The life of Alex Bowden

One of Penola's oldest residents, 95-year-old Alex Bowden loves living in the small town of Penola and still lives in his own home.

His family moved to Coonawarra from Naracoorte (where he went to school) in 1939 and they lived in a stone cottage and milked cows.

The family stayed a couple of years and then World War One started and the family sold the land and moved to Adelaide for some time.

A move back to Penola in 1942 saw them live in Lizzie Street, and after a couple of years the family purchased 40 acres just out of town to milk cows.

Mr Bowden senior also worked at the local butter factory.

"We lived there until I was well into my teenage years," Mr Bowden said.

Mr Bowden went to primary school in Coonawarra then to the Penola Area school.

On leaving school Mr Bowden worked for JK Reilly bus services, the Lands Department and worked on and off on Saturday mornings at the local store operated by Henry Balnaves.

"At 25 years of age I then went and worked for the Lands Department again and from there to the butter factory," he said.

"After that stint I worked at the Mawson garage.

"I then started my own business when I purchased the garage from Edgar and Larkin 1962."

Mr Bowden married in 1956 and moved into his current home.

He has three children, twins Kenneth and Donald and daughter Julie-Anne, nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Mr Bowden is a community person and has been involved in scouts (10 years as leader), Penola Chamber of Commerce, and the Penola Masonic Lodge.

He was also a regular visitor to the Penola

Hospital visiting patients and sharing a joke or two

He didn't play much sport, just a bit of cycling but is an avid reader and is very fond of poetry.

"During my life I have seen major advancement in agriculture, viticulture, pine forests and standards of living. I'm not sure about the quality of life, that is a question in itself," he said.

Mr Bowden said he has had many special times in his life including seeing his family grow up.

He has enjoyed holidays in Hong Kong, Fiji, Tasmania and travelling the Australian outback.

"Family means a lot to me and the older one gets the more special it is. This was spoken about at my last birthday. "The importance of family and friends as you get older become very meaningful," he said

Mr Bowden said he loves living in Penola and it is a good town to make friends.

"I am so lucky to have family so close by and exceedingly grateful to have a family that cares. I hope I can continue to keep good health and stay in my own home as long as I can," he said.

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Students step up to lead

Last Wednesday 19 young people from Millicent High School (MHS) attended a graduation ceremony to acknowledge and celebrate completing a 10 week Personal Leadership Program.

Students welcomed over 60 guests, including Youth Opportunities (YO) founder Peter Marshman OAM, to the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre and each graduate spoke about the program and the tools learned during the weekly program.

Recurring themes of improved self confidence and self esteem, motivation and time management, improved communication and overcoming personal challenges were shared with guests.

The program was originally developed for corporate settings and used as a training tool to increase employee motivation before Mr Marshman saw the benefits for school aged participants.

Currently in its 26th year it is the seventh year YO has hosted the program in collaboration with MHS.

The state based program, which began out of Salisbury High School, recently went national with the support of Federal Government funding, which Youth Opportunities founder Peter Marshman said was because they have seen the results.

"It hasn't had a lot of government support until now but it is well over a million dollars to trial on a national basis," he said.

"We have also been given another half a million dollars to work with what we call a safer communities program, which is to work with the most disadvantaged communities.

"It's all coming about because of genuinely getting results."

The program teaches a series of tools that students use to empower themselves and take positive control over their lives.

During the certificate presentation MHS principal Todd Watson noted some changes are noticed in students immediately while others will see the benefits months and sometimes even years later.

Four graduates spoke to the South Eastern Times about their highlights of the program which was led by Mount Gambier based trainers Alexia Coupland and Debra Boyd.

"My confidence improved greatly from Youth Ops. We used focus blocks which is 10/15 minutes of flat out work and then maybe a five minute break, just to cool off a little bit, it works heaps," Dallas said.

"If I have homework and I'm not motivated to do it I put a five minute timer on, when the five minutes ends I just keep going because I have the time." he said.

"I've become more motivated to complete

my work during classes instead of doing it for homework."

Both Kaleb and Jesse said the program increased their confidence, with Kaleb's favourite tool the boat analogy.

"We had to get the boat from one side of the river to the other without sinking, facing obstacles to get to our goal.

"I would recommend young kids to do Youth Opps, it was quite a fun experience.

"I gained a lot more confidence and motivation to complete work and hand it in."

Jesse preferred using a weekly and daily planner to help keep him on track.

"Because of this program I feel more confident to seek opportunities to come my way."

The program is used in schools across South Australia with MHS delivering another program in term three and Penola High School students set to benefit from the training tools in term four.

'We are progressing' Kingston childcare on the way

The push for more childcare and early learning services in Kingston South East is making progress, but it could still be more than two years before the project is completed.

While the Federal Government committed \$1.8 million towards a new childcare and early learning centre in October last year, there is still more to be done behind the scenes.

Kingston Early Learning and Childcare Services Working Group spearheads Kirsty Starling and Kristen Wilks said while things are moving slower than they would like, progress is still being made towards securing a services for the town.

Ms Wilks said they had hoped the end was in sight with the funding announcement, but there is always another challenge to evergence

"I think when we first heard we were going to receive some funding, we thought potentially it was going to be a two year process," she said

"I'm hoping it's sooner rather than later, but we don't have a definitive timeline yet, which is disappointing.

"We are progressing, but we're a little way off from where we'd like to be."

Ms Starling said the particular challenge at the moment was devising an appropriate governance structure to support a childcare and early learning facility.

"We're trying to build an all encompassing early learning centre, which is a kindergarten and a childcare centre all together on site," she said.

"We're negotiating how that will happen, who is going to pay for what and getting an appropriate governance structure going is where we're at."

The pair said the long-term plan was to aim for gold standard childcare services for all rural locations, not just Kingston.

"Accessibility should be fair and equitable, and it shouldn't matter just because we live in a geographic location that is rural with a postcode that says we're rural," Ms Starling said.

"It just shouldn't matter where we live, we should still have the same equality of those living in an urban area and, at the moment, that's not the case."

State Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said it is the government's intention to work on a model to deliver the best education and care service for children, families and staff.

"My office, the Education Department and the Kingston Council have been working positively with the Kingston Early Learning and Childcare Services Working Group towards a solution for the childcare shortage in the region," Mr Boyer said.

"I travelled to Kingston last year, to speak with the community first hand about the issues they are facing, and since then, the Education Department has engaged an architect to conduct a feasibility study into locations, proposed concept plans and cost estimates.

"Regional childcare shortages is an issue I've raised with the Federal Minister for Early Childhood Education Anne Aly and the Commonwealth more broadly as it is impacting a number of communities.

"Our office is liaising with the Commonwealth Government to help support this project."

Funds needed for stadium

Millicent Basketball Association have appealed to the council to offer some financial support.

Outgoing stadium manger Peter Seebohm presented a deputation to the Wattle Range Council meeting last month, asking that the council consider assisting the association with the completion of their basketball stadium.

Mr Seebohm said the association promotes the town and and region at events, and has a record for having a successful development program.

The association is the only one in the Wattle Range area and caters to juniors and seniors.

"Our peers think we are lucky, having such a great facility, but we say there is no such thing as luck, we have worked hard for what we have achieved," he said.

Work on the stadium has been done in two stages - stage one was to complete the lower level of the viewing platform which will be encased in glass along the front and sides, and includes two large glass windows to view the back courts.

Plans for this space include a kitchen, bar, seating and amenities block with disability access, and a row of courtside seating along the outside of the new space.

Mr Seebohm said last year that the project would be \$540,000.

The association has received a \$211,000 grant from the previous Federal Government's Building Better Regions funding and \$40,000 from the Wattle Range Council.

The rest has been fundraised by the club.

He said Mount Gambier Pioneers had approached the association in regards to holding some exhibition matches before next season, but they couldn't proceed without work on the grandstand and viewing area being completed.

"We have extended ourselves financially with the build we have done already," he said.

"Those exhibition games have an unreal potential for exposure for the Wattle Range region.

"Pre-season games are live streamed, so

there is potential to get the Wattle Range name out there."

He said the games were not locked in, as they needed confirmation of a completion timeline for the building work before they could proceed. Following the deputation, the councillors thanked Mr Seebohm for his involvement in Basketball in Millicent and the Limestone Coast and for his achievements in regard to the Millicent Basketball Stadium.

They wished him well in his retirement.



Lock-up set for declaration

Millicent is the focus for this year's South Australian Police Foundation Day, held annually April 28 to commemorate the establishment of SAPOL in 1838.

The day is commemorated by recognising a place, person or event significant to the history of policing in South Australia.

Next Friday in the older section of the Millicent Cemetery the Commissioner of Police, Grant Stevens, will join dignitaries and family members to unveil a recently installed replica headstone for Mounted Constable (MC) George Manhood.

MC Manhood died of natural causes in 1943 while an officer working in Summertown in the Adelaide Hills region.

The residents of Summertown held the constable, who worked in the town from 1938 until his death, in high regard and installed a large monument in his honour.

This monument, sited opposite their local police station, still stands.

MC Manhood was interred at the Millicent cemetery and the residents of Summertown organised a shield shaped marble headstone inscribed with the same words as on their town's monument for this site.

The inscription includes the words "A faithful officer and friend to all from the residents of that district."

Over the years the writing on the shield has become ineligible to read and a replica has been created to replace the original.

Following the graveside service a declaration of the Millicent Police Stations Stables and Cells complex as a police heritage site will take place and include the unveiling of a commemorative plaque.

The historic former lock-up behind the Millicent Police Station received extensive

restoration work last year which included replacement of the roof and gutters and stonework restoration.

The building constructed in 1874 is Mil-

licent's only confirmed State Heritage Place in the SA Heritage Register within the town

Originally built, along with a police sta-

tion and stables, when the first resident Police Trooper was appointed to the town the lockup is the only building on the site remaining from this era.

Honouring their service

Roy Langdon Waters was a private in the 32nd Battalion and one of the soldiers named on the Millicent Cross of Sacrifice.

He died in France December 2nd, 1916.

The following is his story as told in the local history book Honouring Our Fallen.

Roy Langdon Waters never returned to Millicent to marry his fiancee, Myrtle, who remained single for the rest of her life.

The man she loved had served less than a year with the Australian Imperial Force (AIF) and endured terrible conditions on the Western Front during one of the coldest European winters on record.

He had just finished a stint holding the front line in the Somme Valley and had been withdrawn to intermediate lines waiting to return to camp when he was killed.

The freezing conditions, along with snow, rain and knee deep mud, were a world away from Roy's life in Millicent where he was born on 30 March 1889 to Harry and Anna (nee Hayes) Waters.

His father, Harry, was born in the Lyndoch area and farmed at nearby Sandy Creek in the mid north of South Australia where he married the English born Anna before coming to Millicent in 1879 to take up land in this area.

The couple had a family of twelve children and lived at 'The Pines' on Bowman Road.

Harry died in November 1911 and two years later Anna went to live in Melbourne.

Their tenth child, Roy, stayed in Millicent where he had grown up, gone to school, and found employment as a shop assistant with the local grocers.

He also fell in love with Myrtle Ransom, the daughter of Millicent bakers, Arthur and Lydia Ransom, and the couple became engaged in

On 14 March 1916, Roy enlisted at Mt Gambier where he was described as being almost 27 years old, 5' 7" tall, with a medium dark complexion, dark brown hair and grey eyes.

The South Eastern Times newspaper described him as a "steady, trustworthy young man"

After enlisting, Roy travelled to Adelaide where by the end of the month he was appointed as a Private with B Company of the 2nd Depot Battalion at the AIF's Exhibition Camp before being transferred to the 13th Reinforcements for the 27th Battalion at Adelaide's Mitcham training camp.

While in this camp, he spent three days in hospital suffering from coryza (inflammation inside the nose).

Roy embarked in June 1916 from Adelaide aboard the troopship Bulla arriving at Plymouth, England, on 24 August 1916.

After further training in England he was sent to France late in September 1916 where he was transferred in early October 1916 to the 32nd Battalion and to the battlefields of the Somme.

Within two months he would be dead.

His battalion was not engaged in a battle, but was holding the front line in the Somme Valley in the Gueudecourt area.

The previous Somme battles had failed to make progress and had become bogged down by the conditions.

War historian, Charles Bean described the bitter cold and wet in his books 'The Official History of Australia in the War of 1914–1918': "The conditions on the fighting front imposed on the troops the extreme limit of sordid discomfort and suffering in the process of dying for their country. ... every yard of ground had been fought over, nearly everything standing had been razed, every inch of soil turned and re-turned by some of the heaviest bombardments of the war and by entrenchments.


Continuous rains through October had converted the whole of this area into a very sea of mud.

All movement was greatly hampered by a peculiarly gluey and tenacious quality of the mud, composed of clay and chalk ... deep thick mud which ... tugged like glue at the boot soles so that the mere journey to the line left men and even pack-animals utterly exhausted.

In the dark those who stepped away from the road fell again and again into shell holes; many pack animals became fast in the mud and had to be shot, and men were continually pulled out, often leaving their boots and sometimes their trousers. ... a rescue party broke the back of an officer ... whom they were trying to haul from the mud".

In these conditions, neither the Allies nor the Germans could advance and the last attempt to do so was in mid-November 1916.

The rest of the winter was spent holding the line but constant shell fire, even onto support lines, remained a feature of the miserable en-

vironment in which Roy found himself.

He was killed on 2 December 1916 after the battalion had left the front lines the previous night.

A Red Cross Missing and Wounded Enquiry for another of Roy's 32nd Battalion colleagues, who was also killed on 2 December, may reveal Roy's ending: "The action was between Gueudecourt and LeTransloy ...we were waiting to be relieved when a shell burst... four men that were killed by the same shell were buried together."

There were six men from the 32nd Battalion killed on 2 December 1916 all of them while the battalion waited behind the front line in the intermediate lines.

It is unsure whether Roy was one of the four previously mentioned.

As he was described in his service record as being buried just 10 yards from the Lesboeufs to Gueudecourt Road it is possible he initially survived the shell blast but died in the attempt to get him to a dressing station.

Details of the location of this initial grave allowed his body to be found after the war and he was reinterred in the AIF's Burial Ground, Flers, France where he is among more than 3,000 Commonwealth Servicemen from the First World War.

Two of Roy's brothers also served in the war, Maurice and Stanley, who both returned to Australia.

Honouring Our Fallen tells over 100 stories of the names on First World War memorials in the Wattle Range Coucil region.

Untold stories of Australian sailors and airmen found

Two postgraduate history students have unearthed new findings from within the Australian War Memorial's collection of wartime diaries and letters.

Anna Wilkinson and Hannah Billington, from Deakin University and the University of Melbourne, will share their research into First World War sailors and Second World War airmen as they complete the memorial's prestigious Summer Scholars Program.

"The most surprising thing I found is the everyday joys, frustrations and anxieties felt by these boys and men. Something as mundane as waiting for a letter could consume someone's thoughts for weeks, even months," Wilkinson said.

"We have plenty of research focusing on ships, engagements and officers but I wanted to look at individual emotions."

Billington has investigated the experience of members of the Empire Air Training Scheme during the Second World War and the enduring legacy of their training in Canada

"There is a gap in existing scholarship. By

exploring how their Canadian training impacted RAAF recruits' transformation from civilians to service personnel, I hope to highlight the significance of training to an individual's service history," Billington said.

Both scholars are focusing on the reflections of the young men during these formative experiences and how they conveyed and recorded them.

"It has been hard to whittle down the memorial's vast collection of writings to focus on a few stories. The diaries and correspondence aren't those of seasoned veterans, but of young men grappling with foreign countries, climates and cultures. They are all important," Billington said.

Memorial historians assigned the scholars' topics, which are distinct from what they are pursuing in their academic careers. Wilkinson said the chance to utilise the memorial's collections and work with experts was a great advantage.

"I had the chance to interrogate the National Collection, the Research Centre and the Sea Power Centre-Australia. Accessing these records took me to the source of the history I am writing."

Billington is augmenting the scholarship of the Empire Air Training Scheme already undertaken by the memorial. "The opportunity to bolster the memorial's work around this chapter of our military history, by understanding the personal links and wartime bonds between Australia and Canada, is something I am very proud of," Billington said.

Since 1985, the Summer Scholarship Scheme has given more than 90 young historians practical experience of working in a major historical institution. Each scholar produces a research paper related to their topic, be it an aspect of Australian military history, the memorial's collection, or developing an exhibition.

The summer scholars will present their research at a webinar, available on the memorial's website at awm.gov.au

A longer written version will appear on the website later in the year.

"Having gained a more nuanced understanding of history as a craft, we can't wait to share what we have found," Billington said.


communities commemorate Anzac Day.





Study looks for toxic chemicals

cardboard food packaging used in Australia.

The study is focused on "greener" packaging options that have filled the void created by bans on single-use plastics.

The newer packaging is often designed to be compostable, meaning it can be broken down on an industrial scale and reused in products like fertiliser that are then put back into the environment.

But that begs the question: what nasties might be present alongside useful organic material like paper and cardboard.

Environmental chemist Sarit Kaserzon, from the University of Queensland, intends to find out and says evidence is emerging that compostable food packaging used overseas contains PFAS chemicals.

PFAS stands for per- and poly-fluoroalkyl

Scientists believe they will find toxic, so- substances - a vast family of thousands of products, even to manufacturers who then toxic, very long-lived chemicals that have been linked to environmental and human health problems.

> The chemicals are valued for their heat, water and grease-repelling properties but they don't readily break down, and can build up in plants, including agricultural crops, in animals and in human bodies.

> Many governments worldwide warn certain levels of exposure may lead to increased cancer and other health risks. The Australian government is more cautious but urges a precautionary approach focused on limiting exposure.

> Dr Kaserzon says it's important to establish what is in new-generation packaging given it's typically designed for reuse.

> She savs chemical manufacturers don't always disclose precisely what's in their

use them to line food packaging.

It is sometimes refused on the basis it is valuable, proprietary information covered by patents.

There's also a risk that PFAS could be resulting from unidentified processes that might be occurring during the manufacture of food packaging.

"There are industries that are not doing the right thing," Dr Kaserzon says.

"But I will say there are a lot of industries that are really wanting to do the right thing."

The latter include some Australian packaging companies that are partners in Dr Kaserzon's study, which is being funded by the federal government's Australian Research Council.

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Demons deliver, big-time



"I have never played Kingston in the five years that I have been at Penola," Egan said.


"They have not had an A Grade team in five years so I am glad they have managed to get a team together because they have got some strong junior teams.
