# Threats to wetlands

**To the Editor, The South Eastern Times.**

Further to your article of July 20th, 2023 “The lake debate” we would like to point out that many people in the South East are very concerned about the wetlands in our region, especially Lakes George and Bonney SE.

These hugely important wetlands face many threats including a falling water table, climate change and damage resulting from uncontrolled access.

Lake George is a particularly large (6,327 ha) and extremely important reserve for birds – in fact it is internationally significant for five species of threatened shorebirds such as the Curlew Sandpiper which migrates 12,000 km from the Russian Arctic!

More than 100 other species come here including the near-extinct Orange-bellied Parrot (only 40 pairs left in the wild).

Your article suggests that all is well with Lake George.

It isn't.

Lake George suffers from accelerating and unstructured visitor pressure which disturbs wildlife and damages their habitat.

Wildlife impacted by visitor pressure, such as shorebirds and waterfowl, currently have no safe refuge areas.

The SA Government's proposed changes in management arrangements for six coastal wetlands in South East SA are therefore a reasonable compromise.

The proposal for Lake George for example allocates one-third of the lake for better protection of wildlife with the remaining two-thirds unchanged.

In addition, the recreational values of Lake

George would be enhanced if supported by investment in compliance and enhanced visitor facilities.

However, we also note that final decisions will not be made until Native Title issues have been resolved.

Given this will take time, we call on the government to implement interim conservation measures as a matter of urgency.

# Memorial for Viet vet David Steen

One of Penola's own will be remembered and honoured next week, as the 50th anniversary of Australia's withdrawal from the Vietnam War draws near.

The Coonawarra and Penola Returned and Services League will hold a memorial next Thursday for David Steen, a Penola local who was called up to the Vietnam War as part of the National Servicemen's program.

This year marks 50 years since Australia withdrew from Vietnam, and the RSL.

Mr Steen was only 22 when he was killed in action in South Vietnam on February 18 1968.

He was the only person from Penola to die be killed in the Vietnam War.

The Steen Family arrived in Australia in 1960 from the Falkland Islands and settled in Penola where they worked at the Penola Butter factory.

Mr Steen attended school and played football in Penola, and in 1967, he was called up for National Service duty.

At the time he was employed as a tractor driver, but later that year he was sent to South Vietnam as a sapper with 1st Field Squadron, Royal Australian Engineers.

During the 1968 TET offensive at Fire Support Base Andersen, Mr Steen was killed while at a listening post outside the perimeter wire, during a 150 round Viet Cong Mortar barrage.

After midnight two waves of Viet Cong attacked the base resulting in eight Australians being killed and 22 wounded.

He was laid to rest in the Penola cemetery.

He will be remembered On Thursday, August 3, with everyone invited to pay their respects.

There will be a memorial at 11am in War Memorial Park, where a tree has been planted in Mr Steen's honour.

All are welcome.

More than 804,000 men registered for national service between 1964 and 1972, with more than 63,000 called up to serve, and more than 15,000 served in the Vietnam War, where around 200 died and over 1,200 were wounded.

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War, Veterans SA is gathering the stories of South Australian Vietnam veterans and their families to capture and preserve these personal histories for the benefit of future generations.

# Watch out for weeds

The Limestone Coast Landscape Board are encouraging contractors to thoroughly clean their vehicles and machinery to help prevent the spread of weeds and soil borne pathogens across the region.

Weeds can have a significant impact to primary production, the natural environment and our townships and gardens, and the agricultural cost of weeds in Australia is estimated to be \$4.8 billion per year, or \$13 million a day.

Limestone Coast Landscape Board Senior Landscape Officer, Nicole McGuinness said that once established, weeds can be costly and

difficult to control.

"Prevention is always better than cure and if we can stop weeds spread and protect areas of the Limestone Coast from new incursions, we are not only protecting the landscape we are also assisting primary producers protect their bottom line," she said.

"We're particularly concerned that weeds such as false caper, African lovegrass, Bathurst burr and variegated thistle could be spread to new areas of the Limestone Coast as a result of equipment and machinery

not being cleaned properly before being moved to the next site, or best practice weed

hygiene procedure not being followed."

The LC Landscape Board have developed a 'Best practice weed hygiene' online training tool to support those working on roadsides, in earthmoving and on properties of the impact of declared weeds to the region.

The training tool assists individuals in understanding of best practice weed hygiene and their legal responsibilities and obligations when it comes to the movement of declared weeds.

"We will be asking businesses and industry groups in the region, such as councils, machinery operators and contractors, to include

the training tool in their staff training and inductions," said Ms McGuinness.

To support the roll out of the online tool to businesses, the board are reminding the community of the importance of cleaning vehicles and equipment and invite them to also utilise the best practice training tool which takes less than 30 minutes to complete.

## Adoption of Valuations and Declaration of Rates



Notice is hereby given that the Wattle Range Council at a meeting held on 13 July 2023 and in relation to the financial year ending 30 June 2024, adopted the 2023-2024 Annual Business Plan and Budget and resolved to:

### 1. Valuations

- (b) Commercial Shop—a differential rate of 0.3398 cents in the dollar

- (d) Commercial Other—a differential rate of 0.3398 cents in the dollar
- (e) Industry Light—a differential rate of 0.3398 cents in the dollar
- (f) Industry Other—a differential rate of 0.3398 cents in the dollar
- (g) Primary Production—a differential rate of 0.1858 cents in the dollar
- (h) Vacant Land—a differential rate of 0.5102 cents in the dollar
- (i) Other—a differential rate of 0.5102 cents in the dollar

### 3. Minimum Rate

Pursuant to Section 158(1)(a) of the *Local Government Act 1999* declared that the minimum amount payable by way of general rates on rateable land in the Council area is \$650.00.

### 4. Service Charges

Pursuant to Section 155 of the *Local Government Act 1999* imposed the following annual service charges;

#### (i) Waste Collection Service

based on the level of usage of the service, on all land to which the Council provides or makes available the prescribed services of the collection, treatment or disposal of waste via Council's waste management services in respect of each set of bins, or part thereof, provided on the basis that the sliding scale provided for in Regulation 13 of the *Local Government (General) Regulations 2013* will be applied to reduce the service charge payable, as prescribed.

- (a) three bin normal waste, recycling and green organics collection and disposal service of \$352.00; and
- (b) two bin normal waste and recycling collection and disposal service of \$275.00

#### (ii) Community Wastewater Management Systems

based on the nature of the service and varying according to the CWMS Property Units Code in accordance with Regulation 12 of the *Local Government (General) Regulations 2013* on all land in the Townships of Penola, Southend, Kalangadoo and Beachport to which it provides or makes available the Community Wastewater Management Systems being prescribed services for the collection, treatment and disposal of waste.

- (a) Penola, Southend and Kalangadoo—Occupied Unit \$720.00
- (b) Penola, Southend and Kalangadoo—Vacant Unit \$538.00
- (c) Beachport Occupied Unit \$817.00
- (d) Beachport Vacant Unit \$613.00

### 5. Separate Rates

Pursuant to Section 69 of the *Landscape South Australia Act 2019* and Section 154 of the *Local Government Act 1999*, in order to reimburse the Council for amounts contributed to the Limestone Coast Landscape Board declared a separate rate based on a fixed charge varying on the basis of land use categories in respect of rateable land in the Council's area.

- (i) \$90.30 per assessment on rateable land categories (a), (h) and (i) (Residential, Vacant and Other);
- (ii) \$135.25 per assessment on rateable land categories (b), (c) and (d) (Commercial Shop, Commercial Office, Commercial Other);
- (iii) \$211.70 per assessment on rateable land categories (e) and (f) (Industry Light and Industry Other);
- (iv) \$389.30 per assessment on rateable land category (g) (Primary Production).

### 6. Payment of Rates

Pursuant to Section 181 of the *Local Government Act 1999*, rates for the year ending 30 June 2024 will fall due in four equal or approximately equal instalments on 13 September 2023, 6 December 2023, 6 March 2024 and 5 June 2024.

## SA ranks third in country

The South Australian economy has ranked third in Australia following the latest ComSec State of the States report.

State Treasurer Stephen Mulligan said it was very pleasing to see South Australia's economic strength recognised, ranking behind only Tasmania and New South Wales.

"This report confirms that certain economic indicators in South Australia continue to show resilience in the face of eco-

nomie headwinds," Mr Mulligan said.

"This is a positive sign as we come into an uncertain period that is likely to weigh on national, and subsequently South Australian economic activity."

According to the report, SA was also tracking well in terms of population growth and employment, with latter sitting 4.7 per cent higher than it was at this time last year.

## Dairy factory sale no worry

The potential sale of two interstate dairy processing facilities will be unlikely to affect the South East in the short term, according to Australian Dairy Farmers (ADF).

Supermarket giant Coles is looking to acquire milk two processing plants owned by Saputo Dairy Australia, with one each in New South Wales and Victoria. The planned sale has been met with concern from the dairy industry, with ADF president Rick Gladigau worried it would affect competition at the farm gate. However, Mr Gladigau said the sale, if it went ahead, would be unlikely to have any short-term impacts on dairy producers in South Australia.

"The concern will be over Coles growing that market share and then how they operate on the supermarket shelf, because they will have control from farm to retail, which nobody else has," he said.

"It's a hard one for the region - if Saputo said they were pulling out of the market, that makes a difference, that would be a real concern for the South East market."

While the South East would likely be unaffected at first, Mr Gladigau did not rule out possible long-term effects.

He said dairy farmers would need to keep abreast of the situation and put plans in place for the next five to 10 years.

"A lot of it is about, what's our efficiencies

we can gain at farm level in terms of production costs?" he said.

"Given there are other players in the market around there, it's finding the processor that suits your needs, really, that offers you the price based on how you produce milk.

"Electricity is the biggest one currently hitting us, then we look at fertiliser efficiencies and composting, reuse of waste."

Mr Gladigau also said those were only possibilities, though, with the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) releasing a Statement of Issues on the planned sale.

"We're pleased to see ACCC have got this statement of intent about it, because it does show they haven't just ticked the box and said yes or no," he said.

"We want competition at the farm gate level - we need it to maintain a good price."

ACCC deputy chair Mick Keogh said they are considering the possible ramifications for the dairy industry if the sale goes through.

"We have heard strong concerns across the industry about how the acquisition will strengthen Coles's position in the dairy supply chain," Mr Keogh said.

"Many industry participants have expressed concerns that the acquisition will result in Coles consolidating its private label milk production, which would increase its bargaining power in negotiations with dairy processors and dairy wholesalers."

# Haynes eyes preselection

PRESIDENT of the MacKillop State Executive Council Matthew Neumann has squashed rumours he will be putting his hand up for preselection of the electorate.

Mr Neumann said becoming the next Liberal Party MacKillop preselection candidate was not on his radar after recently accepting the presidential role.

Current vice president of the State Liberal Party Lachlan Haynes, however, has confirmed with The South Eastern Times he was "seriously considering" standing for the MacKillop preselection under the Liberal Party.

Mr Haynes is known within the local branch as a long term member and volunteer.

He has been the chair of the Rural and Regional Council and is the previous president of the MacKillop State Executive Council for four years.

Mr Haynes said he was "very keen" about going further into politics if the potential opened up.

"Representing the people of South Australia and particularly regional people is something I am passionate about," Mr Haynes said.

"I am also passionate about MacKillop because I am born and bred and live in Naracoorte and want to do what I can - if that potential ever arises - to be a Member of Parliament in either the Upper or Lower House to particularly advocate for MacKillop and on regional issues."

He said issues at the top of his list included infrastructure in the region, particularly for roads which needed much more work.

"We have got many issues confronting South Australia including rural doctor shortages and staffing, particularly a lack of workforce and that is also a function of housing availability," he said.

"We also need better health access and expanded services in the Limestone Coast including radiation therapy.

"We need to make the regions - particularly MacKillop - large employers and help the workforce reach its full potential."

He said he believed there was potential for the region to keep growing and needed to "get rid of government regulation" as much as possible "particularly from the State and get help from the State with all these issues".

Mr Haynes also commented on the current

discussion circulating about the Liberal Party being influenced by the "far right".

"I don't find these rumours factually correct as the Liberal Party is a broad party of membership from across the state, it is very inclusive and there will always be people of divergent views," he said.

"It is a democratic party and allows all people to have their say and stand for positions in the party and some elections go to some people's liking and others don't."

He said he believed the Liberal Party was inclusive and promoted "real free speech" which sometimes "ebbed and flowed" with different groups and views.

"At the moment we are seeing people standing up for what they believe in and it is great to see members, particularly younger members, to put their hand up for the party and stand up for their views and get involved with the party," Mr Haynes said.

"As vice president and as previous president of the State Executive Council I have been contacted by many and I think the party is in good shape."

He said despite some members being "upset" by the sudden resignation of former Lib-

eral Party member and Member for MacKillop Nick McBride, many had felt Mr McBride had been "drifting" for some time.

"I think he [Nick] will have support from a small subset of the party and that is fair enough," he said.

"We are a strong and broad church but the majority are looking forward to robust preselection and getting a good candidate to hit the ground running and find a candidate who can articulate their views.

"I think they are feeling confident going forward that the Liberal Party will be a strong force at the next election."

Mr Haynes stated he believed a "lot of this talk" was in people's minds and reiterated the party was in a "positive position".

"People have the ability to express their views and beliefs and going forward we are confident in the procedures and have a robust preselection process," he said.

Another name floating around the community for preselection was previous Member for Boothby Nicole Flint.

The South Eastern Times has contacted Ms Flint to confirm the rumours but she did not respond in time for print.

## Trio of Limestone Coast artists get to the heart of art

Three Limestone Coast artists have joined together for this year's South Australian Living Artists (SALA) exhibition at the Millicent Gallery.

Heartlines brings together Ann Carpenter from Glencoe, Andrea Bartetzko from Worrolong and Mount Gambier based Kirsten Johnston.

The artists, who have exhibited and worked together previously, will be showing a variety of drawings and paintings spanning from realistic to abstract.

"We bring together a collection of new works that seek to express our art from the heart" Ms Carpenter said.

"Heartlines, heartwarming, heartache, heartfelt, heartburn, the heart of the matter.

"Our world is full of sayings and expressions that try to evoke how we feel about our lives."

Ms Carpenter's work in this exhibition evokes her love of drawing using ink and drawing crayons.

These works on paper are executed quickly while the artist attempts to get to the heart of the subject matter, before logic takes over with limitations about how things should be.

Abstract artist Kirsten Johnston explores the small moments in life, those which are often missed or forgotten, attempting to give a visual representation to fleeting instances.

The artist combines abstraction with landscape with the natural world around her an important inspiration.

# Author visits old mystery

Bestselling author Darry Fraser is visiting the Millicent Library 11am on Tuesday August 1st to discuss her latest novel *The Forthright Woman*.

Writing stories against a backdrop of Australian historical events her most recent book is based on Kanyaka Station at the gateway to the Flinders Ranges.

Although Kanyaka Station has been long abandoned, Ms Fraser's research and storytelling brings station life in 1898 into focus with a mystery that crosses decades.

Ms Fraser explained how her work is inspired by history.

"The first thing I do is find an iconic event and the next thing I do is 'listen' for my characters" she said.

"I ask myself the what-if questions about why they were there, who they are, what they do and what they look like.

"I immerse myself into the landscape, for example Kanyaka Station, and always try to research the immediate local history for the facts so that I can weave my story around them."

Themes in the author's books centre women, their strength and resilience, and how events shape their lives.

"Human nature hasn't changed, but society has, and it's always interesting to delve into how someone from 100 plus years ago might have responded to the events around them."

Harper Collins are the publishers of *The Forthright Woman* and are also publishing the author's next book, *The Milliner of Bendigo*, due for release at the end of this year.

Ms Fraser, currently based on Kangaroo Island, is touring the Limestone Coast to talk

# Council flags solidarity

The Pride flag will fly outside the Wattle Range Council chambers every November, in solidarity with the LGBTIQ+ community.

A letter from Rebecca Galdies, of SA Rainbow Advocacy Alliance which was tabled at the last Wattle Range council meeting, asked the council to consider flying the rainbow flag, as they have in previous years.

“Flying the rainbow flag actively contributes to the health and well-being of the whole community and is a symbolic way in which councils can help celebrate the Festival state-wide, as well as publicly acknowledging their councils role in promoting and celebrating diversity,” the letter said.

“This year we are pleased to announce that we have 24 municipal councils participating and 4 High Schools, some for various days during the Festival, some for the duration of Feast and some for the entire month of November.

“Whilst some municipalities have been prevented from displaying the flag on a flag pole, due to local Council policies, they overcame these obstacles by flying or hanging a rainbow flag in the windows of their community centre or library, or by erecting a temporary secondary flag pole for the duration of the Festival.”

The motion, moved by councillor David Walshaw, was moved with little discussion.

Councillors voted to fly the Pride Flag perpetually during the month of November.

Limestone Coast Connect chair Pat Smith welcomed the news.

“It has been positively received by the LGBTIQ+ community of the Limestone Coast,” he said.

“Limestone Coast Connect greatly appreciates the forward-thinking action being taken by the Wattle Range Council.

“We hope this is showing some leadership to the other six LGAs in the area.

“By flying the rainbow flag, it is showing visibility to the LGBTIQ+ community and that you are seen, visible, wanted and accepted in the community.

“It’s not just a metropolitan-based thing, having this visibility out in the regions is quite important.

“Hopefully we are able to get the other six LGAs on board following the lead of Wattle Range Council.”

## Interest grows in latest land release in town centre

Expressions of interest are being sought for a large parcel of State Government owned land in Millicent’s town centre.

The 3.93 hectare site comprises three allotments and stretches from Academy Drive almost through to Rocky Camp Road.

It includes the Italian Social Club building built in the 1970’s and handed to Wattle Range Council (WRC) in 2015 due to declining use.

The crown land had been in the care and management of WRC until late 2021 when council resolved to hand back the parcel of land to the South Australian Government for potential sale.

Council undertook an extensive community consultation process at the time which resulted in three submissions, none of which were negative towards the proposal.

The land has been deemed surplus to the State Government and listed with a local real estate agent.

South East Property Sales owner Fiona Telfer is the agent tasked with selling the unique land parcel.

“We’ve already got a lot of interest, people are doing their own due diligence and waiting for the EPA report that I have just received” she said.

“It doesn’t have any contamination.

“Subject to council approval, land use or zoning changes you could do some development work on there.

“It includes the Italian Social Club which is a very good building, in very good condition.”

The real estate listing states the community facility zoning could potentially be changed to suit residential or retirement development.

The flat site is close to the commercial centre and Millicent High School and is edged by the town drain along its Eastern boundary.

Ms Telfer sold several nearby Department of Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) land parcels along the disused railway corridor.

The DIT parcels had been registered with the Environment Protection Agency as being contaminated sites.

It took almost three years before the final allotment was sold earlier this year.

Ms Telfer is hopeful the latest State Government land parcel will sell much quicker due to not having the contamination issues of the DIT sites.

# Art effort speaks of home

Kristi Biezaite will be exhibiting her exquisite creations at Karatta Wine Room and Gallery in Robe, opening on August 6.

In the exhibition, Ms Biezaite will be displaying blankets and shawls, pots, and embroidered cloths she has designed and made by hand.

For Ms Biezaite, the process is deeply personal and offers a way to reorientate to her new homeland.

Emigrating to Robe from Latvia 12 years ago, Ms Biezaite always sensed danger in the native Australian bush, which stemmed from a lack of familiarity regarding what was safe to eat and the names of the trees and flowers. In contrast, during her Latvian childhood, she had the good fortune to be taught about plants and edible nuts and berries by her grandparents, spending many holidays in the woodlands.

It's not easy to obtain this level of knowledge of the Australian bushland, but in her inimitable style, Ms Biezaite has tackled the problem with energy and fortitude.

She has found that the leaves, bark, and blossoms of Eucalypts are ideal to dye wool, and that this offers her an intimate knowledge of at least those trees and flowers she uses in her creations.

Ms Biezaite showcases the early stages of her creative process, including displaying skeins of wool dyed using a range of natural objects. Eucalyptus bark, leaves and blossoms are boiled up with a fixing agent (mordant) to create deep tones of apricot and moss green.

Copper pipes from the Robe Town Brewery, which Ms Biezaite founded with her husband, Maris, were used to complete the range of colours, creating a muted rainbow.

The wool she has dyed comes from their own sheep, and the entire process is hands-

on for Ms Biezaite, who prepares the wool for spinning prior to weaving or knitting. Beautiful blankets, large enough to shield against the cold winter nights, are each composed of a single fleece: a traceability almost unique in our fast-paced commercial world.

Stripes and subtle variegations in the weave showcase Ms Biezaite's artistry with every stitch.

This artistry was recognised by a grant from Arts SA, which has given Ms Biezaite the freedom to create these works. So far, the work has taken a full year.

In addition to the woollen blankets, Ms Biezaite has embroidered a range of tablecloths, runners, and shawls with her inimitable style. Tiny blackwork stitches highlight the path of screen-printed beetles across the centre of the work. Leaves and blossoms are screen-printed together with nuts and bolts to form a delicate tracery in the surface of the fabric.

Small pots are made from felted wool remnants, ensuring that nothing goes to waste and is instead transformed into items both beautiful and useful.

Come and enjoy the exhibition with a glass of wine at the Karatta Wine Room and Gallery from August 6.

# Building sees many uses

In association with State Heritage, Penola's branch of National Trust SA has developed a mobile phone app called SA Heritage, to enable people to learn more about historic sites within Penola on self guided tours.

The following is one of the subjects from this app.

## PIPERS OF PENOLA RESTAURANT

This building started life in 1908 when the Methodist community in Penola purchased the land and set out to build their church with the help of Home Missioner Moses Gabb from Kalangadoo, who raised money and built the church himself with the help of carpenter, Mr Charles Jackson.

By 1920 attendances had dwindled and the building was sold to the newly-formed Penola RSL who sadly had to relinquish it during the Depression.

In 1928 it became the property of the Independent Order of Oddfellows Manchester Unity Friendly Society, Penola Lodge No. 80. This organisation was founded in Manchester in 1810 and set up to protect and care for their members at a time when there was no National Health Service. The aim was, and still is, to provide help to members when they need it.


With many sick and injured men returning home from World War II, a committee comprising Eric Kidman, Walter Rogers and Eric Balnaves repurchased the building in 1942.

It was during this period of ownership that the small kitchen area was added to the back of the hall and 'smoke socials' were held, with Frank Hinze and Paddy Mooney playing the piano. In 1958, following the building of their new establishment, they sold it to the Penola District Caledonian Society.

There has always been a strong Scottish influence in the Penola district and for the next ten years they shared the building with the Penola & District Caledonian Pipe Band that had been formed in 1950. A memorial to the Scottish pioneer families of the Penola district, erected in 1988, was later transferred to the St Andrew's Church grounds.

In 1998 the building was purchased by Hugh Koch, who carried out extensive alterations and opened Pipers of Penola Restaurant in 2001.

The ownership was transferred to Simon and Erica Bowen and has achieved outstanding success.

## Road safety key as pupils head back for new term

Motorists are being urged to be vigilant on the roads as students head back to school around the state.

Both South Australia Police and RAA have reminded people to keep an eye out for young pedestrians during the first week back after school holidays.

As a way to make sure motorists do the right thing, SAPOL has announced it will be running a two-day road safety operation to start off the school week.

Officer in charge of traffic support branch Superintendent Darren Fielke said there will be a lot of police visibility in school zones.

"As families get back into a routine and return to school, police will continue to target drivers who speed, fail to belt-up, take illicit drugs before driving or make other poor decisions which can put other road users at unnecessary risk," Supt Fielke said.

"We continue to randomly test drivers for drugs and alcohol, even around schools, so our message is simple: Do not drug or drink drive.

"Roads will be busy, so remember to stay patient, reduce your speed to 25k/h in school zones and allow a bit of extra time during school runs."

Supt Fielke encouraged members of the community to contact police immediately if they see anyone driving dangerously, especially near a school.

RAA senior manager of safety Charles Mountain said drivers need to stay alert with

increased numbers of school children on footpaths and in bike lanes.

"It's the responsibility of drivers and riders to look out for children around schools and on nearby roads and motorists should regularly check all mirrors and blind spots – it may just save a life" Mr Mountain said.

"Motorists should take extra care around school zones.

"Children are some of our most precious and vulnerable road users, and we all need to look out for them whether they're being dropped off, riding or walking to school."

Mr Mountain said there were a number of basic actions motorists could take to ensure they kept young pedestrians safe around school zones.

"As a driver you must give way to any cyclists and pedestrians that may be about to cross the road that you're turning into," he said.

"Also, watch out for mid-block pedestrian crossings on major roads which will be activated more frequently particularly in the morning and afternoon as children and parents travel to and from school.

"Be prepared to stop when the lights change to yellow as long as it is safe to do so to help keep our children and all road users safe."

Mr Mountain also reminded drivers to make sure they had their headlights on to maximise visibility in wintery conditions.

# Motoring

## Third generation of HR-V

Unlike most of its competitors, that have up to five SUVs in their range, Honda currently has just two, the small HR-V and mid-sized CR-V. That's about to change with a third variant, ZR-V, due for release in a few weeks and which will slot into the space between the other two.

This week we're reviewing the HR-V. When it arrived here in 1999 it was one of the first compact SUVs around and at once set the standard for what has since become one of the fastest growing segments of the automobile market.

Unfortunately, with its bland styling and three-door body, that original HR-V never really took off and it was subsequently discontinued in 2003. It remained off the Australian market until 2015 when the much more attractive five-door second-generation model arrived.

The third generation of the HR-V arrived here in 2022 with sleeker styling, advanced safety and driver-assist features.

It comes in two equipment levels with two different powertrains starting with the Vi X that's powered by a 1.5-litre i-VTEC petrol engine, and the e:HEV L hybrid powertrain.

Our test was the petrol-only model.

### STYLING

The distinctive new HR-V grille design blends the intakes with the bumper and when combined with the sleek headlights, gives the HR-V a futuristic look. The grille is body-coloured (there's a choice of five) rather than the more common contrasting chrome or black in-fill.

As is a growing trend the rear of the HR-V is a cross between an SUV and a hatchback in its lines but with embedded rear door handles suggesting that it's a two-door coupe.

The lower-side panels are painted in black which makes them harder to see and therefore adds to the apparent ground clearance and SUV look.

### INTERIOR

The dashboard has the instruments in a binnacle with a curved top. The nine-inch central screen is landscape in shape and therefore doesn't give you a view ahead as is offered in a portrait screen.

Potential buyers need to be aware that the HR-V only comes with two rear seats.

This isn't necessarily a problem for two-plus-two families because the rear has comfortable and supportive bucket seats with a large padded armrest between them and a couple of cup holders.

Rear passengers also get adjustable air vents, two USB-A ports and another drink

holder in each door.

The rear seatbacks fold completely flat and the bases can be folded up to allow for taller objects to be carried.

### INFOTAINMENT

The centre screen is a nine-inch touch unit but rather too shallow to give a long view ahead when using the satellite navigation. The problem for the interior designers is that there simply wasn't enough room in the lower dash area for a better screen.

It has wireless Apple CarPlay and wired Android Auto.

### ENGINES / TRANSMISSIONS

The four-cylinder engine isn't turbocharged and has capacity of 1.5 litres with 89kW of power and 145Nm of torque. It is happy to run on standard unleaded petrol which can make a real difference given some of the crazy prices being asked for petrol at the moment.

It drives the front wheels through a continuously variable transmission.

### SAFETY

The Australian ANCAP safety rating gives the

HR-V five stars. The Honda suite of driver-assist and safety technologies includes forward collision warning, collision, mitigation braking system, lane keep assist system and lane departure warning.

### DRIVING

The engine is relatively small and doesn't produce as much power as we would like. It's a typically Honda unit in that it likes to have plenty of revs on board before it really takes off.

Keen drivers won't mind this because once it's given its head it's a really pleasing unit to drive.

Handling is pretty good, with plenty of feel through the steering wheel. It's able to easily take corners at speeds far higher than those who would be done by the typical family driver.

Ride comfort is a little on the firm side but after a couple of hours on our extended-drive part of our road test review the Honda HR-V we still felt comfortable so, again, the designers have done an excellent job.

Fuel consumption is rated at 4.3 litres per 100 kilometres in the hybrid variant and 5.8 L/100km in the petrol model. We averaged 6.6 in our petrol test car.

Standard warranty is five years and unlimited distance with the option of a two-year extension.

### SUMMING UP

Honda HR-V VI X is an interesting machine that, while it doesn't have the straight-line performance that we like, it does have handling that we really enjoy. However, the lack of three seats in the back could make it difficult to sell when the time comes to do so.

"We were lucky to have three of our suppliers come on board to supply the pots, paint and plants."





# Wild Rice and Charred Broccoli and Egg Salad

**Cook + prep time:** 55 minutes

**Serves:** 4

**Ingredients:**

**Salad**

- 150g wild rice
- 4 eggs
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- ¼ cup (65g) whole raw almonds
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 2 bunches broccolini, ends trimmed

- 5-6 red radishes, trimmed and cut into wedges
- 3 green onions, sliced
- 1 small pomegranate, seeds removed
- 1 ripe avocado, peeled and quartered

**Dressing**

- 2 tbsp red wine vinegar
- 2 tsp Dijon mustard
- 3 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- Salt and pepper to taste

**Method:**

1. Cook wild rice according to packet instructions. Drain and set aside.
2. Cook eggs in a saucepan of boiling water for 5 minutes or until medium soft. Remove and cool immediately with cold water to stop cooking. Peel and set aside.
3. Meanwhile, heat oil in a non-stick frying pan over medium-high heat. Add almonds and pinch of salt and toss in hot pan for 1-2 minutes or until toasted. Transfer to plate and coarsely chop once cooled.
4. Cut broccolini into bite size pieces. Cook in the same pan as the almonds were toasted in, until lightly charred and just softened. Remove and set aside.
5. To make the dressing, whisk red wine vinegar, mustard, and season

to taste with salt and pepper. Drizzle in olive oil and mix well.

6. Combine wild rice, charred broccolini, radish, green onion, almonds and pomegranate in a large salad bowl. Pour over half the dressing and toss gently to coat.
7. Cut eggs in half and arrange over salad with avocado. Drizzle over remaining dressing. Serve immediately.

**TIPS:**

- Wild rice, broccolini, eggs, almonds and dressing can all be prepared a day ahead and refrigerated separately.
- Wild rice can be cooked in a rice cooker or for a shortcut, use microwave rice sachets.
- Substitute wild rice with black rice or brown rice.

# Spaghetti with Salmon

**Prep time:** 5 minutes

**Cook time:** 30 minutes

**Serves:** 6

**Ingredients:**

- 6 eggs
- 400g wholemeal spaghetti
- 300g fresh salmon, thinly sliced
- 1 ½ cups baby spinach
- 80ml extra virgin olive oil
- 1 lemon, zest and juice
- Pepper to taste
- ¼ cup parmesan shavings
- A fresh avocado and pea salad, to serve

**Method:**

1. Cook the spaghetti in a large pot of water.
2. Poach the eggs and set aside.
3. Place salmon and spinach into a large bowl.
4. Once the pasta is cooked, lift it out of the water into the bowl stirring carefully. Add a little of the pasta water to bring it all together.
5. Use the heat from the pasta and water will cook the salmon and spinach.
6. Combine oil, lemon zest and juice, drizzle over the pasta, season with pepper.
7. Place onto plates and top with the poached egg and some parmesan shavings.

**TIPS:**

- Twist up this recipe for other times of the year by replacing the salmon with cooked chicken strips.

# Eagles claim thrilling win

Penola survived a late final-quarter surge from Padthaway to claim a thrilling two-point win at home in Round 12 of Kowree Naracoorte Tatiara football.

Despite the close score-line, Penola coach Brad Maney said his team was "better for longer" which was ultimately the difference between the two sides.

"There is no doubt we were the better side for the first three quarters and we probably should have been three or four goals up at quarter time," he said.

Maney also said the Eagles played some of their best football of the season with the ball movement from halfback the strongest it has been all year.

In what was difficult conditions for scoring, Drew Clayfield stepped up in the forward line to lead the way for Penola with three goals.

"He has had a good couple of weeks now," Maney said.

"He was very dirty on himself on his kicking for goal against Naracoorte and he turned that around this week.

"He is such a big presence but he is also a smart and selfless footballer, so him play-

ing well is massive for our side and the whole structure."

Brock Egan also put in a memorable performance and kicked what proved to be a pivotal goal to end the third term.

"That was massive and I guess if you look at it in the context of the quarter that happened after it, without that goal, we do not win the game," Maney said.

"I felt he played his best game of the year on Saturday, his ability to break lines and superb ball-use was probably the difference."

For Maney, all he hopes is for his side to show an improvement from the last game.

"I just think it is an opportunity for us to show that we are not too far away from those top sides."
