## Revival of reviver

Motorists travelling through Penola will be safer with the Penola Lions Driver reviver back on the road.

The club launched their new driver reviver van last week.

The van is a fully-equipped van with a barbeque, fridges and everything needed to keep drivers alert.

It was funded through Round 2 of the Driver Reviver Site Upgrade Program announced in September 2021, in which the Penola Lions Club received \$82,000 to purchase a five-meter catering van and a digital road sign for the Driver Reviver site at Greenrise Lake

Lions Club acting president Ray Haines said the Wattle Range Council supported the club to find some external funding for the project.

"The Wattle Range Council were aware that we were looking at some options to set up a driver reviver site so they guided us towards road safety funding," he said.

"The idea of the Driver Reviver is people traveling, generally on school holidays, call in for a rest.

"They can stop, pull off the highway and have a cup of coffee or biscuit, go for a walk and take the pets for a walk as well.

# A hearty cause

Some Penola locals are lacing up for a cause close to their hearts.

Tara Batt and her mum Diane Williams are in training mode, as they prepare to take on Coastrek, a 20km coastal walk for charity.

The annual event will see the pair, and the rest of their team, walk along the Fleurieu Peninsula coastline, all in the name of raising money for the Heart Foundation.

Ms Batt and her teammates will be walking in memory of her late husband Shane Batt, who passed away of a heart attack 12 years ago.

"I was looking for something to do for the Heart Foundation this year," Ms Batt said.

"My husband passed away from a heart attack so I did a big fundraiser for the Heart Foundation for his thirtieth birthday and thought I wanted to do something this year for his fortieth.

"When I saw that Coastrek was for the Heart Foundation this year, I just knew that was it and I managed to get seven other women to join me to do it too."

It will truly be a family affair, with her mum walking alongside her, and her children and her Dad will be with them in the support vehicle.

In order to take part, the teams must raise a minimum of \$2000, so Ms Batt will be holding a fundraiser on July 28.

There will be great auction items - including accommodations stays, wine and a helicopter ride, among others - games and guest speakers during the evening.

"The event is sort of our way of bringing the community together to help raise some money for the Foundation and to raise awareness," Ms Batt said.

"At the moment, there's 18 people a day that lose their life to heart attacks.

## Phone app to guide visitors

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

### PETTICOAT LANE STATE HERITAGE AREA

This lane, with the national heritage Woods MacKillop Schoolhouse on the right, was originally called Christie's Row after bootmaker Christopher Sharam who built the first dwelling, and later Wilson's Lane after another early inhabitant, noted market gardener, William Wilson. After settlement it became an English lane planted with hawthorn, red and white roses and fruit trees blossoming in season. It has now become the jewel in the crown of the Penola Branch of the National Trust of South Australia, which owns and maintains six historic buildings herein, and manages the following with the indispensable help of local volunteers:

- the Lavender Farm, first created by Simon and Deb Cox from 1999 – 2008, now maintained by the Branch with the help of an alpaca and some sheep;
- the Herb Garden, a popular and prosperous venture first established by Graham and Jenny Hinze in 2001 and since managed by National Trust members Kate Spencer from 2006, and Lynne Karl from 2019.
- and the Murrell block, purchased in 2008 and now the new home of a Heritage Rose Garden sponsored by Heritage Roses in Australia Inc. and planted by member of the National Trust and Rose Society of South Australia, Sue Zwar.

In 2021, the 1860s McAdam Hut was transferred from the Penola High School grounds to this site to prevent its further deterioration.

The South Australian Gazette reported the declaration of Petticoat Lane – Woods MacKillop Schoolhouse as a State Heritage Area on 11 December 1997.

“So when you start adding that up, heart disease is the number one killer in Australia, so we want to raise awareness so that they can reduce that number because it’s not just those 18 people losing their lives, it’s 18 families losing a loved one, and we all know what that’s like and just don’t wish that upon anybody.

“If we can raise some more awareness around that and help reduce that number, then that’s our little bit.”

Ms Batt said the community was a huge support after she lost Shane, and she hoped to repay the community by working to try and reduce heart disease in Penola.

“I’ve been fortunate enough to be able to go into both the schools here when they’ve done Jump Rope for Heart and speak to the kids and raise awareness with the kids,” she said.

“We try and just do our own little bit each year for the Heart Foundation, but we want to use Shane’s milestone birthdays to do something a bit bigger.

“The Penola community is always so generous and such a fabulous community to be involved in and if by raising some awareness, we can help people that may be in the high risk category, then we’re doing our bit.

“Shane is not the only local that has lost

their life in that way, there have been others in the community over the years and it’s one of those ones that is really devastating when it happens because it’s so unexpected so if we can help to minimize it, that would be amazing.”

“So it’s just a very good way for people traveling to break up the journey and to give themselves a bit of a break.”

They will be parked at Greenrise Lake, so travellers will have access to toilets and facilities as well.

“We will set it up for Greenrise Lake reserve so people that are traveling, they only have to turn off the highway a short distance and they can get their cup of tea and have their rest.

“They don’t have to come into town if they don’t want to.

“They can break the journey without having to come into town and spend an extra half an hour. “Some people will choose to do that, but this is really just giving people that are traveling from point A to point B an opportunity to have a rest off the road and have a stretch and revive.”

Member for Barker Tony Pasin praised the driver reviver program.

“Anyone who has used a Driver Reviver site here in Barker or elsewhere across the country knows how important they are for safety and fatigue breaks for drivers and their passengers. This funding is ensuring that Driver Reviver sites continue to be a reliable break spot well into the future,” Mr Pasin said.

“I’m so pleased that this funding has supported the Lions Club of Penola who donate their time and effort to man Driver Reviver sites, offering motorists a cuppa, friendly con-

Beachport Medical Services stated the sudden closure was due to difficulty the practice had in securing doctors for the clinic.

Medical Clinic Millicent have since stepped in and are reopening the doors from Thursday August 3 for two days a week.

The clinic recently announced the opening date via social media and state Dr Claire Thompson will consult on Thursdays and Dr James Bushell on Mondays.

# Beach track to stay open

Glen Point Beach at Beachport will remain open for vehicle access, following community consultation.

Earlier this year, the Wattle Range Council received a request from a local resident who raised concerns about the public safety for pedestrians using a narrow track runs alongside the edge of the Beachport boatyard, that provides both walkers and vehicles access to Glen Point in Beachport.

The resident requested that all vehicular access be stopped in the interest of pedestrian safety.

Public consultation was sought, and council received more than 200 responses.

Of those responses more than 85 per cent said they did not support the closure of the road, answering no to the question "Do you

support the proposal to close the Glen Point, Beachport access track to vehicular traffic".

Many responses said they did not believe there were any safety concerns, while some said they had witnessed drivers going faster than the posted limit.

Council had several options presented to them if those chose to keep the track open to vehicle - Do nothing additional, only maintaining signage, increase maintenance of the current track at a cost or seek to build an alternative pedestrian track or widen the current at a significant cost.

A report tabled to council said the operations team had completed maintenance works to determine if a gravel base existed, and to assess the benefits of this works, and confirmed that these works allowed for use of

the track by a vehicle at lower speeds without getting bogged and that there is a gravel base to the track.

"The Operation Team's recommendation is that should the Council seek to keep the track open they support ongoing maintenance of the track in the condition," the report said.

"This will help with safety as it will not require higher speeds (retain momentum) to avoid users getting bogged."

It was expected that maintenance of the track would cost \$10,000 annually.

There was much discussion about the track in the meeting.

Councillor Peter Dunicliff said he was "conflicted".

"Having used this track on foot and on a vehicle, I am conflicted on this," he said.

"On the southend footpath [discussion] we talked a lot about safety, but then we think "when has there been a safety incident".

"I think we should leave it as a track with a sign.

"It's hard to know what a lot of visitors think about the road because they don't have a chance to answer."

Councillor Richard Cassidy said the response from the community was "wonderful".

"I think we just maintain the track every so often, we can't close it."

Councillors voted to keep the track open to both vehicles and pedestrians, that is retaining this as a shared zone and trailing an increase in the maintenance to improve the surface to encourage users to keep to the sign posted speed of 10km/hr.

## Trees to stay until design

Trees that were on the chopping block in Penola have been temporarily saved.

Five Queensland Box trees in Church Street were up for discussion at the Wattle Range council meeting last week.

There is a section of kerb and gutter in Church Street, Penola that needs repairs due to damage caused by tree roots.

Last year, the council allocated a sum of \$70,000 in the 2022/23 budget for kerb and gutter repair in Church Street, but the work would require the removal of five mature Queensland Box trees.

These trees are the cause of significant damage to the kerb infrastructure along this section of road.

Council was presented with four options - removal of the trees and reinstatement of the kerb, retain the trees and do not reinstate the kerb, realignment of kerb to retain the trees or installation of protruberances to retain the trees.

The options varied in cost from

\$15,000 to \$200,000.

Riddoch ward councillor Emma Castine asked that if the trees were to be removed and replaced, whether similar problems would arise with other trees.

"I spoke to the ratepayers group about the trees," she said.

"They were happy enough to cut them down and go with the cheapest option, but we need to look underneath them - any tree is going to disturb the footpath."

Works manager Peter Halton said the area in question is part of the Town centre project that is currently being worked on by design company Sprout.

Ms Castine suggested that the work be put on hold until more work can be done regarding the town centre project.

The councillors voted to leave the trees as is and remove the funds from the Budget and revisit it once the main street design is finalised.

## Council adopts 7.9 rate rise

Wattle Range Council residents are set to be hit with a 7.9 per cent general rates rise, following the approval of the 2023/2024 Draft Annual Business Plan and budget.

This means that for the 2023/24 financial year, the minimum rate is proposed to increase from \$610 to \$650.

At a special council meeting last week, councillors voted to adopt the 2023/24 Annual Business Plan as presented.

The council will spend \$10.77M on total capital expenditure with \$6.42m expended on renewal and replacement of existing assets and \$4.35M proposed to be spent on new or upgraded assets.

Kerbside waste collection charges for the three and two bin services will increase by 5.4 per cent for 2023/24 but council will continue to provide a rebate to eligible pensioners in 2023/24 at \$120 for those with a three bin service and \$90 with a two bin service.

Key projects include construction of the Council Service Centre, budgeted at \$3m, construction of the Queen Street, Penola storm-water project at \$300,000, \$600,000 for repairs

to the Millicent Swimming Lake, \$165,000 to seal the carpark at the Beachport Recreation Centre and \$100,000 to begin construction of the wayfinding strategies in Millicent and Penola.

Smaller projects include the renewal of the Wallaby Room at the Gladys Smith Early Learning Centre (\$125,000), Construction of a cat impound facility (\$7,000) and the replacement of Millicent town entrance signs (\$20,000).

Events assistance for popular events such as Coonawarra Cabernet celebrations, The Beachport New Years Eve Fireworks, Penola Rodeo and others will continue.

Footpath and kerbing works in Penola and Millicent have been allocated \$196,000 and \$220,000 respectively, while \$80,000 will go towards signs on the Coonawarra Rail Trail.

\$865,000 will go to road reseals across the region, and \$1.331M will go towards the annual resheet program.

# Rare bird sighted in the South East

New Malleefowl nesting mounds have been found in the upper Limestone Coast in known Malleefowl populations.

The mounds were discovered using remote sensing technology (LiDAR – Light Detection and Ranging) and confirmed by on ground inspections.

The mounds have been added to the region's monitoring program.

Malleefowl populations are declining and in some parts of the Limestone Coast, already extinct.

On ground activities to protect Malleefowl (*Leipoa ocellata*) in the Limestone Coast are being supported by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board through funding from the Australian Government's Environment Restoration Fund – Threatened Species Action Plan – Priority Species Malleefowl Grant.

The project activities include the identification of mounds, feral deer and fox control, revegetation, mound protection and pest plant removal.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board team leader habitat conservation Mark de Jong said work like monitoring and detecting new mounds was exciting for the trajectory of the region's Malleefowl population contributing to the national conversation about Malleefowl recovery efforts.

"With our partners National Parks and Wildlife Services SA, we have discovered thirty new mounds which are now recorded and part of our monitoring system," he said.

"Twenty of these are now fenced, protecting them from being accessed and damaged by feral deer."

Mr de Jong said the region's Malleefowl population was the most southern in Australia, and with a warming climate, may become important for the conservation of the species.

"If we link that to the fact that the state's largest populations of feral deer occur in this region, the feral deer eradication component

of the funding is a significant step towards protecting our Malleefowl at a national level," he said.

"We sincerely thank the Australian Government for the funding, and our partners, National Parks and Wildlife Services SA."

## Grassroots Grants announced

The Limestone Coast has received \$276,000 funding for fourteen of its projects, which has stemmed from the Limestone Coast Landscape Board's (LC Landscape Board's) Grassroots Grants project.

The Grassroots Grants program has aimed to continue supporting projects established by schools, individuals, volunteers and community organisations who have the goal to work towards a sustainable landscape.

Other local projects included the protection of tree seedlings from the Mount Burr Trails Incorporation through the installation of 100 'kangaroo proof' tree guards, establishing insurance populations of three critically endangered plant species in the Limestone Coast and the delivery of wetland restoration activities at endangered associated fens, coastal woodlands and karst spring sites in Port MacDonnell.

LC Landscape Board chair Dr Penny Schulz said the program had seen an increase in applications for the 2023/24 round of funding, which she said strengthened the importance of the funding in the region.

Community groups have really taken on board the benefits that the funding can provide in kick starting projects to sustainably manage our landscape."

"This year is the fourth year of the program and it has been fantastic to see application submissions continually increasing and meeting board priorities.

"This year's round has seen new and returning organisations with innovative and bold ideas, it will be fantastic to see the outcomes of these projects."

Grassroots Grants recipient Nora Creina Shack Association spokesperson Angela May said the Shack Association was very excited to be able to start with their project.

"Securing funds in this round of Grassroots Grants will ensure we can work to combat African Lovegrass in the area and use native plants for revegetation, protecting the environmental and recreational value of Nora Creina," Ms May said.

# Street talk

Discussion began with the Somerset Hotel, listed as number one block in George Street, and continued up and down the main street.

One of the businesses that stimulated discussion was Miss Oberlander's shop where Java Cafe is now.

During the 1950's, walking through the shared front door, Miss Oberlander's haberdashery shop was on the right and local lawyer GB Hutchesson on the left.

"It was a little haberdashery shop, it was really dark, long and narrow" Ms Hammat said.

"Miss Oberlander used to sell Sunny Stories books and little knick knacks.

"Kids would ask for left handed cricket balls and if she had any striped paint, things like that.

"She was a dear old soul and was there for years.

"Miss Oberlander died in 1959, aged 79, and I think it was about 1956 when she finished at the shop."

Ms Hammat is planning the next gathering to be held on the second Tuesday in August at 1.30pm.

"I've got about 40 slides of the 1970's era that were donated to the Millicent Museum.

"They are from before the high school subdivision was built and show the first house there, the rest was paddocks.

"I'll try and incorporate before and after slides of some of the shops in George Street during that time."

# Kick-starting habitat restoration with funding

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board (LCLB) has just awarded funding to kick start projects that support our landscapes biodiversity such as establishing shelterbelts, and protecting remnant vegetation and wetlands.

The Habitat Conservation Incentive Grants of more than \$50,000 have been awarded to successful landholders across the region to undertake on-ground projects that contribute to conserving and enhancing our region's biodiversity.

Acting manager land and biodiversity Mark de Jong said it was pleasing to see so many landholders apply for the grant program.

"The grant program has been a fantastic initiative to help landholders improve habitat for native plants and animals and increase productivity on their farms."

The LCLB has supported funding for nine projects across the Limestone Coast with more than 30 hectares of on-ground works to be completed.

Grants were awarded following a competitive process, with successful applicant's demonstrating the best outcomes for biodiversity and co-benefits to productivity.

Wetland restoration advisor Emma Maxwell said the grant process had improved relationships between the LCLB and landholders.

"Working with applicants through the three stage approval process has enhanced relationships while developing some really valuable projects for our region."

Projects include the planting of shelterbelts, fencing to protect remnant vegetation to wetlands, strategic weed control to



# The story of the Redmans

With so many new and exciting brands entering the Australian wine scene, the stories of the classics could well be left on a dusty bottle-shop shelf.

However, as the Redman family celebrate 50 years of Coonawarra Cabernet Sauvignon, with a body of work that shows consistency of style over five decades, it's a reminder that everything old can be new again.

Their non-intervention wine philosophy, instilled in the family from the beginning (1908), continues today and has always stood them in good stead no matter the trends of the time.

This 50 year milestone was due to be celebrated in 2020 but postponed due to the pandemic.

The Redman name has become synonymous with medium-bodied, intensely flavoured Coonawarra Cabernet Sauvignon.

Whilst the Redman story dates back to 1908 and they have long been producing shiraz, it was only in the late 1960s that Owen Redman realised the potential for Cabernet Sauvignon.

1970 was the first release, with 550 magnums produced - only a small harvest the first year, but demand grew as greater fruit became available.

Mal Redman recalled talking about selling these initial cabernet magnums for \$8 each and questioning whether anyone would buy them.

"Within minutes someone walked into the cellar door and walked out with a case. We knew we were onto something special," he said.

Bruce Redman said the 50-year milestone is a great opportunity to look back to see how the industry and region have changed.

"We've evolved and continued to embrace new techniques and technology, but we are still very much hands-on and believe in the philosophy of non-intervention," he said.

"Grapes are de-stemmed and crushed in the field at the time of picking, and there's a focus on red wine, which means a consistency of style that maintains the integrity of the wine.

"Every vintage is different, but there's a common thread running through the wines we're trying to capture."

Owen Redman took over from his father, Bill Redman when he retired in 1965, and he and his wife Edna immediately set out to put their Coonawarra red wines on the map.

Their vision continued until 1982, when their sons, Bruce and Mal Redman took over.

A tight-knit family who purposefully are involved in every facet of the business - from growing the grapes to making the wines and getting the bottle into a customer's hand. Venture into the Coonawarra Cellar Door, and it will be one of the Redman family likely to pour the wines and tell the stories behind the label.

With only three winemakers at the helm across five decades of Cabernet Sauvignon production and just two viticulturists tending to the vines, the Redman family's intimate knowledge of the vineyards and Coonawarra's terroir is impressive.

- trying not to overcrop for moderate yields, to let the natural flavours in the grapes come through.

Recently celebrating their 42nd vintage working alongside each other, Bruce and Mal Redman continue to focus on their house style rather than chasing fads.

Much of the work is now done via intuition, each wine elegant, almost subtle, but with deceptively powerful flavours and length. Dan and Mike Redman, the fourth generation, now

add their touch, but the vision still very much reflects that of their father, Bruce and grandfather. The quality of the fruit, sourced from five exceptional vineyards in the heart of Coonawarra, speaks for itself.

Dan and Mike said that they love hearing the stories of Redman wines passed down from one generation of drinkers to the next.

"The distinctive yellow label evokes memories, reminiscing about celebrations gone by, which our wines have been a part of," they said.

"Other regions may steal the limelight, but the medium-bodied approachable style of Coonawarra Cabernet is still very much in vogue."

The Redman family has been a part of the fabric of Coonawarra for 115 years, showcasing a unique heritage.

The body of work, including 50 years of Cabernet Sauvignon, very much speaks of where they come from.



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# Rainfall hitting new highs

The Limestone Coast endured record rainfall in June, with the gauges hitting the highest they have been in June in 82 years.

It was an unexpected change to The Bureau of Meteorology's (The Bureau's) original predictions for this year's winter.

Earlier this year, The Bureau's climate models predicted it would be a warmer and drier than average winter due to a positive Indian Ocean dipole and a developing El Nino phase.

A positive Indian Ocean dipole means there is less moisture to the northwest of Australia which leads to a reduced chance of rain.

A negative dipole is the opposite, which usually leads to higher rainfall for most of Australia.

The Bureau climatologist Jonathan Pollock said the dipole remained in a negative phase for longer than their climate model anticipated.

However, he said the current forecast still predicted there to be drier than average conditions in the months to come.

"The further we look out into August and September, we are looking at below average rainfalls for large areas of the country, including Mount Gambier," Mr Pollock said.

"The climate models are still forecasting both positive Indian Ocean dipole and an El Nino to develop but we are not there yet."

Mr Pollock said the climate model was reliable for capturing El Nino's southern oscillation, leading to warmer ocean temperatures, and the Indian Ocean dipole, but was not as accurate for predicting the formation of northwest cloud bands.

"There was more available moisture which at the end of the month was quite dramatic and we had this big northwest cloud band stretch from the Kimberley all the way down to Tasmania," he said.

"It wasn't just The Bureau's model which

didn't get it right for large parts of the country, all of the other international models were sort of showing dry conditions."

Mr Pollock said the coming months showed no push towards cooler or warmer temperatures and predicted a more neutral weather pattern.

He also said June and July had experienced

warmer than average minimum temperatures.

"While we kind of have the conditions right in the oceans, the atmospheric indicators we normally look at are still pretty neutral," Mr Pollock said.

"June was warmer than average for minimum temperatures in the South East and for maximum temperatures for a lot of the state.

"Recently in July, we have seen quite a record warm beginning for July for night time minimum temperatures for parts of the South East but that area is set to relax a bit in the coming days."

Mr Pollock said there would also be below average rainfall for August and September for large areas of the country.

## Watch out for deadly drug causing hospitalisations

A deadly synthetic opioid, protonitazene, has made its way into the South Australian drug market and while the substance has not been found in the South East, one advocacy service has warned it was just be a matter of time.

Substance Misuse Limestone Coast project officer Sophie Bouchier said it was important for people to be aware of the risks protonitazene poses and be wary of taking opioid and non-opioid illicit drugs.

"This particular drug has caused recent serious hospitalisations in Adelaide and it may not be in the Limestone Coast, but it is a white powder and it looks like amphetamines or a white heroin or opiate, so people need to be very careful if they're buying from somebody new that they have never bought from before," she said.

Protonitazene has seen three hospitalisations in Adelaide in the last fortnight, while it is suspected another man died after being exposed.

According to SA Health people exposed to protonitazene are at a high risk of opioid poisoning, and the drug can produce life-threatening toxic effects at low doses.

Acting State Director Drug and Alcohol Services South Australia Dr Victoria Cock said protonitazene could be disguised as other drugs.

"There is major concern that this drug is being mixed with other illicit drugs, particularly methamphetamine, and that people are being accidentally exposed to it," she said.

"Even if used knowingly by a regular opioid user, there is a high chance of overdose and death."

Ms Bouchier said if people were buying illicit drugs, they should use their usual supplier.

"If they are taking drugs please remember to be cautious if buying from a new supplier and if the product looks different to what they expect it to look like then be alert and

use smaller quantities," she said.

SA Health encouraged drug users to have naloxone on hand, as it could reverse the effects of protonitazene.

Ms Bouchier echoed this and said drug users should practice "harm reduction strategies".

"Don't use alone and have naloxone on hand at all times, which they can talk about getting that from their clean needle provider

or their alcohol and other drug provider," she said.

Royal Adelaide Hospital duty emergency physician and clinical toxicologist Associate Professor Sam Alfred said it was impossible to know if a drug contained protonitazene or not.

"The danger of taking any type of recreational drug is that it is impossible to know where it has come from, what is in it and at what dose, and what effect it will have on the

individual who takes it," he said.

Ms Bouchier agreed and said it was important to call triple zero (000) if you experienced unexpected effects.

"If people have tiny pupils, they're really pinned, or they have slowed breathing or blue lips and fingernails then call an ambulance," she said.

"Also loss of consciousness and hard to rouse, definitely call triple zero."

## Tuna Mornay with Eggs

Serves: 6

### Ingredients

- 1 ½ cups (325g) long grain rice
- 425g can tuna in oil, drained
- 6 eggs
- 50g butter
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 3 tablespoons plain flour
- 3 cups (750ml) milk
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 cup (110g) grated parmesan
- 1 bunch broccolini, halved lengthways
- 1 cup (50g) panko bread crumbs
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 clove garlic, crushed

### Method:

1. Cook rice according to packet instructions. Spoon into a large ovenproof 10-cup capacity baking dish. Top with flaked tuna. Set aside.
2. Boil eggs over medium heat for 6-7 minutes. Drain and cool. Peel and halve.
3. Meanwhile, melt butter in a saucepan over medium-high heat. Add onion and cook, stirring, for 3 minutes or until softened. Stir in flour and cook for a further minute. Pour in milk and cook until the mixture boils and thickens, about 5 minutes. Stir in Dijon, season with salt and pepper and add half the parmesan. Pour over rice and arrange broccolini across the top.
4. Preheat oven 180°C (fan-forced). Combine remaining parmesan, panko crumbs, oil and garlic together and scatter over the top. Bake for 20 minutes or until golden and heated through. Remove mornay from oven and nestle eggs into the top. Bake for a further 5-10 minutes or until heated through.

## Persian Love Cake

Serves: 12

### Ingredients

- 2 cups (240g) almond meal
- ¾ cup (110g) self-raising flour
- 300g butter, at room temperature
- 1 ¼ cups (275g) firmly packed brown sugar
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 ¼ tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 ¼ tsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp ground cardamom
- 2 tsp rosewater
- 6 eggs
- Turkish delight, pistachios, raspberries, gold leaf and dried rose petals, to decorate

### Rosewater Buttercream

- 250g butter, softened, room temperature
- 500g icing sugar mixture
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 3 tsp rosewater, or to taste
- 1 tbsp milk
- Pink food colouring, to tint

### Method:

1. Preheat oven to 180°C/160°C fan-forced. Grease a round 22cm diameter cake pan. Line base and sides with baking paper. Combine almond meal and flour in a bowl and set aside.
2. Using an electric mixer, beat butter, sugar, vanilla, cinnamon, ginger, cardamom and rosewater in a large bowl until pale and creamy. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating after each addition. Fold in almond meal mixture until combined.
3. Spoon mixture into prepared pan. Smooth surface. Bake for 50-55 minutes or until a skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean. Set aside in pan for 10 minutes to cool before turning onto a wire rack to cool completely.
4. Meanwhile, using an electric mixer, beat butter in a bowl until pale and creamy. Gradually add icing sugar mixture, beating constantly until combined. Add vanilla and rosewater. Tint pale pink with colouring. Beat until combined.
5. Cut cake in half horizontally. Place cake base on a serving plate. Pipe or spread over half the buttercream. Top with cake top. Pipe or spread with remaining buttercream. Decorate with Turkish delight, pistachios, raspberries, gold leaf and dried rose petals. Serve.

## X-Trail's competitive edge

In the process of researching this story I came across a review by one of my esteemed colleagues.

Not once did he mention the fact that Nissan X-Trail and Mitsubishi Outlander are one in the same car, sharing a platform and drive-trains.

That makes Outlander, the X-Trail's most direct competitor, or so I would have thought.

Of course, they don't look the same and there are plenty of other differences, but you wouldn't buy one without checking out the other first.

Then again, the latest X-Trail is probably the pick of the mid-sized SUVs at the moment -- and that's a pretty big call.

The styling is evolutionary rather than revolutionary and it is clearly recognisable as an X-Trail, but looks more sophisticated.

Inside, it is a very different story where the car has undergone a complete makeover and looks nothing like the previous model.

Piano black has made way for a classy, dark, textured wood-grained effect, while all four doors get wide pockets that can accommodate 500ml drink bottles.

It feels bigger inside too, although slightly shorter than before (4680mm) with the same 2705mm wheelbase.

At the same time, it's 20mm wider and stands 15mm taller, and somehow, they've managed to find more rear legroom, with rear doors that open wider for easier access.

Prices range from \$36,750 for the five-seat, front wheel drive ST up to \$52,990 for the top of the range Ti-L 4WD.

While they call it a 4WD, it's really all-wheel drive, in the sense that it doesn't have a transfer case or low range gearing like a Patrol.

A seven-seat version of the ST is also available for another \$3000 which adds all-wheel drive to the mix.

Special attention has been paid to ergonomics and tactile feel of the switchgear and buttons used in the cabin to lend them a high-quality feel.

Research has shown a preference for easy-to-use core functions, so X-Trail features simple, intuitive heating/air-conditioning controls, as well as buttons that govern the central screen functions, such as audio and navigation.

A two-tier centre console provides plenty of space to stash items, with a charge pad in more expensive models for mobile devices.

Standard equipment for the entry model includes cloth trim and air conditioning, with second row air vents.

The driver's seat has six-way manual adjustment with power lumbar operation.

It rides on 17-inch alloys, with LED head and tail lights, along with auto high beam and dusk-sensing activation plus auto fold, heated exterior mirrors, push-button start, an electric parking brake and rear parking sensors.

By the time you reach the Ti-L (subject of our test), there's larger 19-inch wheels, tan or black quilted Nappa leather, three-zone climate air, a heated steering wheel, intelligent rear-view mirror, matrix 12-element adaptive headlights and a power tailgate with hands free opening.

X-Trail is covered by a 5-year, unlimited-kilometre warranty along with roadside assistance during this period.

The entry-level ST comes with an 8.0-inch infotainment unit that has six speakers and features AM/FM and DAB+ digital radio, wired Apple CarPlay and Android Auto, plus four USB ports – two for the front and two for the back.

The touchscreen in Ti-L is 12.3-inches wide, with voice control, built-in navigation, wireless CarPlay, but still wired Android Auto plus 10 speaker Bose audio -- to name a few

features. Fourth generation X-Trail offers a revised 2.5-litre four-cylinder petrol engine with 135kW of power and 244Nm of torque – 9kW and 18Nm more than before.

This will be joined shortly by e-Power hybrid versions, based on a 1.5-litre three-cylinder engine, but with more power and torque, available with ST-L, Ti and Ti-L grades.

Available in two- and all-wheel drive configuration, all models are fitted with an Xtronic CVT (Continuously Variable Transmission) along with steering wheel mounted paddle shifters and shift-by-wire technology.

X-Trail scores a full five stars for safety.

Dual front, side and curtain airbags are standard, along with a centre airbag which provides added protection to front seat occupants in side impact crashes.

Autonomous emergency braking (Car-to-Car, Vulnerable Road User, Junction Assist and Backover) as well as a lane support system with lane keep assist (LKA), lane departure warning (LDW) and emergency lane keeping (ELK) and an advanced speed assistance system (SAS) are also standard.

The seats are generous, supportive with a Euro feel reminiscent of a Pug.

Front and rear doors, front mudguards and the bonnet are all made of aluminium and the tailgate has been rendered in a composite material – to reduce weight and lift performance.

Key aerodynamic features include “3D” tyre deflectors in the lower front fascia and an active grille to control air flow to the engine compartment.

Specially shaped A-pillars and underbody covers manage air flow under the vehicle and a unique “air curtain” directs air from the front to the sides of the vehicle.

In the load area, a clever false floor composed of two panels can be lifted and fixed vertically to separate the load area into two sections.

There's also under-floor storage for smaller items and room for a space saver spare.

A central console-mounted rotary selector offers five drive modes: Off-Road, Snow, Auto, Eco and Sports.

Fuel consumption is a claimed 7.8L/100km for the Ti-L. It takes standard unleaded and we were getting 8.9 from the 55-litre tank after close to 400km.

Maximum braked towing capacity is up from 500kg to 2000kg.



The previous X-Trail offered perky if ultimately uninspiring performance.

Like its predecessor, the ‘all-new’ model is a bit of a mixed bag in this department.

Although the numbers are slightly larger, the naturally aspirated engine lacks torque down low where it is needed and has to be pushed hard to get it going.

This brings on the awful zoominess that we've come to associate with CVTs, together with higher fuel consumption.

Off the boil and cruising the open road performance is relaxed, smooth and relatively effortless.

In this context, demanding drivers will most likely find the way the car performs more than acceptable – and really, that's all that matters.

On the plus side, the ride quality is much improved, with little road noise penetrating the cabin. You've gotta like that.

Large, bright, impressive digital displays for the driver and infotainment help the car stand out too, with separate controls for most used features.

Of special note, the 10.8-inch head-up display

play in our Ti-L is one of the few, if not the only example we have ever encountered that is visible through polarised sunglasses.

I still remember driving the first-generation X-Trail.

It was surprisingly good off road and a dream to drive compared to the big, clumsy 4x4s that ruled the roost back in the day.

X-Trail was late to the compact SUV party but it was well worth the wait.

I really liked the previous model that I drove not so long ago, but this one is so much better it doesn't bear comparison.

Good work, Nissan!

At the other end Robe's Gluyas made an impact, shooting a few long bombs, while Demi Carter shot nine from nine.


The Demons won the quarter by two goals to take a tentative lead to the final stanza.

# Portland rejects proposal

The Portland Football and Netball Club has denied a proposal from the South Australian National Football League (SANFL) to join a re-branded Western Border Football and Netball competition in 2024.

Instead, the club elected to remain at its current home in the Hampden Football and Netball League for the foreseeable future.

Portland Football Club president Troy Bannam was contacted this week and said it was a unanimous decision.

"We have chosen to stay in the Hampden league," he said.

"It basically came down the perception of the group and the footy club.

"The Portland Footy Club thought it was probably a bit of a step back I suppose, as far as the standard goes - whether that is correct or not I am not sure.

"The players and the footy club wanted the challenge of playing at the highest level they possibly could.

"That was unanimous throughout the whole group."

The decision was finalised last week as the club turned its attention to preparation for the 2024 season.

"We are trying to recruit for coaches and recruit players and it just made it very difficult with the uncertainty of where we were actually playing," Bannam said.

Bannam said SANFL and in particular Head of Community Football Shawn Ford were "terrific to deal with" throughout the consultation process but in the end the shoe did not fit.

"The whole process was probably a little bit rushed," Bannam said.

"There were a lot of things that had to line up depending on other clubs and this or that.

"Where we are now we know all of our foot-

ball teams are going to get a game and the same with the netball."

Now the focus is on improved results in the Hampden league.

Last season the Tigers made A Grade football finals for the first time since transferring to the league in 2013 from the Western Border Football League.

That was a high point for the club and now it hopes to build up to similar success.

However, this will take some time following an outflow of players over the off-season.

"We lost about 15 players who left the region last year," Bannam said.

"We played finals for the first time in the Hamden league last year and then unfortunately - through no fault of the footy club - they decided to leave town.

"We probably lost between 15-20 of our top 35 players which put a massive dent in our playing list."

Bannam said the focus for the club is now set on securing an A Grade football coach, while also boosting the playing stocks across the board.

"Jarrod Holt who has been our coach for the last four years, he is stepping down," he said.

"Like a lot of other clubs we are trying to secure a coach and players as well.

"That includes retaining the list that we have and then recruiting some new talent."

Bannam understands it is a difficult time for many country football clubs but hoped to see his own and fellow organisations weather the storm.

"It is difficult for all football clubs and leagues at the moment," he said.

"We wish everyone the best and hopefully we can all survive and thrive.

"We are not the only club which is going through this at the moment, it seems to be happening everywhere."
