This widely sought competition has a first prize of \$12,000 sponsored by the Balnaves Foundation and the entry must be inspired by the poetry of John Shaw Neilson.

Last year's competition attracted 48 entries and Festival Chairman, Mr John Mossop said organisers are expecting similar, if not more entries this year with the high standard to continue.

Dagny Strand who won the 2022 award will enter a painting in the competition again this year.

The local artists have not been forgotten with Lois Hodge offering \$1,000 first prize in this section.

The winners will be announced at the festival opening on Thursday, May 18 at 5pm at the Penola High school hall.

The exhibition will be on display at the school until May 26.

The festival design prize will also be announced at the opening.

This competition is for a poster designed to be used for all promotional material for the 2024 festival.

This competition is designed to encourage young writers and to further the love of writing in the community.

Entrants are to create a short story using this year's theme, "Hope exists as long as..."

The different categories are

- Entrants aged 10 - 12 years old, 350 - 500 words. Winner \$75/ Runner Up \$25.
- Entrants aged 13 - 15 years old, 500 - 800 words. Winner \$100/Runner Up \$50
- Entrants aged 16 - 18 years old, 800 - 1000 words, Winner \$150/ Runner Up \$75.

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Support for young leaders

Young people across the Wattle Range Council (WRC) region are now eligible for a \$1,000 leadership grant.

The Youth Leadership Development Program has been introduced to encourage anyone aged up to 30 who live, and work or volunteer in the Wattle Range region to undertake leadership training.

Employees or employers can apply for the grant which encompasses a wide range of courses, certificates or post graduate qualifications.

WRC Director Development Services, Emma Clay encouraged businesses to apply.

“There can be a large spectrum of what that training can look like, depending on the business,” she said.

Up to \$10,000 per financial year has been allocated to the program.

Grants are awarded on a dollar-for-dollar basis up to \$1000 unless special circumstances apply.

Applications and guidelines are available through the council website.

Bait begins

Pet owners are being made aware of fox baiting happening in OneFortyOne forests near Tarpeena and Nangwarry as well as the Comaum and Myora Forests and Mount McIntyre.

OneFortyOne will use a product which contains the chemicals Para-Aminopropiophenone which are approved for use by the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority.

Neighbours and neighbouring communities have been notified and signs have been installed in the areas targeted.

OneFortyOne estate manager Cameron Shaw said the plantation does not use 1080 poison and if pets or other animals do accidentally ingest the bait, there was an antidote available.

“Baits are always buried and are only laid away from tracks to prevent accidental exposure,” Mr Shaw said.

“If you are walking your dog within the forest, we recommend you keep them on a leash.”

A dazzling display of the Aurora Australis

Local aurora hunters have been treated to an outstanding display of the Aurora Australis over the last week as solar storm activity hit the earth's magnetic field.

Activity peaked very early Monday morning and late that night with the coloured beams viewable to the naked eye.

Usually a camera is needed to view the range of colours.

Perrie Thomas is one of two moderators of a local facebook group, Limestone Coast Aurora Hunters, that is uniting people wanting to view and photograph the phenomena.

The page is increasing in popularity due to the rise in aurora activity which is part of a long solar cycle that is still yet to peak.

“The sun cycle goes through ebbs and waves and we are kind of about half way through the incline into what I think is solar maximum in 2025.

“Activity is definitely increasing” Mr Thomas said.

“Monday morning I was looking at activity that was 45 degrees off the horizon and it was clear to the naked eye, it was so strong.

“I was seeing huge beams of white and as the white was getting stronger and the ambient light was getting stronger all the tops of the beams turned red, the colour was absolutely amazing.

“I only stopped shooting because the

sun came up.”

Mr Thomas, now based in Tantanoola, first began shooting the phenomena as a new photographer.

“Brooklyn (my wife) and myself lived in Southern Adelaide and I happened to be scrolling Facebook one afternoon and noticed people talking about an aurora and seeing it from Australia.

“Being a beginner photographer it piqued my interest so we packed a picnic, a change of clothes and drove down to Petrel Cove at Victor Harbor.

“We slept in the car overnight.

“At about midnight the storm hit and I was one of three people in the Southern hemisphere that caught photos of that particular storm because everyone else was clouded out.”

Eight years on the professional photographer has continued to photograph aurora's but now uses better equipment.

Recently the photographer held several basic astro photography workshops to assist members of the Facebook group after seeing the same questions asked daily about which settings to use.

The workshops have proved popular with the recent solar activity giving participants the opportunity to try their new skills.

“It's basically get your camera out of auto because when you are taking night photography you need to be in full manual mode and there are a few tricks for getting a half decent shot.

“My aim was to get everyone the basics and if they nail that they've got the capability to produce a reasonable image of print quality.”


RSL donation welcomed

Wood Collection Permits

With the conclusion of the Fire Danger Season on April 30, Council will begin to issue permits to collect fallen timber from certain roadsides within the Council area. There are a number of roadsides that collection is not permitted, a list of these roads is available on Council’s website.

Permits can be obtained from Council offices upon payment of a fee and are available only to residents of the Council area to collect wood for personal household use.

Permit holders should abide by the conditions listed on their permit. Failure to do so may result in penalties being applied. Penalties also apply to persons caught collecting wood without a permit.

Light Horse back to serve

Millicent's 2023 ANZAC service held at Millicent's Cross of Sacrifice saw more than 300 people gather for the dawn service.

The crowd listened in silence as prayers were offered by Chaplain Paul Hales, and President of the Millicent RSL sub-branch Chris Matthias led the service.

Members of the Mount Gambier 48CU formed the catafalque and the service ended with the Australian and New Zealand anthem before the public were invited to the RSL Hall to join the gunfire breakfast.

The fine weather ensured hundreds also arrived for the mid morning service which began when returned servicemen led the customary march from The George Hotel.

Following were members of local emergency services, next of kin wearing family medals and veterans in vintage jeeps.

For the second year the Naracoorte troop of the 3rd Light Horse Regiment joined the march.

The 3rd Light Horse Regiment Naracoorte Troop were invited to return for their second outing forming the catafalque at the Millicent Cenotaph by Mr Mathias who requested the use of swords this year in their formation.

Member for Barker, Tony Pasin and Wattle Range Deputy Mayor Peter Dunncliff joined the mid morning service at the Cross of Sacrifice.

Speakers included Mr Matthias, Chaplain Hales and Bruce Clayson who read the poem, I saw the soldiers marching.

This year's service reflected on the contribution of the thousands of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who have served Australia.

"The armed forces of Australia have always been culturally diverse, never more so than now," Mr Mathias said.

"The Australian Defence force has members serving who come from the four corners

of the earth, they all have one thing in common and that is the will to defend this country and its way of life.

"A country they call home, regardless of their origins, cultural beliefs or ethnicity."

Guest speaker Sgt David MacDonald from the 10/27 RSAR spoke of Australian's Indigenous soldiers and their struggle to be accepted as part of Australia's armed forces.

He told the story of Gunditjmarra man Reg Saunders who became Australia's highest

profile Aboriginal soldier and one of the first Indigenous commissioned officers in the Australian Army.

The last post was played followed by one minute's silence before the flags were raised.

The service was concluded with the playing of both anthems and the Light Horse regiment dismounting.

Art adds a natural touch

After six weeks of intermittent painting, artist Peter Dunn was on hand to see his mural installed in the new palliative care courtyard at the Millicent Hospital.

Two large 2.4 metre panels, inspired by Lake McIntyre, have been hung at right angles and although they are within the private courtyard area the mural can also be viewed from the hospital patient garden.

Ron Wood from Millicent and Districts Health Advisory Council (MDHAC) and Trevor Sinclair from Millicent and Surrounds Health Support Group were on hand to help affix the panels to the outdoor brick walls.

Mr Dunn still has some minor touchup paintwork to do before leaving the work for others to enjoy.

“We have a bit more to do but I’m really happy with the end result and looking forward to people’s response to it over the years” he said.

“It will be good to see how it changes throughout the day with the light and there will be different moods according to the weather.”

The \$3,000 mural project was a collaboration between the artist, MDHAC and Imagine Millicent Arts Group (IMAG).

Laurie Dacy, MDHAC committee member said the project has been two years in the making.

“It’s been about two years since our director of nursing asked for help with the mural and it was just lucky I ran into Sandy from IMAG,” he said.

“It all happened really fast after that thanks



to IMAG, they have most of the equity in the project, in fact they funded 5/6ths of it.”

The new palliative care room is close to completion with the final fit out currently underway.

Netball rivals' cause unites

Two Mid South East netball teams put aside their differences over the weekend to raise funds for ovarian cancer research.

Mount Burr Netball Club and Tantanoola Netball Club hosted a combined Ladies Night on Saturday, April 22 which saw more than 130 women come together for a good cause.

The event was held at the Mount Burr Football and Netball Club during the football team's twilight clash with Tantanoola.

Ladies Night organising committee and Tantanoola Netball Club member Emma Gould said the intent from the beginning was to hold a combined function between the two clubs.

"Ovarian cancer is something that is more common than we realise and is a disease that has affected a number of players within our MidSE Netball community, so it is close to our hearts," Ms Gould said.

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Gas leak disrupts Kingston petrol station

A PETROL station in Kingston SE was temporarily shut down on Thursday, April 20 after there were reports of a gas leak.

Country Fire Service (CFS) crews responded to the incident at the Kingston On The Run store at around 8:30pm.

CFS regional duty officer for the incident Danny Crozier said the leak was detected after people at the service station reported a strong smell of gas.

"The staff at On The Run were able to enact their emergency procedures, which

involved isolation and calling 000," Mr Crozier said.

"When CFS volunteers arrived, they evacuated the On The Run and the Ampol across the road for caution, and advised the nearby hotel."

Mr Crozier said CFS crews set up ground monitors to disperse the gas while they waited for a crew from Naracoorte with specialist hazmat equipment and gas technicians from Mount Gambier.

CFS was supported by SAPOL and SAAS personnel and there were not reports of injury as a result of the leak.

Council halves funds offer

WATTLE Range Council (WRC) has halved the amount of money it was offering to replace two old transportable buildings at the Millicent Museum.

During the April general meeting, Council resolved to reduce the money it had allocated to replace the buildings from \$520,000 to \$250,000.

The revised sum was moved as a tied grant,

meaning the Millicent National Trust Branch, which looks after the museum, would have to match or exceed the funding to receive the \$250,000 from Council.

WRC chief executive Ben Gower met with the Millicent National Trust Branch committee following the resolution and said talks would be ongoing.

"We had a good conversation around the context of why the motion was moved the

way it was, and then talked about opportunities for when we could collectively meet with National Trust [of South Australia]," Mr Gower said.

"I discovered during the meeting that they are going to be down here next week and have subsequently reached out.

"I haven't connected with them yet, but I'm hoping to meet with the president of the National Trust when they're down on the

Limestone Coast to talk about the resolution."

Mr Gower said he hopes to be able to bring all three parties to the table soon to discuss options, but it is too early to say what will happen with the funding.

Millicent National Trust Branch declined to comment.

The \$250,000 will remain on offer until December 31, 2023.

Cellar doors aplenty, there's even more to Coonawarra

This year's grape harvest was a few weeks later than usual, but the fruit quality is suggesting a good 2023 vintage.

Business Manager at Balnaves of Coonawarra, Kirsty Balnaves, said vigneron were keen to get the remaining grapes off the vines before the big rains fall.

With 30 years experience in the wine industry, Mrs Balnaves is multi-tasked and holds an MR truck licence.

She is likely to get behind the wheel of the new truck at the urging of her brother, Peter.

"He said you'd better have a quick run through of the gears, because we might need you in the next few weeks," she said.

"We got the whites off and they look fabulous, we picked the reds, and we're starting to ramp up the Shiraz and Merlot, so there's a fair bit of activity."

Her experience extends further than Coonawarra, having been elected President of the South Australian Wine Industry Association in September last year.

It has 230 members from the state's wine regions and the major wine companies.

"We work with our members offering support for running businesses, such as Industrial Relations, work health and safety, and entering the export markets.

"SA represents about 50 per cent of Australia's vineyard plantings, crushes 46.1 per cent of total tonnes of wine grapes and 60 per cent of wine produced in SA is exported to around 100 countries and is the third largest export from South Australia," Ms Balnaves said.

"We're connecting people from overseas with people from SA regions, interested in exporting to South Korea or Japan, among other destinations.

"There's a lot going on in the wine industry at the moment," Ms Balnaves said.

Locally, the wine industry has been promoted since 1980 by the Coonawarra Vignerons' Association, amalgamating with the Coonawarra Grape Growers Association in 2013, becoming Coonawarra Grape and Wine Incorporated.

Recently appointed Executive Officer, Hugh Koch, has returned to the region after 22 years.

This body has 44 members, who pay subscriptions ranging from base entry to more specialised operations.

"That has now given great strength to grape growers and those who are making or promoting wines," Mr Koch said.

Beyond the harvest, some vigneron take a small break before launching into a varied program to promote the region throughout the year.

Activities include the Penola Coonawarra Arts Festival in May, Cellar Dwellers in July, the Coonawarra Roadshow, visiting capital cities in August and the Cabernet celebrations in October.

"It's not only about promotion and marketing, but advocating for our members about issues facing the industry".

"Our role is to push the brand Coonawarra for our members."

Mr Koch enjoys being back in the region.

"It's like slipping back into a comfortable pair of old shoes. It's been great.

"Coonawarra is like family, all wanting to push in the one direction for a common goal

of promoting our region," he said.

Mr Koch believes Coonawarra is very well regarded internationally for its Cabernet point of difference.

Ms Balnaves said vigneron must now offer more than the cellar door for wine tourism.

"The days of just opening the cellar door and expecting people to come in are over.

"You have to offer different and unique experiences.

"Coonawarra has different offerings to the Barossa and the Adelaide Hills.

"Our region is a considered destination and buying experience.

"People can do different things at different wineries and I still think we're a bit of a quiet find. They love the sense of community," Kirsty said

At Balnaves, visitors are greeted at the

front door by a staff member, who serves their table. Individual wine tasting options and cheese boxes are offered.

The \$5 fee is donated to charities of Balnaves' choice and more than \$30,000 has recently been handed out.

Balnaves of Coonawarra has internationally experienced wine makers.

After studies in Melbourne and Adelaide combined with international vintage experience, born and bred local, Jacinta Jenkins, became assistant wine maker in 2018; then wine maker in 2020.

Ms Jenkins said quality grapes are grown in the estate and she looks for elegance and longevity in their wines.

"We pick and de-stem the grapes, ferment them in open top tanks, mature them in oak for 12 months and then bottle the wine," Ms Jenkins said.

She said the winery is well designed and

suited to purpose.

"It's quite user-friendly. You can focus on the small details rather than logistics.

"We have a nice small team and it's a pretty good environment," Ms Jenkins said.

Originally from the UK, assistant wine maker Ali Fraquelli joined Balnaves of Coonawarra in June of last year.

"My focus is on ageability and producing good wines," he said.

He said the best thing is about learning.

"There's a wealth of experience here at Balnaves," he said.

Ms Balnaves said her state role has given her the opportunity to give back.

"The wine industry has given our family so much," she said.

"I've been in this industry for 30 years and I can have an influence on how it evolves at a different level," Ms Balnaves said.

Commission hears issues

The push for better childcare and early learning services access in Kingston SE has bought the working group before the Royal Commission into Early Childhood Education and Care.

Kingston Early Learning and Childcare Services Working Group member Kristen Wilks represented the region as part of a panel which shared the voices and experiences of regional South Australians.

Ms Wilks, alongside Katie Hughes of Yorke Peninsula and Steph Wurst of Kangaroo Island, told the Royal Commission about the challenges involved in accessing childcare and the impact it has on rural communities.

She said the significance of being asked to present to Royal Commission was not lost on her.

"It was a privilege to be asked to appear as a representative of KELCS and the community of Kingston," she said.

"The Royal Commission is really looking towards what can be implemented in the future rather than looking back at the past.

"The Royal Commission is an important part of the review process to seek the information and understand the early childhood education and care (ECEC) challenges that exist for modern families in SA, particularly in regions where there are accessibility issues."

Ms Wilks said she "eagerly awaits" the findings in the Royal Commission's final report, and that she hopes to see meaningful change come as a result.

"We are hoping for greater equity and equality for children and families who live in rural and remote South Australia with respect to early childhood education and care," she said.

"To overcome the current barriers and disadvantage to create a new universal and all-encompassing quality ECEC system delivered through/by the State Government that meets

the needs of children and modern families, particularly in the first 1000 days to set up a great foundation for the rest of their life.

"What we would like to see is 'wrap around services' that include access to health and parent services on site, includes preschool/ kindergarten and is co-located on school sites."

Ms Wilks said she was a bit anxious about presenting to the Royal Commission at first.

"It's not every day you get to have the attention of such an incredibly strong, intelligent and kind ex-PM in Commissioner Julia Gillard," Ms Wilks said.

"It was a great personal experience, very

nerve wracking and daunting with a lot of preparation, a written submission and very little sleep the night before, but a wonderful opportunity to represent the KELCS committee and the interests of working women and families from regional and remote SA."

The Royal Commission's final report is due to be delivered in August.

"I have a daughter who is nearly 16 and she really wanted to play netball, and she's also got some friends that wanted to play netball, so we thought if we can, we should.



Great news for the country that won't cost a cent



An open letter to Treasurer Jim Chalmers regarding the Budget

Dear Dr Chalmers,

There's a crisis in our country you can fix in your first budget, at no extra cost.

With the stroke of a pen you could help secure the future of critical regional news services, using money already allocated in the budget.

All you need to do is allocate a fairer percentage of the federal government's advertising budget to local and regional news services, rather than spending almost all of it with corporate capital city media and foreign-owned digital platforms (which don't produce any content or employ any journalists).

This can be achieved by simply adopting the Victorian Govt policy that mandates a weekly full page government advertisement in every regional and community paper.

Local and regional newspapers connect more than 80% of the country, but they get almost 0% of the government advertising spend.

In an era where false news spreads faster on social media than the truth does, trusted local news services reach more regional Australians than any other medium.

And unlike other media, every government dollar spent with a local newspaper is also an investment in regional journalism jobs.

This shouldn't be controversial.

A recent parliamentary inquiry recommended that a minimum of 20% of government print advertising should be placed with regional news services. A recent study conducted by Deakin University recommended the same thing. In fact, the Minister for Communications, Michelle Rowland, has been advocating for more regional newspaper advertising for many years.

We know there may be bigger budget issues, but this small policy change would be a simple and fair solution to a growing problem for regional Australia.

A policy that ensures weekly federal government advertising is placed in regional newspapers would be great news for the country.

And it won't cost you a cent.

Country Fire Service SCBA training was held in Region 5 for the first time in five years.

Volunteers expand skills

For the first time in five years Country Fire Service (CFS) volunteers across the South East have been able to gain breathing apparatus training within the Limestone Coast.

CFS region 5 commander Jason Druwitt said the specialist Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) training has previously been held in the Adelaide Hills, and it was good to have it available locally in Naracoorte again.

"This means our volunteers can undertake training within their own community, which decreases the amount of travel they've got to do," he said.

"Having the ability to train locally gives them the opportunity to train in their own region."

Mr Druwitt said CFS volunteers, and one ambulance volunteer, from around the South East took part in the course and were now qualified to use the SCBA equipment.

"We had 12 [CFS] participants on the course and they were from brigades all across the region," he said.

"It's the ability for our crews to go into an area where the atmosphere is what we call irrespirable, so it couldn't sustain life.

"They can put this on to make sure their not breathing in contaminants, and contami-

nating their body with smoke or any particulates from the fire."

The commander said it was a two day theory heavy course, with practical learning after that.

"It's about introducing them to how to use the capability and then drills were required, and then there's ongoing assessments to make sure they meet the capabilities because it's a nationally accredited course," he said.

Having SCBA CFS volunteers in the region meant they were qualified to fight fires from inside a building or attend events like gas leaks.

"It's about the protection and the value of

our community because it provides the ability for our crews to do something, but it also protects our crews from inhaling particulates," he said.

The course gained great feedback from participants Mr Druwitt hoped SCBA training would continue to be held in the region

"Its was a successful weekend, all our participants passed which was really good and the feedback we received from the course has been overwhelming," he said.

Mr Druwitt said he was thankful for employers and the families of volunteers who continue to support them while they support the community.

Honda Civic e:HEV LX

The name is a tad confusing but the new Honda Civic e:HEV is a conventional petrol-electric hybrid that competes against cars such as the Toyota Corolla hybrid.

Launched here in September, 2022 it's not the first Civic hybrid.

The previous model was sold here from 2004 until 2016 when poor sales saw it dropped.

Civic e:HEV is the third mainstream Honda model to be offered with an electrified powertrain in the Australian market, following on from HR-V and Accord.

A fourth, the all-new ZR-V, will arrive here later this year.

In fact, Honda was one of the pioneers of hybrid vehicles in Australia when it launched its Insight three-door hatchback way back in 2001.

Competition from the cheaper five-door Toyota Prius saw the Insight drop out in 2004.

At the other end of the scale a hybrid version of the NSX supercar was also sold here.

Honda Australia is running a pretty tight ship at the moment and there are only three Civic variants, each distinctly different from the other.

As well as the e-HEV LX that we're reviewing here, there's a 1.5-litre petrol VTi-LX that our Queensland crew have just tested and the high-performance Type-R.

Prices, they're all driveaway, start at \$47,200 for the VTi-LX, the e:HEV LX sells for \$55,000 and the Type-R for \$72,600.

By way of comparison the top-spec Corolla ZR hybrid has a recommended retail price of \$39,620.

The popularity of SUVs with their taller and squarer profiles has seen conventional sedan and hatchback styles become lower and sleeker to provide a point of difference between the two body types.

So it is with the current, 11th generation Civic which could almost be described as a hatchback/coupe crossover.

We love the look of the latest Civic.

It's neat and attractive without anything that could turn off the more conservative buyers that it has historically attracted.

It has quite a high front with a shallow upper grille and a much deeper lower grille.

The front grille ties in with the lights and gives a wide look.

The lower grille is substantial and the black finish of the front of the car works nicely in our eyes.

The large Honda badge in the centre of the grille has a blue surround, indicating the car's electric component as does the blue 'EV' on the number plate.

The roofline slopes neatly to the rear in a semi-fastback style and there's a manually operated hatchback that opens high to give excellent access to the luggage area.

A powered panoramic sunroof is standard in the e:HEV LX.

The dashboard area is wide to give the Civic e:HEV LX a spacious feel.

There's an eye-catching thin panel with honeycomb fill that spans the entire width of the dashboard on either side of the steering wheel.

It contains a number of toggles to adjust the direction of the air conditioning which, we're pleased to say, uses three large circular knobs below the touchscreen to control temperature and power.

Again, they are within easy reach of the driver.

The front seats are wide enough to cater for a good variety of rumps.

The three rear seats are set up to provide good comfort for the two window seat positions.



New Honda Civic hybrid – impressive car but is the price right?

The centre-rear seat is better than average for this class but I wouldn't like to travel there.

With two rear occupants there's a fold-down armrest including a couple of drink holders.

Boot size is a reasonable 410 litres but note that there is no spare wheel, only a puncture repair kit.

New Civic hybrid combines a power-dense lithium-ion battery with two compact, powerful electric motors and a 105kW/186Nm 2.0-litre Atkinson-cycle petrol engine.

It's a direct-injection system that's optimised for faster and more efficient combustion and greater torque.

The result is a combined maximum output of 135kW of power and 315Nm of torque, the highest outputs ever offered on a Civic with the exception of the high-performance Type-R.

The eCVT continuously variable transmission operates by juggling the petrol and electric engines/motors.

Fuel consumption is listed at 4.2L/100km with CO2 emissions of 96g/km.

Not sure how they all manage to fit them all into a relatively small car, but there are 11 airbags including knee airbags for the driver and front passenger, along with new side airbags for the rear seats and a new front centre airbag to help prevent the driver and front passenger making contact during a side impact.

Other standard safety features include autonomous emergency braking with pedestrian detection, lane departure warning and lane keep assist, blind spot monitoring, rear cross-traffic alert, front and rear parking sensors and a rear-view camera with a choice of angles.

Civic e-HEV LX uses a 9.0-inch touchscreen, relatively small in comparison with others, but importantly within easy reach of the driver and with fast response and sharp definition.

It has two shortcut buttons and an audio control knob to the right of the screen.

There's embedded satellite navigation plus Apple CarPlay (wireless) and Android Auto (wired).

There are two USB-A ports and a 12V socket in the front console above a wireless smartphone charging pad.

Two more USB-A ports are located in the rear.

In front of the driver is a customisable 10.2-inch high-definition full colour digital information display that's relatively easy to read and adjust to the driver's preferences.

Audio comes courtesy of a 12-speaker Bose D41 premium sound system.

The e:HEV LX is the first Honda to get the company's Honda Connect system that allows

owners to access vehicle information through their smartphone.

There are both convenience and safety benefits.

With remote connectivity the climate control can be set up to heat or cool the car in advance, turn the lights on or off and lock or unlock with a single tap.

On the safety front there is an emergency call button to contact roadside assistance and, in more serious circumstances, automatic collision detection which alerts the Honda call centre and where necessary, contacts emergency services.

Owners can also set a speed threshold that sends an alert to the phone when it is exceeded.

A vehicle status feature monitors a range of information.

We found getting into, and especially out of, the car quite challenging but that's our fault for having creaking joints.

Younger, more supple, drivers won't have any such problems.

Regular readers will know the safety concerns that we have about the growing trend towards dashboard and touchscreen controls that require the driver to take their eyes off the road to operate them.

Those in the Civic hybrid are just about perfect, all within reach and easy to use.

The front seats are comfortable and supportive and both are powered.

The steering wheel has height and reach adjustment.

As with all electric or hybrid cars, the fun begins right from the start with the battery providing instant torque for sharp acceleration.

There are four drive modes – Eco, Normal,

Sport and Individual that allows separate control of the engine, transmission and instrument cluster.

This advanced powertrain is capable of shifting seamlessly between Electric drive, Hybrid drive and Engine drive to ensure optimum performance in both urban and highway driving.

Steering wheel paddles can be used to adjust the battery regeneration level.

Handling is good for a car of this type, though the extra weight caused by having two power sources and a heavy battery means it can be a tad slow in responding to the steering wheel.

Ride comfort is good on smooth surfaces but deteriorates a little on suburban roads that have seen better days.

The official fuel consumption figure is 4.2L/100km.

During our test period we averaged 4.7L over our usual mix of urban, motorway and rural conditions.

On a 40km economy drive on easy paced open roads we managed to get consumption down to 3.6L/100km.

Honda seems to be following the Mazda approach, with significant price rises to indicate that they have stepped up to the lower end of the prestige category.

This can probably be justified because both brands are producing vehicles that are of similar quality to the big-name Europeans.

No doubt the buying public will have the final say.

As with all Honda models the Civic e:HEV LX, comes with a five-year unlimited kilometre warranty, five-year premium roadside assistance and five years of Honda Connect subscription.
