Let's hope we see plenty more of the same in the coming weeks.

From the crew down here at Spot On Fishing Mount Gambier, we wish everyone a safe and merry Christmas and a massive thank you for your continued support through this last year – and the 30 before it.
