Jazz in full swing

As Mount Gambier came alive for Generations in Jazz, so too did Kalangadoo, with Concordia College making a pit stop in the town on the way to the festival.

Kalangadoo Primary School hosted the community concert and Governing Council chair Naomi Denniss-Holmes said it was a great opportunity for students to hear a genre of music that was not so common.

“It’s quite interesting for the students as we don’t tend to have a dedicated music program,” she said.

“It’s not a style that a lot of young kids are exposed to either, so we field a lot of questions about the different instruments afterwards and they are generally quite fascinated with it all.”

Anyone in Kalangadoo was able to attend the concert and Ms Denniss-Holmes said it was a great to have the community come together.

“It’s nice to have an event like this, it is not something that happens around here very often,” she said.

Concordia College head of music performance (ELC - 12) Mat Noble said the school had been visiting Kalangadoo on their way to the jazz festival since 2014.

“It’s an opportunity for us to play, but also to share some music with the community that may not have an opportunity to see too much music,” he said.

With two bands and three choirs visiting, the 67 Concordia students more than tripled the number of Kalangadoo students on the campus during their performance.

Students from Nangwarry Primary School were also in attendance and Ms Denniss-Holmes estimated about 50 local students and community members were there.

Used to large audiences, Mr Noble said it did not matter how many people were in the crowd when they performed.

“I’ve been a musician for 35 years and the one thing I know is it doesn’t matter how big or small the audience is - the reason we do this, the reason we play music and the reason we work hard to get to a point where we can play to audiences is just to bring joy,” he said.

“Music is fun to do, so the size of the audience actually doesn’t matter, every time you play is a privilege and the opportunity to play in front of an audience, particularly given the last three years we haven’t been able to, is just absolutely special.”

Mural to bring mindfulness

With the help of a former student, the children at Kalangadoo Primary School have been working together to brighten their school.

Artist Wendy Dixon-Whiley, a former Kalangadoo resident who attended the school in the 80s, said she visited the campus on a trip home recently and was inspired to bring a bit more life to the campus.

“I travelled here last Christmas and had a bit of a poke around the school when it was closed and I thought ‘It needs some sort of public art mural,’ so I picked up the phone and spoke to Allison,” she said.

Ms Dixon-Whiley said she had worked with all 18 students to bring the mural to life.

“The students have created their own individual Mindful Monsters, so they all have a little mindful statement talking about how they choose to do that,” she said.

“They are all really different, and without knowing the students all that well, it seems to reflect their personalities as well

“It’s always so great working with kids because they are always just so creative, society hasn’t pushed it out of them yet... it’s like an innate creativity that slips away when people get older.”

Governing Council chair Naomi Denniss-Holmes said it was great to see the students making a mark on their school.

“The kids got really really involved with it and I think they’ve been pleasantly surprised too with the level of involvement they have

been able to have,” she said.

“They engage well with Wendy and her style of work.”

Year five student Charlotte said she would like to be an artist or a tattooist when she grows up and she had a great time creating her Mindful Monster.

“Mine has four of my personalities on it, my crazy side, my silly side, my happy side and my mischievous side, I call it the Four Headed Wonder,” she said.

When she was creating her Mindful Monster Charlotte said she was feeling her happy side.

“My happy side is a yellow bean shape looking thing with two big eyes and a big smile,” she said.

In the artwork the Four Headed Wonder is drawn saying ‘I like watching butterflies’ as Charlotte said that was one of her favourite mindful activities.

“I watch them flap their wings and fly

around and land and suck the juice from the flowers,” she said.

The mural will be about 14 meters wide and two meters high, with each student’s Mindful Monster included in the work.

Ms Dixon-Whiley said she hoped the space could be a place where students could take a moment for themselves and practice mindful exercises.

Kalangadoo teacher Lauren Manser said including the students in the creation of the mural tied into the health curriculum and it was putting a different spin on their learning.

“We have a big focus on wellbeing at our school so we do work with the zones of regulation, and the Berry Street Model we follow... which is all about mindfulness, wellbeing, understanding your emotions and the tools you can use to keep yourself regulated and engage with the curriculum fully,” she said.

Ms Denniss-Holmes said it was great the small school could have this opportunity.

“Allison discussed it with the governing council and everyone got super excited about it, it just not something that we thought would happen for us,” she said.

“Small schools have less opportunities in general, and for someone from somewhere else to come and take and interest and engage with students and offer them something lasting that will come out of it that they can be involved in- I think is a big deal for them.”

She also said it was great to be adding a bit more colour to the school and everyone was looking forward to seeing it finished.

Coonawarra wine on show with wine importers in town

The Coonawarra Wine Region will be on show when international wine importers from Singapore, Hong Kong, and New Zealand visit Adelaide this month.

In partnership with the state government, the South Australian Wine Ambassadors Club (SAWAC) has organised the visit for international importers to taste the best of South Australian wines.

SAWAC Patron Tony Love said the four day trip would showcase South Australian wine and help grow the industry.

“The visit this month from such an elite group of wine professionals is a key step in forging the future of South Australia’s wine industry,” he said.

“We are able to showcase to vital markets in the Asia-Pacific region the exciting diversity of wine varieties and styles that shine a light on one of our most important trade sectors.”

While the importers will visit the Adelaide Hills, McLaren Vale and Barossa in person, they will be given an immersive experience in tasting wines from other regions.

Those from the Limestone Coast on show

will be the Padthaway, Mount Benson and Coonawarra Wine Regions.

Mr Love said it was important to host these visits and encourage relationships between winemakers and international importers.

“Taking our guests to key regions, introducing them to our winemakers on their own turf, and experiencing our landscape and wildlife along the way are all valued steps in building ongoing relationships that bind us in business as well as international friendship,” he said.

“Wine has a unique way of doing that.”

With South Australian wine exports valued at \$1.3 billion and making up 65 per cent of the total value of Australian wine exports minister for trade and investment Nick Champion said this visit provided a great opportunity.

“This will be a rare opportunity for importers from some of our biggest trade partners to experience the State’s regions and producers first-hand,” he said.

“South Australian Wine Ambassadors Club has played a vital role supporting South Australian wines to enter and grow in new markets.”

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Kids’ reconciliation focus

Reconciliation Week will be recognised in Week Five of the Penola Playgroup to help acknowledge traditional owners of the land.

Centacare’s Family Connection Program will acknowledge not only the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community but also the importance of reconciliation by hosting a range of Indigenous inspired activities during its Thursday morning program.

Connection Program family workers Di Childs and Sandra Case said it was important to encourage learning about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history early on.

“Reconciliation Week is all about reconciling and getting our communities to be as one,” Ms Childs said.

“For playgroup it is about early introduction to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and getting the idea that we are all the same, we live together as a community and also for children to start realising what did happen.” She said recognising Australian history was important for children and by introducing it to them early it would help close the gaps for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities later on in life.

“On the day we will have an acknowledgment to country, we will sing Aboriginal songs and read dreaming time stories,” Ms Childs said.

“We will also be doing Aboriginal symbols in sand and allow the children to try and copy the symbols as well as dot painting on bark.”

She said children will also decorate biscuits in the same style as the Aboriginal flag.

“It will also be good because it is a nice way to introduce the concept of reconciliation and working together.”

Ms Case said by having the playgroup service available in Penola and by acknowledging the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander

culture, it provided a sense of belonging and community for parents.

“Playgroup really allows parents to meet others who are on the same path because there are those who have been up with their crying kid all night or you can talk to other parents who also go through the same thing,” she said.

“We can also identify issues or help con-

nect parents who are struggling to services around the region who may be able to help so we are also able to help the parents as well.”

Ms Case said there was also the added benefit of observing the children attending playgroup growing up.

“It is also great for us because we see these children who used to roll around on the floor grow up to asking and being involved in

activities,” she said.

At the end of each playgroup session, parents and children also gather for circle time which helps children get ready for school, promotes whole body listening and builds vocabulary, speech and social skills.

Penola Playgroup is held each Thursday from 9.30am until 11am at St Andrews Presbyterian Church Hall.

Extra cash to fix the roads

Councils in the Limestone Coast have received a funding boost from the federal government to deliver priority local road infrastructure projects in the region.

Phase 4 part A of the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program was announced in February, and now Part B has been released.

This sees \$250 million of the original \$750 million devoted to regional and rural roads across Australia, with Limestone Coast Councils gaining almost \$2 million more than originally thought.

With the extra allocation, the Wattle Range Council will now receive \$992,291, which is a \$362,993 boost from part A of the funding.

Federal Minister for Regional Development, Local Government and Territories Minister Kristy McBain said the extra funding would allow councils to plan for larger or more

complex projects which would make a bigger impact in the community.

“I’ve met with close to 200 local councils since May last year, and the resounding feedback has been that this extension will enable

them to progress their higher-priority projects – and now this work can commence,” she said.

Federal Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government Catherine King said through this funding the government was fulfilling an election promise.

“We know many councils across the country are struggling to maintain and improve their local road networks – especially following repeated flooding and other natural disasters in recent times.

“We have listened to councils and are standing side-by-side with local governments to support them in their vital role in delivering critical infrastructure for their communities.”

Member for Barker and Shadow Assistant Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Tony Pasin said he was disappointed it took more than a year for funding allocations for each council to be finalised.

“Details on exactly how much of this \$250 million in funding has been allocated to each council has been a long time coming,” he said.

“I welcomed the additional \$250 million, but I’m disappointed that it’s taken so long to confirm something that our Local Government sector has been waiting more than 12 months for.”

Mr Pasin said the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program, an initiative of the former coalition government, was unique as it responded to expressed local needs rather than being invested via a top down determined priorities and strategies approach.

“I’m incredibly proud of the support provided to Local Government through this Coalition Government initiative because this additional funding is empowering local communities and ensuring our regions remain strong, resilient and prosperous in the long term,” he said.

The couple have over 40 horses on their property to train and maintain.

"It's about 70 acres at Nar Nar Goon with our own racehorses and stables" Ms Walker said.

"I've got cows and calves as well and we were out last week ear tagging, I'm always out doing something on the farm.

"It's nice living where I do, I get the Hannah Montana Lifestyle, the best of both worlds.

"I still get to be the country girl but closer to Melbourne for the fashion and the experience side of things.

"I love bright clothes and beads and bows and that is how I express who I am as a person and it makes me feel confident.

"I would get up with dad at five in the morning before school and go and check the lambs.

"I'll be home in Furner at 4.30 pm today and I'll wipe my makeup off and go around the farm with him, it's something I love.

After applying for Miss Universe Australia

in November 2022 it was February this year when Ms Walker was notified she was one of 25 Victorian finalists in the state round and one of 130 national finalists.

Ms Walker will soon face a judging panel at the Sofitel in Melbourne where she has the opportunity to talk about her passions and why she would make a good advocate for Miss Universe.

The event includes a catwalk for the finalists with gowns of their own choosing and five women will be selected to continue through to the national round.

"I'm just a regular country girl, but I hope that people can resonate with some part of me.

"I want to inspire and empower women to chase some kind of dream of their own.

"As a midwife I empower a handful of women every day to care for their babies, educate them and get them to be autonomous over their body and their own choices.

"But I'm only able to do that with a handful of people, if I was to go on to win Miss Universe you are on a bigger platform, people take you seriously.

"I would have a platform where I can inspire more than a handful of people, maybe a nation."

As part of the Miss Universe Australia the finalists are tasked with raising funds for ToyBox Australia, a charity dedicated to supporting Australia's sick and disadvantaged children.

The women are over half way to their goal of \$400,000 and Ms Walker will be adding further to the tally by hosting a Mother's Day event this Sunday.

Held at the Henty in Mount Gambier Ms Walker will MC a two and half hour bottomless brunch menu which includes a drinks package, live music and donations by local businesses.

"There is such a great sense of community in the South East and I'm very lucky my family and friends are here who have been an amazing support for me on my entire journey.

"It's a great chance for other women to network in the South East and locally."

September will see the announcement of the Miss Universe Australia finalist who will continue to represent the country at the international level.

"It's exciting and how often would other people get this opportunity, some of these things I used to dream about," Ms Walker said.

"It's something I will probably look back on and tell my children one day.

"It's definitely taught me a lot about confidence, I feel I could walk into a room and introduce myself to anyone.

"It's been a great experience and I've learnt so much already and the opportunities have been amazing.

"I want to inspire other people to do the same, the world is whatever you want it to be."

Joyful family memories

This Sunday will be the first Mother's Day for some.
But for others, like Mary Pettman, it will be over half a century of celebrations.

Ms Pettman will be spending her 67th Mother's Day with five of her seven children and families who are taking her out to a Penola winery for the afternoon.

In 1956, at 22, Mary Newbery married Bruce Pettman and nine months and three weeks later their first son David was born.

"I think the first baby is a big thing, I was in Mount Gambier when I first got married and none of my family were up there," she said.

"They weren't far away in Millicent but Mum didn't have a car.

"I remember coming home with the first one, a bit sad there was nobody around.

"David wasn't a very contented baby, but I don't think it was him, I think I had that much milk it was causing him wind.

"It was my first baby and I did learn what to do."

Ms Pettman had her seven children over a 21-year period with five born within the first seven years, one born five years later and her youngest daughter born a decade on.

The two later children gave Mary a very different experience of motherhood with more time to enjoy them as babies.

"I had three children under three at one stage, I was busy, but it was no big deal.

"My kids didn't miss out, they had the necessities but not a lot of luxuries.

"It was a good life when you would go to footy on Saturdays, I loved it when the kids were still kids and you could all pack up and away you would go.

"Perhaps going to someone's place for a barbecue or something, it was quite satisfying.

"David was the eldest and he was good with the boys, they followed him a fair bit and there was freedom.

"We lived in little country towns and the kids would get home from school, change their clothes and then they would go and as long as they were back in time for tea, they could roam.

"Discipline was fairly strict, they didn't always do what they were told, but there was discipline.

"People say how did you manage, I tell them I didn't have time to think I just had to do, and there is a lot of truth in that."

It is coming up to five years since her hus-

band Bruce passed away and Mary finds herself often reflecting on family life.

"We were happy and it would be noisy, they were normal children that fought and did all those things and they all have different natures.

"But overall we had a fairly normal family without any stress, and we were lucky with our health.

"I'm glad I had my children a generation ago, today I think it would be much harder, the pressures are too much today I feel.

"Back then you got married and that was

my aim in life.

"You worked when you left school then you married and had a family, if that was your choice, and it was the choice of most girls of my generation."

Mary herself was one of five girls and credits her parents for raising her in a good family situation.

"I had a happy childhood, we made our own fun, so I didn't ever think that children needed a lot of luxuries."

All of Mary's children have gone on to have their own children with only one grandchild

living in Millicent.

The rest of the family are spread across the state or just over the Victorian border with all in driving distance if needed.

"When I look back over my life I'm really grateful for the big family that we had and we got through it without any dramas.

"As you get older you need two or three friends but your family is important and you like to see them as much as you can.

"All I can say is I did my best and leave it at that."

Red gum thieves on notice

As winter creeps in, the National Parks and Wildlife Service is cracking down on red gum thefts in the Limestone Coast.

With an increase of illegal firewood removal this autumn, Limestone Coast Senior Ranger Kieran Gosden has reminded South East residents it is vital to preserve native vegetation.

“With much of the landscape already cleared it’s vitally important to maintain areas of native vegetation in our reserves for future generations,” he said.

Operation Red Gum has been launched and Mr Gosden said it would include increased patrols and targeted camera surveillance in regional reserves and parks.

“Rangers will be out in force with a zero tolerance approach - if you’re caught, you will be penalised, and you may have your vehicle and equipment seized,” he said.

Red gums are often targeted for their slow burn rate and the high temperatures they emit.

Around 50 people have been caught illegally logging red gums for fire wood in the Limestone Coast in the last five years, resulting in fines of up to \$750 for offences including illegal removal of wood and possession/illegal use of a chainsaw in a reserve.

Rangers have also seen trees more than 100 years old cut down, sometimes on a commercial scale, for sale through back yard markets, with devastating long term results for the regions native flora and fauna.

Operation Red Gum would also protect the regions flora and fauna which Minister for Climate, Environment and Water Susan Close said was important.

“The destruction of trees robs native animals of their homes and makes them more vulnerable, especially to feral predators,” she said.

“Taking dead wood from a reserve or park is also illegal for the same reason.”

Ms Close also called for community members to be on the look out for illegal firewood thefts.

“We are also asking for community help with the crackdown to help save our native flora and fauna species,” she said.

In April Limestone Coast Police also started an operation targeting illegal reg gum thefts and reminded the community it was illegal to be in a forest reserve after dark.

In March police arrested two Mount Gambier men aged 47 and 52 at Coles for being unlawfully on premises.

They were allegedly found in possession of

a trailer of red gum at the time and were bailed to appear in the Naracoorte Magistrates Court on Wednesday, May 17.

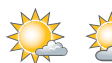

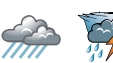

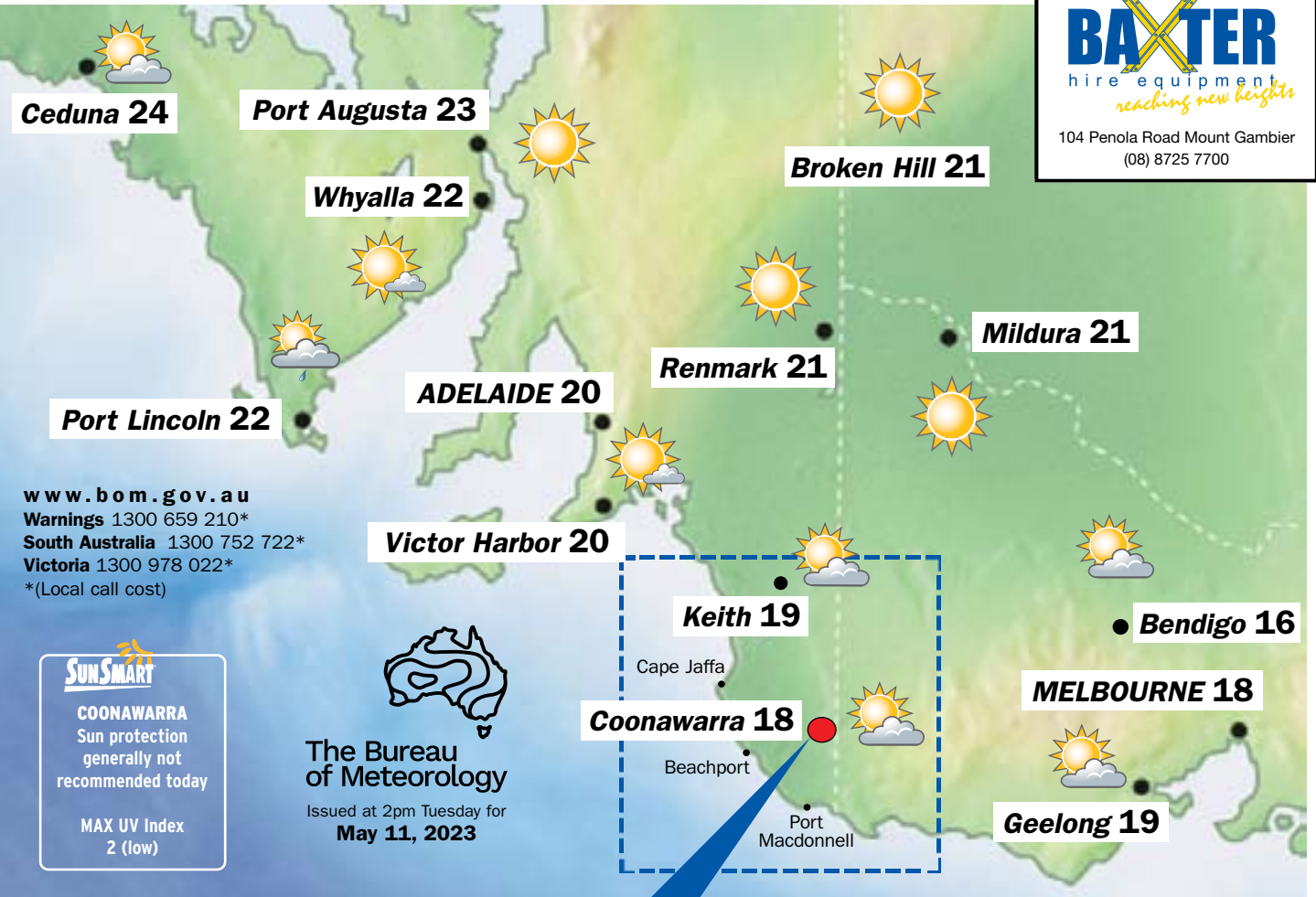

Phoebe must navigate a path that isn't always clear – and people aren't always as they appear. Inspired by creator Anna Barnes' experiences working in community legal centres, *Safe Home* is an unflinching look at the stories behind the family violence epidemic.

Subaru Outback Sport XT

By Chris Riley, Marque Motoring

After all these years, I still think of the Subaru Outback as a wagon rather than SUV -- the Forester too.

Unfortunately, you can't buy a diesel Outback anymore, but the latest turbocharged petrol version certainly addresses any perceived deficiencies in performance.

Like a fine wine, Outback continues to get better with age.

Its one major gap in an otherwise impressive repertoire remains the fact that it seats only five.

In fact, Subaru hasn't offered a seven-seater as part of its range since the propeller-nosed Tribeca in 2013.

But you're not likely to receive any complaints from those five passengers in a car that really sets a benchmark for comfort and features, given its relatively modest price.

Prices for Outback start from \$42,690.

Two turbocharged versions are offered: Outback AWD Sport XT is \$52,190 while Outback AWD Touring XT is \$55,990 -- \$5000 more than their standard counterparts.

The Autumn Green Metallic colour of our test vehicle looks very army and provides a real point of difference, but it won't be to everyone's taste.

Paint appears to be a no-cost option.

To distinguish turbo models, they feature dual tailpipes to go with the extra performance, although they are barely visible below the back bumper.

There's also an 'XT' badge (remember the powerhouse XT Forester) and LED fog lights that are made up of six LEDs -- we're told it's an homage to the Subaru badge which features six stars.

Like other versions the turbo rides on 18-inch alloys with 225/60 series rubber and water repellent, synthetic leather seat trim.

Touring adds Nappa leather.

A full-size alloy spare is provided.

Standard equipment includes dual zone climate air with rear vents, heated and power-adjust front seats, electric lumbar for the driver, heated rear window seats and a power tailgate.

There's also push-button start, auto lights and wipers, auto dimming mirror, auto high beam, rear park sensors, self-levelling, daytime LEDs, steering-responsive LED headlights and adaptive cruise control.

For some reason front parking sensors have always been a dealer fit option.

Outback is covered by a five-year/unlimited kilometre warranty period along with 12-months complimentary Subaru Roadside Assistance.

A three-year service plan is \$1355.

Subaru was slow to the infotainment party, but has made up for lost time with a big, impressive system that's dominated by a large 11.6-inch tablet-style touchscreen.

It has been redesigned to make it more user friendly, with new shortcut buttons, updated climate control buttons and full screen Android Auto.

XT Sport features Bluetooth, voice control, AM/FM and DAB+ Digital radio, built-in satellite navigation, plus wireless Apple CarPlay and Android Auto connectivity, along with six-speaker audio.

The CD player has gone to God.

Physical buttons such as the climate control panel have been integrated into the screen, with convenience and operability prioritised through shortcut switches for some frequently used features.

There are two 12v/120v power outlets (one in the front, the other in the cargo area), USB-A and -C ports and AUX in the front console, plus another two USB-A charge ports in the back.

A turbocharged 2.4-litre horizontally-opposed DIT Boxer four-cylinder petrol engine delivers 183kW of power at 5200 rpm and

350Nm of torque from 2000-4800 rpm.

Transmission is to all four wheels via a CVT-style auto, with auto-engine stop-start and gear changes paddles provided for manual operation.

Five-star safety starts with eight airbags, a rear-view camera and Autonomous emergency braking (Car to Car, Vulnerable Road User, Junction Assist and Backover).

EyeSight 4.0 features roadside speed sign recognition, adjustable speed limiting, and intersection crash avoidance using new cameras with a wider field of view and a lower profile inside the cabin.

There's also a lane support system with lane keep assist (LKA), lane departure warning (LDW) and emergency lane keeping (ELK) and an advanced speed assistance system (SAS).

Three standard child seats anchor points are provided along with two Isofix anchor points.

Apart from the turbocharged engine, the other big change is the switch to the Subaru Global Platform (SGP), which is stiffer and provides the scope to use alternative powertrains -- such as hybrid or fully-electric setups.

With maximum torque kicking in from a low 2000 revs, Subaru says the turbo does the dash from 0-100km/h about 22 per cent quicker than naturally aspirated models.

Auto Stop-Start now incorporates "Change of Mind Control" which as its name suggests, restarts the engine within 0.2 of a second -- if you change your mind.

Although described as symmetrical all-wheel drive, like most systems these days it is actually a part-time system with torque transmitted to the rear wheels as required.

In manual mode the CVT features seven steps or simulated gears, with the addition of Intelligent and Sport modes plus two-mode X-Mode for off-road driving.

With 213mm of ground clearance, X-Mode is designed for use below 40km/h with one setting optimised for snow and dirt and the other for deep snow and mud.

Fuel consumption from the 63-litre tank is a claimed 9.0L/100km compared to 7.3L/100km for the standard model, and it takes premium 95 unleaded.CO2 emissions are 204g/km.

The suspension has been re-tuned to accommodate the new engine, with different settings for the springs and dampers, and the result is first rate.



Although this Subaru was late to the infotainment party, it has more than made up for it with its impressive 11.6 inch touchscreen.

The extra torque of the turbocharged engine has also allowed the tow capacity to be increased 400kg, up from 2000 to 2400kg.

Outback is easy to get in and out of, with a cabin that is a nice place to be.

The seats are large and comfy, something Subaru has always done well, and the ride is quiet and buttery smooth.

All-round vision is excellent and you can see where the front of the bonnet is when it comes to parking.

The large physical blind spot lights that never fail to capture attention.

Elbow room is a bit snug however, so be sure to try it on for size.

The interior layout looks pretty much the same as the previous Outback that we drove a couple of years back, but the front seats have been redesigned with advanced shaping and support to reduce fatigue over longer distances.

Although the infotainment system looks impressive, the instrument cluster has a bit of catching up to do.

It retains old-style analogue gauges that flank a small central driver info screen with fuel consumption figures etc.

You'd be hard-pressed to tell the difference.

At 4870mm in length, with a 2745mm wheelbase, rear legroom in the wagon is excellent as is cargo capacity, with 522 litres available with second-row seats in use and 1675 litres with them down.

Standing 1670mm high, it's also easy to wash compared to most SUVs.

Outback feels more like a car than an SUV to drive and it is this that no doubt keeps me

thinking of it as a wagon.

Performance is for the most part effortless, although there was some slight hesitation from the transmission at times.

It has obviously been tuned differently to other turbocharged models, because power delivery is more linear, instead of arriving with a bang.

The turbo sails up hills without any need to punch the accelerator, the tachometer barely turning over more than 2000 revs and it gets away from the lights at a brisk pace.

It has a secure, planted feel with a suspension tune that is unfazed by the many pot holes that now litter our country roads after all the rain we've had.

But remember you're not buying the Outback for its off-road ability, rather the safety and security of all-wheel drive, with the ability to tackle a bit of mud or snow if the situation arises.

This means no to Fraser Island, as much as you'd like to venture there.

We finished on 10.1L/100km after close to 400km of mixed driving, but expect this to be higher around town.

The Subaru Outback is not perfect, but that is the word that springs to mind.

The turbocharged engine adds some punch and extra towing ability, but be prepared to pay a penalty in fuel consumption.

However, it's the comfort and ride quality that leave a lasting impression -- one that you'll want to take home.

The next step in the evolution of the wagon is a hybrid version, followed we assume by a fully-electric Outback sometime down the track.

There have been a few tuna caught early on and the first day saw school tuna to around 9kg, then on Sunday we saw a few big boys landed.

Kai levins boated a nice 97kg fish onboard Brojak Charters and young Jake Walkom boated a ripper in the junior section onboard Ruby Mc that weighed in at 47kg.

At the time of penning this article I was yet to receive any other updates from the comp so far, so we will be sure to have a full wrap up in next week's report.

The bottom fishing has been tricky in such poor weather, but looking forward to the coming week, we should see some nice fish caught.

Surf fishing was also tricky, again largely due to weather.

Speaking in the shop to a few optimistic anglers and this weekend looks to be a lot better, so there will be more that hit the beach.

The salmon have been in good touch, with some nice fish coming from inside Lighthouse Bay for the lure casters.

Those using bait seem to be getting the bigger numbers of fish, but the lure chuckers have been reeling in the larger catches.

There have been nice fish through Canunda for those willing to make the effort and more at the Beachport Salmon Hole too.

The size in the salmon hole has been varied, but still good fun.

Those chasing garfish have been able to find a few nice feeds during the breaks in the weather.

The waders have probably had the edge while the sea has been up, but once we see it lay down again, I think the boaties will swing straight back into it.

Cape Douglas and Hutt Bay have been productive in the past week and once the sea has settled Livingstons and Pelican Point will be

worth a crack.

A bit of inland fishing has been happening while the coast has been so wild and we are still seeing plenty of redfin hit the deck.

There are plenty of spots within an hour or two which are worth a shot.

Locations such as Lake Wallace in Edenhope which has been red hot in recent weeks, Rocklands Reservoir which has big concentrations of fish and even Lake Koonong Wootong for the electric powered vessels.

A bit closer to home we have Lake Edward which has had some excellent fish for the kayakers or guys in small tinnys, or Mill Swamp just over the border.

All of those spots are worth a look.

The Glenelg River has been pretty handy, with all the twists and turns among the stunning limestone cliffs, there is always a spot out of the wind to wet a line.

This week the hot spots seemed to be from the Princess Margaret Rose Cave, up to Sapping Creek.

I have heard of plenty of fish from through that area and even a few more soapies starting to be caught.

Squid and pilchards have been the most popular, but a live mullet is always worth a crack too.

The bream and perch have been in good numbers this week, with some ripper fish coming from the upper reaches in the heavy timber.

Live minnow are unbeatable if you can get them and I do not think a big perch could ever say no.

The bream fishing has been great in those upper reaches as well, and they will often eat a minnow too.

The lure guys have done well on heavy weighted plastics which will get in nice and deep on the rock walls, or deep diving minnows.

The forecast for the coming weekend and the remainder of the tuna comp is on the improve much to the delight of anglers.

We will have plenty of news to report next week including the wrap up of the competition.
