## Sales boost

Coonawarra wines will soon be on shelves in supermarkets in the United States. A promotional blitz across US supermarket giant H-E-B – which has more than 400 stores in Texas and Mexico – will see prominent displays of premium SA wines and in-store tastings in stores, providing a platform for the state's businesses to tap into the growing US market.

It is part of a State Government-supported campaign. The two-month campaign launched in January and has led to a more than 25 per cent increase of South Australian wine in H-E-B stores and gives invaluable exposure to established and emerging producers, fuelling export opportunities.

Other Limestone Coast regions on display include Padthaway, Mount Benson, Robe, Mount Gambier and Wrattonbully. The US is the second-largest destination market for South Australian wine exports, surging by 43 per cent to \$184.9 million in the past 12 months to December 2022 and representing 14 per cent of all the state's wine exports.

Latest ABS data shows about 45 per cent of Australia's wine exports to the US came from SA. The campaign is the latest Department for Trade and Investment initiative aimed at boosting the state's wine exports in new and growing markets, following wine tastings held in the UK, Germany, Netherlands and Canada. Minister for Trade and Investment Nick Champion said getting more South Australian wine into one of the biggest supermarket chains in the US is a big deal for our regions.

"Local labels will be on full display in shopping aisles throughout Texas – and we want to see more businesses get their products on international shelves," he said.

"This is another example of how we are looking at new ways to achieve export growth and boost one of the state's largest commodities."

Wine Australia Regional General Manager Americas Aaron Ridgway said they are encouraged to see US consumers embracing premium wines from both classic and lesser-known regions within South Australia.

"It is critically important that resources are shared and aligned as we develop and maximise the opportunity in the US, the world's largest and highest-value wine market," he said.

"The collaboration between Wine Australia, the Department for Trade and Investment and H-E-B serves as a great example."

"We made the decision that the funds have to go to South Australian charities which are close to our family's hearts and this time around we are donating to spinal cord re-

search because we do have a family friend who is in a wheelchair."

Ms Balnaves said so far the fundraising initiative has raised just over \$30,000.

"When people come in and find out their wine tasting experience is going towards charities, they think it is a great idea, especially when it is for charities such as the Royal Flying Doctors Service or the Cancer Council because so many people have been touched by those organisations," she said.

"We thought this would be a great way to

give back to the community and over time we have had requests for sponsorships whether it be in terms of monetary donations or wine donations so we thought this way we could choose who the funds go to."

Ms Balnaves said when they first began fundraising through the wine tastings, she did not think about how much would be raised but was happy with the amount so far.

# New report into council

Wattle Range Council has been deemed as being at a risk of being unsustainable, according to a new report by the Essential Services Commission of South Australia.

Under the new Local Government Advice Scheme, the Commission has released advice for the first 15 of the State's 68 councils.

The Commission is an advisory body, providing advice to all councils across a four-year cycle.

"The Commission finds the Wattle Range Council's financial position is at risk of being unsustainable based on forecast operating losses and past growth in costs related to staff," the report said.

"However, future spending constraints and future operating surpluses, based on forecast rates growth exceeding costs, should move the Council into financial sustainability.

"The Council will need to balance maintaining a more sustainable operating position and addressing the backlog of asset renewals it has accumulated, while at the same time having regard to the community affordability risks stemming from higher rates.

"The Commission recommends the Wattle Range Council make 10 changes to its strategic management plans to ensure its financial sustainability and provide confidence to ratepayers that they are paying the right level of rates for council services."

Those changes included Reviewing and publishing its long-term financial plan annually, and ensuring it identifies annual inflation assumptions for its cost and revenue estimates, review its rationale for recent high employee expenses and focus on constraining those costs, adhere to long-term financial plan principles to provide more funds for asset renewal rather than new or upgraded infrastructure and monitor the impact of future rate increases with the community and their capacity to pay, particularly on categories like primary production where rates are relatively high, among others.

Council Chief executive Ben Gower said the council acknowledged the findings, but said that every council reviewed had similar findings.

"Their analysis highlights the broad disparity between metropolitan and regional Councils when it comes to financial sustainability, which is largely driven by population density (i.e. number of rate payers available to fund community services and infrastructure provided).

"The report was written based on the Commission's analysis of high level financial data that was collated over the past ten years, as well as future projections of Council's expenditure based on a Long Term Financial Plan that has not yet been finalised.

"That plan will be presented to the Council in the next few months for its consideration and will be made available for community review and feedback prior to its formal adoption."

He said the council will continue to focus on the high level recommendations made in the report, but said there was nothing new in the report.

"Unfortunately, no new observations or recommendations were made that the Council was not already aware of through its own analysis and audit functions," he said.

"The Commission's analysis was relatively simplistic in comparison, and did not take into account fundamental changes to Council's rating system; significant fluctuations in land valuations; the construction of a significant number of new assets (made possible through Government economic stimulus grants); or changes to Council's service delivery over the 10 year period that was reviewed.

"After spending six months developing the report, the Commission provided the Council with four business days to fact check its accuracy.

"The report contains a number of errors of fact and misleading statements.

"An eight page response was provided to the Commission outlining a number of concerns about both its accuracy and relevance, however the final report was published the following day without any material changes."

"Given the development of this State Government report is likely to cost our ratepayers an additional \$40,000, we seriously question its relevance and value to our ratepayers."

# Chasing the dancing lights

Chasing the Aurora Australis for the past three years has paid off for photographer Ramona Oppelaar with a colourful set of photos capturing the night time solar activity.

Also known as the Southern Lights the phenomena occurs as a result of solar storms which react with gases as they reach the earth's magnetic field.

Using an Aurora alert app and connecting with other aurora hunters online has led to Ms Oppelaar jumping in the car late at night with her camera to chase the lights.

Ms Oppelaar first photographed an aurora three years ago on Wyrrie Road, Millicent, not far from her own home and last year drove to Southend's Boozy Gully to photograph another.

But the aurora photographed last week on Monday, February 27 has been the most colourful she has seen.

"I took them on Monday night, I had gone out Tuesday night the week before and got a bit of colour and that was probably the most colour I had before" Ms Oppelaar said.

As a self confessed 'chicken' in the dark, the keen photographer has taken her mum, partner or dog with her on these late night drives but Ms Oppelaar has now found a kindred spirit to join her.

Sharing a photo online of the aurora photographed on Tuesday, February 22, Ms Oppelaar was encouraged by Tania Millard to phone her the next time she ventured out after Ms Millard noticed a text from the fellow photographer hours after it was sent missing her window of opportunity.

The following Monday, after seeing chatter online about the possibility of another aurora sighting, Ms Oppelaar checked her aurora alert app and phoned Ms Millard to let her know she would pick her up.

Heading out to the Canunda Causeway, the pair pulled up on the side of the road and set up their tripods and cameras.

"I thought it would be a good night if the clouds go away, we were trying to figure out what setting we wanted and then we took a photo and went wow there's colour in here" Ms Oppelaar said.

"You can't see the colour with the naked eye but you could see some of the beams.

"They almost look like someone is out spotlighting, you can see it moving but there is no actual colour, but the long exposure photo picks it up.

"It was moonlit when Tania and I went out but the moon went behind a cloud just as the aurora started up so it made it a little bit darker for us."

For about 45 minutes the women took hundreds of photos of the aurora until the colour finally disappeared around midnight.

Ms Millard's interest in photographing auroras is more recent with the photographer capturing some faint colour along Beachport's coastline a few weeks ago.

"I thought it was amazing that I could actually get it at Beachport and then Ramona said 'well I can get it from nearly my back door'.

"That's when I said next time you go out let me know because I'm a night owl and stay up quite late.

"I said just ring me and that's when she picked me up around 9.30pm.

"It was my first experience of seeing something like that because I'm fairly new to chasing auroras, it's like it's dancing.

"Seeing the beams going from the ground to the sky you can actually see slight colour but of course through the camera it's just that next level.

"If someone didn't say, that's where the aurora is, you wouldn't pick it up," Ms Millard said.

The photos have achieved viral status after

appearing on television networks, state newspapers, online platforms and a state radio interview for Ms Millard.

Interest via social media channels resulted in a barrage of notifications for the women in the days that followed after sharing the photos online.

Camera settings used on the night varied between Ms Oppelaar's Canon and Ms Millard's Nikon and using the same settings resulted in slightly different outcomes.

On the night, shutter speeds of between eight to 25 seconds were used, the f-stop was

set between 3.5 and 5.6 and an ISO of 3200 used.

The keen photographers are both members of the Limestone Coast Camera Club with Ms Millard filling the secretary and treasurer roles.

The group meet monthly between Millicent and Mount Gambier venues and schedule photography outings where they experiment with light painting, portraits, astro and steel wool spinning. There is a broad range of interests and skills among the members of the group and the opportunity to share ideas and tips is a valued part of the outings.

"He discovers this other animal, Rosie, that sings and they get this connection through music and find it resurrects their spirit," he said.

Newbery Park Primary School teacher Sarah Flewster, was excited to have the orchestra play in Millicent.

"Our small country town has no community band for young musicians to aspire to, or enjoy the unique experience of live, complex acoustic performance.

"This performance adds purpose to the students everyday musical learning and will inspire persistence and future dreams.

Forget retro styling with modern features, fuel efficiency, or staying true to traditional Suzuki design elements, it's the interior of wide-open spaces that sets the Ignis GLX apart from other compact sports utility vehicles.

There are no claims here of seating for five (the base GL covers that area), but four occupants have little to complain about as far as living room in the GLX, with its sliding and reclining 50:50 split fold two rear seats, is concerned.

The test vehicle had ample leg room all round for the average-size adult.

However, not all is well. There's tightness in number of vehicles heading our way, because of global constraints on automotive computer chips and vehicle supply issues.

Suzuki Australia says current estimated delivery time, as of this month (February), on a new Ignis is currently at 88 days, up three days or four per cent on January.

That did not stop Suzuki making available a top-notch Ignis GLX CVT, which sells for \$24,490, plus on-road costs, for test.

Variants range in price from \$21,490 for the GL manual to \$25,571 for the recently added GLX Shadow.

Like all Suzukis, the MY23 Ignis is covered by the maker's five-year unlimited kilometre warranty.

In every aspect, the exterior of the new Ignis carries on the legacy of traditional Suzuki elements, while adding modern touches at the same time.

'Simple and Iconic' was the concept design.

The Ignis makes a strong impression at first sight, while keeping structural elements, such as lines, surfaces and curves simple.

In contrast, bold auto-levelling LED headlamps with auto off/on function, plus LED daytime running lights give the Ignis a distinctive look.

A chrome grille surround and 16-inch alloy wheels complete the all-round picture.

The maker's concept design is extended to the passenger cabin with simple lines and uncluttered surfaces.

The adoption of functional components gives a unique personality to the surroundings.

A bold contrast of black and white on the instrument panel and door trim creates a powerful impression, while dark blue and silver highlights on the centre console and door handles attract attention.

The aforementioned four seat set-up consists of firm yet comfortable positions up front and a manual slide-and-recline second row in which the front passenger-side occupant can take advantage of a seat back pocket.

Climate control air-conditioning extends to the rear.

Boot space is from 264 litres with four seats in operation to 515 litres with backs folded and 1104 litres of maximum volume.

A space saver spare wheel lurks beneath the floor.

For the smart phone owner connection to the world outside comes via the 9-inch touchscreen.

Make calls, access music, send and receive messages, or hook up satellite navigation through Apple CarPlay or Android Auto.

Occupants have the use of voice recognition and an audio system with six speakers.

The 1.2-litre four-cylinder engine puts out 66 kW of power and 120 Nm of torque via a continuous variable transmission.

Suzuki claims the Ignis GLX uses 4.9 litres per 100 kilometres of premium unleaded petrol in the combined city and highway cycle while putting out 114g of carbon dioxide.

In an emergency braking situation, ABS brakes keep tyres from locking and adds stability.

In addition, electric brake-force distribution helps maintain control by sending the optimum amount of force to front and rear wheels.

A new generation of stronger-but-lighter chassis provides a stable framework while reducing drag.

Pedestrians are protected too - extra shock absorption is built into the bonnet, front wiper area, front bumper and front bonnet tip to reduce collision impact.

Six airbags - driver and passenger seat front, side and curtain - are fitted as standard to the Ignis for maximum protection.

Boasting a wider, higher SUV-style stance, Ignis is guaranteed to turn heads wherever it's taken.

Impressive ground clearance of 180 mm and generous approach and departure angles mean it can be taken on minor adventures on and off road.

Harnessed through a new and improved engine, the Ignis is a willing drive under varying conditions as it balances power and fuel efficiency.

Peak power of 66 kW comes up at 6000 rpm, while top torque is on tap at a low 1500 to 4000 revs, so it's easy to see its advantages as a town car.

Suzuki claims the Ignis GLX uses 4.9 litres premium unleaded petrol per 100 kilometres in combined city/highway cycle while putting out 114g of CO<sub>2</sub>.

The test car recorded 6.1 and 4.5 respectively.

With its 32-litre fuel tank, it should be able to travel more than 600 kilometres on a full tank.

A more rigid, yet lighter suspension



smooths out shocks and enables more responsive and controlled handling.

A new generation, stronger-but-lighter chassis provides a stable framework while reducing drag.

Large diameter tyres (16-inch) and a minimum turning circle of less than 10 metres make Ignis easy to manoeuvre on narrow

streets or in tight car parks.

The Ignis GLX, with its versatile, voluminous interior, leads the way as an ultra-compact SUV.

A long list of exterior colours and accessories add to the degree of difficulty in the choice of variant.

However, there is the matter of availability.

# Top weekend for anglers

Fine weather over the weekend was enjoyed by anglers across the Limestone Coast.

There was a bit of everything landed, from offshore and out wide, to inshore reef fishing, off the sand, up the river and everything in between.

It has been a long time coming, but I have finally seen the first tuna caught from Port MacDonnell for the season.

Simon Hall was the lucky angler and found a school in around 35m of water that were happy to eat what he had on offer.

Anglers made the trek out to the shelf while the weather allowed on Saturday and there were some lovely fish caught.

James Varcoe and crew got onto some nice blue eye trevalla, Ryan Ritchie and his crew found some big hapuka and plenty of other species such as ling, gemfish and sharks were mixed in too.

Coming in a bit closer, there were some nice bottom fish caught out of that 80m through to 120m line.

Nathan Kilsby found a nice mix of bottom fish, with nannygai, terakhi and some solid tiger flathead hitting the table.

Wilba and the Southerly Fishing Charters crew have been putting their clients onto some lovely fish recently.

Over the weekend the guys boated a nice mix gummy sharks, tassie trumpeter and a cracking little mako shark.

Inshore, there is still no shortage of snapper around – they are everywhere.

The fish have been in as close as one metre of water, through to the deeper stuff.

It has not seemed to matter where you fish, you will find them.

Green and Danger Points have been on fire, as has Orwell Rocks, so any spot you stop down that way should find you on the fish.

The surf fishing this past week has been great for most and the fishing has been spread out.

Locally we have seen some nice snapper again and they are spread from the Piccininni and Green Point area, through Brown Bay, Factory Bay, Orwell Rocks and through to Nene Valley.

There have also been a couple of gummy shark mixed in with them and the odd bronzie too, so you never know what might come along.

Andy Barton and crew headed up around Robe for a fish over the weekend and were kept pretty busy.

A handful of mulloway just under that 82cm mark and a host of other species including elephant shark helped to pass the time.

There have been a few crews fishing the Cororong I have heard from and the reports have all been very similar.

Good numbers and sized gummy shark are still kicking around and the bulk of the news has been from the 28 mile through to the Tea Tree Crossing.

Salmon are still on the chew in spots, as are the odd mulloway, so it is definitely worth a crack.

There has been some more terrific whiting

fishing again this week across the South East.

The Port MacDonnell breakwater has been pretty reliable for most, with land based anglers doing well on the jetty and boat ramp, while the boaties are fishing among the cray boats.

More whiting have come from the beaches this week too, with Factory Bay, Nene Valley

and Carpenter Rocks all copping a mention.

There has been a fair bit of by-catch as well week for the whiting fishos.

Mullet, salmon trout and trevally have all been caught too.

There have still been some good numbers caught up around Beachport and Southend by the boaties in the bay and that continues further along to Cape Jaffa too.

Garfish numbers have again continued to impress this week.

Anglers are finding good numbers and good size among them.

The waders have found some nice fish at Cape Douglas, Hutt Bay, Livingstons and Pelican Point, while the boaties have done well in Cape Douglas and Livingstons too.

There have been a few caught inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater, mainly as by-catch when targeting tommy ruff, so that is another land based option too.

There have been a few anglers heading to Rocklands over the last couple of weeks targeting the yellowbelly and cod and I am hearing mixed reports.

Some have found good numbers of fish around the Brodies and dam wall areas, while others are struggling to get a bite.

The trollers are doing well at the moment, with stumpjumpers, spinnerbaits and other deeper diving minnow-style lures, while those who are casting around the heavy timber have managed a few on plastics and chatterbaits.

Bait fishos from the bank have done well on yabbies or cheese and just a traditional style paternoster rig is perfect.

It gives me great pleasure to finally have mulloway news out of the Glenelg River to report.

We have seen some nice fish from the past weekend's Glenelg River Angling Club competition, where five nice mulloway were weighed in on Sunday morning.

Fish to 15lb were caught from the Dry Creek area, right the way up to Sapling Creek over the weekend, so they are spread out and they are in very good nick at the moment.

The bream and estuary perch fishing has seemed to slow down a little, but it is still excellent.

Bream Master SA is holding a kayak only bream tournament this weekend at Nelson where over 50 of the best bream anglers from southern Australia will hit the water for two days in search of some of the big bream the Glenelg is famous for.

It is always a great atmosphere around the fishing comps, so get down and check it out.

The weekend ahead looks fabulous for most fishos.

Hopefully you get on the water.
