Vintage launched

Prominent figures of Coonawarra got down and dirty last week celebrating the beginning of the 2023 vintage season.

Celebrated at Coonawarra's Siding, more than 60 people gathered to bring in the new season.

The launch ceremony was brought back after a number of years with Coonawarra and district community members, wine industry stakeholders and dignitaries coming together to acknowledge and celebrate the significant time in the region.

Doug Balnaves performed on his beloved bagpipes after a Welcome to Country with Coonawarra Vignerons' executive officer Hugh Koch leading the ceremony.

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride, Wendy Hollick and Wattle Range Mayor Des Noll took part in a traditional grape stomp while Greg Clayfield and Bruce Redman marked the occasion by smashing a bottle of the previous year's local wine to symbolise the end of the 2022 season.

Mr Koch told the Penola Pennant he has since received positive feedback about the ceremony from the Coonawarra community.

"This is the first time we have done a vintage launch for a fair time and having 60 people there was great for a first year and it was great to get people back together again," Mr Koch said.

"We have had positive feedback since the event and it was a good opportunity for people to take time out and reflect on what they have achieved over the last year."

He said attendees also appreciated being able to discuss past years and the future of vintage with each other and with key stakeholders in an informal setting.

"The morning tea created an environment where people could discuss issues with Mr

McBride or Mr Noll as well and it was great to have an environment where that could occur," he said.

"The overall feeling on the morning was

really positive and it provided a good opportunity to reflect on past years as well as those who have laboured in Coonawarra."

Speaking on the 2023 vintage for the region,

Mr Koch said it was looking like a traditional Coonawarra vintage with grape picking due to begin in April.

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Health chief resigns to return to NZ

The chief executive officer of the Limestone Coast Local Health Network has resigned.

Ngaire Buchanan handed in her official notice to local health network staff this week stating her final day on the job would be June 28.

"After much deliberation, my decision has ultimately been driven by personal factors and I will be leaving the region to move back to New Zealand," Ms Buchanan said.

Ms Buchanan joined the health network in 2019 and lead the local board through the Covid-19 pandemic.

"We have achieved a great deal of progress towards our strategic objectives, as well as overcoming a number of enormous challenges, such as an unprecedented global pandemic," she said.

"I am so thankful to have had the opportunity to work alongside each of you. It has been a wonderful experience to work with such highly-skilled, passionate and dedicated teams."

Limestone Coast Local Health Network chairperson Grant King said Ms Buchanan provided "strong leadership" for the network throughout the pandemic.

"I understand and support her decision to return to family, and thank her for her service to our community," Mr King said.

Mystery of old silver mug to be unveiled

Early last year an unexpected package arrived at the Mount Burr Football Club.

It held a silver mug and a simple letter.

Sent from Tasmania the letter writer explained he had recently purchased a house in that state and sitting on the mantelpiece shelf was the mug.

The letter explained he had no knowledge of the former owners but the mug was engraved and acknowledged a former 1930s Mount Burr forester, M.A. Rankin.

Unable to find a Mount Burr history group the mug was sent to the football club where it was collected by Wayne Busbridge.

Mr Busbridge contacted the South East Family History Group (SEFHG) and passed

the mug on.

Since then the group, led by Virginia Pawsey, have researched the origins of the mug and who it belonged to.

As a childhood resident of Mount Burr and with a father who worked in forestry, Ms Pawsey took a special interest in the history of the mug.

Ms Pawsey is the guest speaker at tonight's SEFHG AGM and will reveal the history and mystery behind the mug unearthed by the researchers.

All are welcome to come along and hear more about the return of the silver mug at 1 Mount Gambier Road at 7.30pm tonight.

The mug will soon go on display in the Millicent Museum.

“There was lots to do on the day but if people wanted to chill out at their campsite they could and everything was within walking distance for local cafes as well which were all busy,” Ms Miller said.

She said attendees were excited to be back at the festival and have live music again.

“To be able to get together was fantastic because this is a calendar event that people who are interested go to,” Ms Miller said.

“It was incredible this year and most people don’t know what to expect and don’t realise the variety and style of music so we had a very successful Sunday Market as well.”

“The last few years grape picking has begun in March but this year it will begin in April and that is because there has been quite a wetter spring and then we went from wet and cold to good flowering,” Mr Koch said,

“When we rolled into summer in was warm in December and January but then

cooled right back and as a result of that and longer autumn days, the grapes have set really well.”

He said even though this year’s yield would be more moderate than previous years, quality grapes and product was expected yet again.

“The next two weeks are critical but so far we are looking good for 2023 and the

Coonawarra cabernet as we know is still very popular in the United States, Canada and other countries and we have a number of labels in those countries already,” Mr Koch said.

“However majority of what is sold is in Australia and New Zealand and what we’ve found is there has been some real issues about wine supply in the world but we find

quality always sells.”

He said the Coonawarra region has not had a bad vintage since it began its official recording in the 1960’s which was due to the climate on the region allowing for quality grapes.

“This continues to put Coonawarra on the map and helps keep jobs and increases tourism,” he said.

Members have spent the last two weeks working on the final section of the path between the Harbourmaster’s house and the boat ramp.

“It’s taken about 10 years overall,” he said.

“We started down the other end and the

Murder mystery returns to Millicent as fortune tellers, magicians and other weird and wonderful characters take over the National Trust Museum on Saturday April 1st.

Community members are invited to join the museum tours and attempt to solve a crime presented to them on the night.

Volunteers will transform the museum into a 1980's Carnevale theme and guests will be greeted by a series of scenarios while they wind their way through the complex.

As with previous murder mystery evenings, things quickly sour as a deceased body is found with several possible suspects to be found.

Local Detective Sergeant Bill Reynell, with the help of the local post office manager, discover the young murder victim and set about trying to solve the crime.

Tour guests are welcome to ask questions of the cast who may give out clues and red herrings to those who want to solve the crime.

Chris Hollingsworth has been involved in the museum production every year it has been held and this is her second year of writing the script.

"I do my thinking at night and I came up with a Romany traveller theme" she said.

"I wanted to do something Carnevale because it's easy to costume.

"We've got 30 cast members and they will be spread out in five sections of the museum.

"Half a dozen people are now involved because they came last year and thought it looks like fun."

Animal activists film hunt

Opening day of duck hunting season at Lake George in Beachport attracted the attention of the RSPCA South Australia who have released a statement citing concerns about the actions of some hunters.

Witnesses captured video footage of what they state are breaches of the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) codes of practice for the humane destruction of birds by shooting.

A group of 12 animal activists from Victoria and South Australia met at the lake to record hunter behaviour during the opening two days.

Adelaide-based Kerri, who requested her full name be withheld, was one of those filming at sunrise and sunset.

“I went because I have an interest in the safety of animals and I’ve never actually seen it first hand” she said.

“I had presumptions that the hunters would shoot a duck and it would die.

“I had heard statistics about one in four were injured with the presumption being the rest of them die instantly.

“In my experience this was not the case, most of them were actually injured, not killed instantly.

“My second presumption was there would be a few people doing the wrong thing, in reality most people seemed to be doing the wrong thing.”

The statement released by the RSPCA raised several concerns including:

- The leaving of wounded ducks in the water while continuing to shoot or retrieve decoys.
- Allowing dogs to play with wounded ducks before moving to retrieve them and holding wounded ducks up for dogs to snap at.
- Twirling ducks around with the birds flapping for some time before dying and dropping birds while still alive to resume shooting.

- Handing a wounded duck to a child to kill, and the child then twirling it around ineffectively
- Shooting a bird of a prohibited species then stomping it into the mud.

Some of these instances were captured on video and released to media.

Field and Game Australia CEO Lucas Cooke addressed claims made in the RSPCA media release.

Responding to the retriever dog shown in the video Mr Cooke said the duck was diving under the water.

“It takes the dog a few attempts to locate and pick up the duck, then he gently carries it back,” Mr Cooke said.

“He’s not chewing on it or maiming that bird.

“It is exactly why having a dog is an effective retrieval strategy because that dog gets hold of that bird better and quicker than a person probably could.

Mr Cooke also addressed concerns the birds are not dead after being twirled due to the flapping of the wings.

“It has been established once you have broken the duck’s neck it is dead.

“Quite often the wing flapping will commence once the duck’s neck is broken which is a normal nervous response in a dead bird.”

However, Mr Cooke stated the twirling or helicoptering technique used by hunters several times through the video is not the preferred method used to dispatch wounded birds.

The DEW code of practice states that injured birds must be killed as quickly and humanely as possible by a second shot, or a blow with a heavy instrument to the rear of the skull (the bird should be either restrained or immobile).

This method of dispatching wounded birds varies from Victoria with Mr Cooke stating their organisation would encourage hunters to quickly perform a cervical dislocation which is the recommendation in that state.

“We encourage hunters to be educated and know and practice the right ways to dispatch birds as quickly possible.

“We wouldn’t encourage the windmill approach but at the same time we stop short of saying that guy has done anything wrong, he just hasn’t done it the most effective way he could’ve.

“I find it difficult that SA would not allow you to dispatch a bird in the way that Victoria insists you must.

“If the updated version of the SA requirement are to do it that way then we will probably need to take that on notice and educate our hunters.

“There would be multiple Victorian hunters that have hunted for years and know how to administer a cervical dislocation and would do that as the proven quickest way to dispatch a duck.”

RSPCA South Australia’s objection to duck hunting is the inevitable and often extreme suffering it causes.

The RSPCA South Australia and Australian Veterinary Association (AVA) have both come out against recreational duck hunting.

They cite high wounding rates and disruption caused to nesting species due to the noise and movement of shooters through their habitats as major concerns.

In a statement released last month, the AVA said wing, bill and leg fractures are common in surviving birds.

“If left, wounded birds can suffer from the disabling effects of the injury, including pain and infection or thirst and starvation if unable to drink or eat,” it said.

“All of these increase the likelihood of being taken by a predator.”

RSPCA SA’s Animal Welfare Advocate Dr Rebekah Eyers said that when two peak animal welfare bodies, the RSPCA and the Australian Veterinary Association, are both opposed to an activity that causes needless suffering to so many native animals and birds, something has to change.

“Our state’s native birds are protected species, it’s truly shocking that we remove that protection for four months a year to let shooters into their habitats,” she said.

In a statement received from the DEW it was claimed they will take action against any hunters breaking the law and take breaches of permits and regulations seriously.

The DEW encourage anyone with footage to contact them directly to assist with investigation of potential breaches.

Each year the department investigates a small number of potential breaches.

The most recent prosecution was for an incident in the 2021 hunting season resulting in a person being found guilty of breaching permit conditions and their firearm being confiscated.

Breaches can result in either cautions, expiations or prosecution depending on type and severity of the offence.

Western Australia, NSW and Queensland have already banned duck hunting and the Victorian government introduced a shorter season this year.

South Australia, Victoria, Tasmania and the Northern Territory are the only states and territories still allowing the activity.

The ongoing opposition to opening wetland habitats to shooters has triggered state government inquiries in both South Australia and Victoria, to review the laws.

Wattle Range Councillor reinstated in new legislation

Wattle Range Councillor Emma Castine has been officially reinstated to the council, after being caught up in a electoral commission mix-up.

The incident saw 45 councillors around the state lose their seats, despite most correctly submitting or attempting to

submit their forms.

Ms Castine was reinstated after the State Government passed the Local Government Casual Vacancies Amendment Bill recently.

The urgent bill allowed all 45 elected members to be reinstated immediately with

extra days to lodge their correct form.

An Electoral Commission South Australia statement said its role was to “administer the legislation provided by the Parliament and will administer these amendments as required”.

“The elected members are responsible for ensuring they understand and comply with relevant legislation,” the statement read.

“ECSA will continue to provide guidance to candidates to assist meeting these legislative obligations.”

Fire tower tech upgrade

Technology trials have occurred at fire observation towers across the Green Triangle region after a \$2m State Government commitment came to fruition.

The Green Triangle Forestry Association welcomed the upgrade of seven towers between Penola and Mount Benson alongside work on a Penola North tower due to commence soon.

Trials include satellite detection and remote operation cameras which have officially occurred at The Bluff, Penola North and Mount Burr with the association now in the process of selecting a contractor for new automated detection systems.

The Penola North program will also provide a landscape level fire detection program while ensuring existing fire towns remain operational during the transition to new systems, expected to occur before the 2023-2024 fire season.

A full camera-based fire detection system across the lower South East is also expected to be installed prior to the fire season.

Chair of the Green Triangle Fire Alliance Mick Theobald said it was a significant amount of funding which reflected the mutual importance that government and industry place upon fire detection.

“This investment will ensure fire management is strengthened in the South East, protecting communities, plantations, the environment and regional jobs,” Mr Theobald said.

“Fire doesn’t recognise boundaries, so it is critical that the whole community, not just the forest industry, collaborates in fire protection.”

Minister for Forestry Industries Clare Scriven said it was great to be able to deliver on a pre-election commitment from the State Government for fire detection in the area.

“Fire detection for our region is so incredibly important not only for the forestry sector - which is a huge contributor to our local economy - but also for all of our industries and all of our communities,” Mr Scriven said.

“This will give an increased capacity because of the improved technology and also building a new fire tower up north to be able to replace the ones that are there at the moment was part of our commitment in terms of moving towards advanced technology but also making sure that the existing fire towers are fit for purpose during that transition.”

She said with the contribution the forestry industry gives to the local economy, it had to

be protected through “appropriate fire prevention and detection activities” which included an increased capacity which was important to protect the assets.

Chief executive officer of South Australian Forest Products Association Nathan Paine said the investment in conjunction with for-

est growers in landscape level fire detection technologies would be critical in protecting the forest estate in the South East.

“This will benefit all landscape users and most importantly our communities whose livelihoods heavily depend on the land,” Mr Paine said.

“We all know that bushfires are a part of the Australian landscape and are unpredictable, yet with an increased fuel load across the country due to prolonged cooler months, there is a greater risk of bushfires across our regional communities, including within our forests.”

Heart and Soul of SUVs

By Derek Ogden, Marque Motoring

How things change.

Take the Nissan Pathfinder, for example, that over almost 40 years found its way from being a basic two-door compact wagon, through a big 4x4, to the smart, sophisticated seven (or eight) seater sports utility vehicle of today.

Originally designed for the North American market, the initial Pathfinder was the first of the segment to be offered in two-wheel drive guise.

The fifth generation has landed Down Under with new-found modern design and a stack of high-tech features and safety systems, albeit on a platform and with a V6 engine, developments of the superseded model. The continuous variable transmission has been left behind in favour of a new nine-speed auto.

Three variants – ST, Ti and Ti-L - only are on offer in a mix of front and all-wheel drive.

Diesel or hybrid options, unlike from rival carmakers such as Hyundai, Kia and Toyota, are not on the cards.

Prices have gone up considerably, starting at \$54,190, plus on-road costs, for the entry-level ST 2WD model, while the range topper signs off at \$77,890 without ORCs.

However, where the Pathfinder finds its appeal is the offer of two seating configurations, for seven or eight.

The standard three-row set-up is for eight, but stretch to the Ti-L and get into a pair of luxurious leather captain's chairs mid cabin separated by removable centre console storage.

The test vehicle, a Ti 4WD costing \$70,030, plus on-roads, came as an eight-seater with a 60:40 split second-row reclining bench.

Access to the back twin seats is a doddle, even for grown-ups, with a one-touch button automatically flipping and folding the second row out of the way.

All Pathfinders are covered by a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty with round-the-clock roadside assistance for the same period.

At more than five metres long the new Pathfinder has had its dated hard edges smoothed out, replaced by a thoroughly modern SUV-cum-coupe shape able to take up to eight people in comfort.

With black side moulding and body co-

loured door handles and black painted roof, highlights include chrome window surrounds and silver roof rails.

The front carries on the Nissan V-Motion theme with a large grille flanked by LED automatic headlamps, daytime running lights and foglamps.

Out back are the slimmest LED tail lamps, plus a high-mounted stop light.

Each external rear vision mirror incorporates a turn signal.

Privacy glass is fitted to second row and rear windows, while 205 litres of luggage space is left with all seats in place and 54 litres under floor, leaving room only for a temporary spare wheel.

Quality fit and finish are trademarks of the cabin.

Black leather-accented seat and door trim is joined by a similar set-up steering wheel, the latter with tilt and telescopic adjustment.

Up front is a 10-way power driver seat and six-way manual passenger seat.

The front and second row outboard positions are heated.

Child restraint anchorages with second row outboard seats with ISOFIX and tether, centre seat with tether and third row left side with ISOFIX and tether.

The tri-zone climate control air-con comes with second and third row air vents.

A 7-inch TFT Advanced Drive-Assist Display instrument cluster is joined by a 10.8-inch head-up and 9-inch touchscreen display with satellite navigation.

Wireless Apple CarPlay and wired Android Auto are backed up by a wireless smartphone charger, Bluetooth phone and audio streaming and voice recognition.

A Bose 13-speaker premium audio system includes dual subwoofer for AM / FM radio, DAB+ digital radio.

USB-A and USB-C points feature throughout the cabin.

Under the Pathfinder's bonnet is the same 3.5-litre V6 petrol engine, delivering 202 kW and 340 Nm as before.

However, the continuously variable transmission has been given the push in place of a new nine-speed auto.

The Pathfinder maintains its 2.7 tonne towing capacity.

The Ti features front parking sensors, a surround-view monitor and Nissan's ProPilot semi-autonomous driver assist system that connects the adaptive cruise control with stop/start and lane keeping aid.

Other features include autonomous emergency braking with junction, pedestrian and cyclist detection, rear AEB, rear cross-traffic alert, blind spot warning and intelligent blind spot intervention, rear seat alert, a driver alert,

traffic sign recognition and trailer sway control.

Front seat airbags, side airbags (driver and passenger, second row outboard), front row far side airbag (centre), side curtain airbags (all rows) all helped the SUV earn a five-star safety rating recently.

Remote engine start has the Pathfinder firing up for a quick-ish getaway, with cabin insulation keeping the engine, wind and road noise at bay.

Shift-by-wire technology is aimed at faster, smoother gearshifts.

Nissan claims a 10.5 litres per 100 kilometres on the combined urban/highway fuel cycle.

The test vehicle recorded 13-plus litres per 100 kilometres in the city and suburbs and 6.4 litres per 100 kilometres on the open road.

Nissan engineers have fine-tuned the steering for a sharper response and reworked the suspension for improved levels of damping, increased roll stiffness and wider contact with the road.

Overall, the Pathfinder turned in a good performance for such a big unit.

Backing up are a range of dial-up drive modes, including Sport, Eco, Snow, Sand, Mud / Rut and Tow.

No longer basic, neither is it boofy as in previous iterations, the fifth-generation Pathfinder is the essence of the large SUV, with quality, comfort and safety to the fore, on and off road.

Versatility is the byword, with nothing to match this, except perhaps the Hyundai Palisade.

The gummy shark and schoolies have been spread right along the coast in good numbers for quite a while now.

There is still plenty of snapper for the boats and land-based fishos.

There are no secret spots for the boaties – the edges of kelp beds or any little drop off is the go.

Land based, Nene Valley through to Jones Bay is still one of the most consistent stretches of beach.

This area has also been a whiting hotspot.

Inside the Port MacDonnell breakwater has been hot and cold this past week.

Some have struggled to bring home a feed, while others have not been able to keep up to them.

Whiting, tommies, salmon trout and silver trevally have all been mentioned.
