Sparkling charity

Patrick of Coonawarra has enlisted to be this year's wine sponsor for the NeuroSurgical Research Foundation's (NRF's) Sparkling 60th Celebration Dinner.

Patrick of Coonawarra's chief winemaker Luke Tocaciu said the NRF was a charity which was very close to the Tocaciu family, as his father and the estate's founder Patrick Tocaciu unfortunately passed away from brain cancer in 2013.

"At that point we found the NRF which is a fantastic charity providing support for research into the cure, prevention and treatment of brain cancer," Mr Tocaciu said.

"We have done a lot of things with them over the years, we started raising money doing the City to Bay Fun Run from Adelaide down to Glenelg.

"We did it for about five or six years in a row with a group of people which just grew bigger and bigger each year."

In the last 10 years, Patrick of Coonawarra has contributed more than \$40,000 to the NRF's cause as Mr Tocaciu said he hoped the relationship would continue for years to come.

He added the estate's role on the night would be to dispense its own wine, including a 50-year-old 'Chook Shed' Rare Tawny port, originally made by Patick himself.

The tasting fee for this milestone wine is set at five dollars, as Mr Tocaciu said all proceeds from the tasting would go towards the NRF.

"We are just there to enjoy ourselves, we are dispensing the night with some wine, our Patrick of Coonawarra Wines will be on the table and then there will be further opportunity for people to purchase some of that wine which will then give some of the money back to the NRF," he said.

"The port was made by my dad a very long time ago, so it's fantastic to be able to showcase that and give the proceeds of it to charity."

An additional NRF Partner Pack is also



Boozy Gully cliff cracks

Removal of Southend's Boozy Gully viewing platform has commenced after a large crack appeared in the cliff top alongside the popular lookout point.

National Parks and Wildlife Service Limestone Coast district ranger Ross Anderson became aware of the issue after a report came through last Wednesday, July 5.

"We straight away put up bunting and signage to keep people off the platform at the end of the boardwalk" he said.

"Our plan is to relocate the viewing platform back inland a little bit.

"People are always going to want to go there so we want to make it a safe area for people to view the coast."

"The coast is a dynamic area subject to erosion.

"This type of erosion is not uncommon along the coast and the public would be aware of other similar issues such as the Obelisk in Robe and Cape Buffon at Southend.

"It's a natural process, we've got really soft rock cliffs and limestone.

"Once it's cracked water can flow in there and exacerbate the erosion."

Although removal of the 30 year old platform has commenced re-locating it is expected to take some time.

Not dissimilar to the October Coonawarra Cabernet Celebrations [Decade]nce event (formerly known as the Regional Retrospective Tasting) which solely features the regions signature variety Cabernet Sauvignon, the Cellar Dwellers edition is a showcase of a range of Coonawarra varieties and styles ranging from Chardonnay to Riesling, Merlot to Shiraz, and of course the Coonawarra classic, Cabernet Sauvignon.

Boasting wines dating back to 2002, the wine list for the highly sought after event features up to 30 meticulously cellared wines, between 5 to 21 years of age, from 15 of Coonawarra's much loved producers.

Coonawarra Vignerons Event and Marketing Officer, Heidi Guyett said the Coonawarra Back Vintage Tasting event is a highlight in the 2023 Cellar Dwellers calendar and for good reason.

"What is unique and appealing about this event is that it brings together a diverse group of Coonawarra producers, in one location to showcase their wines collectively," she said.

Community invited to South East coastal lakes meeting

Community members interested in the future of the South East coastal lakes have been invited to a community forum to discuss their future.

Conservation and Hunting Alliance of SA (CHASA) have called the meeting but secretary of the organisation, Vicki Fabris, said the meeting is not just about CHASA.

"We have called it but it's to provide all members of the community with the opportunity to have their say and ask questions of the Department Environment and Water (DEW) representative coming down," she said.

"The South East Coastal Lakes Project has been running for about 18 months, there was some public consultation last year and an online forum but limited numbers were allowed to attend.

"The workshop in Millicent had a reasonable spread of community members and the

opinion at that consultation was very much against any extension of any national park, particularly Lake Bonney and Lake George.

"When the proposal paper came out on May 22nd it appeared that none of the community's input was taken into account.

"We were getting feedback that people weren't happy with the proposal paper and wanted an opportunity to be heard."

Lake Bonney and Lake George will be the focus of the meeting but people with comments, feedback or questions about Lake Eliza, Lake St Clair and Lake Horden North are welcome.

CHASA approached DEW and requested an extension for submissions in response to the coastal lakes management proposal.

The new submission date is Friday, July 28, and CHASA plan to use the feedback from the public meeting to base their submission on.

"Information collected will help to formulate our submission so we are being the voice of the local community and reflecting what is wanted locally," Ms Fabris said.


"The community is telling us they don't want access restricted to the lakes and they feel that local community management is working well.

"Beachport District Development Association and other community members help maintain the lake, it's not just the management committee.

"Lake George is in pristine condition and the locals that use it ensure that it stays that way.

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride, Member for Mount Gambier Troy Bell and Member of the Legislative Council Ben Hood are expected to attend along with Wattle Range Council elected members Richard Cassidy and Sharon Cox.

The meeting will be held tomorrow, July 14, at the Millicent Civic and Arts Centre and will begin at 7pm.

Hood now MacKillop pair

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride has left the South Australian Liberal Party for the crossbench, citing his position as a Liberal member as “untenable.”

Announcing his decision to become an independent on Wednesday, July 5, Mr McBride said the decision was made due to being sick of “factional divisions”.

Wasting no time, less than 24 hours after Mr McBride’s decision was made public, the State Liberal Party Leader David Speirs appointed Legislative Council member and Mount Gambier resident Ben Hood as the paired member for MacKillop.

“The defection of Nick McBride for entirely selfish reasons is incredibly disappointing but the SA Liberal Party is moving on quickly,” Mr Speirs said.

“It is important we have strong Liberal representation in the South East which is why we have immediately appointed Ben Hood as the paired member for MacKillop.

“Ben is a proud South East person and I look forward to working with him in the local community to win back the seat of MacKillop in 2026.”

In a document obtained by The South Eastern Times, Mr Speirs told Liberal members Mr McBride’s decision to leave the party reflected on his “character and not the excellent support he has received from [you] as Liberal Party members”.

“We feel incredibly sorry for [you] as local Liberal Party members who preselected him, worked tirelessly on his campaigns and supported him over the years,” Mr Speirs said in the letter.

“It is always regrettable to see people in politics turn their back on those who got them into politics in the first place.”

Mr Speirs also said now was the time to “preselect an exceptional candidate for the future and to win back the seat of MacKillop in 2026”.

Robe Liberal Branch president James Yates said he believed a majority of the MacKillop voters would not want Mr Hood “to have anything to do with their electorate” due to his beliefs which Mr Yates claimed “do not align with

many MacKillop residents”.

Mr McBride was contacted for further comment.

Mr McBride said last week that the decision had accumulated over his five years as an elected member, and that there had been “frustrations” in trying to work with the Liberal Party.

“The events in the last couple of weeks have been the final straw to what has accumulated over those last five years,” Mr McBride said.

The events Mr McBride referred to included the recent MacKillop annual general meeting where his “strong executive team” was “decimated by factionalism”.

“My people that have done such a terrific job getting me to where I had been were removed which I thought was very unfair, unwise and unwarranted,” he said.

Mr McBride said there were “dark forces” in the Liberal Party, in the sense that “you never see it coming and it operates with stealth”.

“You never know whether you are on the inner or the outer,” he said.

Mr McBride said he was pressured into signing a statement re-affirming his commitment to the Liberal party following a number of rumours in the media recently which said he was “doing deals with the Labor Government” and “looking for a ministerial position”.

He said those rumours were “absolutely false”.

Community calls for footpath funds

A long-awaited footpath is moving a step closer to fruition, with Wattle Range Council moving a motion to create a design for a footpath along Cape Buffon Drive at Southend.

The decision not to include funding for the construction of the walkway prompted community outcry, with council receiving 12 submissions in response to the 2023/24 Draft Annual Business Plan and Budget, ten of which pertained to the footpath on Cape Buffon Drive.

It is a project that the Southend Progress Association have been fighting for for more than 10 years, and it was a number one priority in the Southend Town masterplans, both in 2009 and 2018.

However, there was no money allocated for the project in this year’s budget.

The budget submissions refer to safety concerns due to the busy nature of the road, and ask for a hard-surfaced, formalised footpath to be built.

Speaking at the meeting was Ruth Vander Hoek from the Southend Progress Association, who said there were often parents, tourists and elderly people using the road at any time.

“It is a matter of urgency,” she said.

“We all have the right to feel safe and we all have the right to be safe.

“And it is up to every one of us to make sure we do the best to feel safe.

“We feel Wattle Range Council has to step up, and you all have to step up, and say this is a problem, a big problem.

“We don’t want to wait until there is a tragedy, until there is an accident.



Council heard from locals about what they wanted to see in the budget.

“Wattle Range Council, you have the responsibility also to keep us safe and I’m sure that’s why you sit here now - because you want us to be safe and you would understand it is a duty of care to keep us safe.

“We implore you, don’t wait another year, include a footpath on Cape Buffon Drive in the 2023/24 budget.”

Council moved a motion that the Wattle Range Council complete a detailed design of a footpath at Cape Buffon Drive to be included in the 2023/24 budget.

Also speaking on the proposed budget at Tuesday’s meeting was journalist Fred Smith, who asked that a physical copy of the council agenda be made available for journalists at meetings and that members of the press be provided with a meal during the council meetings.

Other written budget submissions included one from the Beachport and District Branch National Trust SA, in regards to the extension of the museum building to provide more room for exhibits and storage.

Mayor apologises

Mayor Des Noll has made an official apology to Wattle Range Council Chief executive Ben Gower for his “inaction” during a recent meeting.

In The letter, he states that during a Special meeting of council, held on June 29, Mr Gower was referred to by his first name on three occasions.

“Within any debate, the referral should have been referenced around the written facts and not you personally,” the letter said.

“I find this action very disturbing, especially in such a public setting.

“Upon reflection I wish to formally and publicly apologise to you for my inattention during the debate process and for not taking action to correct this inappropriate personal reference behaviour.”

Emergency repairs

Council will undertake emergency works on the Family History Group Building Millicent formally the Millicent School Building located at 1 Mount Gambier Road and corner of Short Street, Millicent.

The building is leaking, with much of the inside of the building affected - the walls and carpet are damaged from the water and will need replacing.

The leak appears to be from a large box gutter running east west between the roof lines and another running north south, and they will need to be replaced along with the old flashings.

This roof work must take priority, ensuring we can stop the leak at the source to allow the building to dry out to then replace the carpet.

Councillors voted to repair the roof leaks, and to allow the carpet and floor to dry out and investigate the carpet damage and replace as required.

Drop off your pet donations

Those wishing to donate pet supplies to Mount Gambier's South East Animal Welfare League (SEAWL) now have a drop off point in Millicent.

Wattle Range Trading owner Nicole Mitchell, decided to contact the not-for-profit organisation after reading their funding agreement with the City of Mount Gambier and District Council of Grant ended on July 1.

The annual funding arrangement between the two councils and the league has been ongoing since 2014 and was worth \$60,000 annually.

Funding contributed to operational costs of the animal shelter which took in lost and stray pets from the council catchment areas.

"I reached out to them after I saw the article to see if there was anything I could do" Ms Mitchell said.

"They've got no one down this way and they always have people ringing and asking if there is a donation bin in Millicent or surrounds."

Donations of unopened tinned or dry dog food or other pet supplies can be dropped at the George Street store and supplies do not have to be purchased from Wattle Range Trading.

"We don't want blankets, bowls, open food or fresh meat as they don't have fridges or freezers there," Ms Mitchell said.

"The donation bin is for collars, toys, dog food and cat food.

"Anything to do with pets is completely fine."

The league previously had a donation bin available in a local Millicent supermarket but recurring theft from the bin meant the option was discontinued.

A donation tin is also available for cash donations at both Wattle Range Trading in Millicent and Toffee and Treats in Penola.

Service station to close

Millicent community members were shocked on Tuesday to hear the sudden announcement the unmanned Pines Service Station on the edge of town will be closed permanently at the end of this month.

A spokesperson for K&S Fuels released a short statement on social media.

"Ampol Australia have informed K&S Fuels of their desire to close the Pines Service Station, effective 30th of July 2023," the statement said.

"K&S Fuels are disappointed and understand the disruption this will cause to our already strained community/customers."

The 2021 decision to move the Premium 98 grade unleaded from the 24 hour site on the corner of Williams and Mount Gambier Road

to the Pines Service Station will be reversed.

This decision was made to accommodate an extra diesel pump after the Adelaide Road service station closed.

Premium fuel will return to the 24 hour services station and diesel will be available on the Williams Road side pump only.

No premium diesel will be available.

The company stated they are fully focused on completing the Adelaide Road Millicent Roadhouse.

This decision will leave Millicent with a single fuel outlet.

The Pines Service Station on Mount Gambier Road is set to close at the end of July.

History of Murrell Block

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

MURRELL BLOCK

This site, previously owned by Christopher Sharam Jnr, was purchased in 1952 by Henry Murrell and his wife Olive. They lived here in a weatherboard transportable home with their three daughters. Henry and his brother Albert were the proprietors of the Penola Electricity Supply from 1948 – 1967.

The Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia purchased the property in 2008 and arranged for the removal of the house.

In 2017 Heritage Roses in Australia sponsored the planting of a Heritage Rose garden depicting old China roses and rare and endangered Hybrid Tea roses. The aim was to have a place where the public can view, admire and learn about the history and charm of these fascinating plants.

Penola High School Council donated the McAdam Hut to the Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia in 1975 and it was moved to this site in 2019.

David McAdam son of Henry, a weaver, was born in Cloncore, Ireland in 1834. He married Ann Jane Castles of Tartaghan Ireland in 1854 and they sailed to Australia on the Constantine, arriving in Adelaide in 1855. Having survived illness due to no employment and therefore no food or housing,

David, Ann and young son William moved to Bringalbert, Victoria in about 1857. Three more children were born there and one at Roseneath, Victoria. They then moved to Penola in about 1863 and it was here that David became a 'carrier'. The last six of their eleven

children were born in Penola.

David died at Lillimur in January 1908 and is buried in an unmarked grave in the Kaniva cemetery.

David McAdam Jnr. married Jane Jones

of Dergholm. He was a Warden of the Penola Church of England, a long serving officer of the Oddfellows Lodge, and a member of the Penola P.A. & H. Society. David was the last person to live in the slab hut, which then became the kitchen for the cottage.

Incentive to boost teaching numbers in regional areas

In an attempt to draw more teachers to regional areas the state government's will make the Country Incentive Zone Allowance available to teachers for the duration of their employment in country zones.

Currently, the allowance is only paid for five to eight years and Minister for Education, Training and Skills Blair Boyer said teacher retention after five years was an issue.

"Retention beyond five years has been an issue in our country schools and preschools, as teachers choose to move back to the city after they've gained some initial experience," he said.

"By making the allowance ongoing, our government hopes that staff in country locations will choose to stay longer – providing staffing stability to schools and preschools."

Teachers in Penola, Kalangadoo, Glencoe, Nangwarry fall within zone two, which means they will receive \$1989 per year for five years thanks to the allowance.

Millicent, Rendlesham, Kangaroo Inn are

in zone three, which means teachers there \$3508 per year for five years.

Australian Education Union (AEU) SA Branch President Andrew Gohl welcomed the change, which will come into effect from

next year, and said it would be rewarding.

"Country schools have far greater difficulty attracting staff and this extra money in the pockets of teachers on an ongoing basis is important to make these roles more attrac-

tive," he said.

As he grew up in the country Mr Boyer said he knew the value teachers had in regional communities.

With around 200 public teaching vacancies advertised in country schools and preschools each year Mr Boyer encouraged teachers to apply for regional roles.

"Working in the country can be a life-changing experience for teachers and leaders, and we hope more people will be encouraged to stay in the country or take up the opportunity to make the move in the years to come," he said.

While it is hoped this initiative will improve teacher retention, the government and AEU are currently negotiating a new enterprise agreement and Mr Gohl said the AEU was highlighting regional teachers during discussions.

"The AEU has raised the importance of all teachers in the country receiving the country incentives ongoing through enterprise bargaining and is negotiating with the government on this," he said.

Ambitious project to improve stays gains ground

Member for MacKillop Nick McBride and councillor Moira Neagle met with Millicent and Surrounds Health Support Group (MASHSG) members on Monday for a tour of Millicent's upgraded student nurse accommodation.

A group of dedicated volunteers have invested around 500 volunteer hours since January this year to upgrade the accommodation block on the Millicent Hospital grounds.

Originally known as the Matrons House it officially opened in 1964 along with the hospital.

Over time the modest accommodation expanded and became student accommodation for undergraduates undertaking placements as part of their degree.

Placements vary between three to eight weeks and the accommodation is generally full for most of the year.

MASHSG members are the instigators of the project which has been planned in three stages.

Mr McBride said he had met with MASHSG members Ron Wood and Trevor Sinclair at least a couple of times a year to touch base with what they are trying to advocate for.

"This was one of those and they are really trying to get these nurses quarters up to scratch, used and utilised," he said.

"It was an opportunity to have a tour and get a look around, I just want to advocate to the minister what is going on here so I can inform him.

"It's terrific."

The building consists of five bedrooms, kitchen, lounge room, and a single toilet, shower and bath in the bathroom.

Stage one saw the building gutted, new carpets laid throughout and the building freshly painted inside.

The bedrooms have been fully furnished with new bed, wardrobe, study desk, side table, window furnishings and bedding.

The installation of ceiling fans will complete the bedrooms.

Stage two includes installation of a new kitchen which is planned while the site is vacant for one week at the end of July.

Member of both MASHSG and the Millicent Health Advisory Council (MHAC), Ron Wood, said Beachport Lions are donating \$3,000 and a second hand kitchen.

"We were going to use the donated kitch-

en but it was going to be too hard and take too long to install.

"They said to go for a new kitchen, it's quicker and simpler and they are happy for us to sell the kitchen.

"That money can go toward the nurses quarters."

Members of the Beachport Lions have also offered to assist with removal and installation of the kitchen as needed.

Stage three of the ambitious project is a bathroom overhaul scheduled for January while the premises are vacant.

Donations from across the community and \$6,000 from Wattle Range Council in the draft budget has meant stage three is fully

funded unless issues arise.

Simone Berry is a member of MASHSG and has actively assisted with the refurbishment.

"The Ladies Hospital Auxiliary are there as a contingency so if we have any unforeseen plans they have some money set aside for the project" she said.

MASHSG and MHAC are grateful for the monetary and practical support received throughout the project and hope to organise a BBQ once the kitchen is installed to show their supporters the progress achieved.

"It's been amazing the support we've had from companies, service clubs and community groups" Mr Wood said.

Sheoak receives thumbs up

Sheoak Aged Care Facility has received the tick of approval from the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commissioner after a performance report was released earlier this year.

According to the report, there was a site audit in July of last year where it was found the service was “unable to demonstrate” assessment and planning, including consideration of risks to consumers health and well-being.

Informing the delivery of “safe and effective” care and services was also of a concern.

The initial report requested the facility address deficiencies including a review of relevant policies to ensure staff had clear guidance, electronic management system training to “ensure staff enter information” relating to the correct documentation of strategies as well as pain and behaviour management training for staff awareness on the use of non-pharmacological interventions.

Another deficiency included the request for an upgrade of the electronic clinical management system to include improved pain assessments.

The report read the assessment team was satisfied these improvements were effected with interviews, documentation and observa-

tions showing “effective assessment and care planning processes” were in place to “identify and mitigate risks”.

Consumers also stated staff at the facility were knowledgeable of consumers’ individual risks and expressed satisfaction with care and services received.

Staff were also familiar with assessment processes and said care plans containing sufficient information to inform how they deliver care.

The report also stated last year the aged

care facility was non-compliant when it was found the service was “unable to demonstrate care and services” which were regularly reviewed for effectiveness or when circumstances changed or incidents occurred.

The assessment team stated action was needed in regards to electronic clinical management system training to ensure staff were familiar with “validated assessment tools” as well as how to perform post incident reviews through charting and observations.

Another deficiency identified was an increase in the consumer review process to process more frequently monitor indicators, such as weight loss, pain and falls.

The service has since been defined as compliant with the previous issues following the assessment team discussing with consumers and staff members.

Further action has since been taken in regards to falls and weight management for each consumer with the assessment team expressing concern with the facility’s relevant policies and electronic clinical management training.

Implementing clinical and care staff handover sheets to ensure staff have to appropriate information to provide consumers with safe and effective care was also highlighted.

According to the report, the issues have since been rectified with care documentation demonstrated high impact or high prevalence risks now screened on entry. Interventions and recommendations from specialists incorporated into care plans has also been implemented.

Ongoing management of risk is monitored through progress notes, clinical audits and high risk meetings, with deficiencies addressed through staff training.

Referendum looms

As Australia gears up for the first referendum in a quarter of a century, the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) is reminding voters, particularly those in regional Australia, to enrol to vote for the upcoming decision on the Federal Voice to Parliament.

At a briefing in Adelaide on July 5, Australian Electoral Commissioner, Tom Rogers, said the high rate of enrolment across Australia was at a historical high level.

"It's been 24 years since the last one [referendum] and anyone over the age of 42 has never voted in a referendum before," he said.

"Enrolment, right now, we're sitting nationally at 97.2 per cent completeness; it is the best since Federation, which is a spectacular result from Australians."

"Indigenous enrolment is also in the best shape that it has ever been, I think at the moment sitting at about 84.5 per cent completeness."

The referendum is expected to be officially called in less than a fortnight when legislation is expected to pass through the Federal Senate, sending Australia to the polls with a voting date likely in October.

For those who may be unsure what will be asked, Mr Rogers said all Australians would have to write either Y-E-S or N-O, for their votes to be officially counted.

"If people want their vote to be counted it's really important that they understand what a formal vote is, and that is having to write either yes or no in full in English," he said.

Mr Rogers said at this stage there were some decisions to be made on other forms of displaying either a yes or no, and if they would be counted.

"A tick, for example, our current advice is that it is likely to be considered as a yes," he said.

"But the critical thing, is a cross (X) which

a lot of people use as a marker will absolutely NOT be included as a formal vote for a whole range of reasons."

Already passions are high on either side of the vote, with the AEC keeping an eye on information given to potential voters as a slurry of misinformation has been flagged by certain political parties, and spread easily across social media by uninformed voters.

"We're not stopping anybody from saying anything, Australians have the right to believe a whole range of things and if you read our social media page, they absolutely do believe a whole range of things," Mr Rogers said.

"But we also have a responsibility to defend

the electoral process and the integrity of the process.

"So if we see information that's factually incorrect, we pick it up, we highlight it, and we call it out." "Part of our role for this upcoming referendum is to make sure that we point out the facts and the legislation."

Expressions of interest are now on the AEC website, with paid polling positions being offered with a push for more regional residents to sign up and work at local polling stations for the referendum vote, with 6000 roles needed for South Australia alone.

She retired in 2022 to live in her home state of South Australia with this exhibition being her first one solo.

The exhibition will be open at Gallery 54 on July 30 from 1pm.

Boost to help digitise 14 years of Kingston S.E. Leader

Earlier this year the Libraries Board of South Australia called for country communities to apply for grant funding to digitise community newspapers.

Eventually making this information accessible online through the National Library of Australia's TROVE platform.

The Kingston Branch of the National Trust of South Australia (NTSA) saw this as an opportunity fitting with their objectives of preserving local history and making it accessible to the community.

The branch has recently been notified their application for a grant of \$5,000 was successful and has been matched with a community financial contribution of the same amount.

It is expected the first 14 years of editions of The Kingston S.E. Leader, from 1962 to 1976, will be digitised.

At a later stage it is expected the digitisation will be completed up until 2002.

In 1962, Richard McRostie relocated to Kingston from Victoria and established a printing business and the first local newspaper in the town, The Kingston SE Leader.

It quickly established itself as a much-loved community resource, eagerly read for all the local news and utilised as the main communication channel in the community.

Weddings, funerals, social occasions, fundraisers, reviews of visiting artists, were all covered by the 'Leader's' reporter/photographer.

Regular reports of local weather, council meeting notes and personal notices, real estate, livestock market reports and classifieds all ensured a strong emphasis on community news.

Sporting events in which Kingston teams participated across the South East were covered with columns by 'local experts' on football and golf competitions regularly contributed.

As one person said, "if you didn't see it in the 'Leader' it didn't happen!"

The "Leader" not only played a key role in reporting, recording, and preserving the town's social and economic activities but became central in developing social cohesion and identity.

It was printed weekly, usually consisted of no more than 10 pages and was printed for 11 months of the year.

Three generations of the McRostie family

published the Kingston S.E. Leader until it was purchased by the Naracoorte Herald in 2001 and became the South East Coastal Leader in 2002.

This publication was, in turn, bought out by Australian Rural Press and publication finally ceased 4 years ago.

A spokesperson for the Kingston Branch of NTSA said: "The impact on community identity through amalgamation and its final demise have been lamented by the community.

"The Kingston SE Leader played a vital role in the recording and preservation of the social and economic history of Kingston and is now a valuable resource to researchers of South Australian state history, local history and family history.

"Having this information digitised and accessible on TROVE will be of enormous value to researchers."



Savoury Texas Muffins: Roasted Capsicum and Chorizo

Prep time: 5 minutes

Cook time: 55

Serves: 8

Ingredients

- 2 chorizo sausages (250g), cut into 1cm dice
- 1 cup (180g) roasted capsicum, drained and chopped
- 3-4 green onions, chopped

- 3 cups (450g) plain flour
- 1 tbsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 2 ¼ cups (250g) grated extra sharp cheddar cheese
- 3 eggs
- ½ cup (125ml) vegetable oil
- 1 cup (250ml) milk
- 2 tsp Dijon mustard
- Tomato chutney to serve

Method

1. Preheat oven to 220°C/200°C (fan-forced) and grease a 6 cup Texas muffin tin with cooking spray.
2. Place chorizo into a non-stick frying pan and cook over medium-high heat until crisp and golden. Add capsicum and green onion. Mix well and set aside to cool.
3. Combine flour, baking powder, salt and ¾ of the cheese in a large mixing bowl. Make a well in the centre.
4. Whisk together eggs, oil, milk and mustard. Pour into flour, along with ¾ of the chorizo mixture. Gently fold until just mixed, do not overmix.
5. Divide batter evenly between 6 muffin holes. Top muffins with remaining cheese

and chorizo mixture.

6. Bake for 10 minutes, reduce heat to 200°C/180°C (fan-forced) and cook a further 20-25 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Stand in tin for 5 minutes before turning out onto a wire rack to cool slightly. Serve warm or cold with tomato chutney.

Tips

- Store muffins in an airtight container in the refrigerator or wrap muffins tightly in cling wrap and freeze for up to one month. Defrost in fridge overnight and warm in oven or microwave.
- While serving size and nutritional panel is based on mixture being divided into 8 servings, the ingredients will only make enough to fit within a 6 serve muffin pan.

Cauliflower Loaf

Prep time: 15 minutes, plus chilling and standing time

Cook time: 50-55 minutes

Serves: 4-6

Ingredients

- 1kg cauliflower florets (approx. 1 large cauliflower)
- 2/3 cup (100g) cornflour

- 2 tsp baking powder
- 2 tsp curry powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 250g grated pizza cheese
- 4 eggs
- 1 tbsp each of sunflower and pumpkin seeds
- Poached eggs, avocado and chopped red chilli to serve

Method:

1. Preheat oven to 200°C/180°C (fan-forced) and grease and line a large 20cm x 11cm x 9cm (base measurement) loaf tin with baking paper, making sure to leave an overhang on the long sides.
2. Place cauliflower into the bowl of a food processor and process until finely chopped to the size of rice grains. Transfer to a large mixing bowl.
3. Sift cornflour, baking powder, curry powder and salt together and add to cauliflower. Mix well. Add cheese and eggs and stir through.
4. Spoon into prepared pan and smooth the top. Sprinkle over seeds and bake 50-55 minutes, or until set and golden and a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Stand in tin for 15

minutes. Cover and refrigerate until cold. Cut into thick even slices and serve topped with avocado, poached eggs and chopped chilli.

Tips

- Use a gluten free pizza cheese blend for a complete gluten free bread.
- The loaf will slice easier when cold. It may be eaten while still warm, but it will be soft and crumbly.
- Reheat slices in toaster or heat between layers of baking paper in a sandwich press.
- Spread with your favourite lunch toppings for a healthy lunch.
- Use any type of seeds for the top such as sesame and hemp seeds.
- Cauliflower bread will keep for 3-4 days in a sealed container in the refrigerator.



Upgrade for Mazda CX-3

Mazda has released details of an upgrade to its CX-3 compact SUV due to arrive here in September.

It will include new safety features, equipment enhancements and technology across the entire CX-3 model range.

For 2023, the line-up will comprise of the entry-level Sport, Pure, Evolve, Touring SP and range-leading Akari grades.

Pricing ranges from \$26,800 for the Sport to \$38,620 for the flagship Akari, and all grades gain a significant uplift in equipment in addition to their already ample specification lists.

The latest update also offers an exclusively front-drive focused line-up, all powered by the tractable four-cylinder Skyactiv-G (G20) petrol engine and paired with Mazda's own Skyactiv-Drive 6-speed automatic transmission.

Replacing Neo Sport trim, the new Sport specification adds a generous array of standard equipment over and above its forebear, including 16-inch alloy wheels (previously steel wheels), Blind Spot Monitoring (BSM) and Rear Cross Traffic Alert (RCTA).

Wireless Apple Carplay is also added as standard across the range, along with wired Android Auto, auto-folding power mirrors and remote window control.

Building on Sport is the CX-30 Pure, which replaces Maxx Sport and now offers highlights such as LED lights front and rear with Daytime Running Lights and High Beam Control (HBC), Lane Departure Warning (LDW), Driver Attention Alert (DAA) and a crisply presented heads-up display (HUD), enhancing safety and in-cabin comfort.

The mid-range Evolve grade, which replac-

es the previous Maxx Sport LE, adds 18-inch machined alloy wheels (previously 16 inches) as well as front parking sensors.

Inside, there is premium white leatherette and tan suede upholstery.

The CX-3 Touring SP (previously sTouring) introduces sportier styling with 18-inch black machined alloy wheels, a black painted roof and black leather and Grand Luxe suede interior with blue highlights.

A black chrome signature wing and gloss black front grille are also new for 2023.

Inside the Touring SP, front seats with two-

position memory function (driver), 10-way power adjustment (driver) and heating function are now fitted, while Mazda Radar Cruise Control (MRCC) with Stop & Go function is added to the existing Advanced keyless entry and Traffic Sign Recognition features.

At the very top of the range is the Mazda CX-3 Akari, which gains further luxury with immersive Bose premium audio featuring seven speakers and 18-inch black machined alloy wheels for 2023, in addition to the power sliding glass sunroof, 360-degree camera and adaptive LED headlights.



New small sedan adds to growing MG range

Chinese manufacturer MG Motors has continued to expand its vehicle range in Australia with the launch of the MG5, a small-medium four-door sedan.

Although new to Australia the MG5 has been on sale overseas since 2012, often badged as the MG GT.

We're getting the second-generation model released in 2020.

MG5 comes with the choice of two variants, Vibe and Essence with driveaway prices of \$24,990 and \$28,990 respectively.

Not surprisingly this will make MG5 the cheapest model in our large and highly-competitive small sedan segment undercutting the Hyundai i30 Active sedan (\$26,000 + ORC), Kia Cerato S (\$26,200 + ORC) and Toyota Corolla Ascent Sport sedan (\$28,630 + ORC).

It does come with the same seven-year/unlimited distance warranty as the Cerato while Hyundai and Toyota offer five years and unlimited km.

MG5 Vibe is powered by a 1.5-litre naturally aspirated four-cylinder engine generating 84kW and 150Nm with a CVT automatic transmission driving the front wheels.

Essence steps up to a 1.5-litre turbo-charged petrol four with outputs of 110kW and 250Nm but with a seven-speed dual-clutch automatic and front wheel drive.

Claimed fuel consumption on the combined cycle is 5.7 litres per 100 km (Vibe) and 5.9 L/100km (Essence).

Full details of safety equipment are yet to be provided.

All that we've been told so far is that there are six airbags with Essence adding a 360-degree overview camera.

Likewise, infotainment features are

sketchy but will include a 10-inch multifunction colour

touchscreen with pairing to Apple CarPlay and Android Auto. Vibe gets a four-

speaker audio system and Essence two extra speakers.

Six colours are available: Dover White, Royal Yellow, Diamond Red, Misty Grey,

Black Pearl, and Brixton Blue.

Orders for the MG5 can be placed now with stock expected to arrive in dealerships by early July.

KNT still as close as ever

With the South Australian Country Football Championships now in the rear-view mirror, the state of play is clear for each team in the Kowree Naracoorte Tatiara Football League with just six rounds left in the season.

It has been yet another unpredictable KNT football season but as we enter the run home, there is a clear top-five and bottom-five.

This season, Border Districts has gone from strength to strength and has set itself as a flag contender with nine wins from 10 games.

Spear-headed in attack by Dylan Schoenmakers and Mackenzie Bower who have combined for 70 goals this season, the northern Eagles have been a class above and are on an eight-game winning streak.

The only loss came to Kingston, who claimed a 10-point win back in Round 2.

At the foot of the ladder is Kybybolite, who is yet to claim a win this year.

The Tigers came agonisingly close to ending its drought in Round 6, when they lost by just one point to Keith in a game where they led at all three changes but could not hold on in the final term.

Looking at the run home, the Tigers have three games against sides in the bottom five

Penola's Brad Bryant has been in stellar form, named in his side's best on eight occasions, while Fraser Adams and Zac Richards have been pivotal for Border Districts this season and have guided their side to top spot on the ladder at the break.

After a tough opening clash, they bounced back with a solid win over Eyre Peninsula.

The South East showed its class to claim a 3.0 (18) - 1.1 (7) win in the final game on Saturday.

The South East men fell short of glory over the weekend at the South Australian Country Football Championships in the Barossa Valley, finishing fourth after two days of competition.

The men headed off with the hope to defend their 2022 title, but missed the grand final shootout by a small percentage, despite winning both round games.

Just seven points either way could have made the difference, so close was the final ladder. From there they faced Southern in the playoff for third position, after an earlier close win.

However, the final game for both sides played out differently, with Southern easy victors 12.6 (78) to South East's 5.9 (39).

Clint Gallio, Jacob Eats, Daniel Bibby, Daron McElroy, Campbell Watts and Kade Bradley were named best for South East in that game, while Brayden Kain (2), Jacob Eats (1), Mitchell Lowe (1) and Colby Munro (1) all contributed major scores.

Gallio was named as the South East's best player after what coach Nick Davis said was an excellent performance across the weekend.

Davis said it was tough for the players to get up on Sunday, after just missing out on the major game and the chance to defend their title.

"The boys were a bit flat after we won both games on Saturday and did not make the grand final," he said.

"Winning both games we thought we would be in the grand final but we missed out on percentage.

"We were a bit off our game on Sunday but that's okay."

The South East men began their campaign with that hard-fought six-point win against Southern.

tively, but Eastern only just pipped South East for that final top-two position and a grand final berth.

"The young fellows were really good," he said.

"A few of the Under 21s played well so it was a good performance from them."

"He was great in the middle and Jacob Eats up forward was really good."

Davis said they managed to rotate all players through and finished the weekend with no injuries, despite the horrid weather experienced.

At the end of the day Davis said it was well worth the effort.

"It was a great experience for the young fellows and the old ones as well," he said.
